The weekend announcement of the change of our congressional districts is almost enough to upset a fellow. Here we thought Parmer County had been shifted into the district of Congressman George Mahon of Lubbock, and we were getting prepared to be happy about it. Congressman Mahon had, in fact, already made a trip here to become acquainted with some of the people he would be representing under the change. We'd even gone so far as to admit in print that we thought Parmer County had more in common with Mahon's Lubbock district than it did the area north of Amarillo which is also served by our present Republican congressman, Bob Price.

Now comes the startling news that a federal court has shuffled the cards again (or more accurately, the congressional districts) and our favorite county gets tossed right back into Price's district.

And there's even more change than that. Under the first change, Price had an opponent in the form of Congressman Graham Purcell, a Democrat from Wichita Falls, due to the combining of parts of those two districts. Under the new change, Purcell's home area is not a part of Price's district.

This could leave Price unopposed in his bid for re-election.

As this is being written, the daily papers are telling us there's a possibility that Purcell might move his residence to Amarillo and continue to run

Some 230 attended dedication services Sunday morning at the new building of St. Ann's Catholic Church.


Open house for the new building was held Sunday afternoon with approximately 35 attending.

C. E. Trimble came home from a horse-buying trip to California last week telling a wild story about getting the wrong suitcase.



Mrs. Walling, after attempting to call the fire department, tried to bring the blaze under control with a garden hose. She suffered minor burns about the face and arms but did not require hospitalization.

> The trailer, which was filled with various household items, was destroyed and the house apparently sustained minor damage. Smoke damage wasn't considered to be severe. "If the wind had been blowing as it has the past few days, the whole house would have probably gone up," one fireman remarked.
