






The large cash prize was begun for the contest three years ago, changing the format of earlier years when tickets to the Cotton Bowl football game served as the grand prize.

Commenting about the scrimmage with Friona Friday night Topliff said,

The appropriate committees were organized. The club decided to meet the fourth Monday in every month at the Oklahoma Lane Community Center at 7:30 p.m.





Hearing Tests Set For Friona

FRIONA..Electronic hearing tests will be given at the Senior Citizens Building in Friona on Wednesday, September 10, from 10:00 to 12:00. Factory trained Hearing Aid Specialist will be at the Senior Citizens' Building at 15th and Washington Street to perform the Tests.

Anyone who has trouble hearing or understanding speech clearly is welcome to have a test using modern electronic equipment to determine if his loss is one which can be helped. Some of the causes of hearing loss will be explained, and diagrams of how the ear works will be shown.

Everyone should have a hearing test at least once a year if there is any trouble at all hearing clearly. Even people now wearing a hearing aid or those who have been told nothing could be done for them should have a hearing test and find out if amplification can help them hear better.

The free hearing tests will be given Wednesday, from 10 a.m. to 12 noon Claude High School and is also a graduate of West Texas State University with a BBA degree in **Business Education.**

Norma met Earl in 1952 while attending WTSU. Earl was raised at Carey, Texas, in Childress County and is a CPA for Shirley Grain Company in Bovina. Norma shares some of her favorite recipes with Blade readers this month.

FRESH PEAR CAKE

2 cups sugar 3 eggs, well beaten 11/2 cups salad oil 3 cups all-purpose flour 1 teaspoon soda 1 teaspoon salt 1 teaspoon vanilla 2 teaspoons ground cinnamon 3 cups thinly sliced pears Powdered sugar glaze(recipe below) Combine sugar, eggs and oil; beat well. Combine flour, soda and salt; add to sugar mixture, one cup at a time, mixing well after each addition. Stir in vanilla, cinnamon and pears. Spoon batter into well greased 10 inch bundt pan or tube pan. Bake at 350 degrees for one hour. Remove from pan and allow to cool. Top with powdered sugar glaze. **POWDERED SUGAR GLAZE** 1¹/₄ cup sifted powdered sugar 2 to 4 tablespoons milk.

1 lb. ground beef 1 cup drained whole-kernel corn 1/4 cup finely chopped green pepper 1/4 cup finely chopped onions 1/4 cup cornmeal 1/2 teaspoon oregano 1/2 teaspoon chili powder 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/4 teaspoon pepper 1 (8 oz.) can tomato sauce pie crust (recipe below) 1 egg

1/4 cup milk 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard 1/2 teaspoon Worchestershire sauce 11/2 cups shredded cheddar cheese 4 stuffed olives sliced.

Fry bacon until crisp; break into large pieces. Chill 1/3 cup drippings until firm and reserve for pie crust mixture. Brown ground beef in large skillet; drain. Stir in corn, green pepper, onion, cornmeal, oregano, chili powder, salt, pepper, and tomato sauce. Prepare pie crust. Place mixture in pastry lined pan. Bake at 425 degrees for 25 minutes. Combine egg, milk, salt, mustard, Worchestershire sauce and cheese. Spread on pie. Top with bacon and olives. Bake 5 minutes or until cheese melts. Let stand 10 minutes before serving. If desired, serve with a






