With Thanksgiving here, can Christmas be far behind? That means we're about to put the wraps on 1971. Up to now it hasn't been a real bad year considering that it's the third one in a four-year Republican administration.

Bovina Business Football Contest still has two more weeks to run, including this one. The final week of the 13-week contest is the first Wednesday in December.

If you're one of those really good players who hasn't picked up any weekly prize money yet, you still have a couple of shots at it.

With the high school season completed, except for the playoffs, and the college season getting wound up this week, the contest features more professional games than it has in the past. This will continue to be the case in the final week, too, only more so probably. The increase in professional games may, or may not, make the pickings easier for the individual contestant. One kind of football game is about as easy to pick as another, we'll guess. Could be that area high school and college fans will have more information about those games than they will about the professionals. However, the info about the pros is available on the book tube and in the daily papers, so it probably just depends on which you're most interested in as to which you know the most about.

All classes of football have a certain amount of unpredictability connected with them. Same can be said for all sports, of course. Maybe that's what makes them sports.

Ted Graham continues to hold onto the lead in the contest here. He has 82 total points as of this week (the end of 11 weeks). Out of a possible 110, that makes a percentage of .745. That's right on the schedule we indicate it would take to win back in the contest's beginning.

Looks now like .750 will win the contest again whether Ted stays in the lead or another contestant overtakes him.

As is usually the case with the overall leader late in the season, Graham hasn't played the contest spectacularly. But he has been highly consistent. At the end of the 11-week period, he hadn't earned any weekly prize money, but he has been in the lead for the grand prize, or tied for it, for the last nine of the 11 weeks.

He's never had a score lower than six nor one higher than nine. He has had score of six, seven and nine three times each and has made eight two times.

Based on that little bit of information, it appears that consistency is the "secret" to success in the contest. This is another opportune time to point out that it's almost a requirement to enter the contest each and every week.

You could win the overall, grand prize by missing a week, but it would be highly difficult. It would take a month or more of super-play to overcome the zero you'd get for the non-entered week.

It seems, too, that overall winners seldom win much of the weekly prize money, never more than a time or two and usually not a first place prize at that.

Anyway, the contest has two parts ---- the weekly prizes and the grand prize. If you feel like you're out of the running for the grand prize, you still have two shots at that weekly money, as we mentioned earlier.

Arkansas University is set to be the host team in the Cotton Bowl after the Texas Aggies knock the U of T at Austin Longhorns out of the title picture come tomorrow (Thanksgiving).

The Hogs will be a good-enough representative for the grand, old SWC even though they'll have to be let in the throne room door by the Aggies.

Our wish for you and yours is a happy Thanksgiving.

Report Football Revenue --

Schools' Attendance Shows Slight Increase

Average daily attendance at Bovina Schools is up slightly from the same period a year ago, according to a report given to members of the board of trustees at a Monday night meeting.

The ADA at the end of the first two six-week periods of the current school year is 644.21. At the same period a year ago, the figure was 642.79, according to L. F. Jacobs, superintendent.

Board members approved the audit report for the 1970-'71 school year as given by Cornell and Co. of Amarillo. Representing the auditing firm at the Monday night session was Bob Zenor. He explained the report at the meeting.

The statement of cash receipts and disbursements of the school district for last year appears elsewhere in this issue of The Blade.

The board authorized the purchase of a new 54-passenger school bus for next school year. It is customary for the district to purchase one new bus each year.

Approved by the board was the use of school facilities for the Adult Basic Education program. The course is scheduled to begin next week and continue the remainder of the school year.

The trustees also approved the installation of a street light at the agriculture livestock pens on school-owned property on the east side of town. A report on football game receipts for the just-completed season was also presented to board members.

Gross receipts for the season, including game guarantees from other schools, totaled \$3321.33. Net receipts after officials, gatekeepers and guards (Continued on Page 2)

Moisture Continues --

Dry Weather Farmers' Hope

Wet weather has continued to hamper harvesting operations in the area during the past week.

Stripping of cotton has been delayed now by several days. The cotton harvest was just set to get underway the first of last week when rain Monday and Tuesday postponed the work. Damp weather prevailed again Monday as mist fell most of the day.

Tuesday's weather turned out to be sunny, however, and cotton stripping could begin again by late this week, if the drying trend continues.

An inch of rain fell across the area on both Monday and Tuesday nights.

The moisture has also stalled the completion of the grain sorghum harvest. Across the area, the milo is 90 per cent or more harvested. However, that fact offers little consolation to the individual farmer who still has part of his crop standing in a wet field in danger of falling.

Moisture throughout the fall has continually delayed harvesting operations.

Money collected this year will be applied to the indebtedness of the Bovina Medical Center, according to Mrs. Jack Clayton and Mrs. H. J. Charles, chairmen of the project.

In past years, the fund has benefitted the clinic and Grace Paul Fund.

At the present time, indebtedness on the clinic is in the neighborhood of \$4,000.

Members of the Study Club point out the need for assisting the project financially through the Christmas card fund.

City Observes Thanksgiving Holiday Thurs.

Business firms in Bovina will close their doors Thursday for the annual observance of Thanksgiving Day.

This is one of several days during the year designated a holiday by Bovina businessmen.

In addition, all government offices, including the post office, city hall, etc., will be closed.

Football games on television and family get-togethers will highlight the day of a number of people. Some are expected to take advantage of the long weekend for out-of-town trips. Classes will be dismissed at Bovina Schools at 2:30 p.m. today (Wednesday) for the holiday and will resume at regular time Monday morning.

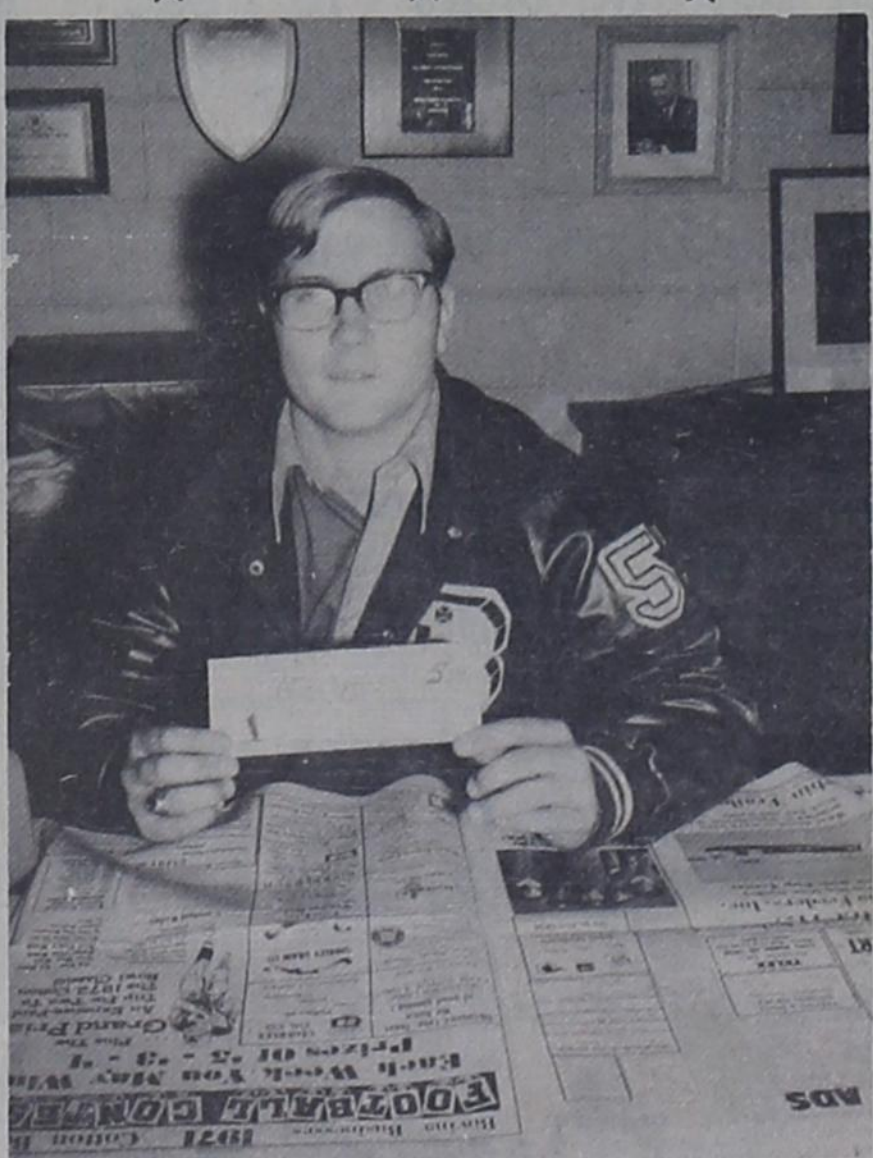

The first time, which was over the previous weekend, a pair of boots, a coat and four pairs of spurs were stolen.

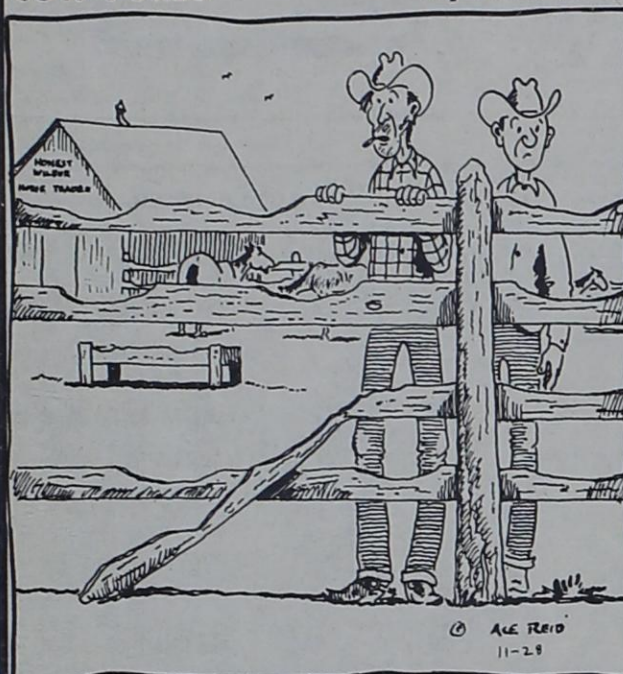
The second time, a saddle, some four saddle blankets and a coat, which had been purchased by Richards to replace the one stolen earlier, were taken.

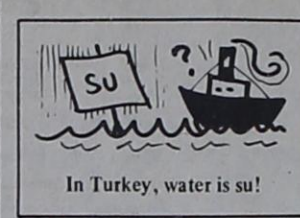

antees to visiting schools were paid was \$2549.33.

SCS Assists In Terracing

The new farming methods used today have made new moisture and erosion control practices profitable as more and more sprinkler systems are being installed in Parmer County, according to Herb Evans, district supervisor of Parmer County SCS. This releases farmers from the old problem of having to run their rows downhill. Rows running up and down a hill cause excessive rainfall runoff and erosion. With the new flexibility gained by the use of sprinkler systems, erosion and runoff can be profitably controlled.

These men have seen parallel terraces, liked what they saw, and installed their own. For more information on how you can profit from parallel terraces contact the Soil Conservation Service in Friona.

Jones Researches Cotton Herbicide

Donald W. Jones, research associate at Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University, Blacksburg, is continuing research on Velsicol Chemical Company's experimental herbicide, VCS-438, in cotton which earned him his doctorate degree recently.

Jones, the son of Mr. and Mrs. O. H. Jones of Bovina, earned his Ph. D degree in plant physiology with a specialty in weed control. He had earned his master's degree from Virginia Tech in June, 1970. His research then concerned

some effects of dimethyl sulfoxide (DMSO) on plants.

He received his bachelor of science degree from West Texas State University, Canyon. During his senior year he received an award for being the outstanding plant science major.

"Field studies have shown that VCS-438 is a promising preemergence and postemergence weed killer in several important crops," Jones explained. "The study just completed measured the amount of VCS-438 absorbed by cotton plants,

determined just where the chemical went in the plants, and also its metabolic fate."

Jones found that VCS-438 was easily broken down or metabolized by the cotton plant roots and very little of the intact chemical moved into the leaves.

The research associate now is determining what is happening to the herbicide when it is further metabolized by the cotton plant.

Jones is married to the former Judy Billingsley, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Leon Billingsley, of Farwell. The couple has two sons, Corey JuDon, almost three years old, and Jeremy Trent, born September 26.



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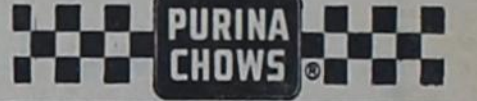

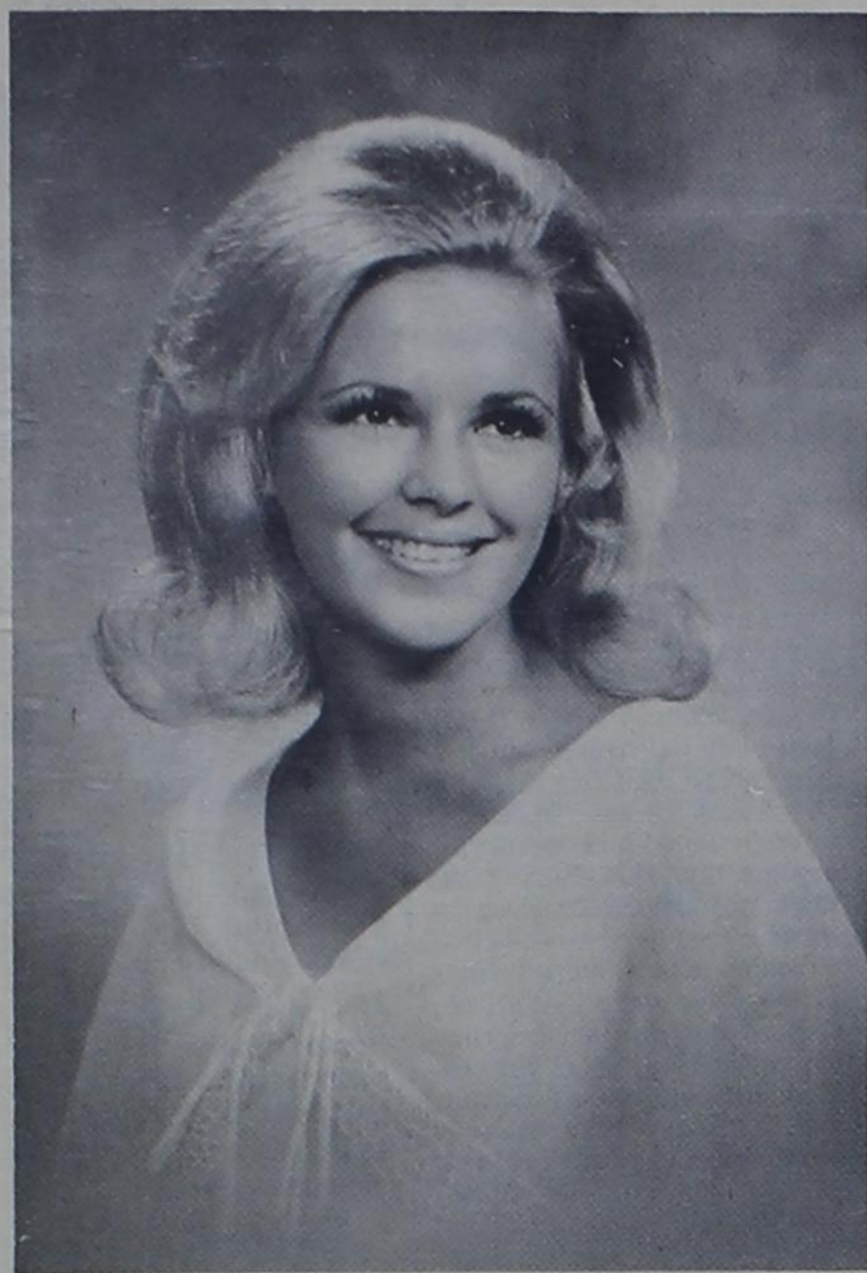
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Reveal Engagement

AJ Medical Service Topic At Club Meet

"I am staying in the Air Force because I believe in what we are doing," said Col. Robert R. Smith of Cannon Air Force Base in Clovis, N.M., when he spoke to Bovina Woman's Study Club Tuesday afternoon.

His topic was Medical Civic Action in Southeast Asia. Serving as program leader and introducing the speaker was Mrs. J. R. Caldwell.

Col. Smith, commander and director of Base Medical Services at the hospital at Cannon AFB, CAME TO Clovis in July 1970 from Hickam AFB, Hawaii, after a tour of Asia.

He is a 1951 graduate of Davis-Elkins College, Elkins, W.V., and received his medical degree from Bowman Gray School of Medicine in Wake Forest College, Winston-Salem, N.C. He is a Diplomat of the American Board of Preventive Medicine in Aerospace Medicine, a member of Amer-

ican Medical Association, Phi Chi and Alpha Sigma Phi fraternities. Col. Smith has been awarded the Bronze Star, Meritorious Service Medal, Air Force Commendation Medal and the Air Medal.

Col. Smith illustrated his talk with slides on his work in Thailand and his participation in Medical Civic Action Program (MEDCAP). He spoke in depth about his work with civilians in the area he was stationed and said the medical teams treated and examined some 38,000 children in the year he was there.

He also spoke on the methods of treating wounded armed forces personnel and the ways in which it differed from World War II and the Korean Conflict. "At the height of the Tet offensive in 1968, some 4,000 wounded per month were processed from the combat area through Clark AFB in the Philippines and on to regional

centers in the United States," said Smith.

Senior Bobby McMeans led the scoring with 23 points, sinking seven of 10 free throws during the game.

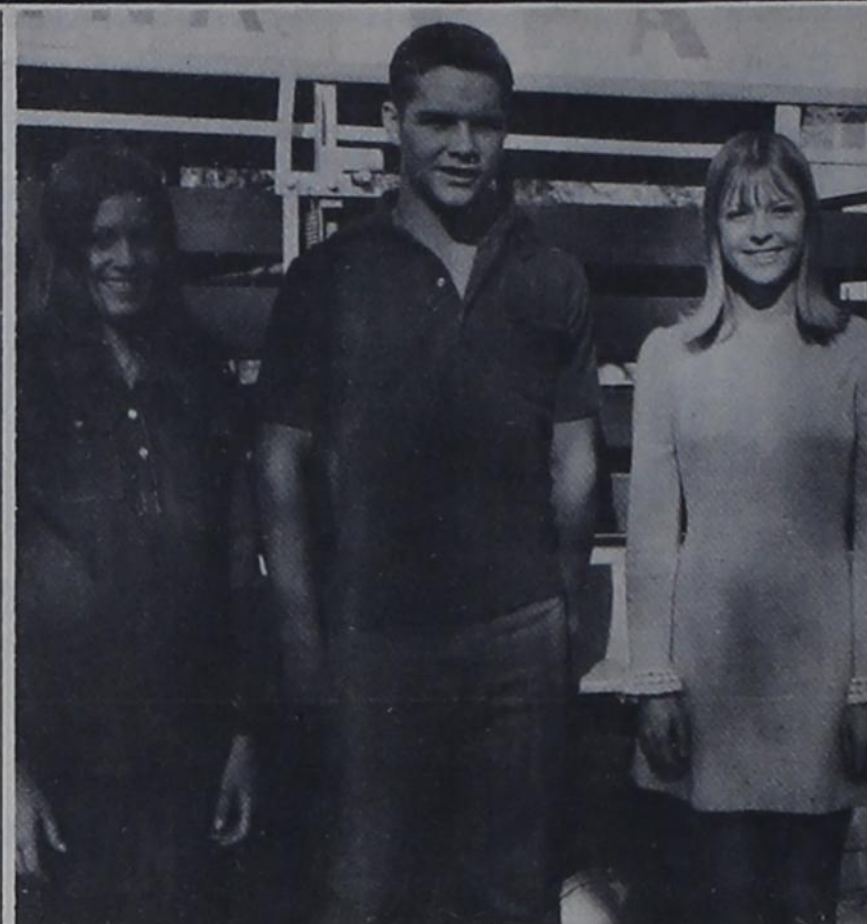
