THE MESQUITE

Did it ever occur to you what a wonderful tree the mesquite is? Over hill and dale it defies the drought by sending its roots deep into the parched earth in search of moisture and when every other tree and plant except the cactus has succumbed to heat and drought, it sends its pea-green plume-like leaves to the sunlight to relieve the eye of the monotony of the heat waves.

While the mesquite has a short scrubby trunk and is not in the class of commercial timber, yet such things as table legs, gunstocks, wagon hubs and felles, paving blocks, fence posts and other like things of the best quality can be made from the mesquite. The wood takes on a polish equal to that of mahogany and in its finished state resembles walnut. There is no better fuel wood than mesquite. The old time blacksmith found no better charcoal than that made of mesquite. During the civil war the roots of this tree proved an excellent dye-wood—giving the fabric a beautiful purple black and was universally known over West Texas as the equal of logwood. The bark of the mesquite is richer than oak in tannin and has been successfully used in tanning hides. This bark is not only useful in the arts, but it is a powerful astringent medicine, and no druggist in Mexico is considered a soaked unless dried mesquite bark is carried. Mesquite being of the acetate genus, exudes a gum that is the equal in every respect to the commercial gum acacia. There is no better food for livestock than mesquite beans. Almost every animal from a prairie dog to a horse is fond of these

The average Dutch town is an attractive place in the summer months, since practically every street and canal is bordered with shade trees which shut out the glare of the sun and offer cool and inviting avenues for the exploration of the tourist. The Dutch municipalities expend large sums each year for the preservation of their shade trees, but the results amply justify the cost of maintenance. In the past year the city of Utrecht taxed each inhabitant 21 cents for its trees (2 1/2 Dutch cents equaling an American cent) and The Hague spent 28 cents for the same purpose.—Harper's Weekly.

ELECTION NOTICE

Whereas a petition signed by Knute Westbrook and 61 other property tax paying voters of Sterling county has been presented to this Court praying that an election be ordered for the purpose hereinafter stated.

Therefore it is hereby ordered by the Commissioners Court of said county that an election be held on the 8th day of November, 1910, at which election it shall be the duty of the voters of the county of Sterling to vote on the following proposition: Shall the Commissioners Court of the county of Sterling be authorized to issue bonds of said county in the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars, payable in forty years, bearing interest at the rate of 5 per cent per annum, payable annually, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds, and to create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem them at maturity, for the purpose of building, plumbing, equipping and furnishing a jail for said Sterling county.

Said election shall be held at the various voting places in Sterling county, to-wit: The court house in Sterling City, precinct No. 1; Mulberry School House, precinct No. 2; China Valley School House, precinct No. 3; D. V. School House, precinct No. 4; Kellie School House, precinct No. 5; Lantier School House, precinct No. 6; Lacy School House, precinct No. 7; Sterling Creek School House, precinct No. 8, and the following named persons are hereby appointed managers of said election, to-wit:

- W. L. Foster, presiding judge, T. J. Straley, ass't judge, 1st sec. 4, L. Douglas and W. V. Churchill, 2nd sec., precinct No. 1.
- G. A. Hodges, presiding judge, G. G. Ainsworth, ass't judge, precinct No. 2.
- J. H. Hester, presiding judge, J. H. B. Brown, ass't judge, precinct No. 3.
- J. L. Copeland, presiding judge, J. H. Welch, ass't judge, precinct No. 4.
- R. L. Martin, presiding judge, G. B. Stanton, ass't judge, precinct No. 5.
- T. M. Jackson, presiding judge, R. L. Brown, ass't judge, precinct No. 6.
- J. W. Reynolds, presiding judge, W. J. Brown, ass't judge, precinct No. 7.
- F. M. Askey, presiding judge, and J. C. Coyle, ass't judge, precinct No. 8.

Said election shall be held under the provisions of the laws of the State of Texas, in such cases, and only qualified voters shall be allowed to vote, and all voters desiring to support the proposition to issue bonds shall have their ballots the words, "For the issuance of bonds in the sum of \$10,000 for the purpose of building, plumbing, equipping and furnishing a jail for Sterling county." The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the State governing general elections.
