

ABOUT TEN YEARS ago, a California scientist, Paul R. Ehrlich, published a small but significant book, "The Population Bomb." He caused everyone to stop and take notice.

Ehrlich's thesis was that "mankind will breed itself into oblivion." He saw population control as the only answer to mass starvation. Mr. Ehrlich's book went into 28 printings, sold two million copies, and led to the movement for ZPG--zero population growth.

The Californian's book triggered scores of articles on the population explosion. Such emphasis upon explosive growth has been fully justified in some areas. Figures from the Population Reference Bureau show that India will double its population in 33 years, China in 41 years, and Mexico's population of 62.6 million is expected to double by the year 1997. However, due to all of the emphasis on zero population growth, it appears that the movement has succeeded so well in the United States that some ethnic groups are virtually in danger of extinction. The population growth rate among the WASPs (White, Anglo-Saxon Protestants) has dropped alarmingly. Catholic and non-white reproduction rates, although higher, also are on a downward trend. It has been stated that the Jewish Community within the United States, statistically speaking, is threatened with extinction within a few generations. These are vital facts to every business leader, public official, yes, even farmer, who must plan their business for 20, 30, or 50 years in the future. A quick explanation as to the reason for the trend in the United States is to examine the labor force. In 1940, only 13.8 million women were counted among the total labor force. Today, the figure is estimated at 38 million. Although two-thirds of these women workers are married, many of these working women want only one or two children, and some prefer to have no children. The affectiveness, acceptability and availability of birth control measures provide another explanation to the population trend. The high cost of medical care, housing and education probably serves as a deterrent to large families. A number of years ago, six, eight or ten children in a family was in style. This has changed drastically. One of the dangers that some economists see about the declining birth rate is the fact that as today's workers reach retirement age and begin to draw social security, their benefits will be paid by an increasingly smaller proportion of productive young people. Some of these specialists have reasoned that if a stagnant economy is to be avoided, millions of workers will have to be imported, either legally or illegally. If the figures released by the General Accounting Office are correct, the situation may take care of itself. A study showed that as many as 1.3 million illegal aliens entered the United States last year from Mexico alone.



Chamber Banquet On Tap Thursday



and Girl in Bovina High School. This will be the third consecutive year for these particular honors to be awarded.



Chairman Reports On Heart Sunday



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



Five new world records were established when the grand champion pen of broilers sold for \$18,000; grand champion turkey, \$13,000;




