PRESIDENT TAFT **COPIED THE LETTER**

CLAIMED BALLINGER'S FRIENDS FRAMED DOCUMENT FOR MR. TAFT'S SIGNATURE.

Stenographer Makes Statement Exposing Method Used In Ballinger Exoneration.

Washington, May 16 .- More astounding than any other revelation made in the Ballinger investigation, reflecting the presentation of the Lawler digest, and headaches. as it has heretofore been designated. This so-called digest shows not only that it was the basis of President Taft's letter exonerating Secretary Ballinger from the Glavis charges, but was prepared as a letter for the President's signature, and was used by him as the model of the letter he signed. Portions of the Lawler digest and of the Taft letter are identical. All the conclusions respecting Ballinger and the Glavis charges presented in the digest are found in the President's letter. The arrangement of the statements is the same in both documents.

No matter what explanations are now offered, there can be no escape from the conclusion that President Taft permitted the Assistant Attorney General for the Interior Department, a subordinate of Secretary Ballinger and partisan of Ballinger, to render decision on the charges against Ballinger which had been presented to the President by Special Agent Glavis of the Land Office in his fight to save the Alaskan coal lands from the extended grasp of the Morgan-Guggenheim combination. The President's position is made more embarrassing by the extraordinary circumstances upon which this Lawler statement has been made public. It was sent to the investigating committee by Attorney General Wickersham, in response to a letter addressed to him by the committee. Previous requests for the same document met with no success. When Mr. Wickersham produced it it was the statement that a further search of the papers in the custody of his private secretary and resulted in the finding of this important paper.

Before the Attorney General sent it to the committee it had been learned that a stenographer in the Interior Department, Frederick M. Kerby, to whom Lawler dictated his so-called digest, had prepared a careful statement in writing setting forth the character of the document and the method of its preparation, and had given this to the newspapers.

Speaking of a certain dictation which he took after Ballinger and Lawler returned from Beverly on Sept. 9, Stenographer Kerby says:

"It was obvious from the way Lawler dictated the letter what it was intended to be. Moreover, there was no attempt at concealment. The letter began, 'Sir.' It referred to Ballinger as 'You' in each case, and the personal pronoun 'I' was used throughout. From the context the 'I' could not be other than Taft. There could be no question that Lawler was drafting a letter for Taft's signature reviewing the Glavis charges and exonerating the Secretary. It was written in such form that Taft might have adopted it bodily. As I have said, the letter was dictated in Ballinger's private office by Lawler. Probably half a dozen drafts were made before the final one was accepted. Each time a fresh draft was completed it would be taken in to Lawler, who would revise it. For two days Massey and I did nothing but help rush this work. Lawler frequently consulted E. C. Finney, assistant to Ballinger. On the afternoon of the second day a consultation was held between Ballinger, Lawler, Finney, Commissioner Frederick Dennett of the Land Office, Chief of Field Service Schwartz, and, I think First Assistant Secretary Frank Pierce and Private Secretary Carr. The draft was discussed in detail, and it is my memory that Ballinger himself read the letter or draft aloud and general criticism from the others was invited and received. Without attempting to force my own conclusions upon any reader of this statement, I want it to be remembered that it was the draft of the letter exonerating Ballinger in the charges Glavis had made against him.

"The conference cut the draft to pieces with criticism and suggestions, and the whole thing was revamped.

"We all understood from the form of the letter that it was to be the basis of Taft's letter covering the Glavis charges.




