O. W. knew it. Rhinehart is among those who are convinced that the importation of water to this area from the Mississippi River is just a matter of time. He looks at the matter a little deeper than that, though. He says the water importation project is leaving the impression with people down state that we're out of water now. Certainly, this isn't the case, as we all know, but we can see how such an impression could be creat-

This, says the real estate man, can unnecessarily discourage some potential buyers of Parmer County farmland. They may believe the price is too much with a shortage of irrigation water when, in reality, there's no shortage what-

Leaders of the gigantic water importation project realize that it can't be accomplished overnight or even in a few years. That's why they're getting the ball rolling now --to insure the continued prosperity of the entire region, and the state as a whole, indirectly.

Rhinehart says he remembers at least one oil well driller speaking of "an ocean of water" through the red bed back in the early '40's.

Mention of the prospects makes for pleasant thinking as we go about getting the imported water show on the road.



Before being elected county attorney, Warner served over five years as Corporation Court Judge for Pampa. During this time, he established the Teen-age Traffic Court system whereby teenagers appeared with their parents in court on Saturday mornings on traffic offenses. First offenders were given the opportunity of writing a 1,000 word theme on traffic safety instead of paying a fine. The percentage of teenagers involved in accidents declined 22 per cent during the five years he was in office, and the percentage of people aged 20 to 24 declined 20 per cent during the same period.

A Dale Carnegie instructor for five years, Warner last year spoke to more than 100 audiences of civic organizations.

Other interests include a high school Sunday School Class in First Methodist Church, which he has taught six years, the Santa Fe District of Boy Scouts of America for which he is district commissioner. He is a member of the advisory board for the Pampa Youth Council, Inc. and for Parents without Partners.

Warner, who is 32 years of age, is married and has two children. He is a Pampa native, having been graduated from high school there in 1954. He was graduated with honors from Texas A&M in 1958 and then from the University of Texas Law School in 1962.


