THREE SHOTS FIRED AT SPANISH KING

ATTACK MADE ON ALFONSO BY A CARPENTER, WHO IS SOON OVERPOWERED.

QUICKNESS SAVES HIS LIFE

Monarch Assailed While Riding Horse, but Proves Courageous in Face of Great Danger.

Madrid.-For the third time in his reign Alfonso narrowly escaped Sunday being the victim of an anarchist attempt against his life.

Three shots were fired at the king in the streets of the capital by a native of Barcelona, Rafael Sanchez Allegro, a carpenter, who was immediately overpowered.

King Alfonso owes his escape to his own courage, quickness and skilled horsemanship. Accompanied by his staff, he was riding along the Calle de Aloala, returning from the ceremony of swearing in recruits, when a man sprang from the sidewalk and seized the bridle of the king's horse with one hand, presenting a revolver point-blank with the other.

The king, realizing the situation, with lightning rapidiy, dug his spurs His quickness saved his life. The instead of burying itself in the king's breast, struck the horse on the neck, but so close was it that the king's left-hand glove was blackened by the powder discharge.

Before the assailant was able to pull the trigger again a secret service man sprang upon him. The two men fell to the ground locked in each other's arms struggling furiously.

The would-be assassin managed to free his revolver arm and fired two more shots in rapid succession, but the officer knocked his arm aside the bullets flew harmlessly

From Jail on Probation. London.-Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst.

the suffragette leader, has been released from Holloway jail after having been on a "hunger strike" since she was sentenced, only nine days ago, to three years of penal servitude. Mrs. Pankhurst was released on probation, under the terms of which she must report at frequent intervals to the police. In case she commits any misdemeanor, she is liable to immediate arrest and must then serve out her full term of conviction. The intention of the authorities is to allow her to be free only until she regains her strength.

The condition of the suffragette eader was described by her friends to be very grave. She was removed at once to a sanitarium.

PROFIT IN PUBLIC PARKS

Make Entire System of Hartford. Conn., Self Supporting.

George A. Parker, superintendent of parks of Hartford, Conn., proposes to make an entire city park system self supporting without in any way curtailing the freedom of its use by all citizens, but on the other hand increasing its usefulness. His experience started when he conducted a refectory in one of the parks, believing that by increasing the quality and quantity of the supplies, adding to the wages of waitress and employing a manager there would be no profit. He was surprised to find a profit of more than \$1,200 the first year. Lighting and heating an old sheep fold near a skating pond and supplying hot drinks and sandwiches at from one to seven cents, he produced returns paying for all the service rendered and in part for keeping the ice free from snow.

A suggestion on a visit to a Kansas City park led Mr. Parker to plan a building nearly 400 feet in length for dances, moving pictures, bowling alley, refectory and auditorium, at a cost of \$40,000. He assumed that the average time spent in recreation by a citizen is five hours, and determined that Hartford's 100,000 population spends \$8,000 to \$10,000 a day for its recreation, including theaters, games, saloons, lectures and churches; that the cost per recreation hour was two cents in Hartford, though in some cities it was as low as one cent.

C.-Removal of all tariff from many articles of food and clothing, broad reductions in the rates of duty on all necessaries of life, an increase of tariff on many luxuries, and a new income tax that would touch the pocket of every American citfzen whose net income exceeds \$4,000 are the striking features of the new Democratic tariff revision bill.

These principal items are taken from the free list and taxed: Rough and uncut diamonds and precious stones, furs, coal tar products, 10 per cent.; volatile oils, 20 per cent.; spices, from 1 cent to 2 cents per pound

The new rates are estimated to reduce the customs revenue approximately \$80,000,000 a year. This is expected to be made up by the income



Hairpins and Other Pins.

Hairpins have been elaborated as a means of decoration since the earliest times. Particularly beautiful is the variety and delicacy of their workmanship, two of the finest specimens The average royalty on all kinds of victims whom they would fool by their being the gold pins which were found at Salamis in Cyprus, and are now in the British museum. 




