DEBTS OF COUNTRIES AT WAR.

Figures Compiled Show an Increase

of \$18,000,000,000.

Washington .- In connection with the \$1,000,000,000 loan being negoti ated by England and France, figures compiled by New York financiers show that the national debt of all countries at war has increased more than \$18,000,000,000, bringing the grand total of what the countries now owe to about \$42,500,000,000. The war is costing England over \$16,000, 000 daily. France is spending \$390, 000,000 per month, Russia \$360,000, 600 and Germany \$500,000,000.

The national indebtedness of the individual allies since beginning of the war is as follows: England \$5, 714,000,000, France \$3,040,500,000, Russia \$2,620,500,000, Italy \$400,000,000 Japan \$50,000,000; grand total for the allies \$11,800,000,000. 


