STEAMER BURNS UP IN MID-ATLANTIC

LINER, VOLTURNO, FROM ROTTERDAM TO NEW YORK IS WRECKED BY FLAMES.

136 PEOPLE WENT DOWN

Storm Delays Rescue by Many Ships that Responded to Wireless Call for Help.

London.—Not since the Titanic sank has Europe been so thrilled as by a wireless message Saturday telling of the burning of the steamship Volturno in mid-Atlantic with a loss of 136 lives and the rescue of 529.

The Volturno sailed from Rotterdam on Oct. 2 for New York. According to the official statement, she carried 22 first cabin passengers, 538 steerage and a crew numbering 96.

The rescue ships reached the scene of the disaster plenty of time to save all, but for hours stood by the blazing vessel, unable because of a storm, to reach the agonized men, women and children crowding the after part of the ship, which was within a stone's throw.

All night Thursday the lifeboats made a desperate effort to get along side the Volturno, but the waves beat them back again and again, and not until the storm abated at daylight Friday did the rescuers succeed in removing the survivors from the doomed ship.

The Volturno was well equipped with boats, sufficient, the agents say, for 1,000 people, but the boisterous sea or lack of boat drill, or panic among the passengers, prevented the successful employment of them. The rescue ships were unable to lower lifeboats, but apparently most of the boats launched from the Volturno were smashed or upset and the occupants drowned.

Forty of the 136 people lost from the steamship Volturno in mid-Atlantic were in the two boats which succeeded in getting away from the burning vessel and which, without doubt, were swamped. The majority of the others who lost their lives were in four other boats which were smashed against the steamer's sides in attempts to launch them.

All this occurred before the arrival of the Carmania and the other liners summoned by the wireless calls for help.

PHILADELPHIA WINS SERIES.

Titular Honors Awarded When Athletics Take Fourth Game.

New York.—The Philadelphia Athletics won the baseball championship of the world for 1913 at the Polo Grounds Saturday afternoon by defeating the New York Giants 3 to 1 in the fifth and deciding games of the series.

With the scores of games standing three to one in their favor, the American league representatives went in to clinch the series, and before the masterly playing of the Mackmen the National leaguers had absolutely no chance. Connie Mack, anxious to finish the struggle on the final day of the week, sent Eddie Plank, his veteran southpaw, to the mound, and John McGraw, his back to the wall, called on Christy Mathewson to check the notorious rush of the Athletics and thus gain for his team a breathing spell.

Both old masters of curve and break responded nobly to the call of their managers and clubs, but the Giants were unable to help Mathewson by even mediocre batting, fell victims to the vicious-hitting, fast-fielding combination which has again raised the standard of the American league over that of the National organization.

The \$20,000 waterworks bond election held at Floydada recently, carried by a majority of 4 to 1. Work will start as soon as the bonds are sold.

That a score of members of the crew of the steamer Julia Luckenbach were imprisoned in the ship when she was rammed and sunk in the Chesapeake bay by the British steamer Indrakula, while on her way to Galveston last January, was discovered last week.

October 25th is the date set by the county commissioners to vote on the issuance of good road bonds at Alice, in the sum of \$125,000.

Heavy damage was wrought by lightning in the Tulsa, Okla., oil fields during the progress of a severe storm. The Texas Company suffered a loss of \$50,000 in the destruction of a tank containing 35,000 barrels of oil. The Prairie Oil and Gas Company also suffered the loss of a tank oil in the Cushing field, according to reports.

The contract has been awarded for the building of the new Brazoria county country club, which is to be located on the beach just west of Quintana. The structure will be of the mission type.

The county commissioners have delivered another consignment of the Tarrant county road and bridge bonds to the purchasers. The amount of the consignment was \$25,000, leaving only \$75,000 out of the total of \$1,300,000 to be delivered.

Sixteen Women Crushed to Death. Lemberg, Austria-Hungary.—The fainting of a woman in a crowded synagogue at Chodrow Galacia, caused a panic. Hundreds of women rushed to the doors and 16 were crushed to death. Scores were injured.

Tulsa Will Be Capital. Oklahoma City, Okla.—Tulsa is to be the temporary state capital as far as the executive department is concerned from Oct. 27 to 31, according to a proclamation issued by Gov. Cruce. The occasion is the international Dry Farming congress, which opens at that city on Oct. 22, and the governor says that all officials business will be transacted from there between the dates given. The proclamation says the congress is of great importance to Oklahoma.

Acting Governor to Open Fair. Austin, Texas.—Gov. Colquhitt will not return to Texas from Cuba in time to open the State Fair at Dallas, and Acting Gov. Will H. Mayes will attend in his stead.

TEXAS BREVITIES

Several split lot drags are being used on the roads in and around Kaufman and the results are gratifying.

Acting Gov. Will H. Mayes has issued a proclamation, designating Sunday, Nov. 2 as "Temperance Sunday" in Texas.

Braham parties have purchased 40 acres of land lying just outside the city limits, and the property will be converted into a race track.

This year's pecan crop in the San Angelo section promises to be the largest ever harvested for several seasons past. Estimates place the production at more than 30 cars.

The Southwest Texas fair will open at Beaumont Nov. 15 for eight days of entertainment. Indications point to this being one of the biggest exhibitions ever conducted in that section of the state.

One hundred thousand dollars of the \$250,000 goods roads bonds recently voted at Conroe have been sold and will be used in constructing highways. Work will begin at once. The remaining \$150,000 will be used later.

Rockport dealers are shipping oysters as fast as they can be prepared for market and the catch this season will exceed that of last year. The value of the fish and oyster output of Aransas county in 1913 was \$185,000.

A road committee has been appointed at Huntsville and a special road district mapped out and a proposition to issue \$150,000 in road bonds will be submitted to the voters. The election will be called soon.

Track laying has begun at Matador on the new railroad under construction by the Matador Northern railway. The road is six miles long and when completed, will connect with the main line of the Quanah, Acme and Pacific.

One Sherman poultry dealer has bought \$40,000 worth of poultry and eggs so far this season. For the first time in the history of this city eggs were put in cold storage, \$5,000 worth of eggs being stored in May and June.

Through an aperture formed by sawing out a single prison bar and crawling through which only a small man could crawl, 20 white convicts escaped early Sunday morning from Imperial state farm. That afternoon four of the men had been retaken, one of the four of the men had been retaken, one of having voluntarily returned to the camp and surrendered. One was arrested by police officers in Houston and the other two by possees combing the country in the vicinity of the camp. Three more were captured Monday.

The recent rainstorm has destroyed more crops and damaged the country more than any storm that has ever visited Wilson county. One family was shown by the mission board of the church of the denomination at its 44th general convention.

A tornado which originated near Oconto, in Custer county, Nebraska, Thursday, swept across the country to the northeast for nearly 20 miles, spending its force near Sargent. Great damage was done in the towns of Lodi and Broken Bow were sufferers. First reports stated that Broken Bow had been struck squarely but some believe only a small corner of the town suffered.

Six million dollars given for missions during three years by members of the Protestant Episcopal church was shown by the mission board of the church of the denomination at its 44th general convention.

One of the most beneficial exhibits to the farmer that will be on display at the Texas state fair at Dallas this month is irrigating machinery adapted to every need and condition from pumping water into the kitchen sink to irrigating a league of land.

Farmers of Asherton are preparing to organize for the promotion of scientific farming and marketing and will operate an experimental truck and stock farm with dairying in connection.

The management of the Texas state fair at Dallas has changed the date of the boy scout day from Oct. 25 to Nov. 1. This change was necessary to give ample time to prepare a more elaborate program. Several new features have been added.

A brick building at Mount Pleasant, Tex., fell. It was occupied by Smith's booting works. Being at night, no one was hurt. The damage will total about \$2,000.

Hearing of the case against Frank M. Ryan, former president of the Structural Iron Workers' Union, and the 27 other labor men who were found guilty at Indianapolis in connection with dynamiting plots was set by the United States circuit court of appeals for Oct. 28, 29 and 30.

Rebecca Moore, nee, aged 102, died at McAlester, Okla. Relatives said she experienced but little illness throughout her life. She retained all her faculties until the time of her death.

Gen. Porfirio Diaz, ex-president of Mexico, is still at Biarritz, France. It is said he will probably return to Mexico toward the end of the month. Recently he was summoned home by the Mexican war department for service in the army.

EVENTS BOILED DOWN

DOMESTIC AND FOREIGN HAPPENINGS SERVED UP IN ATTRACTIVE STYLE.

NOTHING GOOD GOT AWAY

Everything Important That Could Be Confined to a Small Space is Here Found.

Hans Schmidt, erstwhile priest and confessed slayer of Anna Amuller, whose body he dismembered and threw into the Hudson river, has been indicted for murder in the first degree, at New York.

Reports reached Nome Alaska, that Solomon, a mining camp, 40 miles east of there, was destroyed by the storm which damaged this city. Conditions in Nome are improving.

It is expected that nearly 3,000 delegates, from every state in the union, will gather in Philadelphia Monday to attend the first annual convention of the National Fire Prevention association under the auspices of the Philadelphia Fire Prevention commission.

Yuan Shi Kai was Friday inducted into office as first president of the Chinese republic. The ceremony of inauguration was surrounded with Eastern brilliancy, attended by throngs of distinguished Chinese and foreign officials, diplomats and military officers.

Adolphus Busch, of St. Louis, died at Langenschwalbach, Germany, Friday. He passed away peacefully, his wife and August, his son, being at his side. Adolphus Busch was born in Mayence-on-the-Rhine, Germany, July 10, 1842.

Speaker Clark returned from Wheeling, W. Va., to Washington Tuesday by a severe bumping in a sleeping car in the Pittsburgh railroad yards. Though he was not seriously injured, the speaker had a narrow escape when an engine crashed into his car.

Galveston county commissioners will advertise at once for bids for constructing a chain of highways throughout Galveston county. Bonds to the amount of \$250,000 have been voted, and \$200,000 of this amount will be used in building shell roads, while \$50,000 will be set aside for a maintenance fund.

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PANTING THIEF IS MADE PANTLESS

Anchored by a Bulldog's Teeth and Near Capture, Burglar Sheds His Trousers.

Chicago.—A massive jawed, never-forgo bulldog named Phyllis, a burglar in a pair of ripless trousers and Walter Kelly, wielding a shillalah of huge proportions, staged a fetching seriocomic at 218 North Leavitt street the other day. As a grand finale, the burglar panting and pantsless, leaped over a back fence singing a dirge: "Where are the pants of yesterday?"

Kelly lives alone in rooms at the rear of a delicatessen store. He was aroused from a nap by a noise and saw a tall, burly man rifling a dresser. Unafraid, Kelly seized his trusty shillalah and grasped the burglar by the back of his coat. The intruder proved too strong for Kelly and broke away, but not before he had received a sounding rap on the back with the

club that sent him sprawling. He jumped up and dashed through the backyard.

Then Phyllis got on the job. Rushing from her kennel, to which she was chained, she seized the opportune moment and also the seat of the burglar's trousers. Dog was anchored to kennel, trousers anchored to dog and burglar was anchored to trousers—rippers trousers. Big irate man, with big stick, was stumbling nearer, yelling vengeance. Struggle as he might the burglar could not free himself from the steel-trap grip of Phyllis, and she wouldn't let go, no, not even if it thundered.

It was no time to think of modesty. Unfastening and slipping out of his ripless trousers and jumping over the fence the thief escaped. After several minutes Kelly coaxed Phyllis to let him have the trousers, which are in the possession of the police as a clue to the pantless burglar.

Conte Machi Di Cellere has been appointed Italian ambassador to Washington to replace Marchese Casati. Conte Machi, who has been recalled at his own request.

For the first time in the history of the national feeders and breeders show at Fort Worth, Jersey cattle will be given recognition in the exhibition. It is expected that prize Jerseys from all parts of the country will be exhibited at this show in November.

President Wilson has selected Dr. Arthur Yager, president emeritus of Georgetown college, Georgetown, Ky., for governor of Porto Rico.

A heavy wind-storm which struck Duncan, Okla., has caused much damage to property, the greatest loss being at the fair grounds, where many stables were torn down. Rain and hail came with the wind. The damage there was so great it made necessary postponement of the Bryar county fair until Nov. 12, 13 and 14.

It was recently announced by the colonization agent of the Santa Fe railroad that 70,000 acres of cut-over lands in East Texas will be opened for colonization by that road. It is also planned to establish several demonstration farms on the property with experts in charge.

Receipts at the Dallas postoffice for September amounted to \$86,318.91. A year before the total was \$72,174.88. The increase was \$14,143.13, or about 20 per cent.

Reports from Sabinas and Barroteron indicate that the constitutionalist army had met defeat and was in full retreat toward the border with 1,600 federalists hanging on its flanks. Americans, who were last week ordered to leave the disturbed district, arrived from the front and asserted that the great militia properties at Menor, Aguajita, Rosita, and, possibly, Esperanza, as well as the town of Barroteron, have been destroyed to prevent their capture by the invading federalists.

CONTROL OF BIG CORPORATIONS.

Ex-President Roosevelt Outlines Policy of a Square Deal.

Theodore Roosevelt in a recent article appearing in the "Outlook," on "The Living Wage and the Living Rate," presents in a very forcible manner, both sides of the railroad question. We have long heard many of our public officials discuss only one side—that of the people—and it will be news to many who have been following the public discussions, to learn that there are really two sides to the question.

The views of Mr. Roosevelt, who has been considered a radical in railroad legislation, are especially interesting and instructive to Texas at this time when our transportation affairs are in an inflammatory condition. The ex-president said in part:

"It must be a cardinal principle in dealing with honestly-built and wisely-managed railways that the investor, the shareholder, is just as much entitled to protection as is the wage worker, the shipper or the representative of the general public. Unless the investor finds that he is to get a fair return on his money, he will not invest, and in such case not only will no new railways be built, but existing railways will not be able to repair the waste, the wear and tear to which they are subject, and will not be able to make needed improvements. All governmental action, whether by the legislature or the executive, should be conditioned upon keeping in view this fact.

money—that is unless business is prosperous—there will be no money to give in proper wages to the wage worker, there will be no money with which to provide for protection and to insure him against loss and damage and no money wherewith to tender proper service to the customers and to the public as a whole.

"It is just as much the duty of the Commission to permit rates to be raised when the rate is justifiable as to require them to be lowered if the lowering is justifiable.

"The control should not be left to the corporation; it should merely be hostile to any misconduct on the part of the corporation, and it should protect the corporation against misconduct aimed at it solely as it protects others from misconduct committed by it."

TEXAS SUGAR INDUSTRY

Built Up by Home Patronage State Sands Second in Production.

Sugar and related products are obtained from three widely different classes of plants, to-wit: cane, sorghum and maple trees. In Texas cane is the only article producing sugar in commercial quantities. The soil and climate of the coast country from the Mississippi to the Rio Grande are especially adapted to the propagation of sugar cane.

We have 40,000 acres in cane, producing 400,000 tons, valued at \$1,000,000 per ton, and the average production is ten tons per acre. The sugar cane crop for 1912 approximated \$1,000,000 in value. The entire production is manufactured in Texas.

We ship into the state from Porto Rico for refining at our mills 10,000,000 pounds of raw sugar per annum and approximately 50,000,000 pounds from Cuba. We manufacture per annum in Texas 250,000 barrels of sugar and 20,000,000 of syrup. One-half of the total production is compelled to seek a market outside the State, although we consume four times more sugar than we produce. The investment in this industry approximates \$2,000,000 and gives employment to 2,000 people. The annual output has a factory value of \$3,000,000. Texas ranks second with the states in the Union in production of sugar cane, Louisiana leading with almost ten times the acreage of Texas. In the United States 6,240,000 tons of sugar cane were produced in 1909, according to the federal census reports. The West Indian Islands furnish the bulk of the raw sugar manufactured in the United States.

The best sugar producing states are on the Canadian border and the Pacific Coast. The production in the United States in 1909 was 3,200,000 tons.

The average consumption of sugar per capita in the United States is 87 pounds per annum. A little more than one-half the sugar consumed for household purposes; the remainder is used in the manufacturing establishments chiefly in the preparation of articles utilized for food and drink.

Fuerta or "Feterita"

Fuerta, commonly called "Feterita," is said to have been brought from Soudan to the United States only a few years ago. The plant is of the sorghum family, and grows best in a semi-arid region. The stalk and seed resemble white milo maize, only the grains are whiter, larger and softer than maize. The husk or shuck which surrounds the grain is black; and when the grain is fully developed, these husks are hardly visible. Unlike milo maize, the stalk of Fuerta, when ripe, instead being pithy and dry, is full of sweet juice, like sorghum, and no doubt would make a fine quality of syrup.
 Last Spring, through the United States Department of Agriculture, the writer obtained a few of these seeds. He gave a part of them to Mr. Jno. B. Ayres, who planted them on his farm two miles west of town. Last week, Mr. Ayres reported that he had harvested a surprising crop of most beautiful heads of the new grain, which he intends to plant next year. He says he cut the stalks which were full of juice, for forage, and that the stubbles have put forth new shoots which will produce another bumper crop of feed.
 Mr. Ayres is of the opinion that Fuerta is far superior to maize, for the reason that the grain is larger and softer, and the heads greater in number, while the stalk will make a most valuable forage.
 The writer planted a few rows in his garden, along with some maize, sorghum and Jerusalem corn, all of which received the same cultivation. During the dry, hot weather of June and July, the sorghum and maize all died. While the Jerusalem corn lived, it was badly damaged by the drouth. But the Fuerta went right on growing and soon developed heads, which the sparrows promptly ate as fast as the grains ripened, and we saved only a few heads by tying screen wire bags over them. These stalks are still flourishing and making heads. One stalk has borne as many as 27 heads, and the stems are still sweet.
 This grain appears to be earlier than maize and will withstand the dry weather much better. Our observation is that Fuerta should be planted thin on the ground. It should have about the same distance as corn, and about the same cultivation, except that the cultivation should be shallow.
 We advise all our farmer friends to plant some of it next year.

OUR JOBBING INTERESTS

Texans Consume \$300,000,000 Dry Goods Annually.

The Jobber, Salesman of Industry and Forerunner of Factories.

We can never hope to become a manufacturing country or to acquire power in commerce and trade until we first build up our wholesale and jobbing interests. The jobber is the salesman of industry, the servant of the factory, the standard-bearer of prosperity and the authorized medium of co-operation between the producer and the consumer in economic distribution of merchandise and in empire building.

The people of Texas consume annually approximately \$300,000,000 worth of dry goods and notions, and only a small fraction of the purchases are made through Texas jobbers and manufacturers. No country can advance far in industrial progress until it patronizes home institutions; no community can become powerful in trade and remain indifferent to its local industries. Patronizing home industries is as essential to our commercial success as patriotism is necessary in government, and those who do not do so fail to discharge a debt inherited from civilization and lose an opportunity of making a living contribution to the progress of the country.

The patronizing of our jobbing houses would call for an immediate increase in investments in that industry of approximately \$50,000,000, five direct employment to 100,000 people, bring within our borders ten thousand factories affording employment to a half million people, provide a home market for our farm products, give us control of our own business affairs, make us independent, instead of dependent upon our foreign neighbors and multiply the opportunities of every citizen.

There is not a town, village or hamlet in this State that would not become the logical location for one or more of these factories, and yet his natural heritage is withheld from them through lack of co-operation among the buying interests of Texas.

WITHIN THE LAW

Whether the Attorney General in filing the so-called anti-trust suits is within the law has no bearing upon the immediate effects accompanying such litigation. The fact stands out boldly that corporate investments in Texas have been thrown in the hands of a receiver without a hearing and a railroad is now being tried for high crime for alleged minor offenses. Perhaps the statutes may justify and duty demand such action, but in the chamber court of industry, a verdict must be rendered that the law of common sense has been violated.

Leaving the statutes for the interpretation of lawyers and eliminating from the discussion the personality of all public officials past or present, there is no escaping the power of men in the affairs of government. Standing at the source of every movement, good or evil, in government is a man, and upon the wisdom and experience of these who wear the mantle of authority depends our first destiny. Our progress, and indeed our safety, is in the hands of those who guide the ship of state. It is upon their knowledge of the high seas of commerce, their experience in seamanship, that we must depend to keep us off the reefs of destruction and in the roadstead of success. It is through our leaders that we must knock at the door of opportunity to enter the gate to the cemetery of despair.

There is no more noble purpose in life than a desire to be useful and no one for a moment questions the motive of our public officials, but the pathway of civilization is strewn with the wreckage of good intentions and pinned under its timbers are the people whose leaders have displayed more courage than wisdom.

Those who have torrents of energy to turn loose in the name of the state should realize that folly has its limits as well as its rights and that the public can reasonably expect those whom it honors to do something more than meddle with fate and scuffle with progress.

As a rule responsibility steadies rather than intoxicates public officials, but the surest way to promote our prosperity is to elect to office men seasoned in business affairs and who have had experience in actual transactions. Government is a big business institution and only those who possess masterful qualities can properly manage it.

COOKIES IN DEMAND

POSSIBLY ON ACCOUNT OF WAY THEY WERE MADE.

At Least There May Be Ideas in Recipe This Young Person Followed—Cordially Indorsed by Brother Frank.

The Young Person was about to bake cookies. Brother Frank watched her up to the molasses jug. "Let me," he said, "that's pretty heavy." Then, as he watched the thick brown syrup drip slowly into the cup—"I like lasses." The young person laughed appreciatively. "I know you do—Sally and Molly and Susie and my cookies—all sorts of lasses! There!" her voice rising to a little shriek. "You'll spill it! Thanks!" with relief as Frank got the big jug safe to the table again she replied, rolling the cold dough "Now, go read Chapter II in your book there, and by that time I may have a cookie for you—if you don't read too fast." So Frank left her to her devices, and she went quickly about her task. While the cup of molasses was reaching the boiling point in its granite pan on the stove, she mixed in the big bowl two cups of whole wheat flour, one of rolled oats, and one of white flour, a teaspoon powdered of cloves—no ginger—for Frank did not like ginger. To the molasses she added four level tablespoons of shortening, quarter of a cup of sugar, and quarter of a cup of milk. She mixed this with the dry ingredients, and put it on the ice to chill while she mixed her cake, to take advantage of the oven at its hottest. By the time her cake was out of the oven Frank had wandered back here, boy fashion. "Aren't those cookies ready yet?" "No, but they will be soon now," she replied, rolling the cold dough very thin, cutting it deftly with the round top of a cocoa tin and laying the trim circles on a wire cake tray. Into the oven it went, and Frank soon sniffed while she still rolled and cut. "They must be done, Sir; that's a piping oven."

"Just in a minute," and as the second tray was filled it went in, and the first came out, brown and crisp and tender. "Yum-yum!" said Frank, and went off with both hands and his mouth full, and perilously near to burning. The Young Person busily rolled and cut, commencing wisely with herself. "Very wholesome, as good as medicine, and just what Frank needs for his digestion. Luckily it's a good big recipe, for add Hal's capacity to Frank's, allow a half for father, and you need quite a lot of cookies."

Green Tomato Pickles. One gallon sliced tomatoes, the greener the better; salt them in layers, and let them stand over night; in the morning drain them well; slice four large onions; put a layer of tomatoes in the vessel, then a few slices of onion; proceed in this manner until they are all put in; cut six green peppers very fine and spread over the top; take one tablespoonful black pepper, one tablespoonful allspice, two tablespoonfuls cloves, three tablespoonfuls mustard; put in a bag and boil in the vinegar till the strength is extracted, then put the bag on the top of the pickles, pour on boiling vinegar enough to cover them. Cover the vessel tightly and let it stand three weeks without opening.

Stew From Cold Meat. This dish provides a good way of using up the remnants of a roast, either of beef or mutton. The meat should be freed from fat, gristle and bones, cut into small pieces, slightly salted, and put into a kettle with water enough to nearly cover it. It should simmer until almost ready to break in pieces, when onions and new potatoes, pared and quartered, should be added. A little soup stock may also be added if available. Cook until the potatoes are done, then thicken the liquor or gravy with flour. The stew may be attractively served on slices of crisp toast.

Meat and Pastry Rolls. Small quantities of cold ham, chicken or other meat may be utilized for this. The meat should be chopped fine, well seasoned, mixed with enough savory fat or butter to make it "shape," and formed into rolls about the size of a finger. A short dough (made, say, of a pint of flour, two tablespoonfuls of lard, one teaspoonful of baking powder, salt and milk enough to mix) should be rolled thin, cut into strips and folded over the meat rolls, care being taken to keep the shape regular. The rolls should be baked in a quick oven until they are a delicate brown color and served hot.

Cucumber Salad. A most attractive way to serve cucumbers for a salad course, or as an accompaniment of a fish course, is to pare and cut each in half, taking the round end off so that the piece will stand upright. Cut out the inside and mix it with a salad dressing and replace it in the tiny cubes. Stand each on a crisp leaf of lettuce and chill thoroughly before sending to the table. In their season, finely chopped "chives" may be added.

Cheese and Nasturtium Sandwiches. These are quite a change, as well as being economical and wholesome. Spread your bread thickly with fresh cream cheese, and between the two slices put a layer of small young nasturtium leaves. These leaves have a taste which is not unlike mustard, you know, and they go excellently with the slightly sour flavor of the cheese.

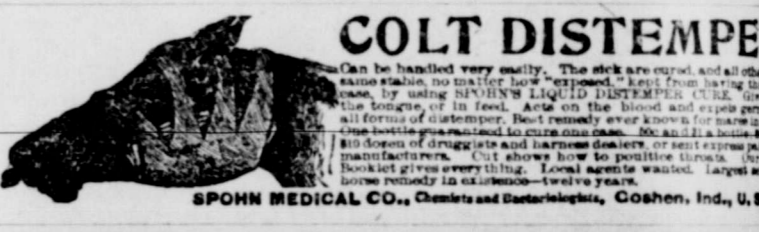

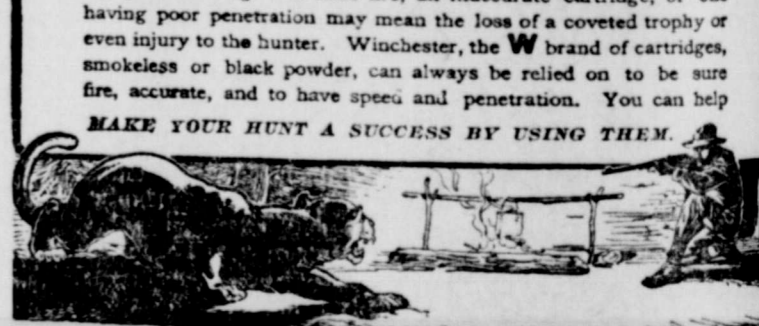
