"That couldn't happen here," returned Mike calmly.







Resolution. House Joint Resolution proposing an amondment to Section 5, of Article II, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for offics of more than five thousand (5000) inhabitants to adopt their charter by

Section 1. That Section 5 of Artiele II of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Cities having more than five thousand (3000) inhabitants may. by a majority vote of the qualified voters of said city, at an election held for that purpose, adopt or amend their charters, subject to such limitations as may be prescribed by the Legislature, and providing that no charter or any ordinance passed under said char ter shall contain any provision inconsistent with the Constitution of the State, or of the general laws enacted by the Legislature of this State; said cities may levy, assess and collect such taxes as may be authorized by law or by their charters; but no tax
