THE LAND SHOW AT CHICAGO

It is safe to say that the Panhandle country more than ever before is awake to the worth of demonstrating to the outside world its vast possibilities. The question of sectional or state-wide exhibit is one that is so far unsettled, but it is a settled fact that worthy exhibits will go from this portion of Texas to important fairs and exhibits.

Already much of the matter for these demonstrations has been collected, and men and money are operative to the end of bringing together that which is most desirable and in keeping with the particular needs of the situation. Never before has there been such a ready co-operation as at present to furnish all that is desired by those collecting products, at the hands of the growers of the same.

Hundreds of articles will be offered from which a more select few may be gathered, so anxious are the people as a whole that nothing but the best in every line be offered for the inspection of the critical public.

Experts will be in charge of these exhibits, and everything done that tends to secure the best showing with the facilities at hand. It is stated in connection with the showing from the Panhandle in Chicago last year that inquiries are still coming in through an interest aroused at that time. Based upon this fact there seems good reason for that broader and deeper campaign being waged during the present year.

It is not improbable that where

a dozen or so people from the Panhandle visited the land show last year, there will be hundreds this year, all for the purpose of assisting with the proper demonstration of the achievements and possibilities in this country in an agricultural way.

That the soil products will predominate the Panhandle exhibit this year, there cannot be the least doubt. In fact an effort is being put forth to show something of every crop grown, from the natural grasses to the most finished in the agricultural, horticultural and allied lines.

It is stated by those directly engaged in the financial department of this movement, that money is coming in at a satisfactory rate, and so far as may be determined at this early date, there seems to be every reason to expect a showing unprecedented in its worth to this section of the state.

The agitation for an all state exhibit with this section of the state co-operating is so new that there has not been a general discussion, while that is true, those who have been heard from regarding the movement state that the outlook is good for the attainment of the joint or uniform exhibit.—Amarillo News.

The farmers are all at work now picking cotton, some just beginning this week. From all reports cotton around Hedley will yield from one-third to one-half bale average.

Lets begin now planning the planting of trees this winter around our homes, along each side the business streets, more especially should the public park be planted to trees and otherwise beautified.

The Clarendon News changed hands last week. A. M. Beville retires from the editorship and J. M. Warren assumes control. Editor Warren is an old hand at the newspaper business and in taking over the News we believe it is just changing from one good newspaper man to another. The Informer regrets to lose Mr. Beville from the newspaper field, but extend to the new owner a hearty welcome to Donley county.

Taking a paper out of the post office makes the recipient liable for the bill. An editor in Missouri sent his paper to one John Smith. The latter paid for it twice and then refused to pay again. He said he ordered it discontinued. But the court of appeals holds that mere acceptance of the paper created a liability. It adds: "The preparation and publication of a newspaper means much mental and physical labor as well as outlay of money. One who accepts the paper by taking it from the post office continuously, receives a benefit and pleasure arising from such labor and expense as fully as if he had appropriated any other product of other's labor, and by such an act he must be held liable for the subscription price."

Hedley business men need to get right up in the collar together and pull with all their might and main for Hedley. Now is the time to do something if we ever aim to do anything. Co-operation is what we need

and must have if we expect to make a greater town. Our territory must be increased in order for the town to grow. To increase the trade territory the whole town must get up and work night and day. Let us lay aside all petty strife and do what is possible to do. If "John Doe" advocates something that's good for the town "James Smith" should not say, "Well, I would do something, but you know there's 'John Doe' working along that line and is trying to further his own selfish gain, and, too, I don't like him." Such as that has occurred in other towns, but we believe all Hedley will join in and work mightily if the necessity is brought to them with proper force. What is one man's interest in a town should be every man's interest when it comes down to a matter of building a town. We must either go forward or crawl backward. It is just as easy, once you start, to build a town as it is to run your business and make it pay. What we need to do is to begin holding weekly meetings where each and every citizen can air his views on what's best for the town, and then all hit on some plan of action and then buckle down to work. Work until we accomplish what we set in to do.

The Informer has been boosting and trying to agitate the necessity for action until it seems there is no further use. But once more it comes forth pleading to the good of the town—LET'S DO SOMETHING. Hedley has been making rapid advancement this year, but unless the whole town gets in line and quit kicking over the traces, it cannot hope to grow much more without a miracle is performed. We should set our population mark at two thousand souls by 1914. It can be done. Are you ready to do your part?

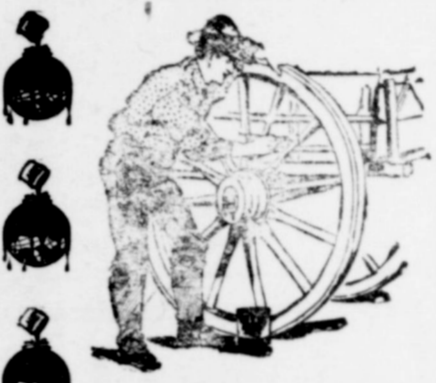

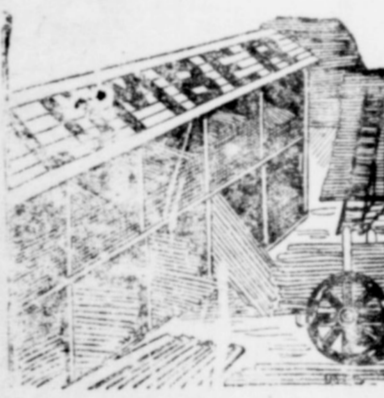
