# This Is For The Birds - Parakeets, That Is

This story is for the birds - literally.

Down around 210 W. Third, there's a lot of chattering every daylight hour. The chattering comes from just about the prettiest bunch of birds ever assembled in one place - parakeets, hundreds of them!

"Got into the business mostly by accident," says C. F. Garth. "We moved to this place about four years ago, and my neighbor, Mrs. Jay Brantley, had 27 parakeets. But she was tired of the business, so I just bought her out, lock, stock and barrel. We skidded the pens over to my place and all of a sudden I was in the parakeet business. "I guess Mrs. Brantley missed her birds more than she figured she would, because a year later she bought a bunch

of birds from me and she was right back in business, too." Today parakeets are a big business for Garth. His 12 pens contain 1350 birds and he has a thriving wholesale business. The birds are shipped every few days to American Bird Co. in Chicago, and they wind up in pet shops and five - and - tens throughout the nation.

Mama starts the sitting process even before she lays the first egg, and then 18 days later the first little bird peeps out of its shell. It's meals - in - bed for both the mama and the little birds, papa providing the transportation.

"Funnest thing you ever saw, watching the papa bird feeding those little ones," Garth chuckles. The little like flat on his back, opens his mouth, and papa parakeet

crams the food down the little fellow's throat. After a few days, mama bird also starts with the feeding process for the birds, leaving her nest long enough to pick up a few choice morsels for Junior.

"By the time she has wound up her hatching job, the first bird hatched already has his pin feathers. And another smart thing, when it's time for Junior to get out on his own, mama nudges him out of the nest, from that time forward he feeds himself or he dies. Most - ly he feeds himself, because the casualty number is very low."

The birds live mostly on oats and millet, "but the birds like their salad," he adds. "You ought to see them go wild when I take in grass cuttings or celery or alfalfa - those green foods are their favorites." The birds require very little heat - one stove in the center of the house provides enough heat for all the birds, and they get by in summer without air conditioning.

## Months Of Red Tape In U.S. 84 Right-Of-Way Buying Nears End

Months of red - tape, that tedious process by which right-of-way land must be acquired before even a simple 9.8 mile stretch of road can be first shoveled of dirt turned, is nearing an end.

"There have been some changes in the conversion program," he explained the primary one being rescheduling the cut - over date from Aug. 15 to Nov. 7.

"The reason for the change in dates is due to some delay in obtaining necessary central office equipment from the factory."

He said the later date also would "better coincide" with the issuance of new telephone directories here.

He said all numbers in Muleshoe will be changed both those with four digits and those with five digits, and the prefix will be 272. However, the seven - digit system will make it possible for a person who moves from one section of Muleshoe to another section to retain his number.

## Courthouse Gets New Lighting System, Painting

Bailey county courthouse, long dark except in those rare spots where old - fashioned bulbs glare forth spotty light, is being lighted these days.

The county commissioners have approved an elaborate lighting project to brighten up those dingy offices. At their session this week they decided to rig the courthouse with fluorescent lights, removing the old globes and bulbs that have been in use - some of them at least - since the structure was erected.

A general re - arranging of the building also has been under way. The tax assessor - collector's office was moved from its bay space on the second floor to the first floor to space formerly occupied by the district attorney. A portion of the county attorney's former office also was included in the collector's new suite. The county attorney has taken over the scragged quarters of the public library before that institution moved into a building of its own on the north side of town. The district - county clerk took over the space formerly occupied by the collector's office.

A general interior painting job also was approved by the commissioners. The entire interior of the old structure will be given fresh coats of paint, and those offices which have already been moved have already been given a paint job.

all this business by Sept. 15," he says, carefully crossing fingers on both hands.

"After that, it will be up to the State boys to decide when the actual contract letting takes place. Most hopeful date is sometime early in 1966."

Meantime a specially appointed commission has been meeting in semi - formal sessions with the land owners along the route who were not satisfied with the appraiser's figures or else their titles are clouded. The commission has heard seven of eight cases, filed by the county - state for title clearing. They had four such cases set down for hearing Thursday, and they heard three. The fourth would have been tried before the special commission, but the fourth land owner had to go to a funeral.

Of the eight cases filed, one was continued and another is to be appealed. That means that Judge Williams - who also appointed the commission in the first place - goes into the difficult task of trying the case by jury.

"Puts me in kind of an embarrassing spot," the judge explained, "but that's the way the law reads. I will try that particular case - and others like it if necessary - to the best of my ability."

As the judge figures it, there are only seven cases left to be wound up, including the two complicated cases mentioned earlier in this progress report.

"Several of those whose deals have not been closed are willing to wind up the matter. In fact, they are eager to get the job done with and get their pay. These are mostly those who for some minor reason or other, have clouded titles. Of course, the cases heard by the condemnation - commission, are, to all practical purposes, as good as finished; once the condemnation has been settled, by the special commission, the job of clearing off the land can get under way.

And probably no one will be more pleased to see this written to the county's tedious activities than Judge Williams who has been a sort of referee for the entire affair ever since the land - buying program was started months ago.

Susan Birdsong has been selected to appear with the United States of America High School Band on a 30 - day tour of Canada and the Eastern U. S. this summer.

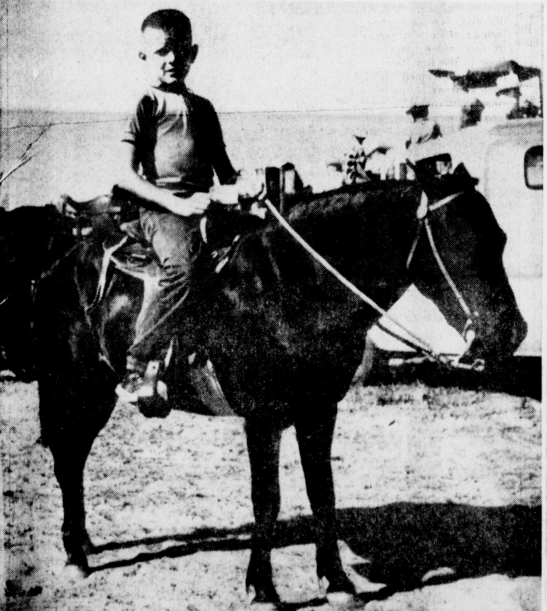

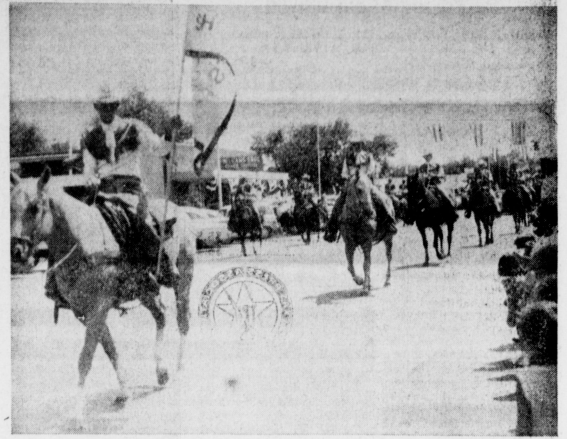

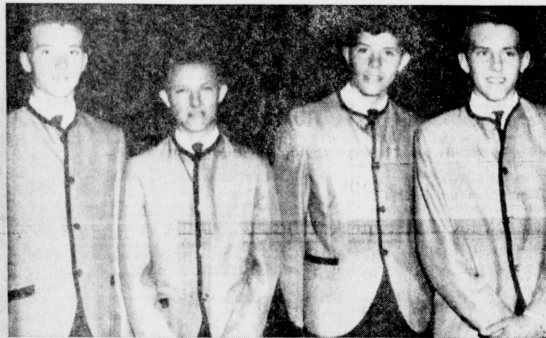

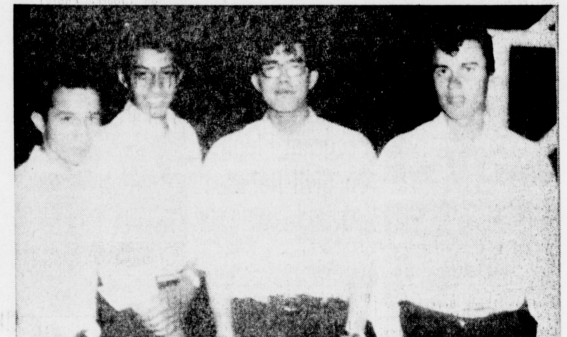

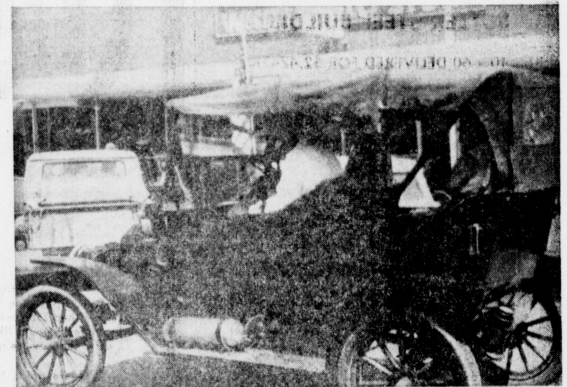

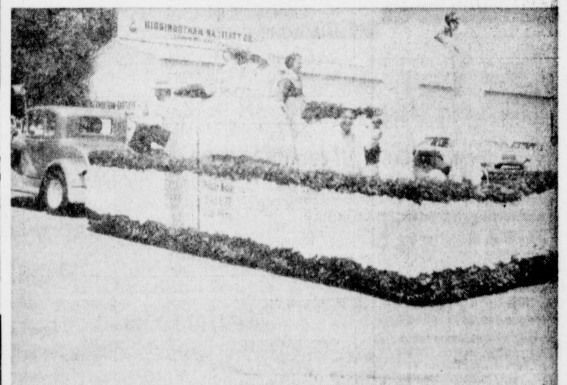

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**Letters TO THE EDITOR**

Dear Editor:

On Monday night, June 28, I watched an hour long program that was the most deplorable program I have ever watched. The title was "It's What's Happening, Baby," sponsored by the Economic Opportunity Act, paid for with our tax money. The M. C. would interrupt the acts every 10 to 15 minutes with something like this: "Come on Baby, you know your problems better than we do in Washington, so get with it, send in your idea of how we can help you." Or The President

has sat up the Economic Opportunity Act with money already set aside, to help just you have a better life, so get with it baby, write today to New Chance, Washington, D. C." In other words it was telling our youth to stop knocking themselves out trying to better their life, just send it and let the Federal Government help do this for them.

It is highly unusual that our government would get a program such as this and then have to beg the people to use it. Time was when we the people would implement programs for the good of man, then send them to Washington to be voted into an act or law. Not any

more, but rather there verse is happening in that these programs are coming from the top down, both with the program for our youth as well as for the aged.

I attended a meeting in San Antonio in November, 1964, with different groups of people whose purpose was to get programs sent in from the local level requesting money from the E. O. A. Could it be that the fact that the people from the local level is not requesting help from the Federal Funds, was an embarrassment to the Government?

Some of the recommendations that came out of this group was such, Quote "Due to

the fact that community action may not be a spontaneous result of the Economic Opportunity Act, we therefore urge that persons qualified to catalyze community interest into Action Programs be made available in Texas immediately" unquote. In other words, if a community is not taking advantage of this money already set aside for use, then send someone into that community and get prominent men and women of that community to plan and coordinate programs that will be sent in for request of Federal Aid, which under this act will pay 90 percent of the cost of a project.

These programs are to be used to help people of our com-

unities better themselves, of which I am for. But I am not for using Federal money to do this with. Our States as Well as our Counties have programs already in action to care for the needy and I feel that each community can and should care for their own.

How much of this money will actually get to the individual? In Oklahoma City it is reported that of the \$92,000 in Federal Funds to finance a project for a year was used to a little over a month. Where did this money go? Who has been helped with it? This same trouble has been reported in Chicago and other places. In Gum Spring, Virginia of \$74,000 available to fight poverty for a year \$34,000 is going for Staff salaries. Again I ask, Who's being helped the most with projects such as this? I need not ask who is "footing the bill, because in 1963 taxes and other governmental livies took 38 percent of the total national income. It is undoubtedly much higher today with no end in sight."

It is strange, indeed, that our government would sponsor T. V. programs and use these other methods to beg the people to use Federal money. Why? What long range purpose is behind it? After celebrating the fourth of July and thinking again of the price our forefathers paid to hand us all the freedoms we enjoy today, it is continue in the ways we are going. May we all, as long as we have a voice to use, raise it against such give away programs. And may we in each community love our neighbor and help those in need, without the need of calling on Federal help.
