Another football campaign has been wrapped up by the Bovina High Mustangs and folded back into the pages of local sports history.

"That's the way the ball bounces," somebody figured out once, however, and we extend our best wishes to the Vega Longhorns as they take on the New Deal Lions this weekend. Vega has a highly explosive offense; there's not much doubt about that. Surely, they'll do something about their defense this week after they allowed Farwell to score 36 against them in their final regularly-scheduled game of the season last week.

Anyway, before we say farewell to the 1971 football season locally, we'll again say that the Bovina win over Farwell this year was one of the greatest schoolboy victories we've ever been privileged to eyeball.

We put too much emphasis on the game with Farwell, our critics tell us, and they might well be right. But still, when you get the first win over a neighboring school---only 12 miles away---in 16 years, it's got to be a big deal, in our way of thinking.

Not only is it important to win that particular game, but you have to be able to win over the Steers before you can expect to go on to greater things. 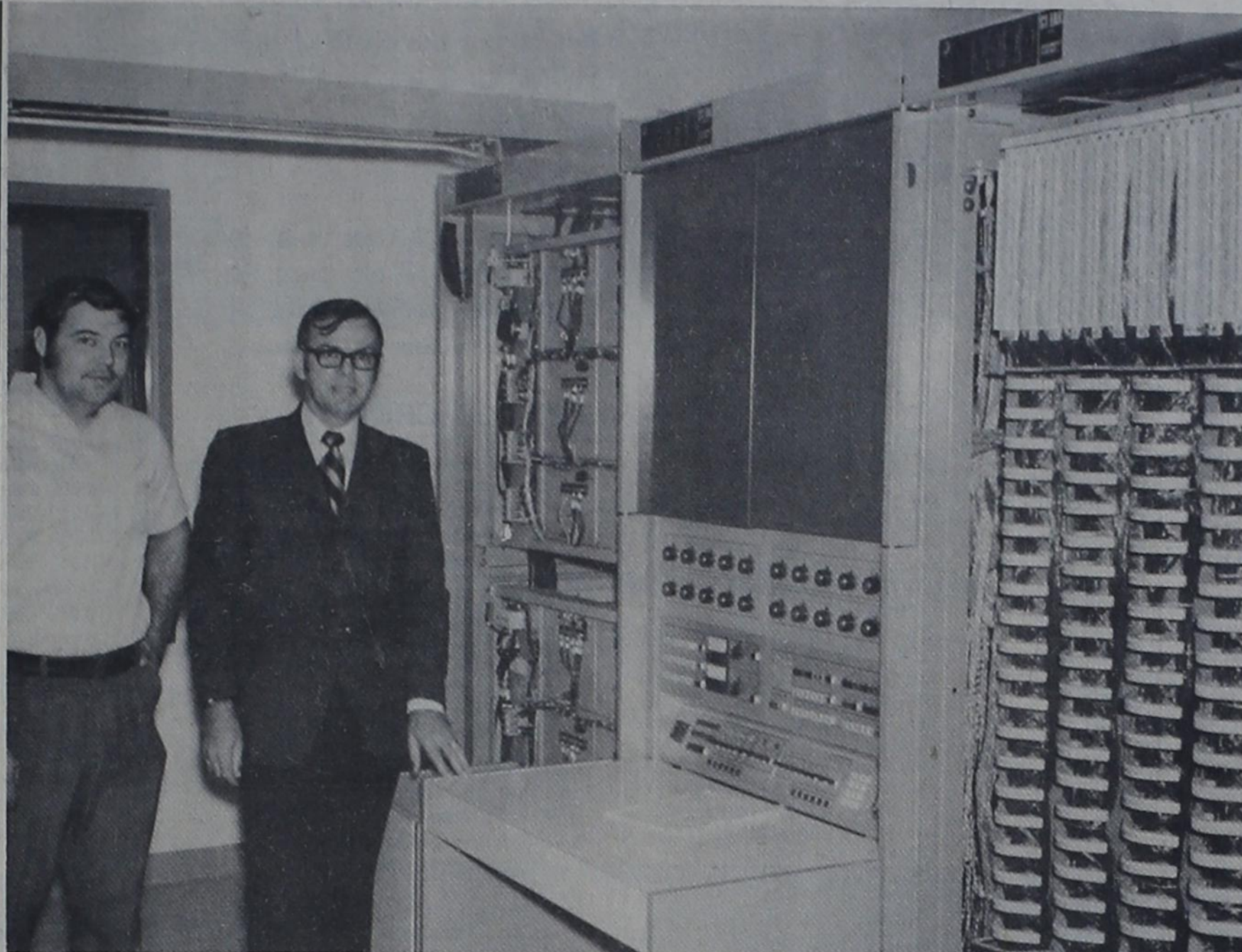

Halt Harvest Again --

Rain, Wind Hit Area Monday

Light rain Monday and a rain and wind storm Monday night brought Harvesting operations in the area to a halt.

Rainfall during the past several weeks had hampered the harvesting of grain sorghum. However, most of the milo had been cut when the early-in-the-week moisture fell. There are a few scattered fields of milo unharvested, but for the most part the crop has been delivered to area elevators.

The light rain Monday was just enough to stop combining of milo and stripping of cotton, which was just getting underway. About an inch of rain fell across the area Monday night, however. The windstorm

struck around midnight. Heavier rainfall, as much as an inch and a half, was reported south of Bovina.

There was no reported wind damage to crops, but leaves were blown from trees. Light hail also accompanied the storm in some parts of the area.

Cotton stripping was just getting started and several farmers were planning to begin stripping Monday, according to reports. The moisture forced postponement of the cotton harvesting, however.

The moisture is highly beneficial to the wheat crop which has been given a good boost already by previous rains. Most farmers, however, would prefer clear weather until all har-

vesting operations can be completed.

The grain sorghum crop, while still considered to be "a good one" as usual, has been handicapped by weighing less than normal. The testweight per bushel has been considerably less than normal for Parmer County.

No definite reason has been figured out for the crop to weigh light, but some farmers feel a frost early might have caused this and others believe that a cool, wet spell during August didn't allow the grain to mature enough to weigh as it normally does. Extremely high yields aren't being reported this year as they have in the past few years.

Elect Bell To Board Of Grace Paul Fund

Durward Bell, a farmer in the Bovina community, has been elected to the board of directors of the Grace Paul Fund, according to Mrs. Charles Corn, member of the board.

At a recent meeting, Bell was elected to fill a vacancy created by Mike Barraza, who has moved from the community.

Two students, Elodia Serna and Martha Adams, are currently receiving supplementary loan funds through the Grace Paul Fund. Miss Serna is a junior at West Texas State University in Canyon and the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Luis Serna. Miss Adams, the daughter

of Mr. and Mrs. P. A. Adams, is attending South Plains College in Levelland.

The Grace Paul Fund, which is sponsored by Bovina Woman's Study Club, was set up as a memorial to Miss Paul shortly after her death in October, 1968. She had been a teacher and elementary principal in Bovina Schools for 20 years.

The fund was set up to assist students in any type of educational program, including trade and vocational schools. It is not a scholarship program, but a revolving fund that loans money to young people who have a desire for an education. Students who are on the plan work up a budget as to how much they will need for the year. After the budget is approved by the board, they

may draw checks as needed up to the amount set.

It is pointed out by board members that the loan funds must be repaid by those who are in the program, however, they pay no interest on the loan. The fund is incorporated with the Opportunity Plan, Inc., in operation at West Texas State

University under direction of Morris.

The local board accepts applications, screens them and makes the decision as to who will receive educational aid. If the student attends WTSU, Opportunity Plan, Inc., will manage their finances. If not, the (Continued on Page 2)

Mary Jane Wilson Wins --

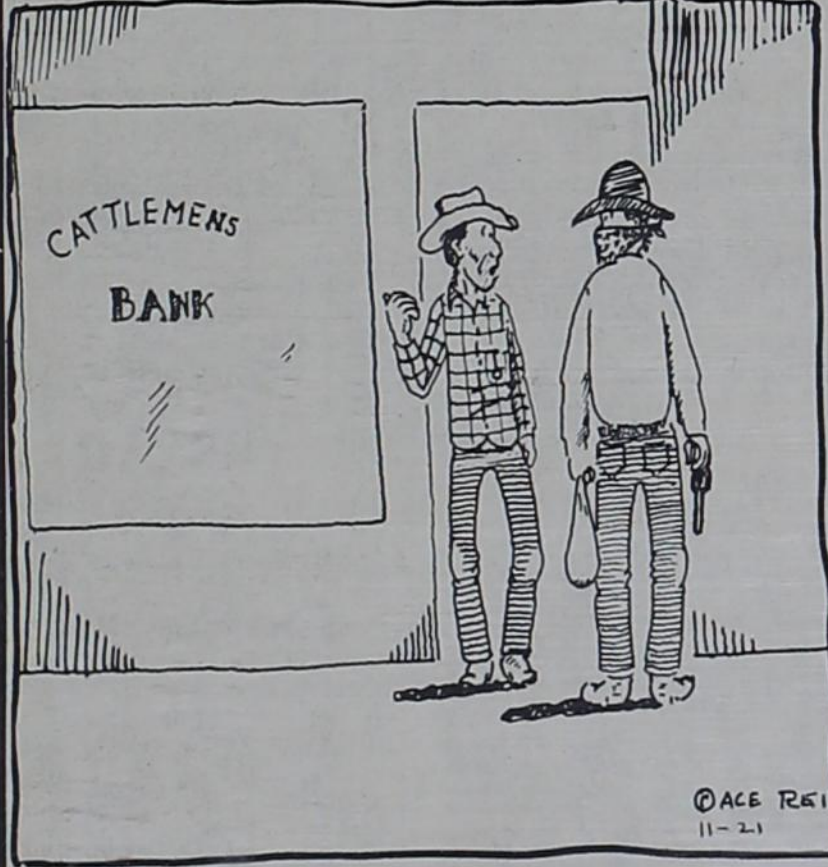

- What product or part is guaranteed.

- What the buyer must do before the guarantee will be honored, such as returning the product to a certain location or paying labor costs.
- How long the guarantee is effective.
- How the guarantee will be carried out--if it promises repair, replacement or a choice.
- The company or person responsible for the guarantee.

Good advertising will tell you what you need to know about products and services. Remember to buy from retailers you can trust--those who have an established reputation of standing behind their products. Also remember it pays to have guarantees in writing.

If you are faced with deceptive advertising or a firm that refuses to perform warranty service, report the de-

tails to the nearest FTC office or to the Consumer Protection Division of the Texas Attorney General's Office.

ROAST BEEF

Salt, pepper, paprika and dust with flour a 3 to 4 pound roast. Brown on both sides in a small amount of oil, add 2 c. water and cook in 300 degree oven 3 to 4 hours or until tender. Potatoes and carrots may be added during the last hour.

Remove from pan, more water may need to be added for gravy. Add salt, pepper, paprika and 1 T. worcestershire sauce. Mix 1 to 2 T. cornstarch with enough water to make paste. Add cornstarch when gravy mixture begins to boil, cook until thick.

PEANUT BRITTLE

2 c. sugar
1 c. white corn syrup
peanuts (large package)
1 T. butter
2 t. vanilla
1 t. soda

Cook first three ingredients to hard crack stage. Add butter, vanilla and then soda. Pour onto a large flat cooking sheet that has been buttered and sprinkle with salt. When cool break into pieces.

GERMAN SWEET CHOCOLATE CAKE

1-4 oz. pkg. German sweet chocolate
1/2 c. boiling water
1 c. butter or oleo

2 c. sugar
4 egg yolks, unbeaten
1 t. vanilla
2 1/2 c. sifted flour
1/2 t. salt
1 t. baking soda
1 c. buttermilk
4 egg whites, stiffly beaten

Melt chocolate in boiling water, cool. Cream butter and sugar until fluffy. Add egg yolks, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Add melted chocolate and vanilla. Mix well.

Sift together flour, salt and soda. Add alternately with buttermilk to chocolate mixture, beating after each addition until smooth. Fold in beaten egg whites.

Pour into 3-9 in. layer pans lined on bottom with waxed paper. Bake 350 degrees for 30 to 40 minutes. Cool. Frost sides only.

FROSTING

1 c. evaporated milk
1 c. sugar
3 egg yolks
1/2 c. butter or oleo
1 t. vanilla

Mix above ingredients together and cook, stirring constantly, over medium heat until thickened, about 12 minutes. Remove from heat and add 1 1/3 c. coconut and 1 c. chopped nuts. Beat until thick enough to spread.

CHERRY COKE SALAD

1-6 oz. pkg. black cherry gelatin
1-9 oz. can crushed pineapple
1 large pkg. cream cheese
1-No. 2 can pitted blng cherries

1 king size Coke
1/2 c. pecans

Drain cherries and pineapple. Heat the mixed juices and pour over gelatin, stir until dissolved. Add cheese while mixture is still hot. Can be mixed in blender. Add Coke, let mixture chill. Add pineapple, cherries and nuts.

FRUIT SALAD DRESSING

1 T. cornstarch
1 egg
1/2 c. sugar
1/2 can evaporated milk
dash of salt
juice of 1 lemon

Cook first five ingredients until thickened, remove from heat, add lemon juice, cool. Add to your favorite chopped, mixed fresh fruit. If you use canned fruit, drain before adding dressing.

ICE CREAM SALAD

Thoroughly drain 1-9 oz. can crushed pineapple. Add water to juice to make 1 cup, heat, add to 1 small pkg. line gelatin. Blend in 1 pint vanilla ice cream. Chill until partially congealed. Fold in 1 c. grated cheddar cheese, pineapple and 1/2 c. chopped nuts.

Mustangs Have Hart; Close Season On Winning Note

The Bovina Mustangs closed out the 1971 season on a winning note and got their season mark over the .500 level here Friday night as they pulverized the Hart Longhorns, 42-12.

The Bovina team has a season record of 5-4-1, including the easy Hart triumph. In district 3-A play, the Ponies finished the year with a 3-4 mark, winning from Hart, Sudan and Farwell while dropping tilts to Springlake-Earth, Happy, Kress and Vega, the district champion.

Nine members of the Mustang squad were seeing their final action in a maroon and white uniform. They were Shannon Davis, Bobby McMeans, Mike Spears, Bob Rogers, Ken Jamerson, Tommy Bonds, Tommy McCormick, Johnny Martinez and Al Delgado.

The game was dedicated to

the senior members of the team and they were individually recognized at halftime of the contest.

The Mustangs led at the end of the first quarter, 14-0. By halftime, the lead had been built to 28-6. After a scoreless third quarter, the Mustangs salted the game away with another 14 point splurge in the curtain stanza.

The first tally came with 4:53 remaining in the opening period. Quarterback Billy Shelby kicked a 58-yard drive with a six-yard scoring run around right end. Kim Rundell kicked the first of six consecutive extra points.

The second TD came quickly after the first--with 2:30 remaining in the period. Shelby threw a 34-yard pass to Plankner Ronald Steele in the endzone for that.

The Mustangs, in command of the game throughout, put seven more points on the scoreboard, before the Hart offense could break its goose egg. The third six-pointer came on a four-yard scoring blast by Fullback Shannon Davis.

Hart's second period touchdown was set up by a Mustang fumble. The Bovina miscue gave the Longhorns possession at the Bovina 22. A 10-yard loss moved the ball back to the 32, but then Jimmy Brown, the fleet Longhorn freshman halfback broke loose for a 27 yard gain to the six. A half-the-distance penalty against the Mustangs from there put the ball on the three and Fullback Stanley Dyer bulled his way in from there for the counter.

Just for good measure, the Mustangs added another seven onto the total before intermission.

The game with Three Way will be played immediately following the varsity girls game. Games that night will begin at 6 p.m. with the B girls. Admission to all high school games will be 50 cents for students and \$1.00 for adults.

The home team got their scoring machine back in gear in the final period. With eight minutes remaining, Davis went in from one yard away, capping a 30-yard drive which covered six plays.

The final tally came in the game's final minute on a seven-yard jaunt by Eddie Pesch. The Mustangs racked up their

largest total yardage figure of the season as they accounted for 461, including 79 through the airways on four of eight completions.

Jeff McCormick was the leading groundgainer as he was handed the ball 23 times and made a total of 183. Pesch carried 14 times for 71 yards. Davis made six trips for 21 yards and Shelby netted 91 yards as he carried 11 times.

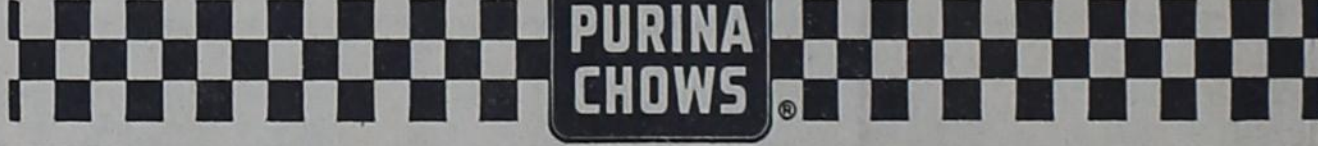
