WHITTLIN'

The word, "democracy," and the term, "the American way of life," are often used without their true meaning being felt, we think.

This is brought to mind by the fact that in the next seven days, citizens here will have the opportunity to go to the polls to elect two members of the school board and to fill two positions on the city council.

Unimportant these elections are, you say? Possibly so, but if our local politics were set up any other way, we'd be willing to fight to get them back to the way they are now.

Our intentions are to vote in both local elections and appreciate the opportunity to be able to do so.

Don't look now, Postmaster Ezell, but somebody has relieved you of your metal comma between Bovina and Texas on the front of the post office building.

After more than a year of warming up, Bovina's newest paving program is apparently about to get off to a sputtering start.

We don't know yet the streets which will be included in the program, but we're eagerly awaiting information from the city engineer and the city council in regard to this.

Of particular interest to us, of course, is Avenue A, which is immediately south of The Blade office and unpaved. Surely this street, which is also adjacent to the bank's fine new building a block west of The Blade, will be a part of the program. Not only will paving this street be of benefit to our location, but it will also help most all of Bovina's "downtown" traffic.

People driving away from Main Street, for instance, need to make a loop to get back on Third Street, which is a main artery. With Avenue A between Second and Third Streets paved, it could better serve as a part of that loop. The same situation exists in reverse as far as the post office is concerned. With the post office two blocks from Main, Avenue A could again offer a better service to motorists circling the post office block if it were paved.

During the last paving program, we owned no property on Avenue A. Still, we thought, and wrote, that paving of the street would be of benefit to the downtown section. For various reasons, we're sure, city officials elected to pave Avenue B between Second and Third Streets instead of Avenue A. That was a good deal, too. As a matter of fact, it was second best to paving Avenue A.

However, Bovina's new post office probably wouldn't be located where it is if Avenue B . . . and Second Street . . . hadn't been paved.

One of the post office department's requirements is that the PO be located on pavement. So, without paving, the northwest corner of the intersection of Second Street and Avenue B, would still be semi-improved in all probability.

This is to be considered in connection with the forthcoming paving project.

Property which may now seem to have little value may be improved more than can be imagined after it has paving around it.

The cost of paving is high, but it is about as good an investment as can be made to increase the value of property. Mention of the fact that Third Street now serves as a main traffic artery brings to mind that Second Street could take some of the traffic off Third if Second had paving from Main clear through to Highway 86. This might or might not be a good thing and property owners on the south end of Second might prefer to have their street just as it is, unpaved.

Still, Second, if it had paving, could become a much more important part of the city's street network. At present, Third Street not only serves as the primary link through Bovina Highways 86 and 60 but also is the most-used route between the town's residential sections and downtown.

Paving, as said before, is a good thing; one of the best things

Spears Sell S & S Store

Sale of S&S Dry Good has "gone into contract" here to I. P. (Jack) Renfro from Heavener, Okla., according to Mr. and Mrs. Oris Spears, who have operated the store in its present location since August, 1965.

Renfro is scheduled to be in Bovina Monday to take over the store. However, Spears said a new name for the business has not been announced.

Sale of the business also includes the building, Spears said. Renfro is a former public school band director. He holds his college degree from Sam Houston State College and has directed bands in Texas, Louisiana and Oklahoma.

The past two years he has been engaged in ranching at Heavener, Okla.

Spears also announced that beginning Thursday this week the store will be open from 9 a.m. until 6 p.m.

The term of Edward Issac and C.E. Trimble expire this spring.

Five candidates were petitioned for places on the ballot including Edward Issac for re-election, French Crook, Jimmy Ware, Robert Hopingardner, and C.R. Elliott.

Trimble was ineligible to serve again because of moving outside the city limits.

Likewise, another candidate, who filed, B.J. Goldsmith, also resides outside the city limits and is ineligible to appear on the ballot.

Mayor Bedford Caldwell has another year to serve, having been elected last spring. Hold-over members of the City Council are Owen Patton, Charles Corn and Billie Sudderth.

The five candidates include three businessmen. Isaac is owner and operator of Bovina Dry Goods and The Smart Shop. Crook owns and operates Southside Service Station and Grocery. Ware, who is manager of Bovina Chamber of Commerce, is owner of Bovina Insurance Company.

Hopingardner is bookkeeper for Charles Oil Co., while Elliott, who is a former mayor of Bovina, is a retired businessman.

Drivers Ed Begins Here

Classes for drivers education began Monday, March 20, for 31 students in Bovina Schools.

Instructor is Roy Stone. Sessions are being held each weekday night from 6 to 8. Following 30 hours of class work, which includes traffic laws, use of automobile, safety, etc., the students will take a test to receive restricted license to drive with a licensed operator in the automobile.

Six hours of observation and other driving will be taken, then six hours of driving, Stone said. Following these 12 hours, students may take their tests for driver's license.

Rains Bring Area Boost

Rainfall in the Bovina area Wednesday and Thursday ranged from sprinkles west of town up to two inches on the Lawrence Jamerson farm six miles south-east of Bovina.

One-half inch was recorded here early Thursday morning. At Oklahoma Lane, there report

there from Wendol Christian was that about 1.50 inches had fallen on the northern fringe of the community while about a half inch was received on the southern fringe.

East of Bovina from .70 on the J. D. Kirkpatrick farm to .90 at the Jamerson place were measured.

Gayle Clawson reported .60 north of Bovina, while west of town approximately .40 fell, finally dwindling further from town.

The moisture accounted for the first of any consequence since late summer, and added to

the .20 received the previous Sunday.

Although the rainfall in the Bovina area was "fairly" general, a heavier amount was received along a line from south to east about four or five miles from town.

The heavier rainfalls received in that area, however, appeared to be spotted although nearly all farm land received near a half inch.

Additional moisture is needed, however, since no seasoning is in the ground from the winter except from irrigation, for the planting of spring crops.


Pictures of barrow breed champions in recent issues of The Blade will lend support to the fact that congratulations are in order for the chapter and to Mr. Jones.





Engineer Makes Paving Plans

Ralph Douglas, engineer from Muleshoe, last Wednesday morning accepted employment offered by the City of Bovina for working out plans for paving several streets in Bovina. He is currently going over maps of the city showing paved and unpaved streets and will make recommendations to the city council in the near future, a councilman said this week. These will possibly include some streets to connect existing paving, and needed paving in other areas as well.

Following the submission of recommendations, a hearing is being planned by the city council to hear the wishes of the citizens of Bovina in regard to the engineer's plans.

In January, 1966, Bovina citizens approved a bond issue, which included \$20,000 for a paving project.

Cost of the paving to the citizens involved in the program has not been announced, but is expected to be in the neighborhood of \$5 per foot.

Granddad died, but my dad kept the paper. This scribe had the pleasure of working with him about 15 years.

Just to make a long story short, this writer thinks that editor, or printer as he calls himself, is just about the greatest guy who ever came along -- and married a pretty fine old gal. Right or wrong, he's had the courage to stand up for his convictions, even though they were not always popular -- and sometimes in spite of threats.

There aren't many like him anymore.

A chapter in the family history closes April 1. The old newspaper, established there in 1903, passes into other hands on that date.

It's kinda like losing a member of the family.



GSPA Reports --

Grain Sorghum Progress Made

Only a few members of Parmer County Grain Sorghum Producers Association turned out Wednesday for its meeting in Bovina, but two Japanese representatives of Tokyo's Mitsui & Co., one of the world's largest companies which last year bought 50 million dollars of U.S. grain sorghum, were here to discuss phases of the market with grain men.

Bill Nelson, Amarillo, executive vice president of GSPA, was on hand for the event, as well as Elbert Harp of Abernathy, GSPA president, and A. W. Anthony, Jr., Friona, GSPA secretary-treasurer.

Yojo Miyamoto, deputy section chief, corn section, produce department of Mitsui & Co., Ltd. in Tokyo and Hiromasa Tago,

representative from St. Louis, Mo. were on a tour of the grain sorghum area to become better acquainted with the industry, storage facilities, etc. Nelson said the two were impressed with farming operations here, as well as the storage facilities.

Nelson also pointed out that Japan is the largest consumer of U. S. grain sorghum in the world.

Since the Grain Sorghum Producers Association began, progress made in foreign relations has been astounding. In 1956, when the organization was born, 22 million dollars in sorghum was exported. In 1966, 10 years later, 265 million dollars in sorghum was sold to foreign countries.

However, the price of grain

sorghum is still below corn, and solutions are being sought to remedy the situation.

One project of GSPA since October has been the effort to raise the county loan rate.

Another has been for the CCC to announce higher prices for export at the Gulf. In the last project, during the past month the GSPA has been successful, Nelson said. An increase has been made from 2.37 to 2.49 5/8, which will increase local grain sorghum prices an average of 10 cents.

Attending the meeting from Parmer County were Gene Smith of Lazbuddie, Parmer County president of GSPA; Elmer Hargrove of Farwell, county secretary, Jim Ray Daniel of Lazbuddie, Grady Sorley, Edwin Lide and J. D. Kirkpatrick, all of Bovina, in addition to Anthony.

The riding group also participated in the Grand Entry that night at Lubbock Municipal Coliseum.


However, the day was not an easy one, members of the Roping Club report, since truck transportation planned for the horses did not appear as planned in Bovina and trailers had to be quickly provided.
