We can't figure out why the Amarillo channels didn't carry the tournament games, but thanks to Cablevision, we in Friona and Bovina were able to follow the Southwest Conference action.

Most folks know that we did our college work down at Texas Tech, so there is usually little question as to who we root for in college competition.

We would like to offer congratulations to the Raiders on three pressure-packed performances in the SWC tournament, culminating in the 74-72 win over the Aggies in the tourney finals Saturday night.

A special bouquet is due Tech Coach Gerald Myers, who won his 100th game Saturday since becoming the Raiders' head coach.

We remember Myers as the play-making guard out of Borger High School who teamed up with Charley Lynch and Leon (Podd) Hill from Sudan and Wade Wolfe and Chuck Key of Lubbock on a great freshman team at Texas Tech back in 1955-56. That was also our freshman year at Tech.

We were employed at the Tech Athletic Department for a couple of years, so we were able to get acquainted with Gerald on a personal basis.

If memory doesn't fail us—Myers was Tech's first all-SWC athlete, after Tech's fight to gain admittance into the Southwest Conference.

Following his graduation at Tech, Myers landed a head coaching job in high school for a couple of years, and then went on to Houston Baptist College.

In 1972, Bob Bass left the Tech team in mid-season for a job with the pros, and Gerald was lured back to his alma-mater.

We remember wondering at the time if old Gerald was seasoned enough. After all, he was just "our age," remember. Was he ready for the historic Southwest Conference?

Well, Gerald has hushed the skeptics. In five years as the Raider boss, he has posted a record of 100 wins, 47 losses, and currently leads all active SWC coaches in winning percentage. By directing the Raiders to the three tournament wins, Myers has coached Tech to its best basketball season record in history.

THE AREA LOST a great leader this week when G.B. (Pete) Buske died. Buske, longtime Friona resident, was probably the one individual most responsible for the expansion of the cattle-feeding industry on a large scale in Parmer County.

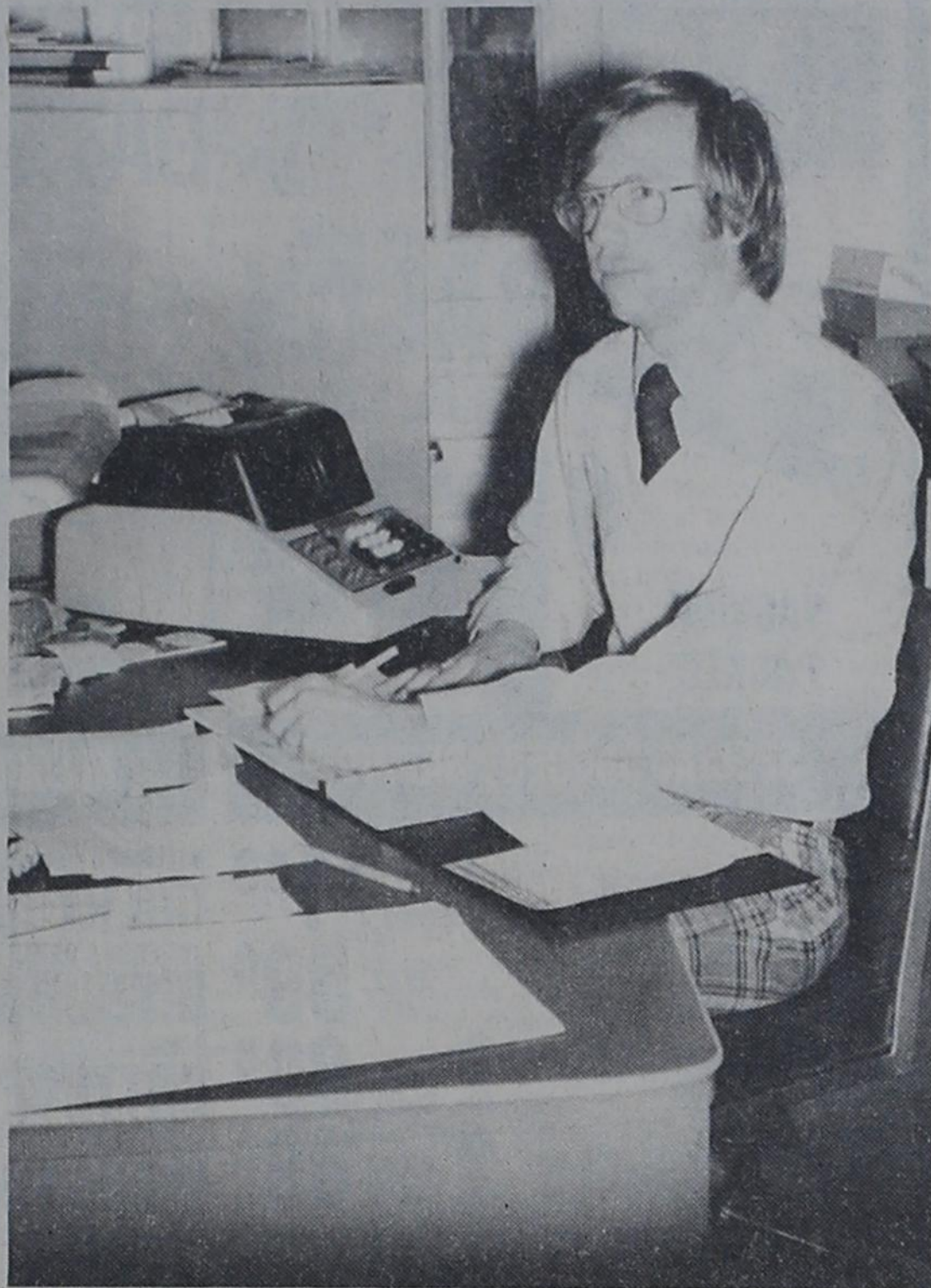
He had been earlier involved in the beginning of Hereford Feed Yard, and was one of the stockholders in the county's first big feed yard. He helped to build Hi-Pro Feeds, Paco Feed Yards, and was the founder of Pioneer Cattle Order Buyers.

Besides his achievements in cattle-related industries, Buske also helped with such community enterprises as Parmer County Community Hospital, the county showbarn, and the new nursing home which will be completed later this year in Friona.

# Lists Of Candidates Remain Unchanged

Deadline for candidates to file or be petitioned for the April 3 city and school elections was Wednesday of last week.

The list of candidates in both the city and school elections remain unchanged from last week.

Four candidates are seeking two positions on the city council. Incumbent Mayor Tom Bonds is unopposed for that position.

Four candidates are also seeking two positions on the board of trustees of Bovina Independent School District.

City candidates include Incumbents Dickle Clayton and Bedford Caldwell and Vernon Estes, a former councilman, and Stan Klimek. Klimek has not previously served in the city government.

Seeking the two trustee positions are Jimmie Cockerham, Tom Ware, Leroy Mayfield and Incumbent Edwin Lide. Billy Smith, whose term expires this year, is not a candidate.

Clayton, Caldwell and Estes are farmers. Klimek is office manager of Parmer County Cattle Company and Bonds is owner and operator of Bonds Oil Company, the Gulf distributor here.

Cockerham, Ware, Mayfield and Lide are farmers.

Both city and school elections are scheduled for Saturday, April 3.

The city voting will be at the American Legion Hall with the school balloting at the main school building.

Holdover members of the city council are Billy Whitecotton and Ken Horn. Trustees with time remaining on their present terms are Leon Ware, Leon Schilling, James Clayton, C.C. "Cap" Naegle and Earl Whitten.

The pickup left the highway, struck an embankment and veered into a small lake on the north side of the highway. Guzman was trapped inside the vehicle. Fire department units from Bovina, Farwell and Friona were called to assist in freeing Guzman from the pickup.

Arlin Hartzog (name unavailable) struck the rear of a small by-products truck on U.S. Highway 60, at almost the same location near Parmer County Cattle Company.

Bobby Calaway of Bovina reported a citizens band radio, valued at \$200, was taken from his locked pickup sometime Sunday night at his home here.

Reilly also reported an "unusual" DWI incident about 2 a.m. Monday on Third Street here. A boy, about 12-years-old, was reportedly driving an automobile when Reilly stopped the vehicle. Two men, who were apparently intoxicated, were in the car with the boy.

Saving 400 million dollars worth of cotton has been the result of a special program on the Texas Plains. For nearly 12 years the High Plains Boll Weevil Control Program has worked to promote mass spraying of weevil-infested crop areas. Estimating the 400 million dollar saving were members of the Entomology department at Texas A&M. In making the estimate they took into consideration reductions in quality losses, increases in yield and lowered control costs. Through last year, total cost of the program was estimated at 12 million dollars. Funds for the spraying (which involved the eastern edge of the cotton area) have been provided by cotton producers, the United States Department of Agriculture and the Texas Department of Agriculture. One of the outstanding things about the program has been the fact that all producer funding has been collected on a voluntary basis.

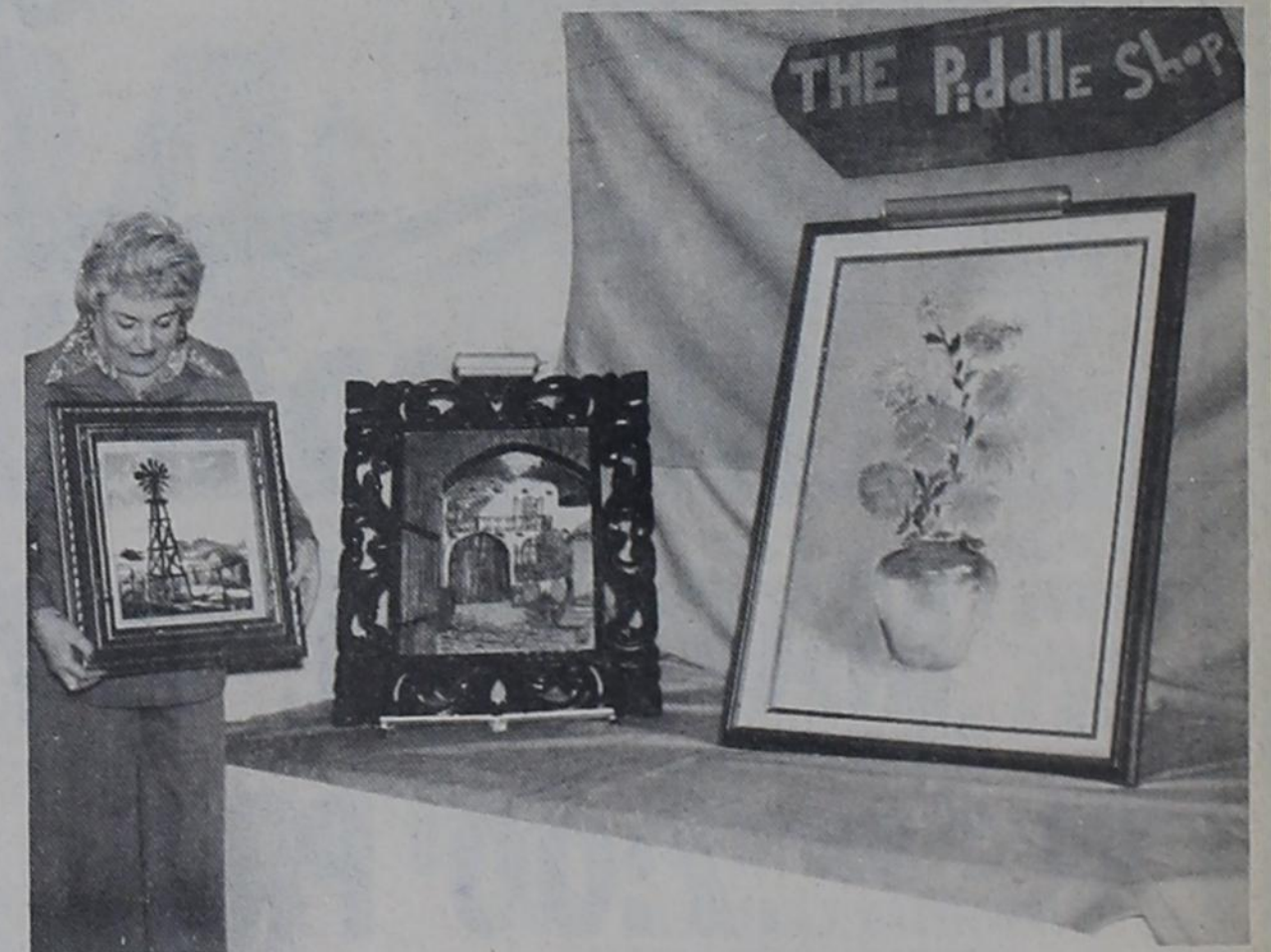

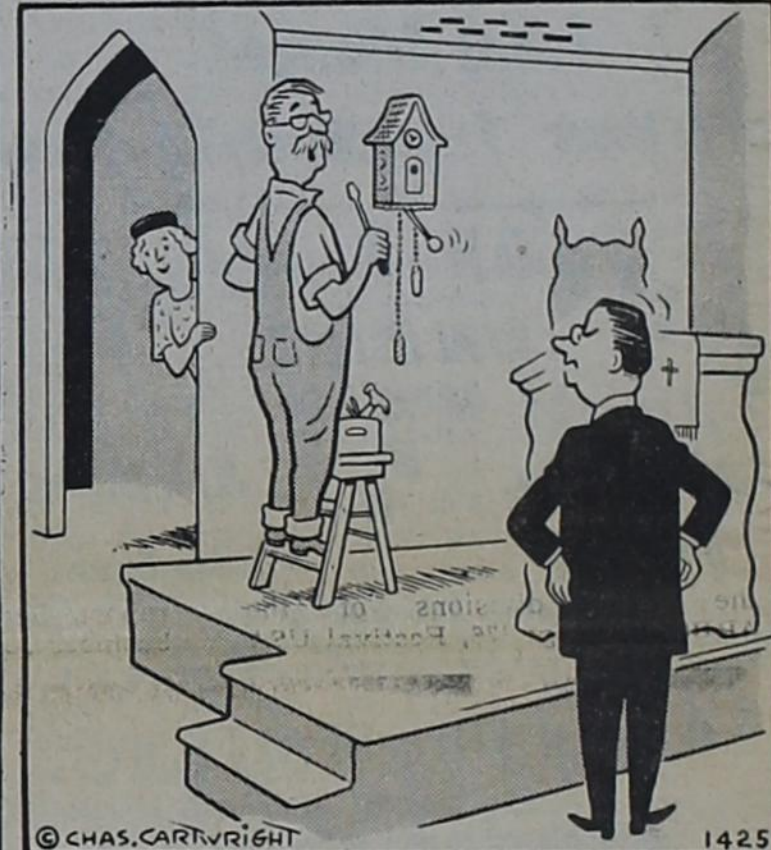

constituting a quorum and among other proceedings had by said Board of Trustees was the following:  
WHEREAS, the term of office of Billy Smith and Edwin Lide members of the Board of Trustees of this School District will expire on the first Saturday in April, 1976, said first Saturday being April 3rd, 1976, and on said date a trustee election will be held in said School District.

WHEREAS, it is necessary for this Board to pass an order establishing the procedure for filing for and conducting said trustee election;  
THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF BOVINA INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT:

1. That an election be held in said School District on April 3rd, 1976, for the purpose of electing to the Board of Trustees of said School District two members.

2. That all requests by candidates to have their names placed upon the ballot for the above mentioned election shall be in writing and signed by the candidate and filed with the secretary of the Board of Trustees at the superintendent's office not later than 30 days prior to the date of said election.

All candidates shall file with said application the loyalty affidavit required by Art. 6.02 of the Election Code.

The Secretary of this Board of Trustees shall post on the bulletin board in the building where the Board of Trustees meets the names of all candidates that have filed their applications in accordance with the terms and provisions of this Order, and said Secretary shall otherwise comply with the terms and provisions of Art. 13.32 of the Election Code.

3. That said election shall be held at the following places, and the following named persons, are hereby appointed officers for said election:

(a) In election precincts numbered at High School Building, in Bovina, Texas, in said School District, with Les McCain as Presiding Judge and Ernestine Minter and Don Murphy, Clerks.

The polls at the above designated polling places shall on election day be open from 7:00 o'clock a.m. to 7:00 o'clock p.m.

4. Zoe Clary is hereby appointed Clerk for absentee voting, and Patsy Nance is hereby appointed Deputy Clerk for absentee voting. The absentee voting for the above designated election shall be held at Ridgelea School Tax Office within the boundaries of the above named School District and said place of absentee voting shall remain open for at least eight hours on each day for absentee voting which is not a Saturday, a Sunday, or an official State holiday, beginning on the 20th day and continuing through the 4th day preceding the date of said election. Said place of voting shall remain open between the hours of 8:30 A.M. and 5:30 P.M. on each day for said absentee voting. The above described place for absentee voting is also the absentee Clerk's mailing address to which ballot applications and ballots voted by mail shall be sent.

5. By resolution heretofore adopted, the Board of Trustees determined that the electronic voting system-voting machines shall be used in the above mentioned election for absentee voting by personal appearance; and in accordance with said resolution and the Election Code, as Presiding Judge, and as Clerks, are hereby appointed the Special Canvassing Board for said election.

6. The manner of holding said election shall be governed, as nearly as may be, by the Election Code of this state, and this Board of Trustees will furnish all necessary ballots and other election supplies requisite to said election.

7. Immediately after the votes

have been counted, the officers holding said election shall make and deliver the returns of said election and perform all other duties as provided by the Election Code.

8. The Board of Trustees shall give notice of said election, and this combined Election Order and Notice shall serve as Notice for said election. The President of the Board of Trustees is hereby authorized and instructed to post or cause to have posted said combined Election Order and Notice at three public places where notices are customarily posted in this school district, and said posting shall be made at least 20 days before the date of said election.

The President shall also cause a copy of this combined Election Order and Notice to be published one time in a newspaper of general circulation in the county where this school district is located. Said publication shall be not more than 30 days nor less than 10 days before the date of said election.

It is further found and determined that in accordance with an order of the Board of Trustees, the Secretary posted written notice of the date, place and subject of this meeting on the bulletin board located in the central administrative office of this school district, a place convenient and readily accessible to the general public, and said notice, having been so posted, remained posted for at least 72 hours preceding the scheduled time of said meeting.

It is further found and determined that in accordance with an order of the Board of Trustees, the Secretary furnished a notice of the date, place and subject of this meeting to the county clerk of Parmer County, Texas, the county in which most, if not all, of this school district's pupils reside.

The hospital board almost decided the only solution would be to eliminate waste baskets entirely and throw the trash out the window. Cooler heads prevailed when it was realized that such actions would clearly violate the regulations of the Environmental Protection Agency. And so it goes in Montana, and elsewhere.

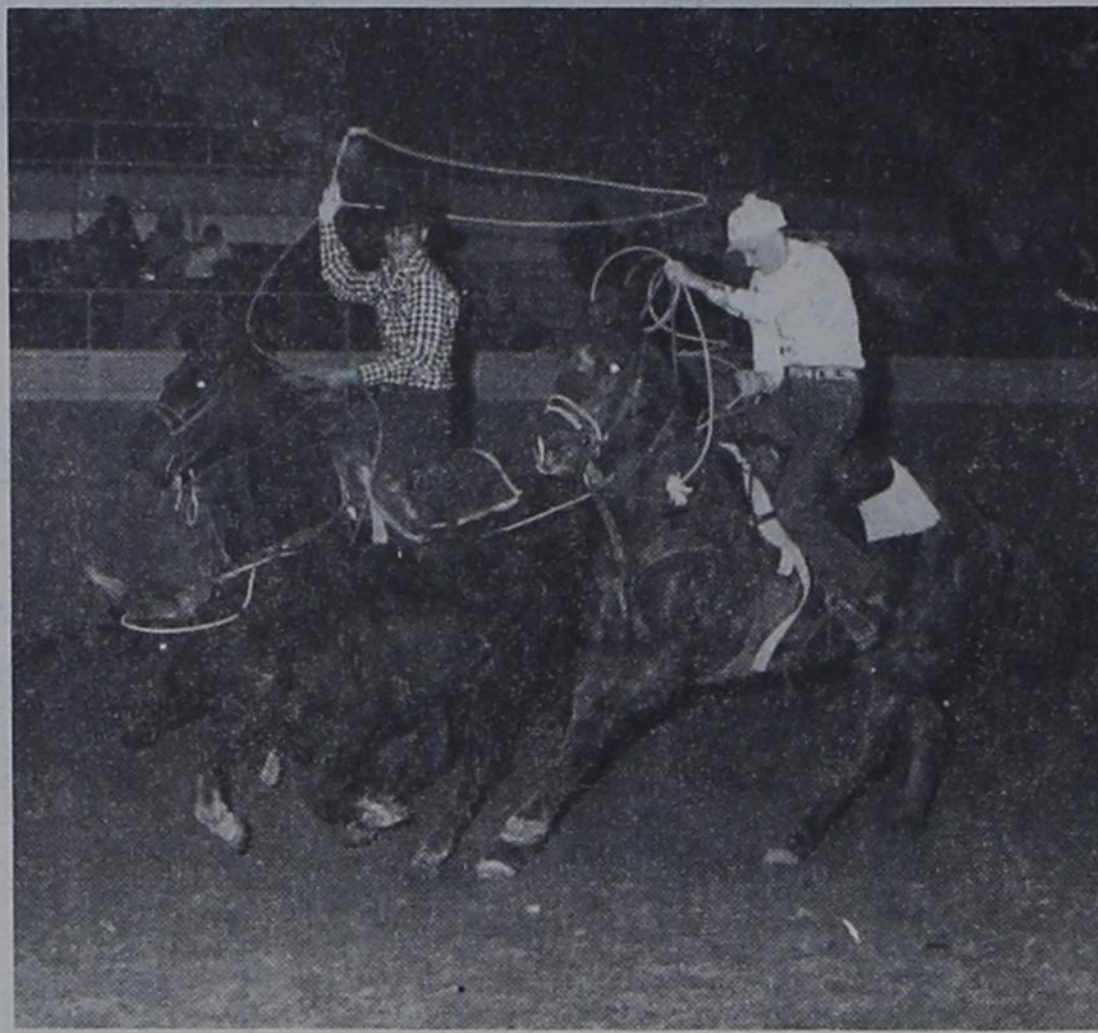

## SCS Report

When thirty to sixty miles-per-hour winds laden with dust hit your house something is going to happen. Most ladies who keep house can tell you exactly what happens.

No matter how tight windows fit, dust is going to find its way into the house, somehow. An added attraction is noted during spring house cleaning. The outside of the windows are hard to wash because they are sand blasted and pitted.

This sand blasting takes its toll on outside paint, too. It may not be as noticeable at first, but it shows up over a year or two.

This wind and sand blasting has an effect on cropland, too. The obvious damage it does is stunting and killing crops. This may not be the most serious harm done. Shifting soil loses nutrients and structure.

The red stuff you see way up in the air during a dust storm is not sand. The sand stays on or near the ground. The dust in the air is mostly organic material and clay. These materials are the

nutrient carrying substances of the soil. These losses are permanent to the potential of the soil.

What can be done to protect the home and the fields from the destructive force of the wind? Ralph Robinson and M.C. Osborn believe they have found at least a partial solution. They have decided that for spot protection windbreaks are an answer.

Planted in rows around a house, trees can reduce wind velocity from thirty miles per hour to a gentle breeze. This cuts down sand blasting and house dust.

Windbreaks have the same effect on cropland. When wind velocities are reduced on bare ground they do not have a chance to damage the soil.

Osborn and Robinson began planning their windbreaks this time last year. Now is the time for you to start planning yours for next spring.

## Name Five To WTSU Honor Roll

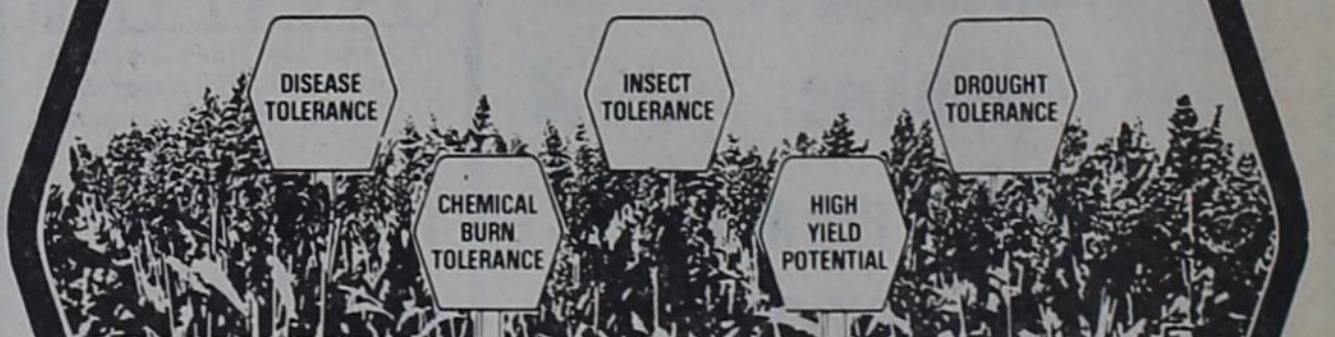
Five students from Bovina have been named to the dean's and president's honor rolls for the fall semester at West Texas State University at Canyon.
