Yes sir, there are two nice things about these little old March snows. They're nice to have, moisture-wise and they hardly ever last over 24 hours!

O. W. Rhinehart, the real estate man, continues to be optimistic about the availability of additional water for irrigation in this area. He has reason to believe that there may be more, deeper water here than people know about or are interested in at this time. Back in the '40's, according to Rhinehart, oil well drilling crews struck water through the red bed. The holes were plugged then and the potential of the deeper water was evidently forgotten about by people who weren't overly interested in irrigation, anyway.

A brief conversation with Rhinehart will, however, whet the imagination and kindle hopes for the future. Back when irrigation was developing, we understand, it was believed that water had to be reasonably close to the top of the ground to be profitable. Since then, though, there's been many gallons of water pumped down the rows and we might be in a position to afford to pump some deeper water if we had it available and knew it.

Rhinehart is among those who are convinced that the importation of water to this area from the Mississippi River is just a matter of time. He looks at the matter a little deeper than that, though. He says the water importation project is leaving the impression with people down state that we're out of water now. Certainly, this isn't the case, as we all know, but we can see how such an impression could be created.

This, says the real estate man, can unnecessarily discourage some potential buyers of Parmer County farmland. They may believe the price is too much with a shortage of irrigation water when, in reality, there's no shortage whatsoever.

Leaders of the gigantic water importation project realize that it can't be accomplished overnight or even in a few years. That's why they're getting the ball rolling now--to insure the continued prosperity of the entire region, and the state as a whole, indirectly.

Rhinehart says he remembers at least one oil well driller speaking of "an ocean of water" through the red bed back in the early '40's.

Mention of the prospects makes for pleasant thinking as we go about getting the imported water show on the road.

Probably the best, above-board bargain in this area this week, which will be available to everyone, will be tickets to the annual banquet of Bovina Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture.

For \$3.50, you can attend the banquet, be well entertained along with your friends and neighbors and be served a charcoal-broiled rib-eye (that's the best kind) all in the same evening. The steak itself will, in 99 places out of 100, cost more than the ticket to the Bovina chamber banquet. So, right there, you have a bargain without even mentioning the fringe benefits.

The deal is opportunity a 'knockin'' for overworked, underpaid husbands to provide themselves and their wives a night out for the amazingly low price of only \$7.

And we're not in charge of ticket sales, either. We just think it's a tremendously good deal, too, and everyone is invited to take advantage of it. If the ticket salesmen have missed you up to now, this doesn't mean they don't want you to be there. For proof of that, tickets will be available at the door, as well as in advance.

The chamber banquet would be a good deal even if tickets were four times the amount they are. Next to Bull Town Days, it's one of the best events of the year for everyone in the community.

Teacher Contracts Renewed By Board

Teachers in Bovina Schools were rehired at a meeting of the school board Monday night and action taken on several other items of business.

Candidates for the board of trustees drew for places on the ballot and will appear in the following order: Charles Smith, Tommy Williams, Earl Whitten, Don Murphy and Thomas Rhodes.

Vehicle Check Creeps

"With the April 15 deadline for obtaining inspection stickers drawing near, only 31 per cent of the registered vehicles in Parmer County have been inspected," stated Captain Alan Johnson, Motor Vehicle Inspection Supervisor of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

A total of 8420 vehicles are registered in Parmer County but only 2610 had been inspected by March 1.

"Unless there is a rapid increase of inspections, long waiting lines will be forming at inspection stations as the April 15 deadline approaches. The authorized inspection stations are ready and capable of handling the inspection of Texas registered vehicles if owners will not wait until a few days before the deadline," Johnson added.

"Any driver operating a vehicle on public roads after April 15 that is required to be inspected will be operating in violation of the law," Johnson said.

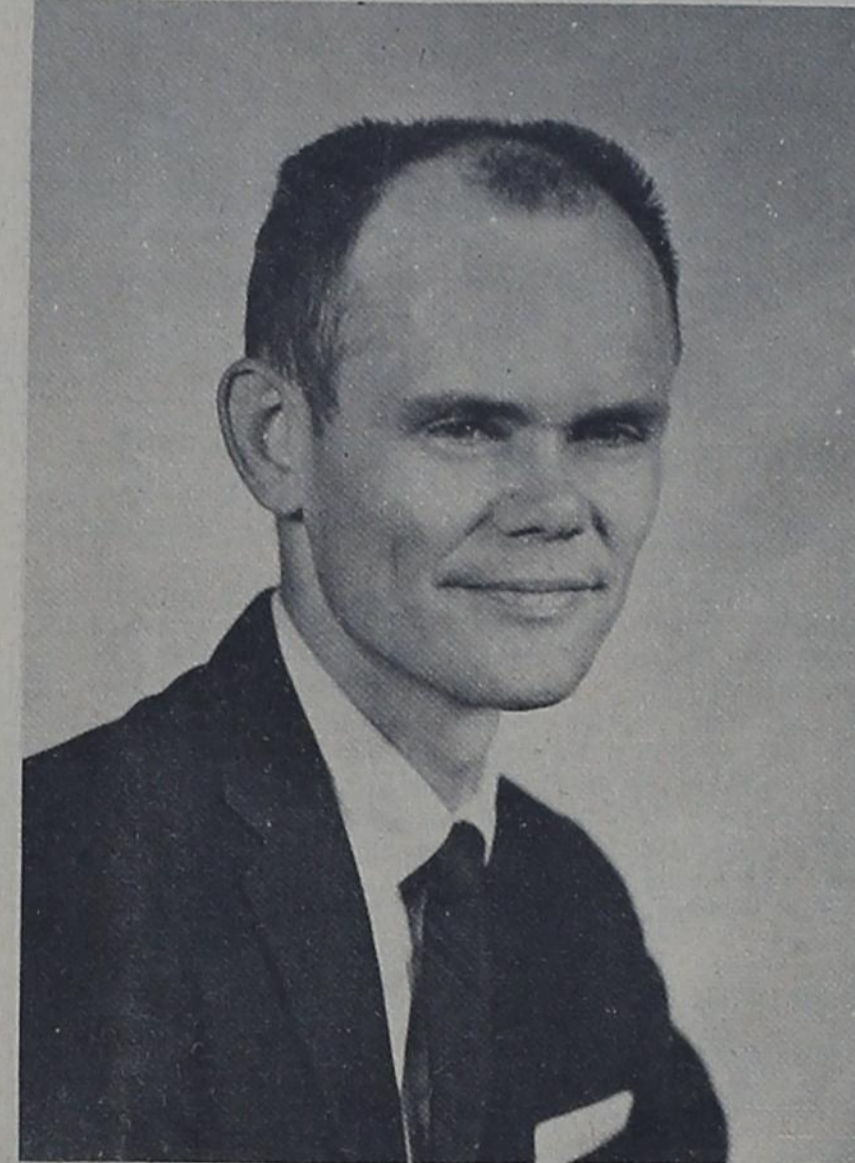

Hinkson Appointed State Committeeman

Frank H. Hinkson of Lazbuddie, twice an announced Republican candidate for Congressman from the 18th District, has been appointed to the Texas State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

The announcement was made from the Washington office of Charles M. Hardin,

secretary of agriculture, last week.

Hinkson is the first Parmer Countyman to serve on this agriculturally-important board. He attended the first meeting of the newly-appointed committee Monday at College Station.

Other members named to the state committee are Clarence A. Dankief of Rosenberg, Charles L. Calhoun of Fabens and John B. Rudd of Waskom.

The state committee holds its meeting in College Station to administer federal farm programs including crop acreage allotments, marketing quotas and conservation assistance.

The Lazbuddie member has been a farmer and rancher for 35 years. He has been active in area Republican campaigns for the past eight years.

YF Changes Meet Date

Bovina Chapter of Young Farmers has postponed its meeting scheduled for tomorrow (Thursday) night until the first Thursday in April, according to Ralph Roming, president.

The change is because of a conflict with the Bovina Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture banquet here tomorrow (Thursday) night.

In 1962, Hinkson announced as a candidate for representative to the 18th District to Congress against Jack Seale of Amarillo. He withdrew his candidacy before the primary election to support Seale.

That year he became the first Parmer County resident to seek a national office.

In 1964 he was again a candidate for Congress and was defeated in the Republican Primary by Bob Price, who was eventually elected to that office in 1966.

.55 Moisture --

Farmers Welcome Late Winter Snow

Moisture for the year totaled 1.36 this weekend after .55 of an inch was received in a late winter snow that covered most of the Panhandle and South Plains and

immobilized the Lubbock area Saturday. Snowfall here measured seven and one-half inches, according to Weatherman Willie Williams. It held .55 of an inch of moisture.

Along with previous light snows and an earlier rain, total moisture now stands at 1.36. Other snows, however, had not been beneficial to cropland until that received here Saturday.

Bovina farmers received maximum benefit, however, because no wind accompanied

the fall, which spread evenly over the area. On the South Plains, snow measured from 10 to 14 inches, drifting in many localities. Roads were closed and businesses shut down until snow was either cleared away or melted. The snow here caused no such inconveniences.

The moisture was greatly needed here both for wheat crops, which have suffered through a dry winter, except for a rain of .48 and snow (Continued on Page 2)

At Bovina Office --

Education Top Goal Of Community Action

"What does the Community Action Program in Bovina do?" is a common question asked about the office operated by Mrs. Pearl Cervantez and Lorenzo Granado.

Since the question is difficult to answer, it was taken directly to the directors of the Bovina program.

"Our main job," Mrs. Cervantez answered, "is to work with disadvantaged people. Our first duty is to take care of their immediate needs, such as securing social security cards, etc., but our entire purpose is to help them help themselves."

When the program was set up here last summer, interviews were held with people who could be aided through the program. They were asked what they thought are the causes of poverty. Most thought unemployment, housing and edu-

cation to be the primary causes, Mrs. Cervantez said.

The Bovina office is working mostly in the field of education here and Mrs. Cervantez stated the Bovina Schools have been cooperative in their efforts.

The basic education class is being held for adults, and a welding class is underway for working men. The latter will receive certificates at the end of the course this spring. If this class proves successful other courses may later be offered.

Six Bovina people are receiving GED training at Clovis in order to secure a high school education and diploma. Three have been enrolled in Job Corps, another leaves this week, and another application has been received.

The office has applied for funds to be used for a tu-

toring program next year for students in grades fourth through eighth who are having difficulties in school. Mrs. Cervantez and school personnel have recommended no less than five teachers for the tutoring program, which would be held each day an hour after school.

In the field of unemployment, Mrs. Cervantez says this is really "not our work." However, contacts have been made through the office, but the Texas Employment Commission in Friona has been instrumental in finding jobs for such people.

She and Granado pointed out that the Department of Labor has a program for On-the-Job-Training, whereby businessmen may cooperate in providing such training. The program provides the employ-

attention to the fact that since the beginning of the inspection program in 1951, vehicles having a defect that was a causative factor in fatal accidents decreased from 13 per cent to three per cent.

Johnson said, "The purpose of the Motor Vehicle Inspection Program is to discover any maladjustment which might become a link in a cycle of events leading to an accident and, by removing the link, prevent the accident."

The announcement was made to prevent undue inconvenience to area residents who must drive to Friona for license renewal.

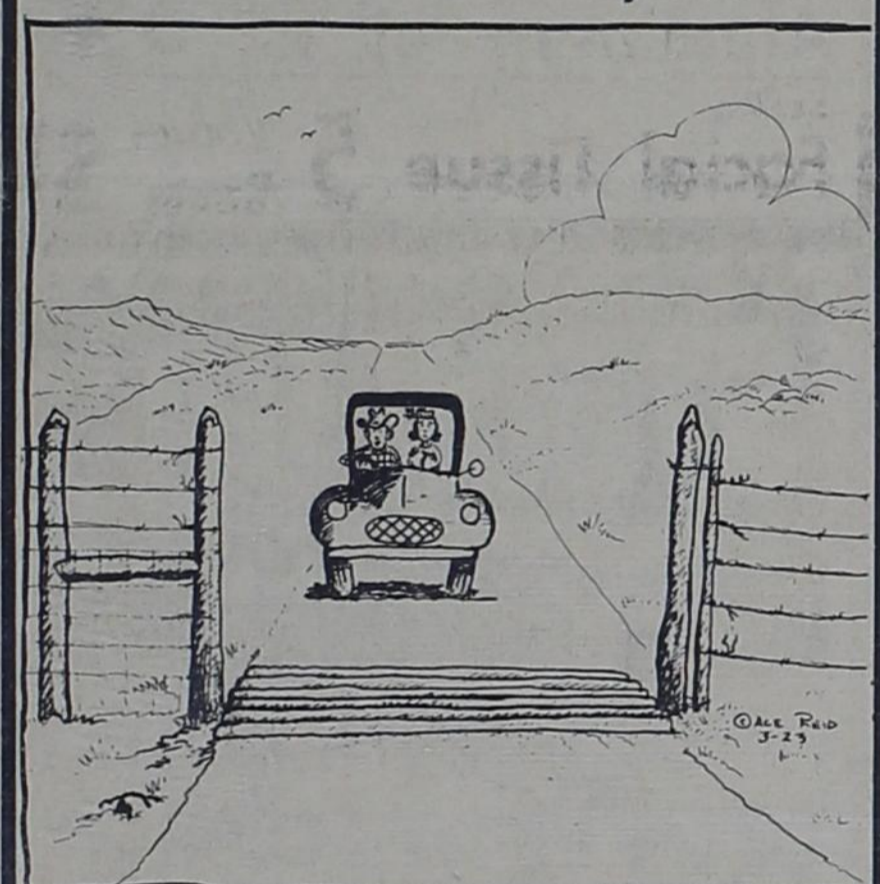
Kennedy Services Pending

er funds for the training period.

For instance, Metal Industries in Amarillo takes On-the-Job-Training employees. They are paid a weekly salary, for which the industry is reimbursed by the program. Mrs. Cervantez is interested in finding someone in Bovina who will provide such training.

She said B & B Welders here cooperates with the Texas Rehabilitation Agency for trainees with handicaps, which works much the same way. Some progress has been made in housing here, and hopes are that conditions will improve in the future. Mrs. Cervantez says some living conditions here are bad. Those people who are more settled and have been here several years are being aided through the Bovina office in buying homes through Farmers Home Administration with low interest rates.

One family, that of Alvin Lumbra, has bought a home and two have applied for loans for new homes. These are expected to be constructed this summer.

Mrs. Cervantez says lots behind Ridgelea Elementary School are available for new homes, as well as at several other locations.

Their biggest disappointment in Bovina is "getting the people who need these things to cooperate. They have lived this way so long --- without education and in poverty---it is difficult for them to see how they can be helped." The biggest indifference is to education, the one program Mrs. Cervantez feels is the greatest service.

The Community Action Program is striving to secure community involvement at the present time. Meetings are held the last Monday of each month. On March 31, additional members will be elected to the advisory board so that it will include four city officials, four civic organization representatives and four disadvantaged persons.

Breathalyzer Aids Safety

The Breathalyzer, a portable instrument used for determining the alcohol content of the blood by a simple "breath test," which was put into operation November, 1968, over the state of Texas is proving to be quite useful in the Northwest Texas area, announced Major C. W. Bell,

Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety for this Region.

During the months of November and December of 1968, there were 1164 suspected drinking drivers who took various types of tests to determine the amount of alcohol in their blood. Of this

number 957 or 82 per cent took the Breathalyzer test as compared to 207 or 18 per cent who took other types of tests.

Major Bell stated that the Breathalyzer not only will help in convicting a drunken driver, but assists in absolving a person who appears intoxicated, but may actually be suffering from epilepsy, a heart attack, an overdose of insulin, or many other pathological conditions.

The magnitude of the problem is reflected in studies conducted by the Texas Department of Public Safety. Based on a ten-year traffic death toll of 27,000 in Texas, the use of alcohol may have accounted for about 50 per cent of these fatalities.

Bell stated, "It is hoped that the use of the Breathalyzer will hit hard at the problem and help reduce the traffic deaths in Texas."

Injure Eight --

9 Accidents In February

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated nine accidents on rural highways in Parmer County during the month of February, according to Sergeant W. E. Wells, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one person injured, and an estimated property damage of \$6,760.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first two months of 1969 shows a total of 19 accidents resulting in eight persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$14,285. "Windy" March is here. Pedestrians and drivers can be temporarily blinded by blowing dust or sand -- long enough for a hazardous situation to develop and lead to an accident. The reduction of visibility can cause a head-on collision, a rear-end collision, or a run-off roadway type of accident, the sergeant said.

The wind itself can exert a powerful force on your vehicle and force it across or off the roadway. Sudden changes in wind velocity can cause you to lose control of your vehicle. Be sure to have both hands on the steering wheel to help maintain control of your vehicle, he went on.

The sergeant says, "Be alert and prepared for these dangers of gusty winds and reduced visibility."

The long, wiry stems of scabiosa and the excellent keeping qualities make them especially good for cut flowers.

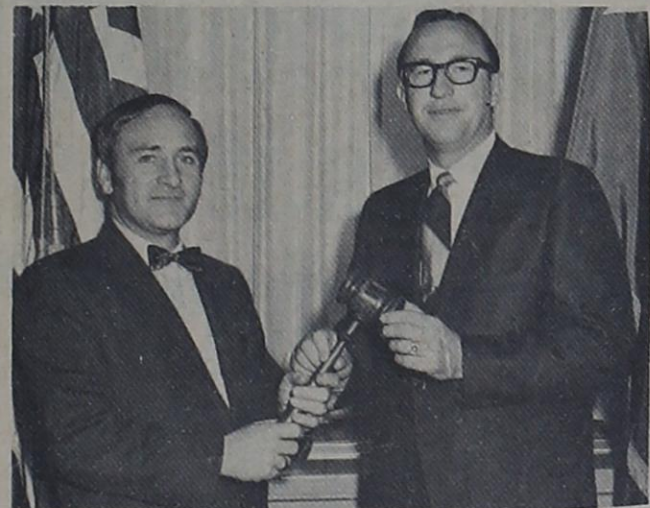
Easy to grow, scabiosa seeds even tolerate winter cold if they are sown in fall.

tions and refreshments carried out the St. Patrick Day theme.

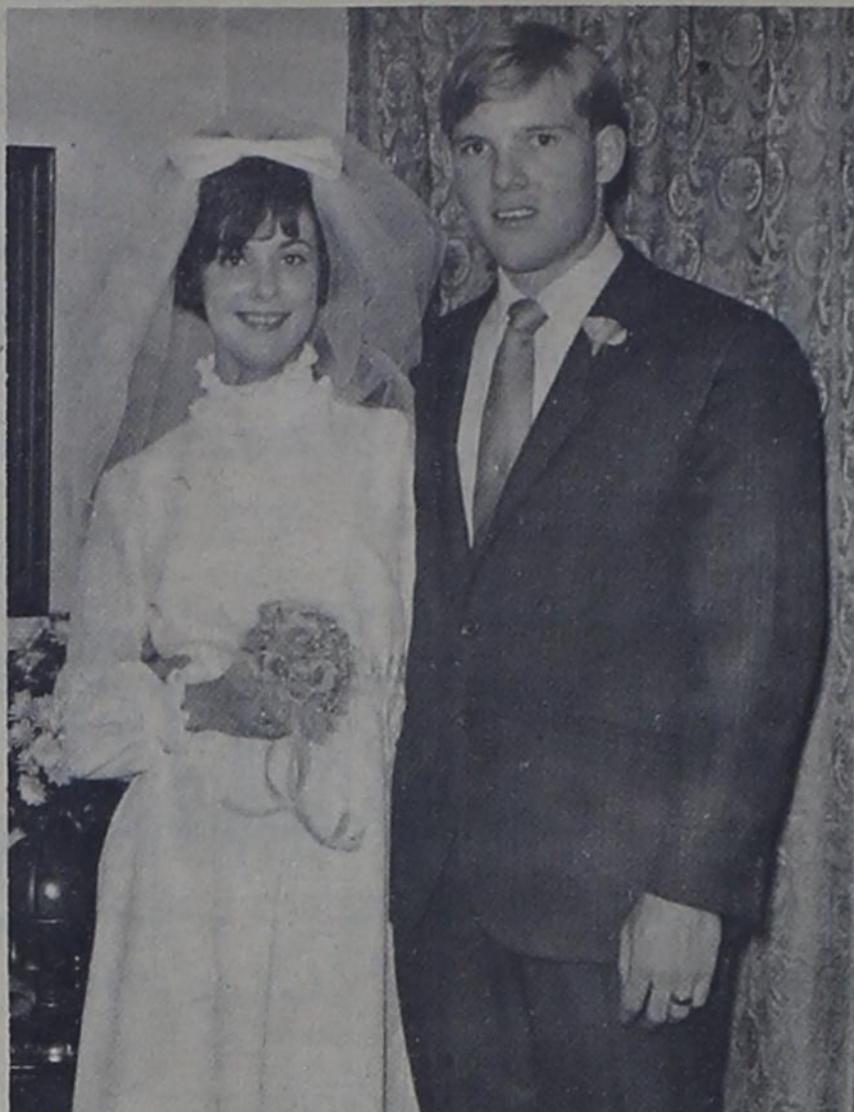

Jay Boothe served his son as best man.

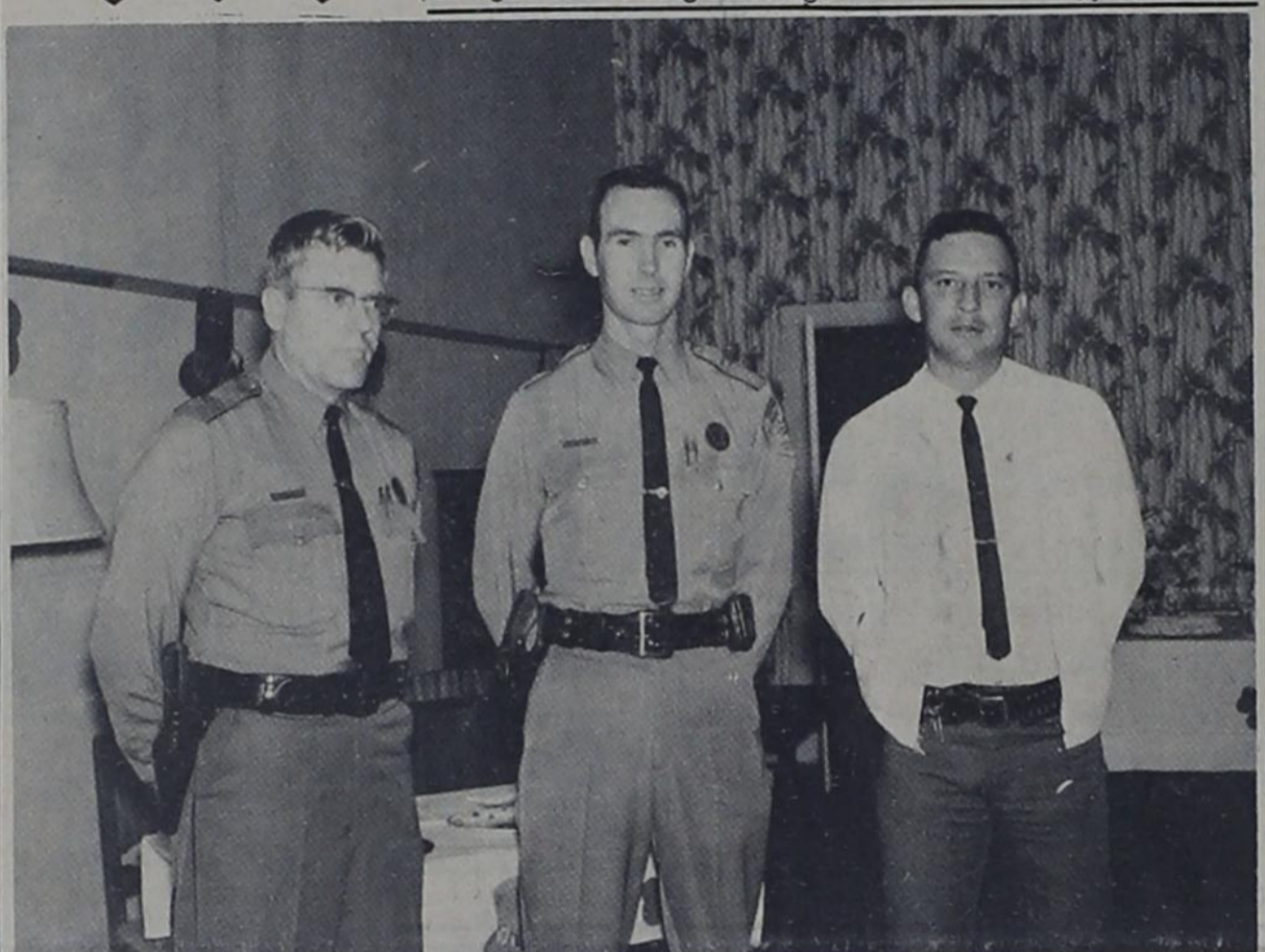
The bride's mother chose a two-piece pink dress and the bridegroom's mother wore a blue suit. Both wore white carnation corsages.

Absentee voting in said election in said school district shall be held at the same place as herein designated as a polling place on election day.

2. In Farwell School District at Farwell Texas with Albert Smith as Presiding Judge

and M.-s. Hope Schuman as Alternate Presiding Judge, and said Presiding Judge shall appoint the necessary clerks to assist him which shall not exceed two clerks. Absentee voting in said election in said school district shall be held at the same place as herein designated as a polling place on election day in the office of the County Clerk.

3. In Friona School District at Friona City Hall with Nelson Welch as Presiding Judge and George M. Baker as Alternate Presiding Judge, and said Presiding Judge shall appoint the necessary clerks to assist him which shall not exceed one clerk. Absentee voting in said election in said school district shall be held at the same place as herein designated as a polling place on election day.

4. In Lazbuddie School District at Lazbuddie School Auditorium with E. A. Parham as Presiding Judge and Alton Morris & E. A. Redwine as Alternate Presiding Judge, and Clerk and said Presiding Judge shall appoint the necessary clerks to assist him which shall not exceed one clerk. Absentee voting in said election in said school district shall be held at the same place as herein designated as a polling place on election day.

For absentee voting beginning March 17, ending April 1st in the County School Trustee election - County Clerk's Office.

The above designated places for absentee voting in each of said School Districts shall remain open for at least eight hours on each day for absentee voting which is not a Saturday, a Sunday, or an official State holiday, beginning on the 20th day and continuing through the 4th day preceding the date of said election. Said place of voting shall remain open between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 5 p.m. on each day for said absentee voting.

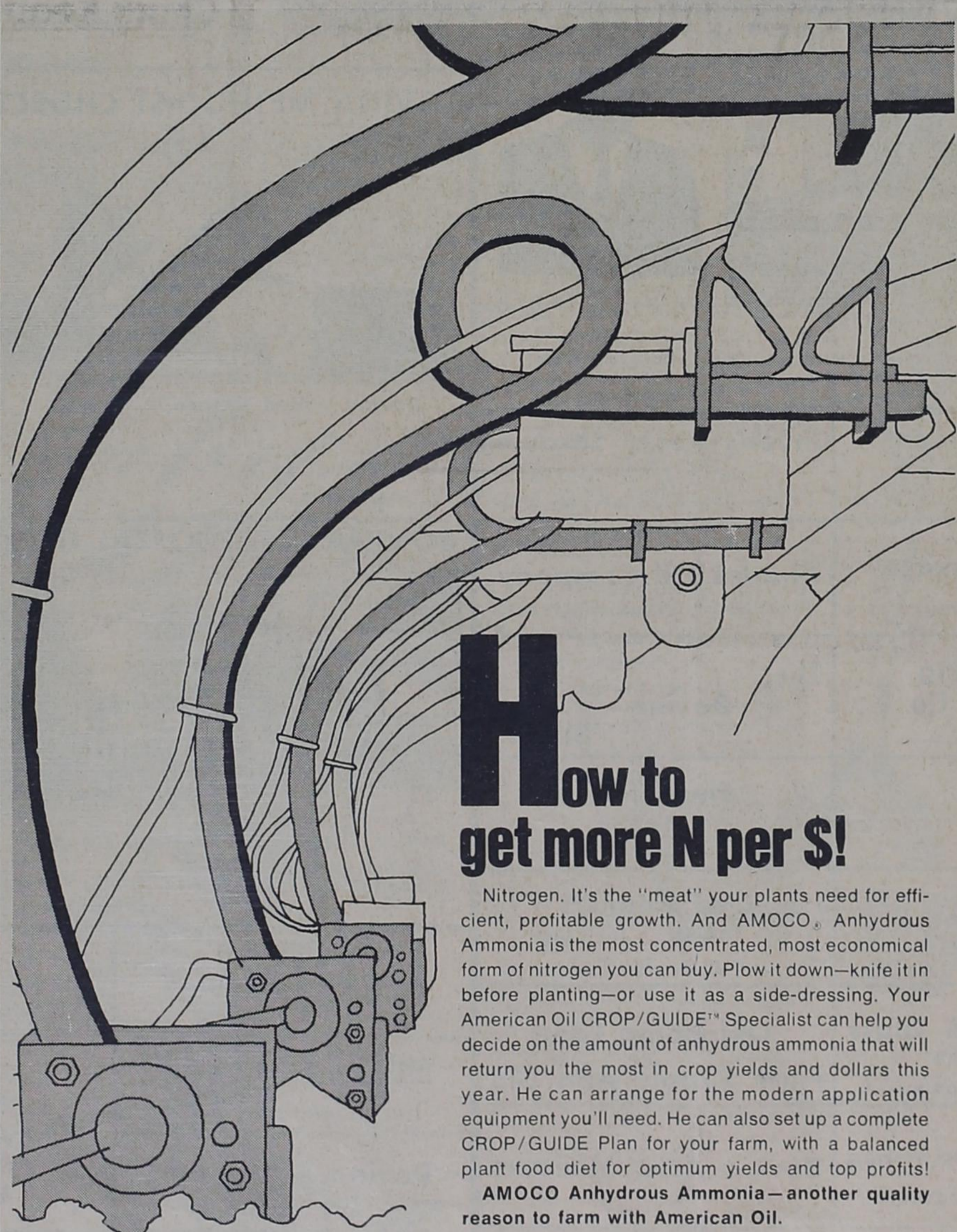

TEC Marks First Year

Texas Employment Commission's Parmer County office in Friona is ending its first year in operation under supervision of Fred Jackson. The year has proved to be more successful than at first hoped, since a total of 2208 people were placed on jobs. Jackson and his assistant, Kathy Whitaker, have listed over 2500 job openings during the office's first year of operation. Of the 2208 placed, these include 372 individuals placed with 157 different farmers. In addition, 1643 people in crews found work through Texas Employment Commission in Parmer County.

Eighty-two business places listed 266 job openings during the year with 193 being placed with these firms. Applications from individuals looking for work totaled 889 at the Friona office. In addition to employment, the office has assisted in special programs such as Job Corps, MDTA (training program with business people), rehabilitation programs and others. According to a report on national conditions, unemployment in February was at its lowest point in 15 years. Jackson invites anyone looking for work and needing workers to contact his office.

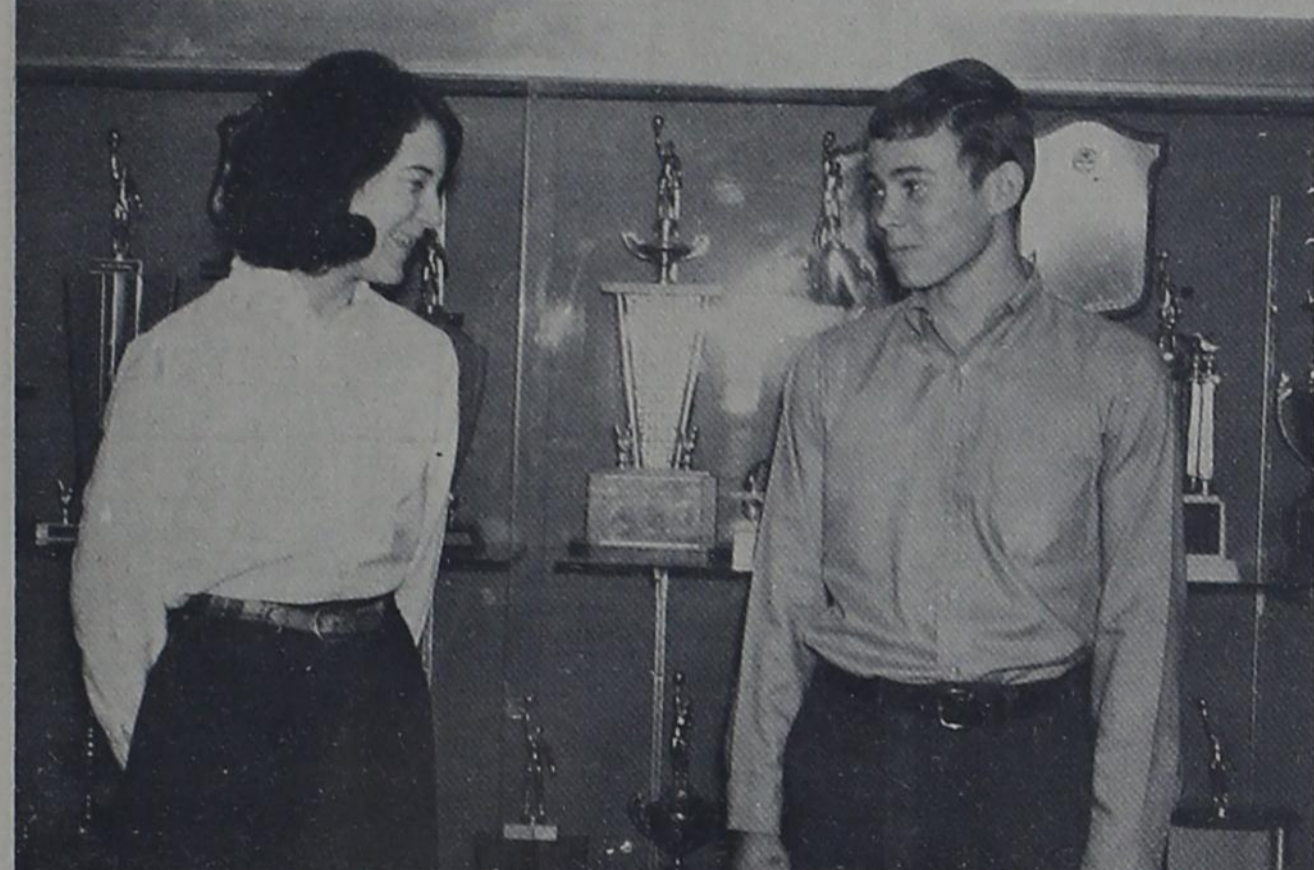

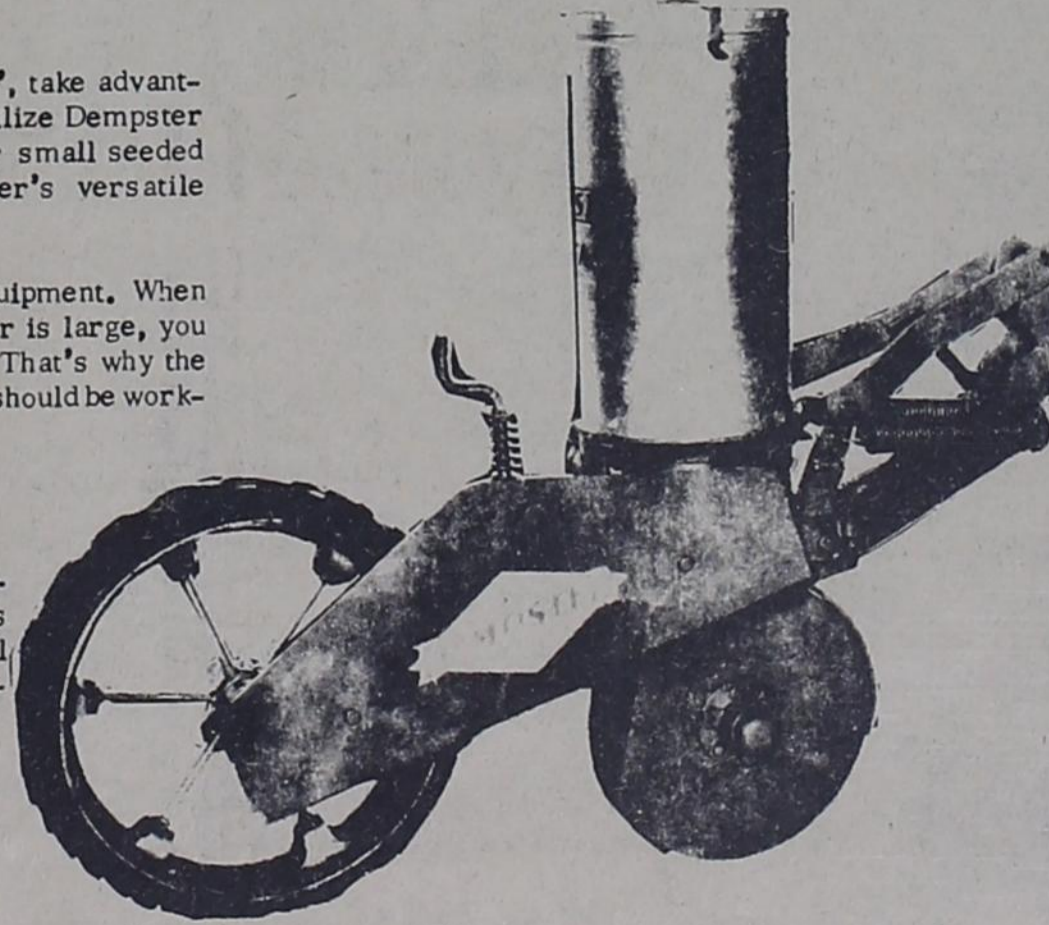



The drill is of sturdy construction and is equipped with sealed bearings throughout the unit. The frame is constructed of 3 1/2 inch square tubing which has a yield strength of 52,000 pounds. The four row drill weighs approximately 1,440 pounds and the six row approximately 1,990 pounds.

The Tye Drill can be converted to a four or six row double row planter for planting on top of beds with the optional press attachment.
