Another football campaign has been wrapped up by the Bovina High Mustangs and folded back into the pages of local sports history.

The season had one highlight which shines like a brilliant beacon in foggy darkness, but we'll get around to that later.

Overall, the year wasn't as bad as some and could have been worse. The record reads a better-than-.500, 5-4-1. All of the losses came to District 3-A foes while the Mustangs got three of the wins in playfor-keeps competition.

The losses were all disappointing and with a little luck here and there, the Maroons could have won the tilts they lost --- all for the same price. Happy did the best job of outscoring us and while we don't mean to take anything away from the Cowboys, we'd think it would be safe to bet on the Bovina team if the two teams played again.

At Vega week before last, the Bovina boys won everything but the score and the host team had to tally in the last minute to save the win.

We don't mean to put a cluster of sour grapes down here in black ink and we don't mean to make excuses. We're trying to point out that with a little more luck distributed at just a few convenient places and the Bovina team could be making a trip to a bi-district game with week.

"That's the way the ball bounces," somebody figured out our best wishes to the Vega Longhorns as they take on the New Deal Lions this weekend. Vega has a highly explosive offense; there's not much doubt about that. Surely, they'll do something about their defense this week after they allowed Farwell to score 36 against them in their final regularlyscheduled game of the season last week.

Anyway, before we say fare-well to the 1971 football season locally, we'll again say that the Bovina win over Farwell this year was one of the greatest schoolboy victories we've ever been priviledged to eyeball.

We put too much emphasis on the game with Farwell, our critics tell us, and they might well be right. But still, when you get the first win over a neighboring school---only 12 miles away --- in 16 years, it's got to be a big deal, in our way of thinking.






The "big game" of the year for the Bovina Mustangs is Friday night. It will be against the Longhorns of Vega there. Kickoff time is 7:30 p.m.





According to the guidelines, advertising is deceptive if it fails to state: What product or part is guar-

anteed. What characteristics of the

product are covered. What the buyer must do before the guarantee will be honored, such as returning the product to a certain location or paying labor costs.

How long the guarantee is How the guarantee will be

carried out -- if it promises repair, replacement or a choice. The company or person responsible for the guarantee. Good advertising will tell you what you need to know about products and services. Remember to buy from retailers you can trust--those who have an established reputation of

Also remember it pays to have guarantees in writing. If you are faced with deceptive advertising or a firm that refuses to perform warranty service, report the de-

standing behind their products.
