

\$3,000 reward offered in supermarket heist

TAHOKA - An armed robber held an employee at gunpoint at Tahoka Thriftway grocery store early Friday morning, getting away with an undisclosed amount of money after forcing employee Felix Calvillo to open the store safe. The unidentified male was heavyset and wearing a black t-shirt and blue jeans, with a bandana tied over his face and a red baseball cap pulled low over his forehead, according to video captured by Thriftway's security cameras. The baseball cap had a capital "T" on the bill, possibly a Texas Rangers or Texas Tech

Lynn County Crime Line and Thriftway are offering a \$3,000 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the robber, according to store owner Steve Sanders. Call The Lynn County Sheriff's Office at 806-561-4505 or Tahoka Police Dept. at 806-561-5255 to report any information.

"I know there is somebody out there that knows who this guy is, and we are offering a substantial reward for this information," Sanders told The News. "It's not so much about the money, but if he gets away with this he will do it again, and the next time somebody may get hurt, or worse. I am so thankful that Felix wasn't hurt," he added.

Op-Ed The Lesson Congress Should Learn from the VA Scandal

Like other federal scandals before it, the mess involving VA hospitals has followed a well-trod path. First comes the revelation of misdoing. Then comes the reaction: a shocked public, an administration on the defensive, and grandstanding members of Congress. Finally, major reform bills get introduced, debated, then put aside when the heat dies down, or the target agency gets more money thrown at the problem.

With the VA, we're at the reform part of the cycle. In its rush to address public outrage, Congress is proposing dramatic changes that could have benefited from more thorough

The irony is that this need not have happened — not with the VA, nor with the IRS, or FEMA, or any of the other cases in recent years where the federal bureaucracy proved to be dysfunctional and Congress rushed in with a half-baked fix. Mostly what is needed is for Congress to do its job properly in the first place.

This means exercising its oversight responsibilities and catching problems before they mushroom. Diligent oversight can repair unresponsive bureaucracies, expose misconduct, and help agencies and departments become more effective.

To do this, Congress first needs to know what's happening. Performance, budget, a personnel, management challenges, major and minor problems: members of Congress ought to be experts on all of this. Understanding the facts, working cooperatively with the federal agency, and anticipating problems is a far more useful approach than Congress's usual pattern of throwing up its hands at a scandal and blaming everyone else for the problem.

Congress must also get serious about reforming the federal bureaucracy. Federal employees deserve to feel they're being listened to, respected, and treated fairly, but management also must have flexibility to hire and fire, and to handle personnel problems constructively.

If Congress wants federal agencies to work better, it has to work tirelessly to understand problems and help repair them. It cannot eliminate politics from this oversight process, but politics should not drive the whole oversight enterprise.

The point is that many failures of the federal bureaucracy can be avoided with robust congressional oversight. It's a crucial part of improving the performance of government, and Congress has a duty to get ahead of problems, not lag constantly behind. Unless it's willing to accept its responsibility for diligent oversight, the next scandal is only a matter of



Protect your pets against heartworm

COLLEGE STATION - Heartworm disease is transmitted to an animal through the bite of a mosquito carrying heartworm larvae, which eventually settle into the blood vessels of the lungs or within the heart itself. Although cats are less susceptible than dogs to heartworm infection, our feline friends are still very much at risk of heartworm disease.

"Cats have some innate resistance to infection, and the worms seem to prefer living in dogs rather than in cats," said Dr. Audrey Cook, an associate professor at the Texas A&M College of Veterinary Medicine & Biomedical Sciences. "In addition, the tests we traditionally use in dogs, such as the Knotts test and heartworm antigen tests, are not very sensitive in cats as the number of worms is much lower."

Dr. Cook explains that though more sensitive tests are now available, cats are still not routinely screened for infection. It is highly likely that many cats are infected but are simply not identified.

Although it is more probable for outdoor cats to come into contact with infected mosquitoes, indoor cats still have a notinsignificant chance of contracting the infection. "As infection requires a bite from an infected mosquito, indoor cats are less at risk overall," said Dr. Cook. "However, we do still see this disease in strictly indoor cats, most likely occurring when an infected mosquito gets inside of the house and then bites the cat."

Some of the most common heartworm disease symptoms include frequent coughing, weight loss, vomiting, lethargy, and difficulty breathing. However, since many of the symptoms mimic those of asthma and

other disorders, affected patients may be misdiagnosed.

"Although some cats are diagnosed because they show some of the clinical signs and the veterinarian then performs the appropriate tests, many cats are diagnosed with heartworm disease after suddenly dying and only then finding the worms in the heart or lungs," said Dr. Cook. "The blood tests available have substantial limitations, and we sometimes only confirm the diagnosis by visualizing a worm in the heart using echocardiography."

If a veterinarian suspects heartworm disease in a cat, he or she is likely to recommend radiographs (X-rays) of the chest, along with antigen and antibody testing. Depending on these results, an echocardiogram (ultrasound examination of the heart) may be indicated.

Unfortunately, there are currently no approved treatments for feline heartworm disease. Veterinarians often recommend using medications to limit clinical signs such as coughing, and starting cats on preventative medications in order to stop future infection and hasten worm death.

"In addition, an antibiotic called doxycycline may be prescribed to the cat, as it is also thought to weaken the worms and hasten their death," said Dr. Cook. "However, sometimes the death of the worm causes an acute and fatal reaction in the cat, so it is a very difficult disease for us to deal with."

Indoor or outdoor, young or old, every cat is vulnerable to heartworm disease. Since there are no available treatments for this widespread infection, preventative medications administered on a regular basis are a must for protecting your feline friend.
