DECLARES HEAD OF NEW GEN. LUIS MENA LEADS REVOLT

# TICISM OF THE COURTS CAPITAL CITY IS ATTACKED

Serious Conditions Prevail in Repub lie Through Failure of Corn and Bean Crop.

New Orleans, La.: Confirmation of the revolt of Gen. Luis Mena and his followers in Managua, Nicaragua, dispatches to Senor Juan Zavala, Consul of Nicaragua. These advices contained the added information that the Government forces were under the leadership of Gen. Emiliano Chammorra, Conservative, and personal en-

Reports that Gen. Mena attacked the capital indicate that Campo de Marte and La Loma de Tiscapa, the principal fortresses protecting Managua, are held by the Governme forces. For months past the greater part of the Government's munitions of war have been stored in Camp de Marte, and it is believed President Diaz and Gen. Chammorra worked a ruse to gain possession of this fortress and of La Loma, further up the hill, overlooking the capital, before the resignation of the Minister of War was requested.

As an evidence of the serious conditions which prevail in Nicaragua through the failure of the corn and bean crops this season, Modesto Sequira, Governor of the Department of Bluefields, issued an official appeal on July 10 for money and provisions to relieve the distress of the destitute inhabitants of Twappi, Krukira, Quiia and other towns in the Wama River district. At the congress the term is applied to fruit growers, truck growers, swine breeders, poultry raisers, beekeepers, nurserymen, etc., exactly as it is to the man who specializes in cotton or corn. Even the rural letter carriers occupied a prominent place on the program of the congress this year, and the man who delivers the mail in the rural districts seemed to take considerably more interest in horse feed, good roads and kindred topics than he did in the postal regulations and the particular problems of the route carriers.

All the eighteen or twenty agricultural and horticultural organizations mittee of the Farmers' Congress, and nearly all of these organizations advanced some ideas during the past three days for the promotion of themselves in particular and the farmers of the State at large in general. These ideas took the form of resolutions. A long list of these resolutions was deemed worthy of recognition by the congress, and went forth bearing the indorsement of that organization.

Section 1. That Section 5 of Article II of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to here-

Constitution Creating the Office of Prison Commissioner and Making the Term of Office of the Board of Prison Commissioners Six Years.

(H. J. R. No. 22.) House Joint

Joint Resolution proposing to amend Article XVI of the State Constitution by adding thereto Section 58, creating the office of Prison Commissioners, and making the term of office of the members of the Board of Prison Commissioners six years, and making an appropriation.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be section which shall be known as Section 58 and shall read as follows:

Section 58. (Article XVI.) The Board of Prison Commissionera charge ed by law with the control and management of the State prisons, shall be composed of three members at pointed by the Governor, by and with the consent of the Senate, and whose terms of office shall be six years, or until their successors are appointed and qualified; provided that the terms missioners first appointed after the adoption of this amendment chall begin on January 20th of the year fol-lowing the adoption of this amendment and shall hold office as follows: One shall serve two years, one four by lot after they shall have qualifi and one Prison Com missioner shall be appointed every two years thereafter. In case of a vacancy in said office the Governor of this State shall fill said vacancy by appointment for the unexpired term

The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue and have published the necessary proclamation for the submission of this proposed endment of the Constitution of the State of Texas to the qualified voters for members of the Legislature of the State of Texas at the next general election to be held in this State. All persons favoring said amendment shall ave written or printed on their ballots "For a six years' term for Prison Commissioners" and those opposed to the adoption of this amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots "Against a six years term for Prison Commissioners."

Sec. 3. The sum of three theusand dollars (\$3,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appro priated out of any funds of the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated to defray the expenses of publication mitting this proposed amendment.

(S. J. R. No. 9.) Senate Joint

# INJURED BY INSECTS DAIRY IS MOST PROFITABLE

Annual Loss to the Peanut Crop ls \$3,000,000.

Advent of Mechanical Thresher In creases Damage Done by Active Little Pests on Account of Shells Being Broken.

It has been estimated that the peanut industry in the United States, for the year 1910, amounted to \$15,000,-000, and that about 20 per cent. of the peanuts grown are injured by insects, bringing the estimate of annual loss to \$3,000,000 Until recently the peanut was con-

sidered practically immune from insect injury, the growing plants suffering no noticeable damage, while the "nuts" are protected by their shells from the usual insect enemies of stored products. With the advent of the mechanical thresher or "peanut picker" this injury has greatly increased, amounting to as high as 30 per cent. This is due to the tendency of operators to feed the nuts too quickly through the machines, resulting in broken shells, which afford easy entrance to insect pests and to the practice of piling sacked nuts high in storage warehouses, and climbing upon the sacks, thus breaking the shells and increasing the percentage of infestation. The insect principally concerned in injury to the stored product is the Indian meal moth. Its caterpillar, which, when fully grown, measures about half an inch in length, develops with great rapidity and if not checked does consequent serious injury. The moth which lays the eggs which produce this destructive caterpillar appears in the Virginia peanutgrowing region in March and April, and by June the first new generation or "brood" of moths first becomes noticeable in numbers. Later, other generations are produced-as many as four in ordinary temperatures and still more in heated buildings. Two effective methods of control

may be employed with excellent results-heat and fumigation. Heat is applicable only to mills or storage rooms heated by steam. By employing steam at a temperature of 75 to 100 pounds a temperature of 120 degrees Fahrenheit may be easily profuced on a hot day in summer. This temperature, if maintained for about six hours, readily penetrates the bags writer in the Baltimore American. By and destroys the contained insects. The temperature should not be raised above 125 degrees Fahrenheit, as experiments have shown that blanching and slipping of the skin are apt to take place at higher temperatures, es-

pecially with shelled Spanish nuts. A considerable degree of prevention of injury may be accomplished by the grower and packer in the proper handling of the peanuts. Infestation may begin in the storage sheds or barns and is especially ant to be severe where the nuts are held over summer. By avoiding this practice much injury can be prevented. The same applies to the practice of crowding the mechanical pickers or threshers, especially those of the "cylinder" type, which results in broken peanut shells. The peanuts should be stored in light, well-ventilated buildings, preferably in concrete, brick or stone structures, rather than in loose frame buildings. In addition to the necessity of fumigating or heating the storage plant it may be found advisable to fumigate the freight cars used in transporting the nuts.



Brings In Steady Income Every Month During Year to Farmers Living Near Large Cities.

Dairying is the most profitable branch of farming for those living close to a large town or village, or within convenient distance of quick transportation to market. It brings in a steady income every month, which is constant throughout the year. Grain farming, except on rich limestone soils. is not as profitable, as the yield depends largely on the weather, the income from the dairy is less subject to failure than the one-crop system. The feeding of silage, which may be fed throughout the year, and the raising of green forage crops, suitable for the land and climate, have made the provident dairyman less dependent upon weather conditions.

Dairy farming requires constant attention to the wants of the cows, the care of the milk, the growing of an abundance of rye and wheat for early spring feed; peas and oats for second early feed; clover and corn fodder for mid-summer green food, and millet and barley for late fall feed. By sowing in season on well-prepared land, and spreading a light dressing of rich, rotted manure, an abundant yield may be

had, even if the season should be comparatively dry, as it was the past year. It is well to have a silo. I prefer two small ones to one large one, says a having two, a supply of silage for winter and summer feeding may be secured at a cost of \$1.50 per ton. The best time to build a silo is the latter part of winter, when most of the hay has been fed out, and when outside work is not so pressing. One portion of the barn may be utilized, if it is thought best; our preference is to build the silo outside of the barn, but convenient to the stables. A plain. small silo, six feet square and sixteen feet deep, of two thicknesses of rough boards, with tarred paper between, can be put up at a cost not to exceed \$30. A better silo, but one that will cost one-third more, can be put up with reinforced concrete. A concrete silo is much the more economical, as it will last for many years without repair if it is properly built. The wooden silo should be put up with planed and jointed lumber and well painted inside and out with hot coal tar. In building a silo allow a cubic foot capacity for each cow per day.

Silage will usually be fed about two hundred days, the usual allowance per cow per day is 40 pounds, which is 8,000 pounds of silage, or four tons, per cow for the 200 days. A herd of SHEEP WILL ADD TO PROFITS ten cows in milk will require a silo holding 40 tons; a herd of 30 cows, a silo of 120 tons capacity. 
