





Austin: San Antonio has a larger enrollment of children on its scholastic census than any other city in Texas. Houston holds second place and Dallas third. The State Department of Education has received the scholastic census from these three cities, and they are as follows: San Antonio, 18,533; Houston, 18,186; Dallas, 16.596.

The scholastic census of the other larger cities of the state have not yet been received by the Department of Education and it is impossible to tell which cities will get the fourth, fifth, sixth and seventh places, respectively. Under the returns last year, Hous-

ton was in first place in the number of scholastic. San Antonio was in second place anad Dallas was in third. astic age. WRIGHT MACHINE GOES HIGH

Altitude of 6,000 Feet Reached By Brookins Over Ocean.

Atlantic City, N. J .: Walter Brookins, driving a Wright biplane, reached an altitude calculated at 6,000 feet over the ocean Saturday and broke all existing world's records for aeroplane altitude. The exact official figures now being worked out by engineers who took observations for triangulation will be given out later. The barograph altitude recording instrument carried on the machine showed an altitude of 6,100 feet. Officials using an altitude gauge on the ground gave the height as 5,680 feet, and it is believed that the final official fig-

ures will be between these two.

The census returns from two East Texas counties made public show losses in population sufficient to offset the large average gain made by the counties heretofore announced. The two counties showing decreases are Milam, which fell from 39,666 in 1900 to 36,780 in 1910, a loss of 7 1-3 per per cent, and Red River County, which fell from 29,893 in 1900 to 28,564 this year, a loss of about 4 1-3 per cent. On the other hand, two other counties show enormous increases. One of these is Fisher County, in Northwest Texas, which has a population of 12,-596, against 3,708 ten years ago, a gain of 240 per cent. The other is Medina, in Southwest Texas, which jumped from 7,783 in 1900 to 13,415 this year, a gain of 72½ per cent.

Two hundred and eight dollars per acre are the proportionate returns which a well-known farmer has received from a cabbage crop grown at Decatur this season and sold at 3c per pound.

James J. Jeffries and Jack Johnson are \$322,412 richer as a result of the big fight at Reno and their theatrical engagements before the battles. Jeffries pulled down the lion's share of the coin, having dragged down a total of \$191,812, which includes his picture money and the gate receipts from his tour before the fight.

Controlled Newspapers. The Atchison Globe says that no advertiser has ever tried to control its editorial policy, the remark being occasioned by the charge often made nowadays, that the big advertisers direct the editorial policy of newspapers.

The experience of the Globe is the experience of most newspapers. The merchant who does a great deal of advertising is more interested in the circulation department of a newspaper than in the editorial department. If a daily paper goes to the homes of the people, and is read by them, he is satisfied, and it may chase after any theory or fad, for all he cares. He has troubles stomach and had of his own, and he isn't trying to shoulder those of the editorial brethren.

There are newspapers controlled by people outside of the editorial rooms, and a good many of them, more's the swellings began to abate after I began pity; but the people exercising that control are not the business men who pay their money for advertising space. The average western newspaper usually is controlled by its owner, and he is supposed to be in duty bound to make all sorts of sacrifices at all sorts of times; there are people who consider it his duty to insult his advertisers, just to show that he is free and independent. If he shows a decent respect for his patrons, who pay him their money, and make it possible for him to carry on the business, he is "subsidized" or "controlled." The newspaper owner is a business man, like the dry goods man or the grocer. 



New Remedy for Strong Poison.

Experiments at the Rockefeller Institute of Medical Research are said to have developed a surgical expedient by which the effects of the most virulent poisons may be rendered relatively harmless. So long as there is the faintest heartbeat, it is possible to save anyone who has taken what has been heretofore regarded as a fatal dose of strychnine, morphine, 11luminating gas, and kindred poisons. The basis of the treatment is the

forcing a steady supply of air through the windpipe into the lungs. It differs from other artificial means of respiration in that the lungs themselves are not called upon to give aid. A small tube forced through the windpipe to the openings of the lungs conveys the fresh air, while the foul air returns by pressure through the windpipe outside the tube, which may be inserted through the mouth, or an aperture cut


