SIX DEAD; THREE HURT

THREE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLAR PROPERTY LOSS IN MASSACHUSETTS.

Loss of Life Caused by the Explosion of Turpentine, Paints, Oils and Dynamite.

Lenox, Mass., April 12.—Six persons lost their lives, three others were badly burned and a property loss of \$200,000 to \$300,000 was caused by a fire in the heart of the business section of this city vesterday. Four two other structures were destroyed. proportions.

The fire is believed to have started in the Clifford Building from spontaneous combustion.

The loss of life occurred in the Clif- ing at 9 o'clock. ford Building, where the blaze started, and resulted primarily from a series of explosions among the turpentine, paints, oils and dynamite stored in the cellar of the James Clifford & Sons Co., hardware dealers.


