IN MEMORY CAPT. NATHANIEL SMITH

Capt. Nathaniel Smith was born Oct. 18, 1839, in Barren Co. Kentucky, where he was raised to manhood.

When the crisis came between the North and South, and war was declared, he holding to the principles and cause dear to every Southern soldier's heart, volunteered his services in their defense.

Through this long drawn out and bloody conflict, under Gen. Morgan, he showed his bravery and gallantry in many hard fought battles, notably, Manassas and Shiloh.

At the close of the war, he returned to his home to take up life's progress amid the wrecks and ruins of the war.

In 1866, he sought the hand and heart of Miss Belle Langford who lived near Nashville, Tenn., as a companion, to share his joys and bear the trials and troubles with him through life.

Soon after their marriage they left the land of their youth, and sought a home in Texas, settling near Sherman, Grayson county, in 1867.

Here they lived until 1898 when they came to Rowe, Donley county Texas, where they resided (except a short time) until his death Dec. 12, 1911.

His only son, Atty. J. E. Smith Denison, Tex., and daughter Mrs. Buna Perrine, Ft. Worth, Texas, his devoted wife, and a host of other relatives and friends are left behind to mourn his death. After funeral services held in his home, followed by a large concourse of people his remains were carried to Rowe cemetery and there interred.

Captain Smith, when but 14 years old, professed faith and hope in Christ, and united with the Missionary Baptist church. He was of the Pauline and J. R. Graves style of Baptist in doctrine and devotion.

He was unassuming and unpretentious in his disposition and life; a devoted father, loving and companionable husband, a kindly friend, a loyal and honorable citizen, a tried Confederate soldier, a positive character. He died in faith and hope of Christ as his all sufficient Saviour.

Sleep his body till the resurrection.

THE AUSTIN DAM

Austin, Texas, Dec. 25.—The big dam will be finished in January 1913. It will create a lake a little more than 20 miles long and will furnish storage for approximately 300,000 acres of water. Between the main dam and the division dam, four miles below, is to be a lake aggregating in depth about eighty feet at the division dam. The main lake above the dam will cover 8000 acres and along the hill and cliffs 2000 more acres will be under water. The Medina Irrigation Company, which is developing the huge project, owns sites upon the hills and cliffs that will be sold for country homes.

FIGS A POPULAR FRUIT

EVE'S FAVORITE BECOMES GOLD IN TEXAS PROGRESS.

The fig is the pioneer of Texas fruits and the numerous races of the tree have explored most every section of the State, but it has more thickly populated the coast country than any other part of Texas.

According to the Texas Almanac we have 3,710 acres now in commercial fig orchards on the coast country and the planting of an additional thousand acres is under contract. Galveston County leads in fig culture, having 1,225 acres. The largest fig orchards in the world are located in this county. The farm value of the annual output of one acre of bearing figs averages \$250 and the total value of the annual Texas output approximates \$1,000,000.


