A light voter turnout is expected next Tuesday, November 2, when 16 proposed amendments to the state constitution will be presented to the

The propositions include four proposals concerning general obligation or revenue bonds for projects; three issues concerning county surveyors; changes in the amount of time to redeem real property sold at a tax sale, a proposal for a state exemption on some new property tax burdens for

The issue drawing the most attention is Amendment 4, which would prohibit a personal income tax without approval of the voters, and dedicate funds from an income tax to education and reduction of local property

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

Farwell stormed back with scores by Haseloff and Brock Anderson to snatch the victory.


