ANOTHER BRICK BUILDING TO START MONDAY

Hedley is growing. The brick layers finished their work on the bank building yesterday and the carpenters began at once to put on the roof and other finishing touches to this building which is one of the nicest in the town.

C. B. Battle closed a contract with J. S. Cobb for a brick building joining the bank on the south and work on it will begin next Monday. The building will be 25x80 feet. In the meantime the bank's frame building, which was purchased by Mr. Battle, will be moved to his lot across the street just north of the two story mercantile building. Mr. Battle has faith in the future of Hedley as is evidenced by the investments he is making.

HOW THE STATE OF TEXAS IS GROWING

The estimate of the state comptroller on taxable values in Texas this year shows an increase of something over \$7 million dollars over last year. And to further show the tremendous gain last year over the year previous was 70 million. The figures show that Texas has not only kept up the pace, but has increased it. The

gain is greater than we expected and exceeds the expectation of the most buoyant booster, showing that even those who are spectacular in their opinions about Texas prosperity cannot exceed by speculation the actual progress of Texas. The increase this year is worthy of analysis, for the reason that it is based only upon actual improvements, having been no revision of land values.

The change made several years ago when there was a complete revision in land values and since then—that is, last year and this, the property owners have rendered and the county commissioners have as a rule appraised land values on the same basis as the year before, thus showing that the increases are measured in values due to improvements and prosperity thruout the state.

This unexpected increase coming just now when there is some grumbling of Texas, is deeply grounded, and that the surface conditions in nowise reflected the actual conditions. Texas prosperity is real, it is genuine, it is built upon a firm foundation. Adverse winds may blow, political conditions may change, hope may lag, and effort may be half-hearted, yet Texas as a whole goes on hopefully, heedlessly and certainly. Its wonderful resources are in such a variety that it can't be crippled by an ordinary misfortune. If it is hurt in one place it is strengthened in another and the giant combination of industry, natural resources, the indomitable will and spirited determination of its people will press on always and steadily until this magnificent empire will be the greatest section of the United States in every way, as it now is in area.—Ex.

MORE TRAINS PUT TO WORK ON THE DENVER

Monday morning three additional freight trains were started on the Denver road, thus giving work for three full crews. One of these trains will run north to Amarillo as a local, thus giving a daily service on the north end. The other two are both locals, one from Childress to Quanah, the other from Wichita Falls to Fort Worth. Thus it will be seen that business is already picking up and it is hoped that the time is not far distant when the road will have its usual number of trains operation.—Childress Post

THE NEW FORCE, NITROGEN.

Word comes from London that the world is soon to be propelled by nitrogen instead of steam and electricity. It is claimed the promoter has been granted a master patent for the production of nitrogen power and harnessing it as a driving force, \$250,000 being already subscribed by London financiers to start a capital fund of \$1,000,000. The scheme appears to be the compression of nitrogen gas in cylinders at a pressure of 3,000 pounds to the square inch. There is an endless supply of the gas furnished by every smoking chimney, but Lord Montagu publishes the pertinent comment that the weight of the cylinders alone may make the system prohibitive for motor car and other forms of propulsion.

**RUSSIA PAYS HIGH PRICE
FOR TEXAS COTTON**

That Texas cotton finds its
way to every mart and hamlet in
the universe is strikingly empha-
sized in a letter received by Aug-
ust Carlson, a young Swedish
farmer of Williamson county,
from T. T. Skvorcov, Sereda,
Russia, recently. Last year Mr.
Carlson placed a letter in a bale
of cotton raised by himself ask-
ing that the manufacturer buy-
ing the cotton, write him telling
the date of the receipt of the bale,
the price per pound paid for it,
etc., and the letter received from
the Russian manufacturer dis-
closes the fact that the price paid
for the cotton was forty cents per
pound, the highest price paid in
Russia for a 1910 bale of cotton.

The Texas cotton crop will give
the world one suit of clothes per
capita and we produce one-fifth
of the cotton crop of the world.

The Informer wishes to cor-
rect an impression created by an
article in last week's issue con-
cerning a class of legal voters
being denied the privilege of vot-
ing. It was not intended as a
slam at anyone, but to get our
officials to investigate the laws
before ruling out legal voters.
In regard to saying the Commis-
sioners' court cut out the names
of that class of legal voters from
the petitions, we intended to con-
vey the thought that on account
of being ruled out in the July 22
election these voters were natu-
rally cut off the petitions to the
Com. court, because of the fact
that there was naturally no rec-
ord of those voters on the poll
tax list or election returns. As
we understand it the representa-
tives of the petitions trimmed
the names, the court did not.
