

The revenue the city derives from the golf course is based on a seconinimum rent and possible percentage rents if revenues from perations exceed certain thresholds. The minimum annual syment today is \$50,000, which was instituted in 2009 with a endment to the lease agreement that was approved by both arti, according to the release. Prior to that, the payment was approved by \$25,000.

Heath seeks liens against non-paying customers

Members of the Heath City Council gave approval to staff to seek property liens against customers who get far behind on their sewer or trash-removal bills.

According to staff a significant number of customers are several months or several years behind on their payments.

Most of the time trash and sewer customers are also water customers, so cities have the recourse of turning the water off and requiring high deposits to ensure collections, but Heath serves many custom-

ers who get their water from other sources.

Efforts to contract with water companies to link water service to payment of trash and sewer bills have been unsuccessful, staff said.

The city may have as many as 10 customers with balances in excess

of \$3,000 and many more in the \$500-and-under range, staff said.

Staff will take steps immediately to secure liens on those high-balance accounts and seek additional liens as the debt increases in increments. Liens will give the city the ability to recover its money if property changes ownership, such as in foreclosure.

On March 15, 2010, Atmos Energy Corporation, Mid-Tex Division ("Atmos Energy" or "the Company"), filed a Rate Review Mechanism ("RRM") filing to increase its gas rates and implement a new schedule of rates and riders. This filing is applicable to all customers within all incorporated cities served by the Mid-Tex Division, with the exception of the City of Dallas. The proposed effective date of the requested rate changes is August 1, 2010. If approved, the proposed changes will affect approximately 1,190,843 residential, 97,756 commercial, and 735 industrial and transportation customers.

If approved, the proposed rates will increase the Company's annual revenues for the affected incorporated areas of its Mid-Tex Division by \$56,826,830, or 6.04% percent, including gas costs, or 14.82% percent, excluding gas cost. The proposed change in rates constitutes a 'major change" as that term is defined by Section 104.101 of the Texas Utilities Code.

Based on the proposed rate design, the typical monthly bill for each customer class within the affected incorporated areas of the Mid-Tex Division will increase by the amount and percentage shown in the table below:

But ir voracious federal government thrives on collecting information. In

fact, to prepare for the 2010 census state employees recorded GPS coordinates for every front door in the United States so they could locate individuals with greater accuracy! Once duly located, individuals are asked detailed questions concerning their name, address, race, home ownership, and whether they periodically spend time in prison or a nursing home - just to name a few examples.

From a constitutional perspective, of course, the answer to each of these questions is: "None of your business." But why is the government so intent on compiling this information in the first place?

The Census Bureau claims that collected information is not shared with any federal agency; but rather is kept under lock and key for 72 years. It also claims that no information provided to census takers can be used against you by the government.

However, these promises can and have been abused in the past. Census data has been used to locate men who had not registered for the draft. Census data also was used to find Japanese-Americans for internment camps during World War II. Furthermore, the IRS has applied census information to detect alleged

tax evaders. Some local governments even have used census data to check for

compliance with zoning regulations.

It is not hard to imagine that information compiled by the census could be used against people in the future, despite claims to the contrary and the best intentions of those currently in charge of the Census Bureau. The government can and does change its mind about these things, and people have a right to be skeptical about government promises.

Yet there are consequences for not submitting to the census and its intrusive questions. If the form is not mailed back in time, households will experience the "pleasure" of a visit by a government worker asking the questions in person. If the government still does not get the information it wants, it can issue a fine of up to \$5000.

If the federal government really wants to increase compliance with the census, it should abide by the Constitution and limit its inquiry to one simple question: How many people live here?

If the government sets up health care so that other people pay for your care and you pay for theirs, that doesn't mean that you'll get great care for free. All it means is that you'll pay a zero price — and high taxes — for whatever the government decides to give you. That's a big difference, and that's where rationing comes in. Rationing is entirely consistent with and, in fact, required by government-provided health care because basic economics teaches us that the amount of health care people demand increases when prices to the consumer drop to zero. As government health-care budgets inevitably balloon, suppliers will be squeezed to "share in the pain" and "give something back." This will complete the tragedy and double the rationing efforts, as the amount supplied will decline in response to reduced payments. Economic theory will be confirmed and our society will have taken a great leap backward.

Soviet "right to health" failure

We shouldn't forget the dire results of the Soviets' 70-year "constitutional right to health" experiment.

With unsanitary conditions, drunken personnel, bed sheets stained from past patients' blood, a lack of medical supplies, and workers just pretending to work, Soviet hospitals were a hundred years behind their U.S counterparts. Russian economist Yuri Maltsev points out that according to official government records, 78 percent of all AIDS victims acquired the virus through dirty needles and HIV-tainted blood in state-run hospitals.

Will you pay bribes for treatment?

Patients had to pay bribes to garner even minimal attention from medical personnel. Hospital bureaucrats withheld anesthesia from patients as a further means of collecting bribes. Some in the Russian Parliament estimated the infant mortality rate to be seven times that of the U.S. rate. Shockingly, fiftyseven percent of all Russian hospitals did not even have running hot water. Not surprisingly, the Soviets had a two-tier system: one for the common citizens and a much better one for the Nomenklatura - the bureaucrats and party lead-

It's true that these extreme examples are from the poor and backwards Soviet Union. It's not likely to get that bad here. But the principle is the same whether ers will pay attention to the government, not to us. The recent Task Force in the Soviet Union, Britain, or Canada: When the government pays, the government is the customer and the patient suffers. Take, for example, the waiting lists for medical care in Canada. Canada's Fraser Institute, which publishes an annual report on waiting times, estimates that the median waiting time between referral by a general practitioner and an appointment with a specialist was 8.2 weeks in 2009. The median time between the appointment with a specialist and

an actual medical procedure was 8 weeks. The total wait: over 16 weeks or almost four months.

How long will you wait for treatment?

Consider admissions to the E.R. In American emergency rooms, the average wait before a patient sees a doctor is 30 minutes, according to Reason science correspondent Ronald Bailey. A year ago, the British government set a maximum target of "only" four hours for the National Health Service. The Guardian reports that U.K. emergency rooms are meeting the four-hour goal through "patient stacking." Even seriously ill patients have been forced to wait outside in ambulances before they can be admitted, thus delaying the start of the fourhour timer — and tying up ambulances.

Moreover, European health-care systems, with the accompanying high tax rates, are one reason that Europeans' standard of living is 30 percent lower than ours. While this might seem unrelated, it is both germane and essential.

How much will you pay?

A private firm says to its customers: If you want this service or product, you'll have to pay for it. Under the Senate and House health-care bills, the government heavily subsidizes the insurance premiums of low-income people. As their income rises, the government reduces its subsidy. That means that people's implicit marginal tax rates — the amount of each additional dollar the government takes — rise. Harvard economist Greg Mankiw estimates that the reduction in subsidies adds an additional 23 to 32 percentage points to marginal tax rates for middle-income families. This amounts to a doubling of marginal tax rates to around 60 percent or so. Some smart taxpayers, looking at keeping only about 40 cents of an additional reported dollar of income, will respond by shifting their time to untaxable pursuits such as retirement, recreation, or the off-the-books economy. After all, why work for something you will receive anyway? Economists have a vivid term for these distorting effects of high marginal tax rates: deadweight loss.

In the frenzied sprint to further insulate Americans from their health-care costs and to spend OPM, most Americans will be the big losers. Genuine reform should move us as far away from the Soviet disaster as possible. ObamaCare is, at best, a distraction and, at worst, multiple hops down a dreary path that history admonishes us to avoid.





"It was a miracle"

That's the way Linda Jefferson describes her neardeath experience in Galveston with her 81 year old mother. On the weekend trip to Galveston, Linda woke up the day after arriving with severe back pains, "I couldn't move, the pain was excruciating." She was admitted to University of Texas Medical Branch, Galveston Hospital where she was diagnosed with kidney failure. While in ICU, hospital staff informed her mother about the seriousness of Linda's condition, not expecting her to live.

"I remained in a semi-conscious state for several days," Linda explained. "I was still in pain and couldn't walk or do anything for myself." After 10 days she was ready to

be released from the hospital, with recommendations to

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seek help in a rehabilitation facility to help her strength and be able to walk again. "I wanted to be d home, so I told them to take me to Royse City Hea Rehabilitation Center," Linda said. I was unable to the trip back by car, so it was a seven hour ambulance

"I was at an all time low," she added, "but in a few slowly came out of that state, because the staff was so tive and caring. They literally saved my life! I could anything by myself upon arrival, but every day got fittle bit better. They just kept encouraging me."

Linda is at home now, and returns to Royse City He Rehabilitation Center once a week as a volunteer. "I some good friends there," she said, "and I enjoy bingo, it's a wonderful outing for me and I get to s friends again."

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
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Lady Jackets work overtime to reach regional

Rockwall parents walked on to the field, wearing dazed expressions and holding their hands over their heart, after the girls' soccer game at Lovejoy Tuesday.

They had just seen the Lady Jackets upset a district champion for the second time in five days in shocking, heart-stopping fashion.

Both games went past overtime to shootouts. Tuesday's game against unbeaten McKinney even when past the five shooters designated by their coaches. In the sixth round of kicks, sophomore Bethany Schomin won

Rockwall (10-7-6 overall) was just 4-4-2 in district play, with two losses each to Pearce and Highland Park, but the Lady Jackets have swept four postseason opponents.

What's the difference?

Said RHS head coach Melissa Garcia, "The girls have come into their own as a team and found a different level of soccer in themselves. They have seen what they are capable of, and they realize that if they play together and

have faith in their teammates, they can accomplish great things."

Those great things could include a third consecutive set - this time of Pearce, Richardson 21-4A's runner-up behind Highland Park. The Lady Mustangs (20-4-2) have not lost in 13 games. They're also the last team to defeat Rockwall, 1-0 on March 12.

Rockwall boys lead regional gymnastics after first day

on the high bar (9.6). The Jackets showed depth, with four gymnasts among the top seven allaround. Bradley Meyer (57.8) was third, Robert Johnson (56.7) fifth and Zach Bennett (54.2) seventh. Meyer's best event was the parallel bars, tied for second with 9.9; Johnson was tied for fourth on the bars (9.8), and Bennett tied for third in the vault (9.6).

Rockwall had a good month of March. The Jackets went into the district meet following a first-place finish in the L.D. Bell Invitational in Hurst. Their score of 151.65 easily out-distanced the 140.85 by the host school, which has won 16 state championships. Rockwall-Heath was sixth with 120.15.

In that meet, Johnson was second all-around - including first places on the pommel horse, rings and parallel bars, and third on the high bar. Strong placed third all-around, tying Johnson for first on the parallel bars and finishing fourth in the floor exercise and high bar and five in the rings and vault. Bennett's eighth place all-around included finishing third on the floor and pommel horse and fifth on the parallel bars.



Royse City Lady Bulldogs start second half of season in first place, 7-0

With two wins by a combined score of 24-0, Royse City completed the first half of the District 10-4A softball season in first place with a 7-0 record.

That sole position atop the standings was in jeopardy Thursday, when the Lady Bulldogs (15-6 overall) were scheduled to play at second-place Rockwall (6-1 in the district).

The most recent games for RC, a 10-0 home victory over Carrollton Newman Smith Friday, and a 14-0 romp Tuesday at Carrollton R.L. Turner, weren't a lot different from what the Lady Bulldogs have down all season. They outscored their district opponents 60-7 the first time around that district. That's an average score of almost 9-1.

Four of the runs allowed were in a 5-4 victory over Rockwall in the district opener. The Lady Bulldogs shut out five of their seven 10-4A opponents.

On Friday, Alicia Pille, who already has two no-bitters in district play this season, pitched a one-hitter and struck out 15 batters. The Lady Trojans' only hit came on a slow ground ball that was fielded at third base. The batter barely beat the throw across the diamond to first base.

Royse City's offense started slowly, with just a 1-0 lead after two innings. In the bottom of the third, Pille hit a fly ball that hit the top of the fence in leftcenter field and bounced over for a three-run home run. She had fallen behind no balls, two strikes, but worked the count to 3-2 before her big hit.

RC added another run for a 5-0 lead after three innings, and scored four more runs in the fifth. Mallory Baumann's two-run single was the key hit in that inning. The game ended in the bottom of the sixth when a Lady Bulldog broke from third base after a throw to first, and beat the throw home. The 10-0 lead meant Royse City had reached the 10-run mercy rule.

The Lady Bulldogs did the same Tuesday, taking a 14-0 lead before the teams had played the five innings needed to make the game official.

Little Sluggers T-Ball program offered






