### **8** Students Honored for **Excellence**

On Wednesday, April 10, students from Bovina High School were recognized during the eighth annual Celebration of Educational Excellence luncheon at South Plains College in Levelland.

Nearly 400 students from 40 area high schools and junior highs attended the festivities.

The ceremony was part of a statewide celebration sponsored by the Texas Education Agency and State Board of Education to honor more than 14,000 Texas public school students who have been named among the top students at their junior high and high schools.

The students received a **Celebration** of Educational Excellence medallion and a congratulatory letter from Gov. Rick Perry.

Students were typically selected for the honor by their local principal or counselor for achievements in mathematics, science, social science or English language arts.

The city manager sug-gested the possibility of the council attending a council training seminar for elected officials in El Paso, July 25-27. Terry will be attending a conference in San Antonio June 20-24 for city managers.

Terry also presented a draft of the new codes for the city and asked that the council be prepared to discuss them at the next meeting.

The council set the next meeting for May 7, at 7 p.m.

Congratulations and good luck at regionals to Edgar, Johnathan and Jake.





Despite a significant level of uncertainty about what federal programs will look like in 2002, cotton producers across the High Plains are busy getting fields into shape and fine-tuning planters in preparation for the 2002 growing season.

Of the many critical decisions a grower makes at this time of year, variety selection has the potential to ruin a grower's chances to show a profit at seasons end.

Research conducted for the past two seasons by Texas Cooperative Extension cotton

specialist Dr. Randy Boman, g/esw/pcip/var2001.html of Lubbock, provides the best available view of how different varieties and production systems perform under normal field conditions. These large-plot tests are also combination of weed pressure coordinated with normal variety testing projects carried out by Dr. John Gannaway at numerous locations across the High Plains region.

Boman's Systems Testing Program has proven to be a tremendous success after its second full year of support by Plains the Cotton Improvement Program.

The program is designed to do side-by-side comparisons of conventional and genetically enhanced cotton seed varieties. The research is conducted on large, replicated plots and grown utilizing the specific chemical and/or pesticide programs to which the varieties are adapted.

Plots are large enough to provide cotton that can be harvested using commercial harvesting machinery and ginned with commercial ginning equipment. Bales from each variety are then classed to determine quality characteristics and market value. Total costs and returns to produce each variety on a per acre basis are calculated and the results compared to each other.

The program has proven to be a valuable asset to growers seeking information to aid in their variety selection decisions. The research provides growers the ability to see how particular production systems compare


