THE UNITED STATES seems to be working itself into a bad situation from a standpoint of foreign affairs.

The hostage situation with Iran has now brought on the breaking of relations with that country and a call to our allies to do the same. A few of America's friends have followed suit, although most appear to want to stay out of the squabble.

Then there is the invasion of Afghanistan by Soviet Russia, which has caused almost as big a stir in our country as the hostage situation.

The U.S. has protested the Afghanistan invasion to the point of pulling out of the 1980 Olympics, and is just now beginning to get some support from some of America's allies.

Some observers say that Russia is now building up its border with Iran, much the same as it did on its border with Afghanistan, before it invaded that nation. This leads some to think that a Russian invasion of Iran might be their next step.

It would seem to the casual observer that the world's nations are almost in the process of "choosing up sides" for an ultimate conflict.

Our nation can ill-afford another Vietnam, so we are hoping that the threatened conflict never comes.

The hostage situation has become a frustrating issue. It must really be frustrating for those with friends and relatives in Iran, due to the way their hopes have risen and fallen practically with the tides.

Had you realized that Barbara Tim, hostage mother who was finally successful in seeing her son this week in Iran, had originally applied to Iran for a visa as early as January?

Mrs. Timm's application was put off, ignored or given the runaround, until the VERY DAY that President Carter made his edict against travel by Americans to Iran. Then, within hours, Mrs. Timm received her okay on her visa application.

It was evident that the Iranian leaders want to force Americans in general and the hostage families in particular to go against the president's wishes regarding foreign policy.

The international "chess game" continues, and one wonders where it will end. It is frightening to realize that at stake are not only the lives of the 50 hostages, but perhaps another group of thousands of young lives if the nation should be plunged into another war situation.

We certainly are not an expert on foreign policy, so we have no quick answers to our problems. We doubt that there are any easy answers.

But we are working ourselves into a very serious set of circumstances, and the deeper we go in each situation may mean the harder it will be to come out without a confrontation of some kind.

Bird Season Will Shorten To 16 Days

Jack Patterson and Reagan Looney flew to Austin last Thursday to meet with the Park and Wildlife Commission to fight for the nine day pheasant hunting season.

Patterson said they had to settle for a 16-day season. The representatives from Hereford asked for 16 days and the commission went along with them.

According to Patterson the bag limit will probably stay the same, although it hasn't been decided definitely.

The game biologist claims about 70 per cent of the birds were killed the first weekend and if the limit was raised it would probably thin the birds too much.

Patterson and Looney returned home Saturday.

REPORT SHOWS

Feasibility 'Good' For Gasohol Plant

"Gasohol production appears to be very profitable, and relatively risk-free."

So reads the opening statement of the feasibility study for a proposed gasohol plant in this area. The study was made by the A.D. Little Company.

Grady Sorley, a member of the board of directors of the steering committee for the proposed plant, moderated a discussion here Thursday of the groundwork which has been done so far in securing a plant for this area.

Sorley told those attending the meeting that he feels a plant which would produce 50 million gallons of fuel alcohol per year is a distinct possibility.

Testing Slated

Testing will be done at the Bovina High School Library on May 8, 1980. Testing hours will be from 9 a.m. to 12 noon and 1:30 p.m. to 3 p.m.

This class is offered for 3 to 5 year old children with learning problems, physical problems or a developmental lag at no cost to the parents.

Absentee Voting Gets Underway

Absentee voting began on Monday for the Democratic and Republican primaries May 3.

Absentee ballots may be cast at the County Clerk's office in Farwell, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays, through April 29.

To finance construction of the plant, the steering committee is securing contracts from farmers who will pay \$1,000 in cash and sign an \$8,000 note. The farmers, with such a pledge, agree to deliver 10,000 bushel units of grain to the plant each year.

A chart was distributed to those attending Tuesday's meeting showing that while the price of corn has gradually gone down during the past nine months, the price of fuel alcohol and gasoline has been constantly on the rise.

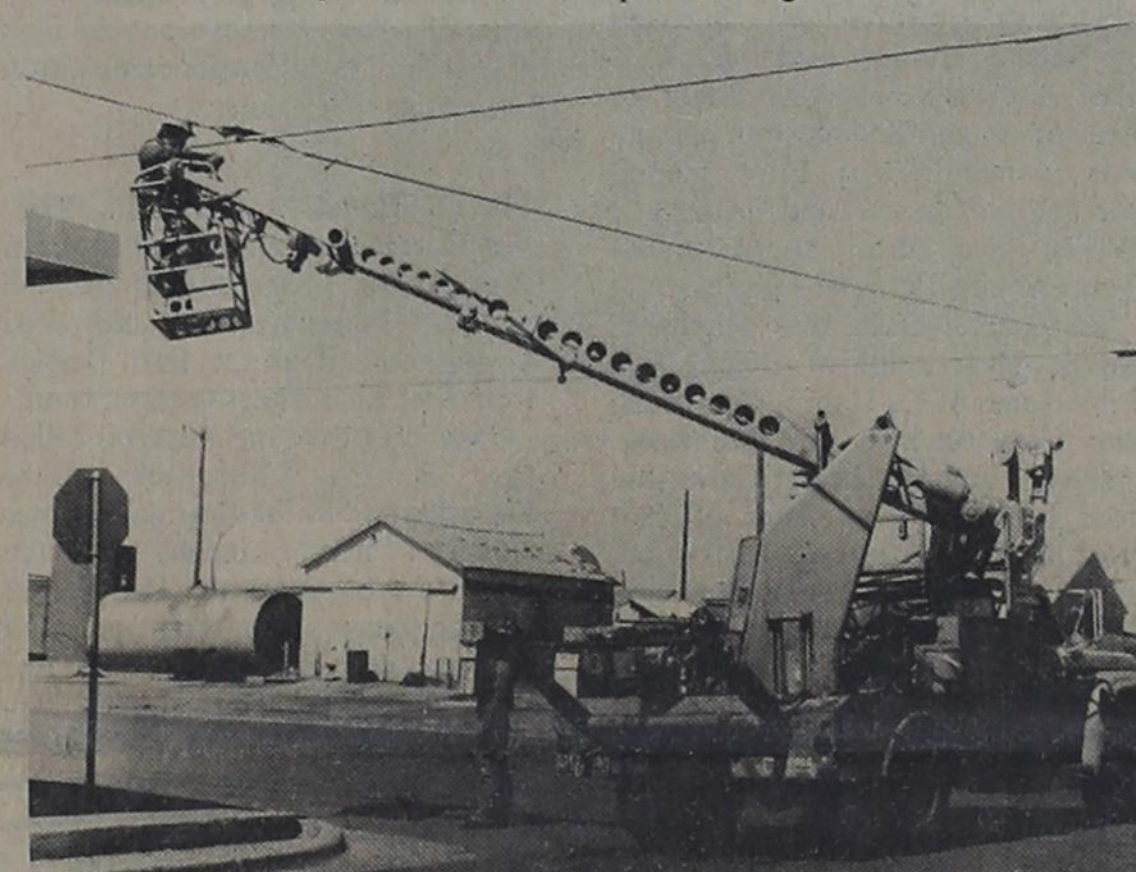
"I feel that if we are to continue with a profitable venture, we must somehow tie our products to an

energy source, and the gasohol plant gives us the opportunity to do just this," Sorley said.

The cooperative has set as May 1 the deadline for signing on as a member of the co-op. It was explained that only farmer members can deliver grain to the plant when it is in operation. It will be a "closed co-op" in that respect.

The proposed plant is expected to be designed where it can process corn, maize, wheat--virtually any grain.

Sorley said that at this time it appeared that maize may turn out to be the most profitable grain to process for gasohol.

Court Session Is Routine

Mostly routine business was conducted by the Parmer County Commissioners at their regular meeting this past Monday at the court house.

The commissioners voted to transfer some money from the county's Farm to Market Road Fund into certificates of deposit, as the money is not needed at the present. A total of \$20,000 was transferred from Precinct 1's F-M fund, and \$30,000 from Precinct 3. Ninety-day certificates were purchased.

Treasurer Benna Felts gave the quarterly treasurer's report for the county.

Two bills were presented for Dora Fields, Parmer County foster child, \$186 for boarding care, and \$147 for

medical expenses. Since the child has now qualified for Medicaid assistance, the future bills should be small, Judge Porter Roberts said.

The county's participation in the Texas Counties Association's unemployment fund was approved.

The county will advertise for bids to replace a 1975 Ford LTD belonging to the county Sheriff's Department.

The commissioners also are advertising for bids for two Massey-Ferguson tractors with seven-foot sickle mowers, and a 500-gallon four-wheel tank trailer.

The court also voted to advertise an arc welder which was recovered by the Sheriff's department from a robbery, but the owner has not been located.

Rules Explained On Voting For Primary

"You don't have to be a life-long Republican to vote in the May 3 Republican Primary," according to Mrs. Vernon Estes, Parmer County Republican Party Chairman.

"Voters who have always voted Democratic in the past, and who intend to vote for some Democrats in November, are nevertheless eligible to cast a ballot in the Republican Primary."

She pointed out several good reasons for doing so, including the fact that the Republican Primary offers the voter an opportunity to influence the choice of the presidential nominee. "Our presidential preference primary will be binding--the delegates to the Republican National Convention will be chosen based on the votes received by the candidates in the polling places on May 3.

"The Republican Primary will also give the voters of Parmer County an

opportunity to express their opinion on two of Governor Clements' proposals, the use of wiretapping to help stop massive distribution of illegal drugs in our state and the question of Texans having the use of Initiative and Referendum, a method by which the voters of the state could make laws in the general elections," Mrs. Estes said.

The Republican Chairman emphasized that past party activity or future voting plans have no bearing on a voter's choice of primary election in 1980.

"Even a voter who signed a nominating petition for a Democrat can vote in the Republican Primary." According to Secretary of State George Strake, the chairman explained, any election official who tries to prevent a voter from casting a ballot in the primary of his choice would risk committing a federal offense.

Tucker Is FB Manager

Carroll Tucker is the new agency manager of the Parmer County Farm Bureau office, it has been announced.

Tucker is a native of Hobbs, New Mexico, and comes to Friona from Hereford, where he has spent the past two and one-half years with the Farm Bureau. He was a football coach for the first 13 years of his working career.

Tucker is married and he and his wife Retha have two daughters, Kimberly and Tammy. He will be moving his family to Friona at the end of the school term.

"I am very happy to be in Friona and Parmer County. I feel that the potential of this county is unequalled anywhere," Tucker said. "The agricultural potential in this county is one

of the best in the nation," Tucker says.

The new agency manager said that Madge Crow and Carolyn Shipp will remain with the Farm Bureau. It is expected that other sales agents for the county will be hired in the near future.

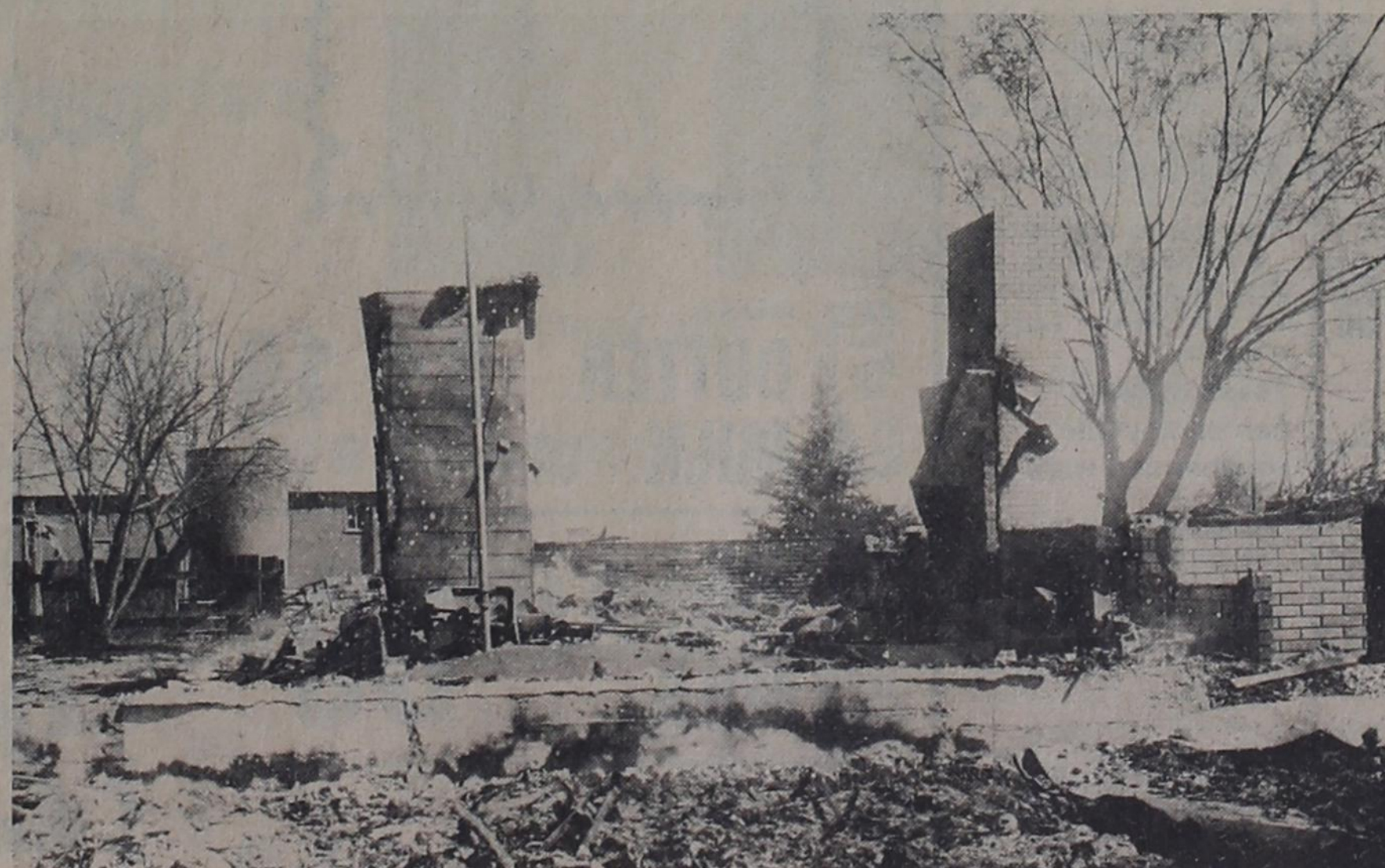
At the present time there is no cure for Cystic Fibrosis.

Texas twisters can hit anytime, weathermen warn

COLLEGE STATION — Although the peak tornado season in Texas traditionally runs April through June, experts at the State Climatologist's Office at Texas A&M University remind Texans that tornadoes are a year-round concern.

The climatologists' reports indicate an average of 109 tornadoes touch Texas soil each year. The state ranks at the top nationally in number of storms sighted — 1,425 of the 8,560 total for the decade occurred here. Because of its size, however, Texas ranks 11th in number of twisters per 10,000 square miles.

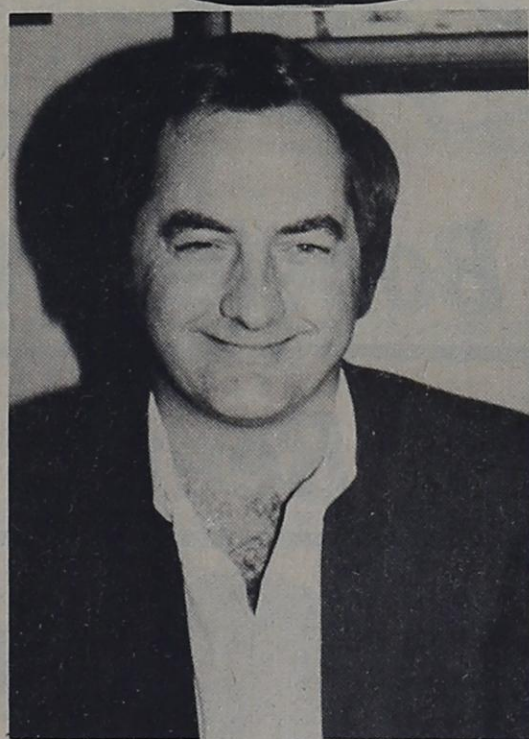
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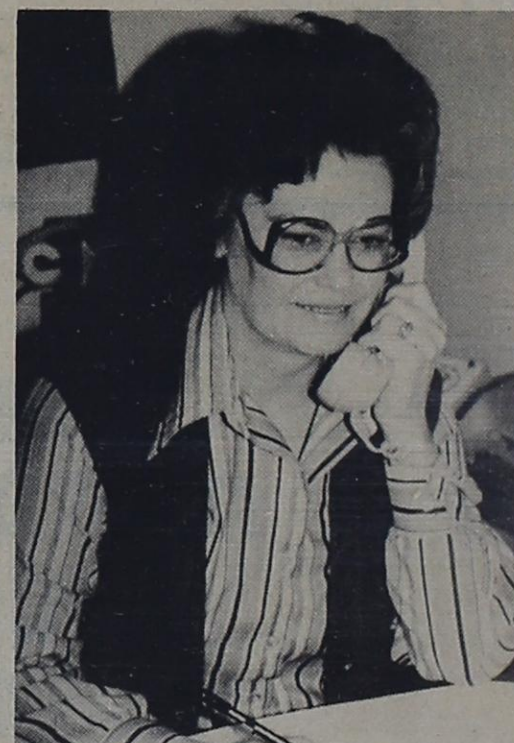

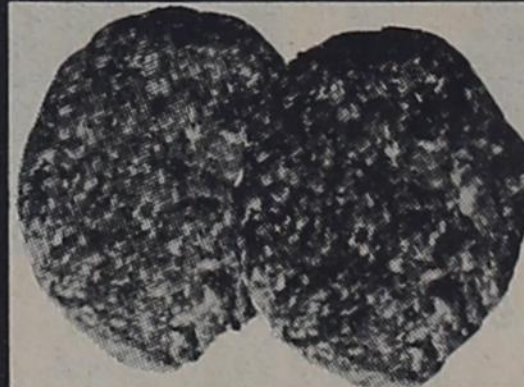

PRAYER: Lord, we are grateful for all our modern equipment, but help us to utilize it to the fullest by making us responsive to Your Holy Spirit. Amen.

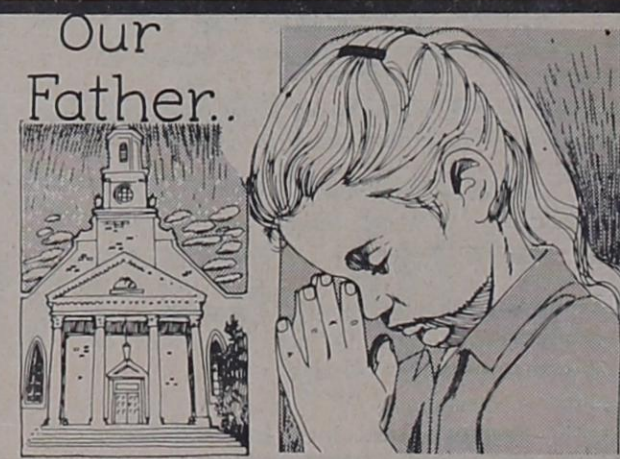

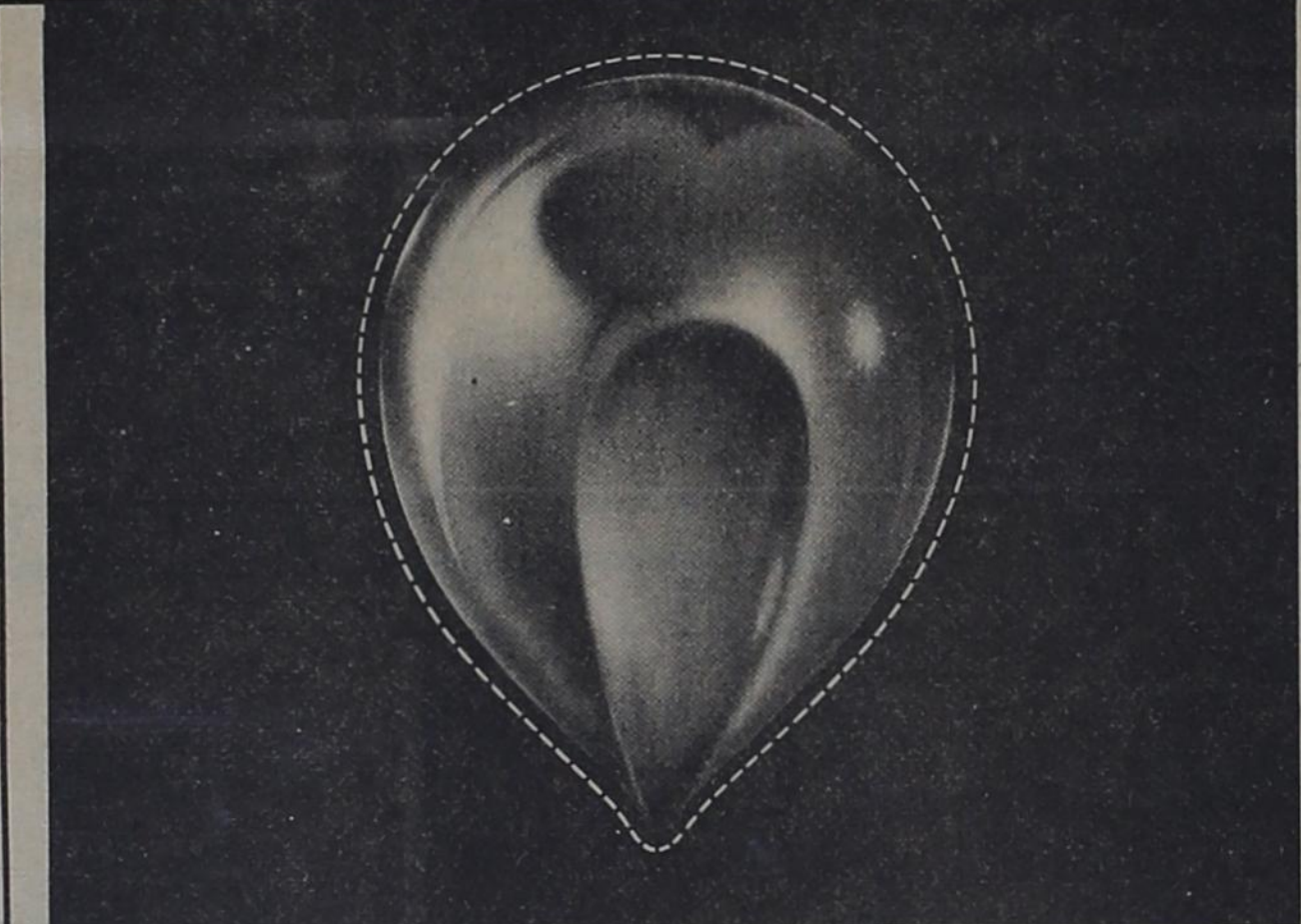

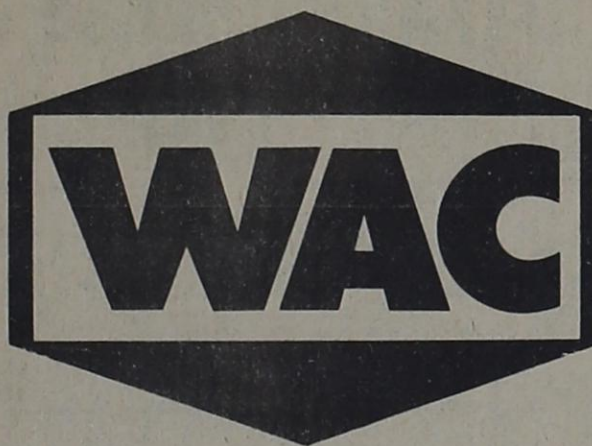

The Lariat Gin men's team took home the first place trophy.



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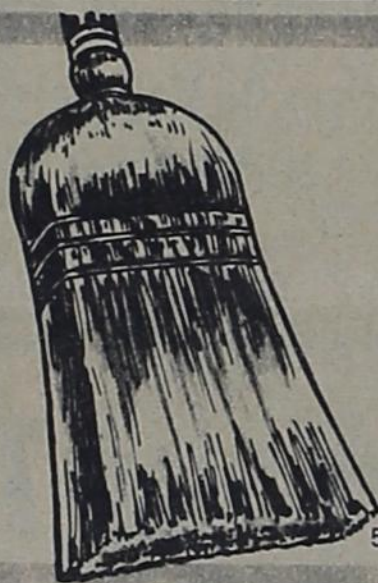


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
