Lumbrera Sentenced After Plea Bargain

Former Bovina resident Diana L. Lumbrera was sentenced to life in prison last Thursday for the October 2, 1978 murder of her three-year-old daughter, Melissa Garza Lumbrera, a Parmer County official said.

Ms. Lumbrera, 32, pleaded guilty during a plea bargain hearing last Thursday morning before District Judge Jack Young of Muleshoe, said District Clerk Margie Watkins.

She has been accused of killing six children, five of them her own.

She now has been found guilty of murdering two of them and awaits another trial in Lubbock County.

District Attorney Johnny Actkinson said Wednesday that Ms. Lumbrera was scheduled to go to trial Monday for the death of her two-year-old daughter, Melinda Ann Garza Lumbrera.

Contacted Thursday night at his home in Farwell, Actkinson refused comment on the case and abruptly hung up the telephone.

Ms. Lumbrera's attorney, Selden Hale of Amarillo, could not be reached for comment.

Parmer County Sheriff Rex Williams said that after Ms. Lumbrera pleaded guilty, three other murder charges against her either were dismissed or adjudicated.

Ms. Lumbrera was sentenced to life in prison in Kansas last November for the May 1990 smothering death of her four-year-old son, Jose Antonio Lumbrera. She was transferred from Kansas to Farwell late last November.

The defendant also had been indicted for murder by grand juries in Parmer and Bailey counties for the following deaths:

Ms. Lumbrera was indicted last October for murder in connection with the October 8, 1980 death of a cousin's child, six-week-old Ericka Aleman. She had carried the dead infant into Muleshoe Area Medical Center on that date, according to investigators.

On January 21, she was arraigned for murder in connection with the February 13, 1978 suffocation death of her 2½-month-old son, Jose Lionel Garza, Jr.

She was accused of suffocating the child while in a room at Methodist Hospital.

Another child, Christopher Daniel Lumbrera, 5½-months, died March 28, 1984 in Plains Memorial Hospital in Dimmitt.

"She won't be back to Parmer County," for further legal action, Williams predicted.

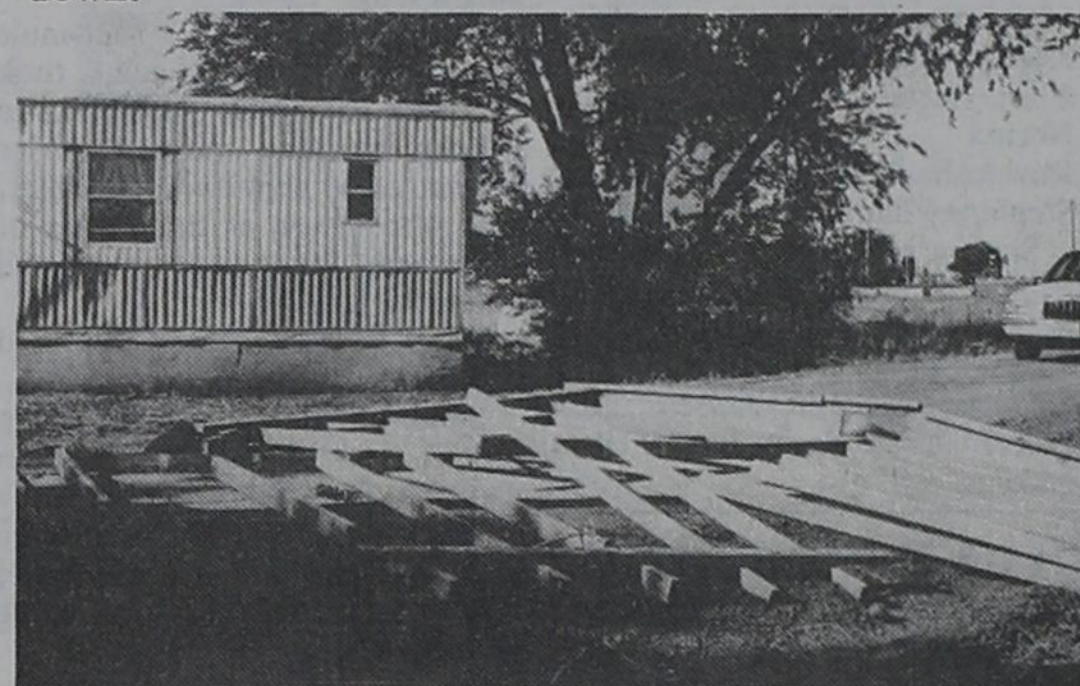

Area Recoups From Late-Night 'Blow'

Bovina and the surrounding area suffered from a very abusive storm that hit the area late Friday night. Local firemen were on top of the storm from the beginning and they had several men who were out tracking the storm, keeping a watchful eye out for possible tornadoes. Firemen also gathered at City Hall to take incoming calls on the pager.

There were several reports of damage to the area, but luckily there were no reported injuries. The high winds reached up to seventy miles per hour and Don Hatley, who lives three miles south of Bovina, had his garage turned over and destroyed.

Wes Cockerham, who lives on FM 2290, three miles west of town, lost the roof to his barn and a trailer home behind the Yankee Cafe, belonging to Martin Jasso lost its roof in the storm.

Pay-n-Save had some brick blown off the front of their building and there were many reports of broken tree limbs and debris scattered everywhere.

There were no confirmed tornadoes, but it was believed that the damage to the Hatley garage was caused by a tornado that didn't come all the way down to the ground.

The storm left a trail of tree limbs and parts of tin barn roofs to be cleaned up by area folks but, most important, there were no lives lost to the storm or injuries, and that should be attributed to the fine job done by area firemen who alerted people of the storm's rage and they were also there to let everyone know when the danger had passed.

BULLETIN: Maggie Moore reported that the rainfall in Bovina Wednesday was .12 inch, with a whopping 1.6 inches on Thursday night. Some pea-sized hail was reported, although not enough to cause any damage.

Blood Drive Set Here Next Tuesday

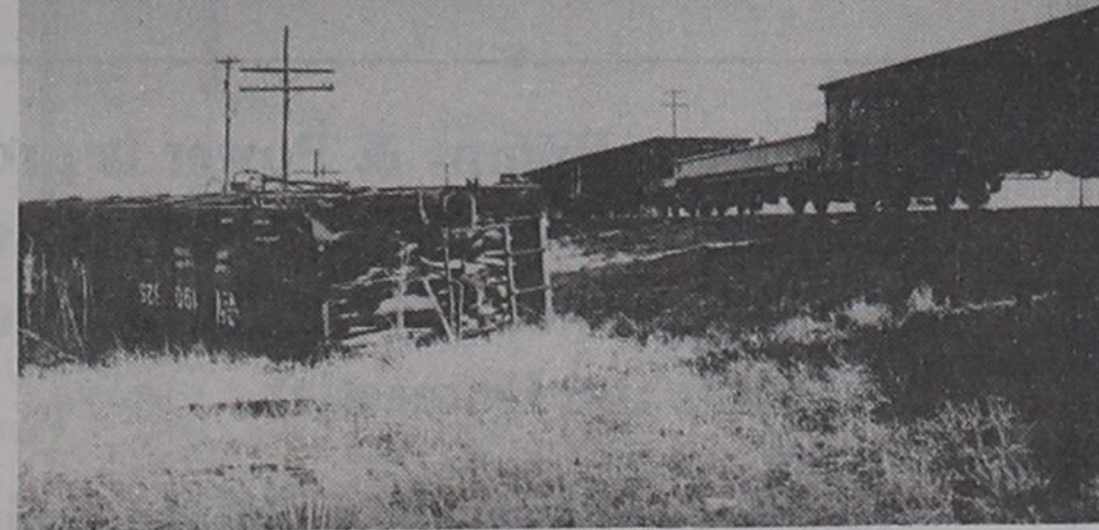
You may donate blood if you meet the following requirements: donors must be 17 years of age or older; those who are 65 or older may continue to donate blood, provided there are no changes in their health and they meet all normal donor criteria; you must weigh a minimum of 110 pounds and there must be at least eight weeks between donations.

You may not donate blood if you have or had: Hepatitis, cancer

(other than skin), diabetes requiring insulin, intravenous drug use not prescribed by a physician, participate in activities at high risk of contracting AIDS, sexual contact with an AIDS patient or with individuals who are at increased risk of contracting AIDS, unexplained night sweating, skin eruptions, fevers, weight loss, swollen lymph glands or persistent diarrhea. Heart, lung, kidney, liver, or stomach disease may or may not prevent you from donating blood.

"It is recommended that you eat a meal before donating, preferably one low in fat. Fasting is not recommended. We will ask for your Social Security number for identification purposes," a spokesperson said.

Everyone who meets the requirements is urged to come on down and donate blood

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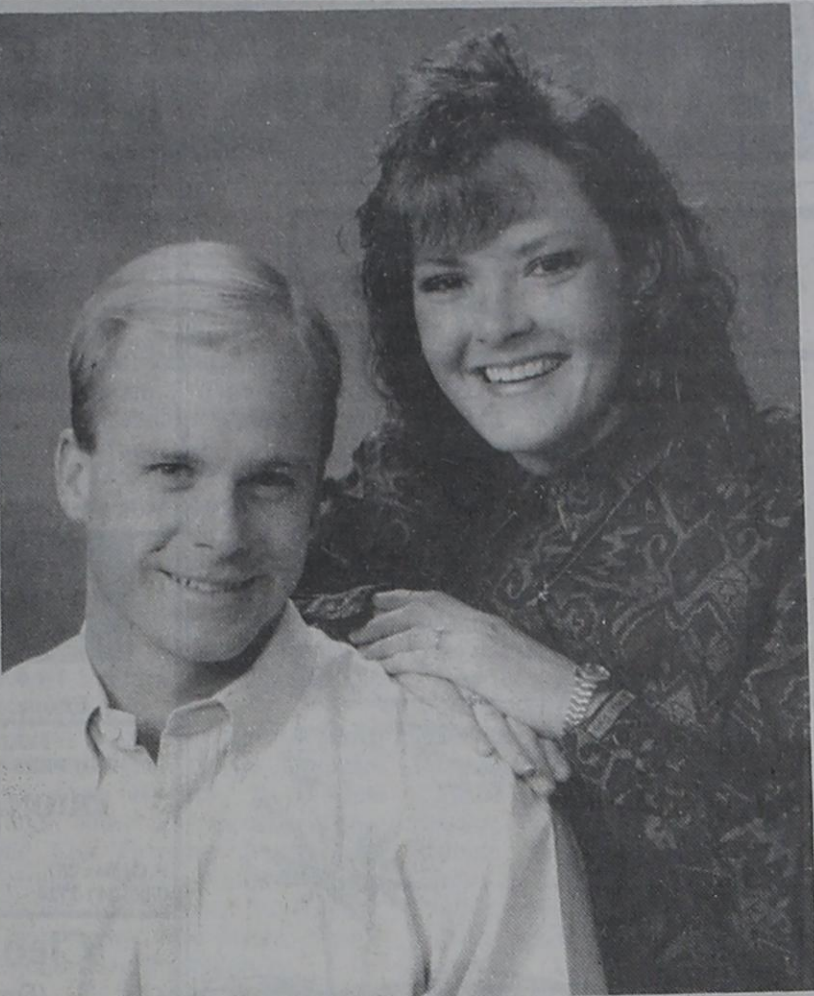
Farmers Warned Of Thefts
