**MOST PEOPLE** go to a livestock show to see the stock, but several that we know of will be going to the Farmer County Junior Livestock Show in Friona this weekend just to be able to view the show in comfort for a change.

For the first time in the history of the show, the county livestock show will be held completely indoors, in the new county showbarn.

The showbarn is located north of Highway 60 and just off Highway 214, on the north side of the lake, for those who have not seen the structure under construction.

It is figured that more buyers will attend the auction sale in person this year, rather than sending their representatives. In the past, you could always count on a good blast of Arctic air on Saturday morning of the show weekend.

The only thing that could mess up the inaugural of the new facility would be a snow, or other moisture, since the parking area has not been surfaced.

That last statement sounds almost sacrilegious, as dry as it has been this winter.

**YOU HEAR A LOT** about the high cost of living, and we're not going to deny that prices are high. Evidently, however, the average American still has a much better standard of living than his counterpart in other parts of the world.

The National Federation of Independent Business released a chart recently which showed the approximate worktime required to buy selected commodities at state-fixed prices in Moscow, and at retail stores in New York City, on the same date in 1970.

**THE CHART** showed that Russia outproduced the U.S. in wheat, potatoes and sugar, but that the U.S. led in rice, corn, meat and cotton.

Figures, which were computed in tons were as follows, with the U.S. totals first: Wheat 43,766-88,093; Rice 4,565-1,220; Corn 128,178-13,177; Potatoes 15,601-101,168; Meat 18,052-11,684; Sugar 5,480-11,110; Cotton 2,403-2,149.

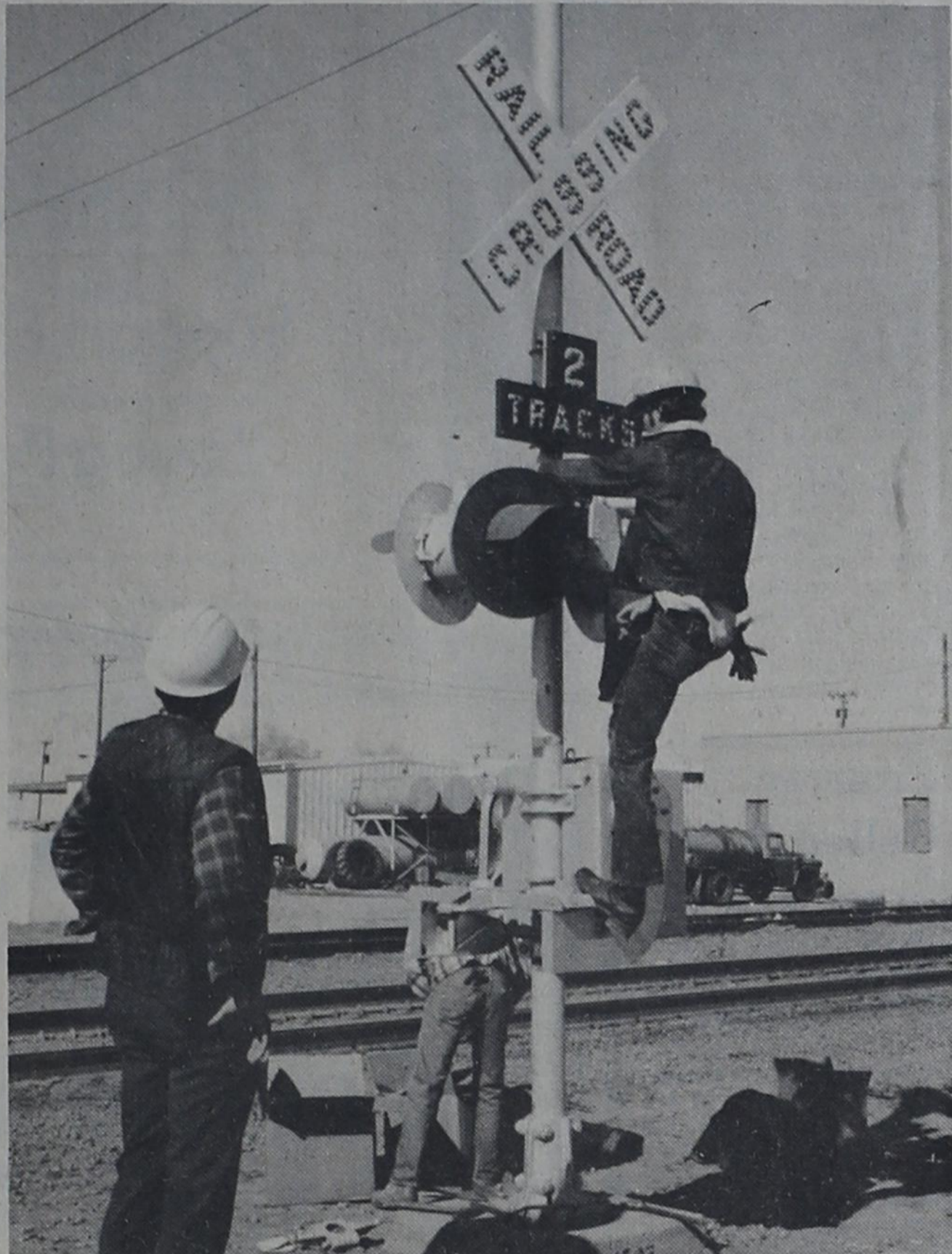
The value of total goods produced per person amounted to \$4,756 in the U.S., to \$2,000 in the USSR.

**OTHER FIGURES** showed that the U.S. had 115,222,000 telephones in use, to only 12,000,000 in Russia. Our country had 1,758 daily newspapers, to only 628 in Russia. Americans read 62,060,000 newspapers every day, to 26,911,000 in the Soviet Union.

One surprising statistic revealed that Russia has more hospitals, doctors and hospital beds. The U.S. leads in the number of dentists, by 11,000.

In housing, the average number of rooms per dwelling was 4.7 in the U.S., to 3.3 in the USSR, and the average number of people per room was almost double in Russia.

So we still don't live in a bad country, even if it has a few faults!



**THIRD STREET GATES**...Preliminary work on railroad crossing gates on Third Street began Monday by a Santa Fe Railway Co. signal installation crew. C.O. McMillian, foreman of the crew, said the installation should be completed in two weeks barring any difficulties. Gates at the east Main crossing were put into operation in May of

The new safety device at the Third Street crossing will be the end result of efforts over a period of years to obtain added protection at the dangerous intersection where several persons have been killed. The gates at both intersections are controlled by a new-type electronic system, McMillian said.

Farwell, Springlake-Earth, Dimmitt, Sudan, Hart and Lazbuddie.

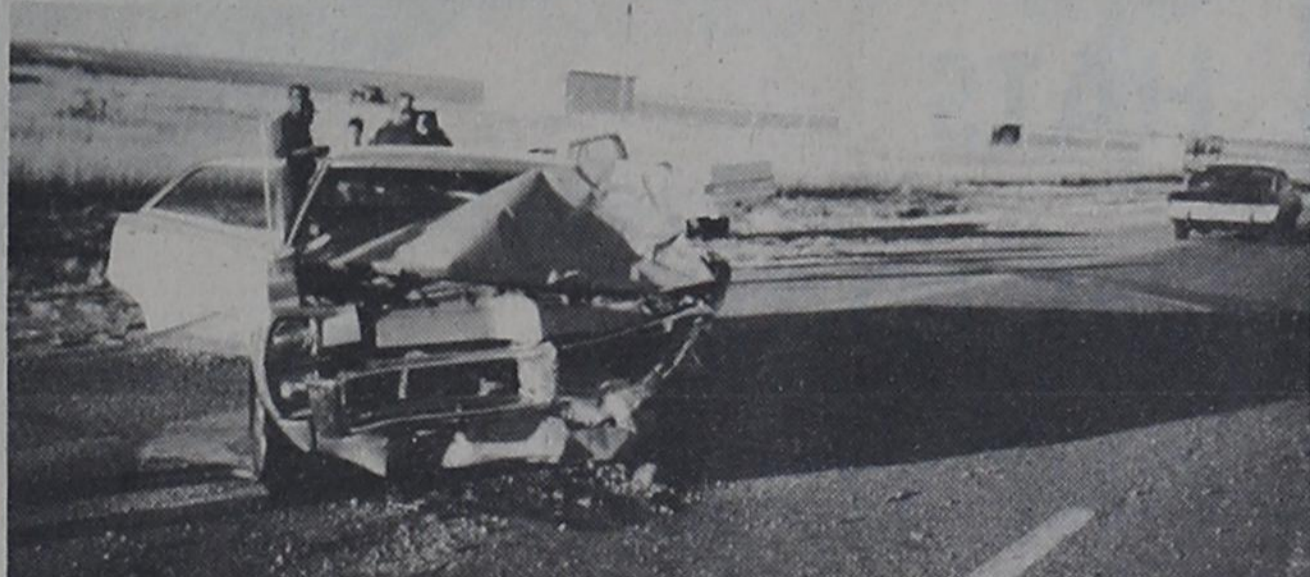
The Bovina Little Dribblers will get underway next week with the first game set for Tuesday night. Two games are on tap that night, one at 7 p.m. and the other at 8.

Judging in the annual Bovina FFA-4-H Livestock Show begins at 7 p.m. today [Wednesday] in the agriculture barn west of Eighth Street.

Approximately 50 animals will go through the arena, according to Monroe Gates, vocational agriculture teacher and FFA advisor here.

## School Slates Holiday Friday

Students in Bovina Schools will receive a "bonus" holiday Friday, according to Superintendent L.F. Jacobs.

Friday has been set aside as a teacher work day, said Jacobs. Teachers will be grading six weeks tests, which are being given this week, and posting grades.

Classes will resume at regular time Monday, he said. Report cards for the fourth six weeks will be issued Wednesday or Thursday of next week.

Scotty Windham, vocational agriculture teacher at Lazbuddie High School, will judge the local show.

Trophies, ribbons and cash prizes totaling over \$300 will be awarded exhibitors in the show.

The event, under direction of Gates, is sponsored annually by Bovina Lions Club and Bovina Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture.

Awards will be presented by FFA Sweetheart and Plowgirl.

Terri Willard and Cathy Trimble, respectively.

Ribbons and cash prizes will be awarded the first six places in each class. Trophies will be awarded the grand and reserve champions, the breed champions in each division and the champion gilt.

Five classes of barrows, one class of gilts and three classes each of lambs and steers will make up the show.

Breeds in the barrow class include Duroc, Hampshire, Poland, Chester Whites and

Cross Breeds. Classifications in the steer show will be Hereford, Angus and Cross Breeds. Classes of lambs include Hampshires, Cross Breeds and Dorset-Suffolk.

Showmanship trophies will be awarded in the steer, lamb and barrow division.

Some 20 of the 50 exhibits in the local show will be 4-H animals. Most of the entries in the local show are expected to be entered in the county show, Gates says.

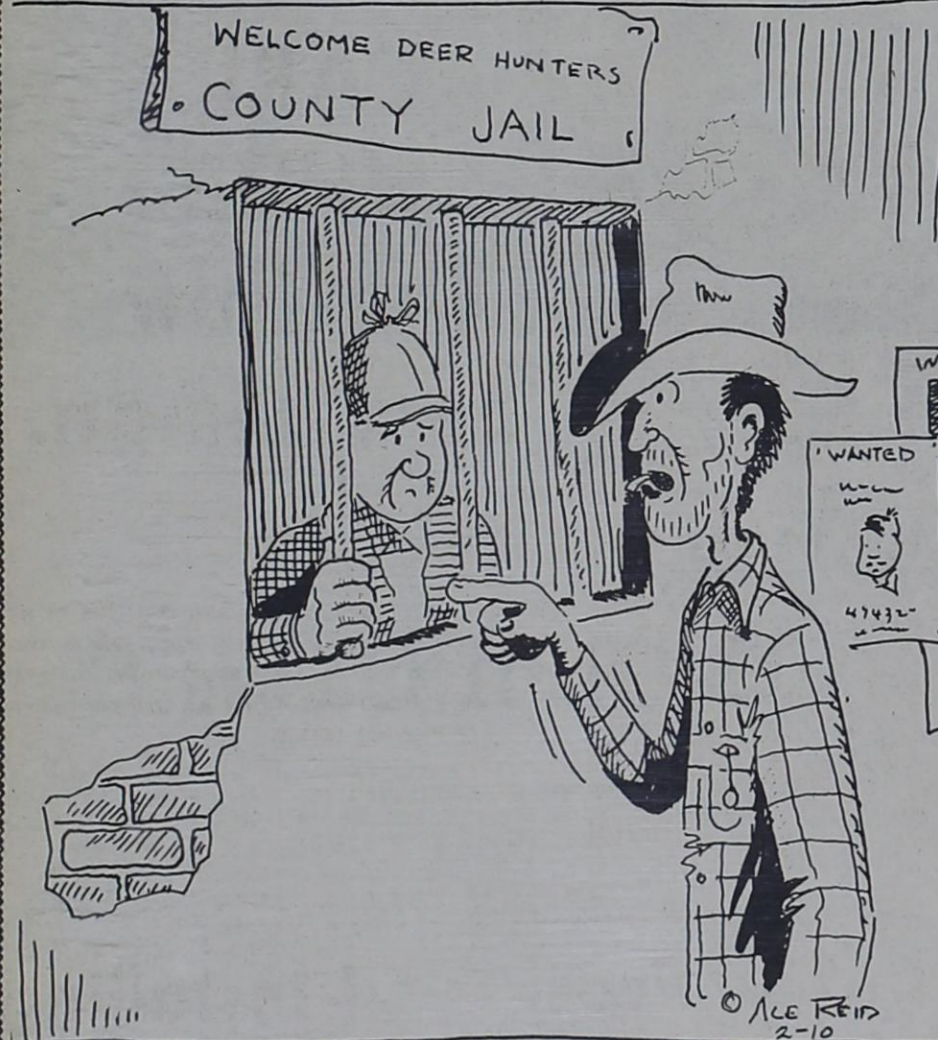
Members of the department urge residents of the community to be extremely cautious when burning trash because of the abnormally dry conditions.

**Sickle Cell Test Set In Amarillo**

Plans for an area-wide sickle cell anemia drive for youth and adults have been announced. The four-day program is scheduled to begin Wednesday night, February 20 at the Hilltop Service Center, 1338 N.W. 18th, Amarillo.

The project is to be sponsored by the Panhandle Planned Parenthood Association, 604 West 8th and the North Branch Young Men's Christian Association, 1330 N.W. 18th.

Educational Seminars are scheduled for Wednesday, February 20 at 6:30 p.m. for youth up to 18 years, and Thursday, February 21 at 7:30 p.m. for all adults 18 years and older.

Individuals who attend the seminar will be encouraged to pre-register for the sickle cell testing to determine if he/she carries the trait.

The testing will be Monday, February 25 and Friday, March 1 from 12 noon to 8 p.m. The seminars and testing dates will be at the Hilltop Service Center.

Norma White, District Chairman for March of Dimes; Claudia Stuart, Health Educator for Planned Parenthood; and Don Brown, Community Service Director for the Branch Y.M.C.A. will present the program.

Nurses, lab technicians, and counselors will be on hand during the testing, said Claudia Stuart. The sickle cell anemia drive is headed by Claudia Stuart, Health Education of Planned Parenthood, Earl Bledsoe, Executive Director of the branch Y.M.C.A. and the Program Staff of the Y.M.C.A.

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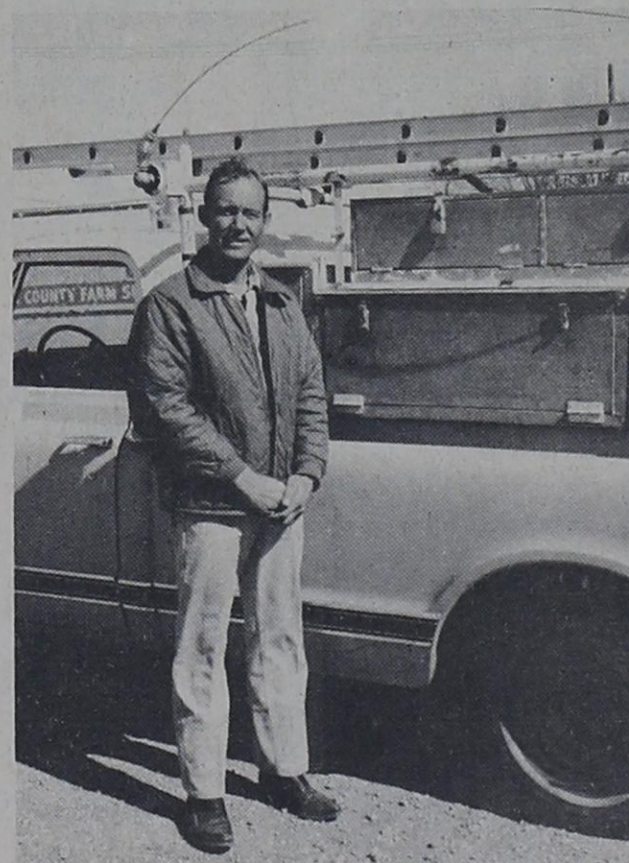

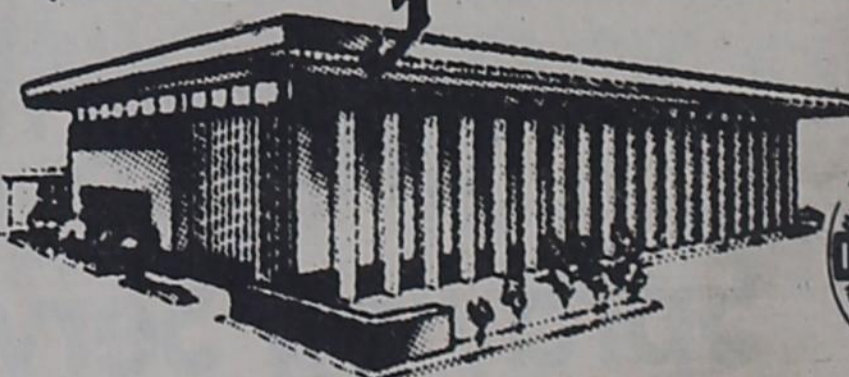

**IN '73 Parmer Ranks 1st In Barley**  
 Agriculture Commissioner John C. White has announced that Parmer County was the state's leading county in barley production in 1973. Barley production in the county drastically increased from 34,600 bushels in 1972 to a record 478,500 bushels in 1973. This was an increase of 443,900 bushels. Farmers in Parmer County harvested 6,400 acres of barley and averaged 74.8 bushels per acre. In 1972 the average yield per acre was 43.3 bushels. Commissioner White said that the 1973 barley crop established a record yield of 39.0 bushels per acre. "Barley is a significant crop, and we are proud that Texas ranks in the top twenty barley producing states," White said. In 1973 Texas produced 3,510,000 bushels of barley compared to a total production of 1,980,000 bushels in 1972. Parmer County also ranked in the top ten counties in the production of winter wheat. The total yield was 3,564,000 bushels with an average of 40.8 bushels per acre. Texas ranked sixth in total wheat production.

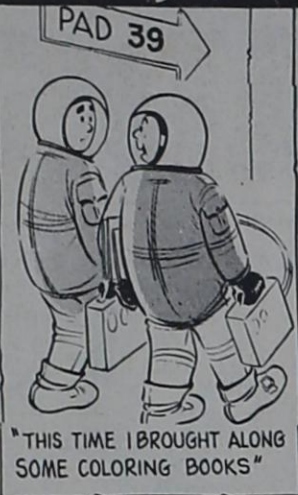

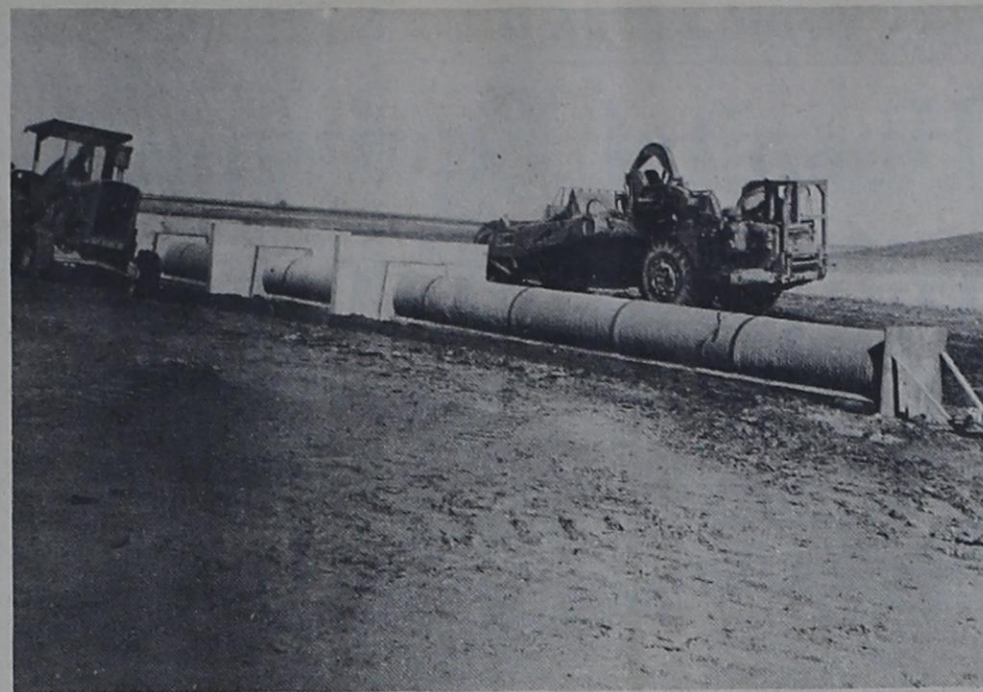

**Youths Enter Houston Show**

Several students from your area will be entering livestock in the judging contests at the 1974 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo.

Entries in the 1974 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo are expected to exceed 19,000 in number proving it is really the largest livestock show in the world. 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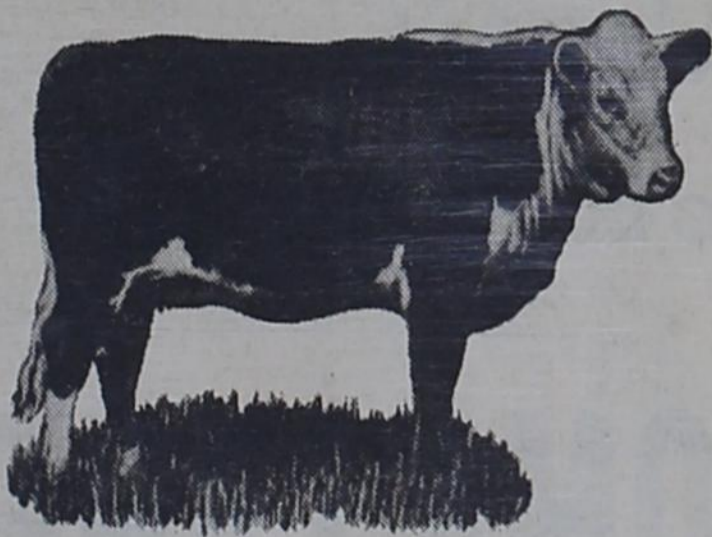

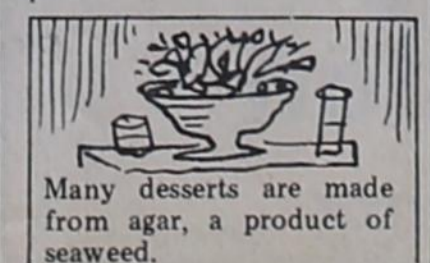

# Hospital Equipment Gift Of Hi-Pro Feeds

A local firm's healthy sales of animal health products recently resulted in a healthy grant of nearly \$3,000 worth of equipment that will assure better health care at Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona.

The company, Hi-Pro Feeds, Inc., a division of Friona Industries, presented equipment that makes it possible for the hospital to perform certain blood chemistry analysis on its own premises for the first time. It also has ordered a "memory loop" that will improve the hospital's cardiac care facility.

The award came "just in time to solve a dilemma for us," said Dr. Paul Spring, member of the hospital's staff and board of directors, during presentation ceremonies at a board meeting Tuesday night.

He explained that the hospital has until now been able to get blood analyzed at a commercial laboratory in nearby Hereford which has at least temporarily discontinued the service.

### SAVES TIME

"Until Hi-Pro gave us this equipment," he continued, "we were forced to send blood samples to Amarillo or Dallas in the absence of a nearby source. In a critical situation, this could take too much time. We conceivably could lose a patient in the meantime."

Eldon Rape, manager of Hi-Pro's animal health department, said Hi-Pro won a total of more than \$8,500 in awards for non-profit service organizations of its choice in a unique marketing promotion sponsored by Dow Chemical U.S.A. by significantly increasing its 1973 sales of Dow animal health products.

"We tried to divide this up for presentation in the communities which contributed most directly to our animal health product sales increases by buying the Dow products from our branches," Rape said.

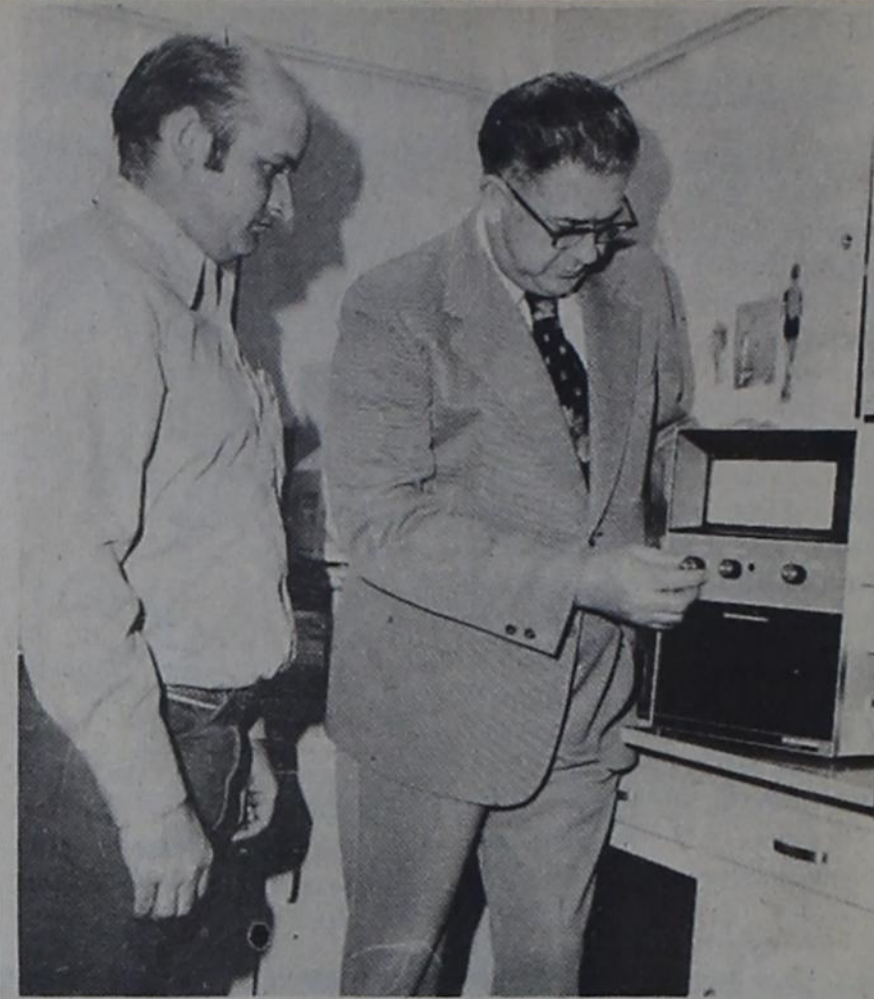
"We figured about \$3,000 of the total should go to the Friona area and we selected the hospital because it is a community facility operating to serve everybody. In a sense, this lets everyone share in our award."

The flame photometer given to the hospital enables the hospital's medical technician to analyze blood samples for levels of sodium, potassium, calcium and lithium, Dr. Spring said, adding that these are among the most critical of blood tests required when a blood chemistry imbalance is detected or suspected.

The "memory loop" for the cardiac care facility is an electronic device which permits a nurse to "replay" and capture on tape for a physician's examination any erratic behavior she may note while monitoring a screen that constantly displays electrocardiogram data for heart patients in intensive care. "Our present equipment can produce a constant hard-copy record," Dr. Spring said, "but this means a doctor must examine hours and hours of tape to recover significant portions. This new device should save time and reduce the possibility that important data will be overlooked."

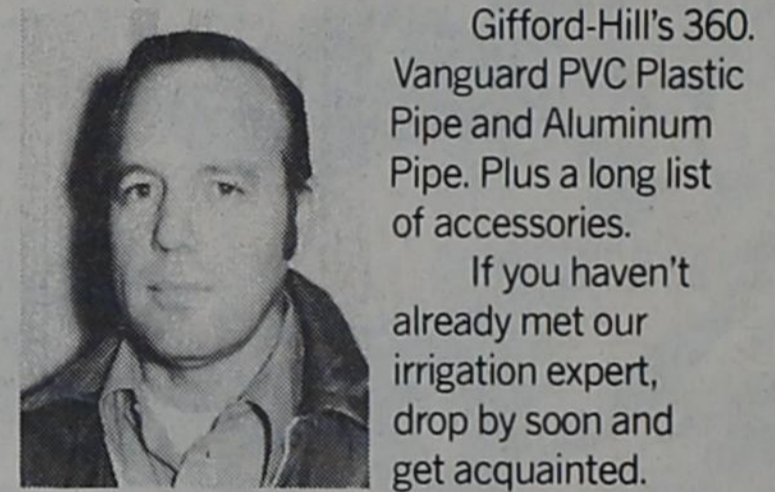

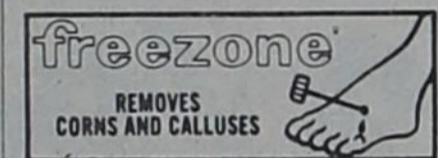

The Mustangs trailed throughout the game-7-12, 19-27 and 31-40.



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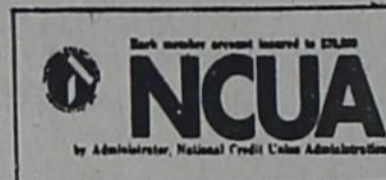
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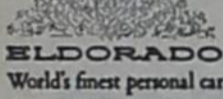
