January 31, 1962

Second annual banquet of Bovina Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture has been scheduled for night of March 15, which is on Thursday. Three weeks prior to the annual banquet, a general membership meeting will be held.

Just like Ol' Man River, Bovina Mustangs are rolling along toward a district basketball championship. They finished first half of their district round robin play Tuesday of last week with a perfect 4-0 record. Then Friday night, they started on second half with a low-scoring 36-26 decision over Nazareth to bring district record up to five wins and no losses.

Bovina Gun Club has its new trap shooting range in operation. Population of Parmer County is increasing at a rate of almost 400 per cent faster than it is decreasing through natural causes, according to a comparison of county birth and death records.

A total of 150 births was registered with the county clerk during 1961. This is opposed to 39 deaths recorded in the county. All bids recently submitted for state highway department-owned land in Bovina have been rejected.


Going into the current week's district basketball action, the Bovina Mustangs and Fillies have identical 2-1 records.

## Voter Registration Deadline Jan. 31

Potential voters in Parmer County are reminded that this week is the last chance to register to vote in 1972 elections.

Application blanks are available at the Bovina city hall.

All one must do is fill out the application blank and mail it to the tax assessor-collector's office in Farwell.


Regulations for registering to vote remain almost the same as last year, according to Hugh Moseley, tax assessor-collector.

However, one change in the

law has gone into effect, Moseley said. "If one forgets to register to vote for the 1972 elections by January 31, he may register at a later date and his name will be added to the supplemental list of voters. He must register at least 30 days prior to the election in which he wishes to cast a vote."

Bovina voters will have the opportunity to cast ballots in city and school elections in the spring and general elections in November.

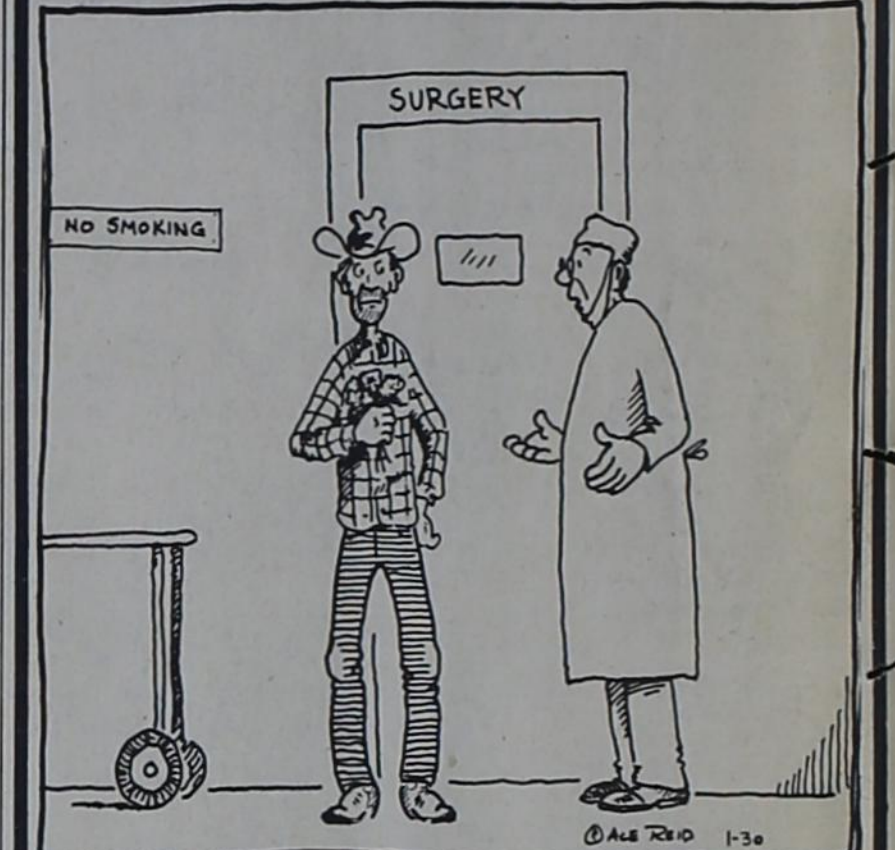
## Sgt. Bobby Webb Gets Unit Award

# Boys Win Second; Girls Place Third

Bovina Junior High's eighth grade teams, boys and girls, brought home trophies from the Springlake-Earth Junior High Tournament last weekend.

Eighth grade boys copped the second place trophy and the girls won the third place award in the event. Seven other teams were entered in each bracket.

Both teams took decisions over Whiteface in the opening round of the tournament Thursday afternoon.

The girls defeated Whiteface, 18-16, in a low scoring tilt.

Connie Ware scored eight, Fran Jacobs six and Cathy Trimble four in the contest.

Bovina trailed at the end of the first two quarters, 1-2 and 4-7, but pulled into a tie at the end of the third quarter, 14-14, and went on to score four points in the final stanza for the slim margin of victory.

In another close game, the boys defeated Whiteface's eighth, 27-23.

Elbert Shelby sank nine, Dennis Willard seven, Ray Martinez eight, Butch McCain two and Duane Mitchell one in the win.

The Bovina lads led at the end of each quarter with the first quarter ending, 7-4. Halftime score was 14-7, Bovina pulled into a nine point lead at the end of the third quarter, 21-12, and staved off a come-back attempt by Whiteface to preserve the victory.

In second round action, the girls lost to Dimmitt and the boys connected with a win over the Dimmitt boys.

Miss Trimble sank six, Miss Ware four and Miss Jacobs two in the 12-20 loss to Dimmitt.

The boys defeated Dimmitt, 36-25, to advance to the finals of the tournament Saturday night.

Willard was high scorer in the game with 11 points, followed by Mitchell with 10, Alan Rhodes with seven, Shelby five, Martinez three and McCain two. Burks sank nine points for Dimmitt.

Bovina trailed at the end of the first quarter, 7-9, but a scoring streak of 15 points in the second stanza brought them to a 22-13 halftime lead. Scoring was even in the third quarter with each team scoring six points. Bovina outscored the Dimmitt team eight to six in the final period for the win.

The girls met Muleshoe's eighth grade team Saturday afternoon for the third place honors, winning handily, 21-12. Miss Trimble was high scorer in the tilt with 13 points. Miss Jacobs and Miss Ware added four points each to the score.

Tied 5-5 at the end of the first quarter, the Bovina ladies pulled into a 13-7 lead at halftime. In the third quarter, Bovina increased their lead to nine for a 19-10 edge.

In the championship game Saturday night, the Bovina lads fell to a strong, tall Springlake-Earth eighth team, 24-45.

Scoring was evenly divided among four of the five starters with Rhodes accounting for

eight points, Willard six, Martinez five and Shelby two. Mitchell added two and Robert Pesch one. Clevinger sank 22 for S-E with Lathem scoring 10.

The score was close in the first quarter with S-E leading, 10-8. However, they increased their lead in each quarter, leading at halftime, 20-14, and at the end of the third period, 30-20.

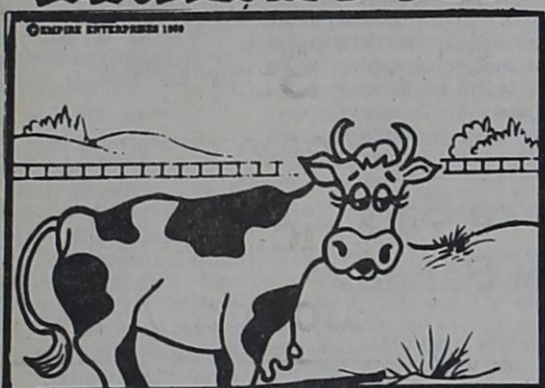

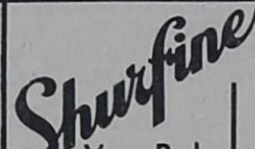

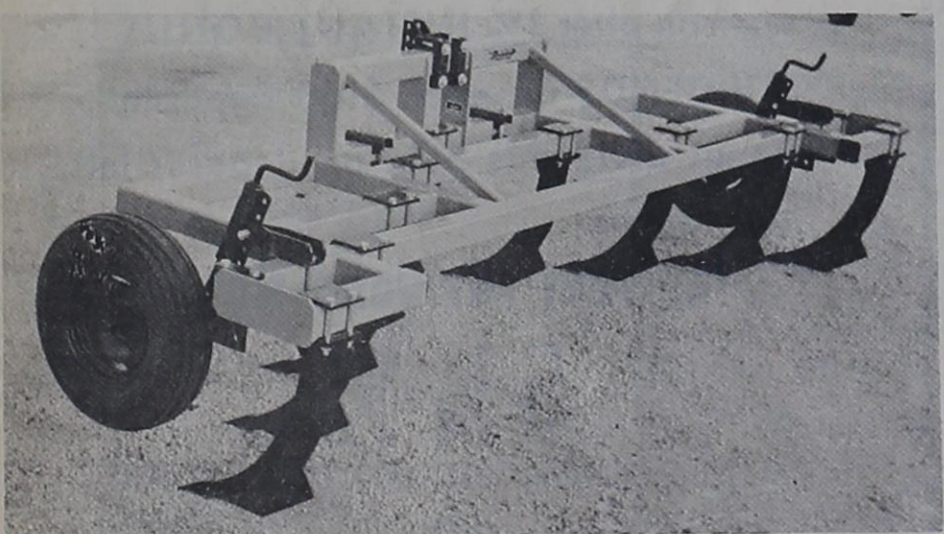

With the current surge of interest in Early American furnishings, an Atlanta, Ga., interior decorator has discovered what may be the first suitable floor covering with today's wearability but with an appearance to compliment pre-Revolutionary decor.

Mrs. Janet Hedges Lindemann, who was originally from New England, has "discovered" a uniquely colored carpet called "Candy Stripe," produced by Lewis Carpet Mills, Inc., of Cartersville, Ga., for use in a room in her home that is furnished almost entirely in authentic Early American.

The style, which features a variety of mixed colorations, is of 100 per cent continuous filament nylon and is actually made up of remnants of

nylon fiber dyed in a variety of colors.

It had been in production for some time, but had not been considered for this particular decorator use until Mrs. Lindemann happened to see a sample. She was amazed at its resemblance to the actual rugs that were woven from scraps in the Early American period.

Mrs. Lindemann pointed out that the current interest in restoring old homes and in building new homes of Early American design and with Early American furnishings provides a growing market for "Candy Stripe" carpet.

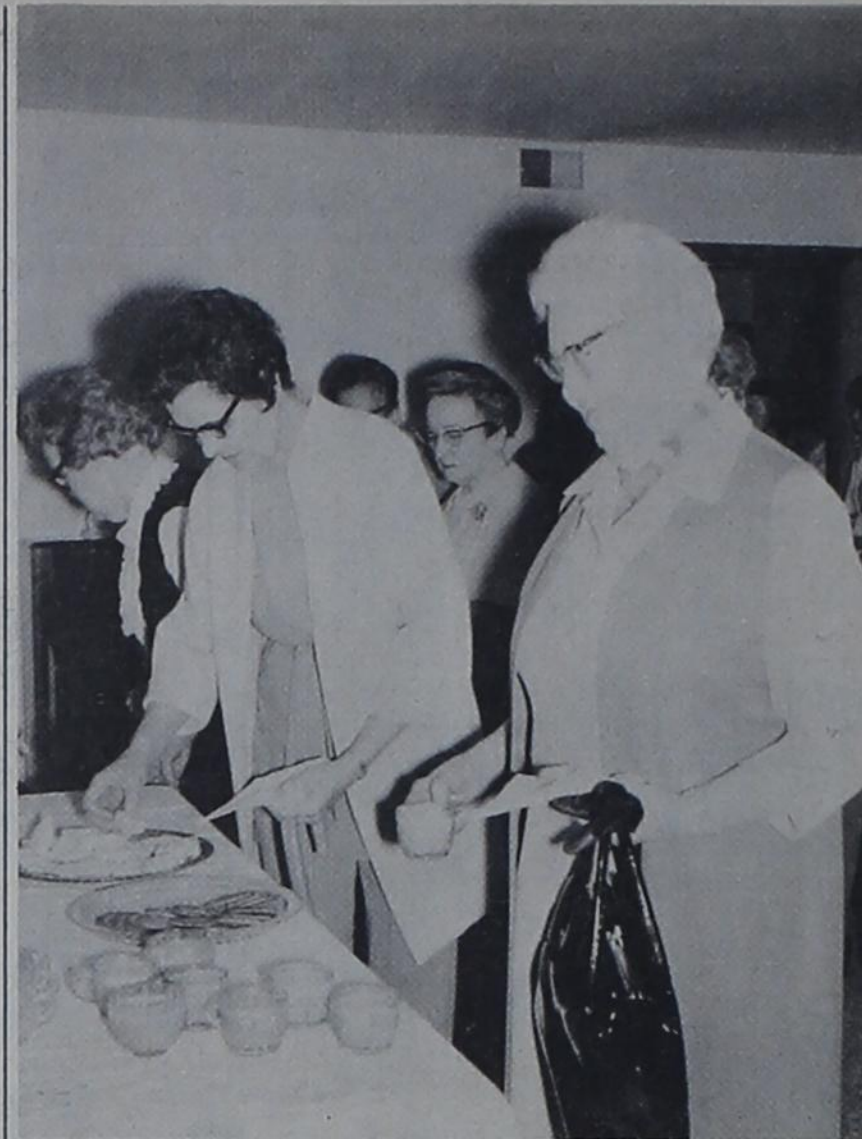

senior, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Brooks Davis.

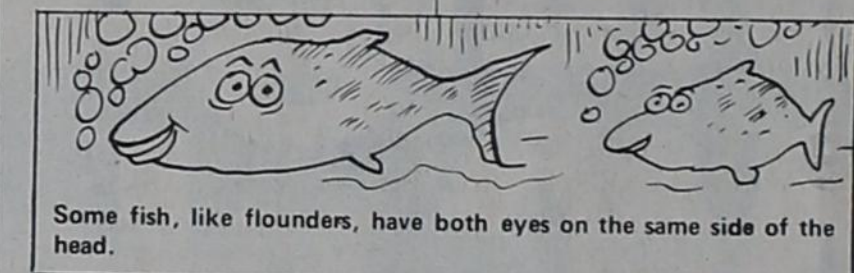
They were chosen from a field of four nominees for each honor. The Fillies selected the king and the Mustangs named the queen.
