Of 67 people who cast votes for president there, only 66 went for Nixon.





calls for a fuel adjustment clause which allows the electric company to adjust the rate to recover, without profit, future increases in fuel (gas) costs for the operation of generators.

Based on the city's use of electricity last year, the increase amounts to \$481 yearly. The city paid \$3210 last year and the cost under the new rate for the same amount will be
