Accident Occurred in St. Lawrence River-Vessel Goes Down in 14 Minutes After Crash. Rimouski, Quebec .- Sinking in 96 reaches of the St. Lawrence river

early Friday, the Canadian Pacific sengers and crew. Of the 1,387 persons on board the liner only 433 are the probable death list 954.

Looming up through the river mists, was the day of the initial event. as the Empress of Ireland was lying to, waiting for the fog to lift or day to break. the Danish collier Storstad crashed bow-on into the side of the big Canadian liner, striking her about midway of her length and ripping her side open clear to the stern.

though the liner was heading for the sea and the collier coming in from it. the disaster was not one of the ocean but of the river. Unlike the Titanic's victims, the Empress of Ireland's lost their lives within sight of the shorein land-locked waters.


Immediately the ship's crew recov ered from the shock of the collision, and it was seen that the liner had received a vital blow, a wireless "S. O. S." call was sounded.
