BODY OF LAND OFF SALVADORE DISAPPEARS.

# SEVENTY FAMILIES DROWNED

Sinking Inhabitants Appealed in Vain to Panic Stricken Salvadoreans.

Port Limon, Costa Rica, Dec. 19 --The island, in the center of the llo pango lagoon, off Salvadore, has disappeared after a series of earthquake shocks, and slid into the depths of the lagoon, carrying with it nearly all of the inhabitants.

The sinking of the island is said to have followed a series of earthquake shocks, which were felt throughout the Republic. The shocks began early Saturday evening and grew in frequency and violence as night progressed, until about midnight, when the watchers on shore heard the sounds of guns from the people on

the island. Shortly after that, a huge bonfire was lighted on the island and at about 1 o'clock a boatload of frightened women and children reached the main-The survivors reported that other boats were coming as fast as they could be filled, as the island was slowly sinking under the feet of the inhabitants.

Reports from correspondents indicate that there will be an average increase planted in oats of 8 per cent, which indicates about 900, 000 acres as probable for 1911.




