Entry blanks may be brought by the Blade office on Third Street or mailed. Entries that are mailed must bear a postmark of Friday, and must be received by the Blade by Monday to count for the week's prizes.

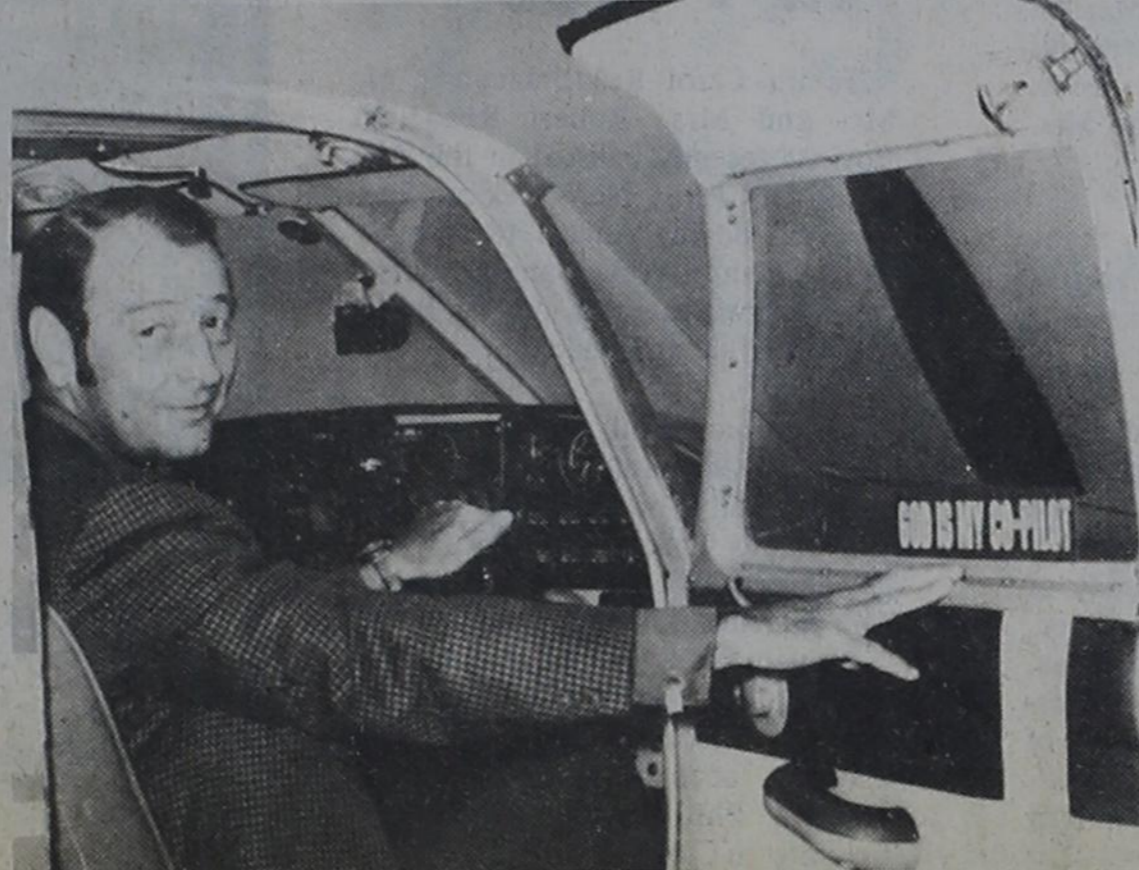
Winner of the 1979 contest was David George, who had a total score of 124. It was his first time to be a regular entrant in the contest.

Tamra Read Enlists In Air Force

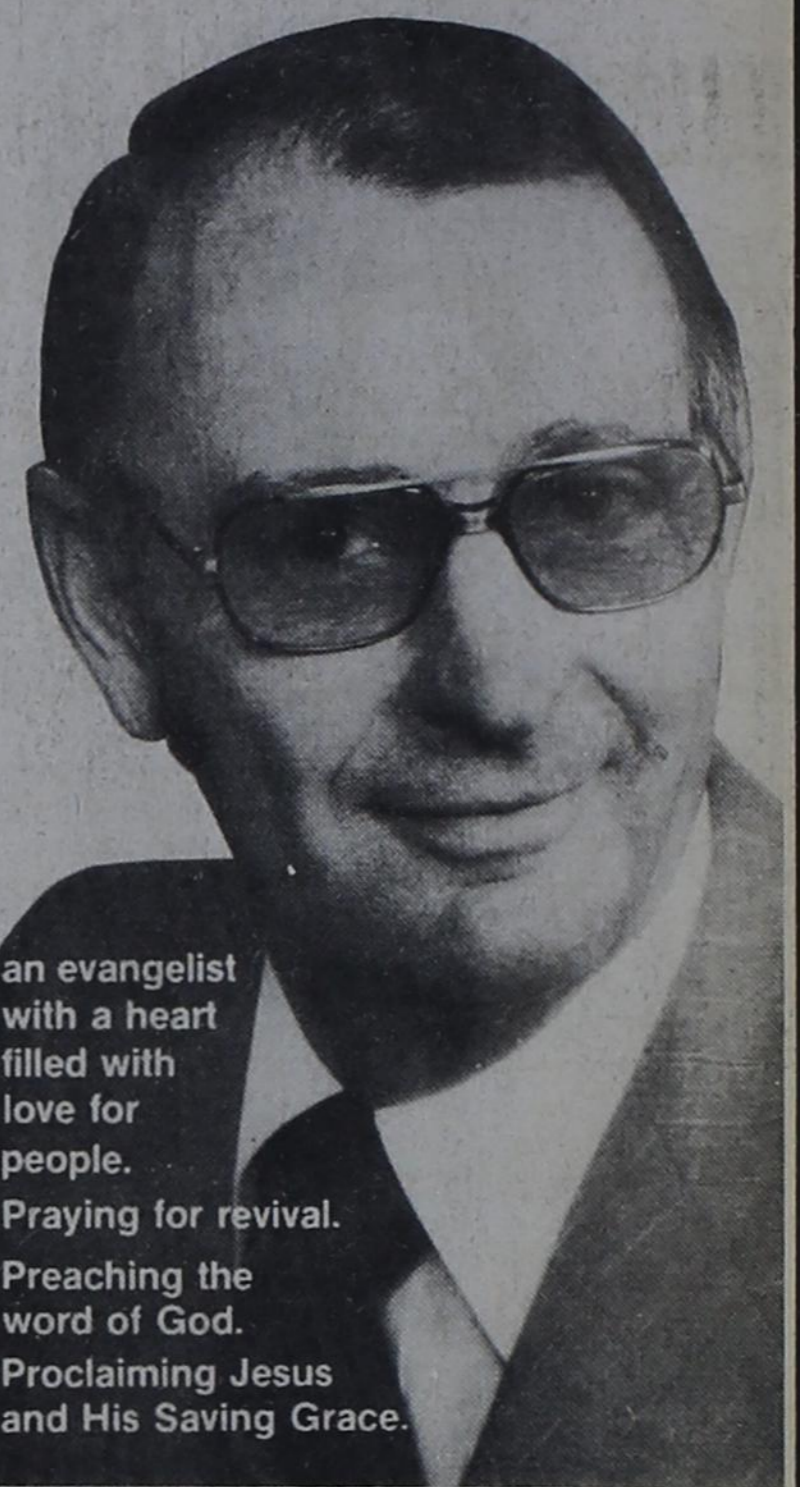

1 lb. ground beef
1 cup drained whole-kernel corn
¼ cup finely chopped green pepper
¼ cup finely chopped onions
½ cup cornmeal
½ teaspoon oregano
½ teaspoon chili powder
½ teaspoon salt
½ teaspoon pepper
1 (8 oz.) can tomato sauce
pie crust (recipe below)
1 egg
¼ cup milk
½ teaspoon salt
½ teaspoon dry mustard
½ teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
1½ cups shredded cheddar cheese
4 stuffed olives sliced.

Fry bacon until crisp; break into large pieces. Chill ¼ cup drippings until firm and reserve for pie crust mixture. Brown ground beef in large skillet; drain. Stir in corn, green pepper, onion, cornmeal, oregano, chili powder, salt, pepper, and tomato sauce. Prepare pie crust. Place mixture in pastry lined pan. Bake at 425 degrees for 25 minutes. Combine egg, milk, salt, mustard, Worcestershire sauce and cheese. Spread on pie. Top with bacon and olives. Bake 5 minutes or until cheese melts. Let stand 10 minutes before serving. If desired, serve with a tomato sauce. Yield: 6 servings.

PIE CRUST
1 cup flour
2 tablespoons cornmeal
½ cup firm bacon drippings
3 to 4 tablespoons cold water
Combine flour and cornmeal. Cut in bacon drippings until mixture is size of small peas. Add water, stirring with fork until dough holds together. Roll out on floured surface to 1½ inch larger than 9 inch pie pan, fold edges to form a standing rim. Flute edges.

This recipe takes time, but is worth it, I think.

Anyone who has trouble hearing or understanding speech clearly is welcome to have a test using modern electronic equipment to determine if his loss is one which can be helped. Some of the causes of hearing loss will be explained, and diagrams of how the ear works will be shown.

Everyone should have a hearing test at least once a year if there is any trouble at all hearing clearly. Even people now wearing a hearing aid or those who have been told nothing could be done for them should have a hearing test and find out if amplification can help them hear better.

The free hearing tests will be given Wednesday, from 10 a.m. to 12 noon at the Senior Citizen's Building. If you can't get there on Wednesday, call 247-3645 and arrange for an appointment at another time. In-home testing is also available.

FRESH PEAR CAKE

2 cups sugar
3 eggs, well beaten
1½ cups salad oil
3 cups all-purpose flour
1 teaspoon soda
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon vanilla
2 teaspoons ground cinnamon
3 cups thinly sliced pears
Powdered sugar glaze(recipe below)
Combine sugar, eggs and oil; beat well. Combine flour, soda and salt; add to sugar mixture, one cup at a time, mixing well after each addition. Stir in vanilla, cinnamon and pears.
