

Frank Hollman Sentenced In **DWI** Fatalities

On May 11, 2002, a headon collision on Highway 60 near Summerfield claimed the lives of 13-year-old Amy Kilpatrick of Hereford and her mother, Connie Ortiz of Friona.

Francis Michael "Frank" Hollman, 43, of Friona was the driver of the other vehicle traveling northbound in the southbound lane of Highway 60 when his van collided with the Ortiz vehicle. Hollman was found to be intoxicated at the time with a blood alcohol level more than twice the legal .08 limit.

His 3-day trial was held in Hereford last week in 222nd District Court, visiting judge Bryan Poff presiding. The jury took less than two hours to return a guilty verdict and impose the maximum sentence on the two counts of intoxication manslaughter.

Hollman was given two 20year sentences and two \$10,000 fines. The sentences were to run concurrently and Hollman must serve at least half of the time before being eligible for parole.

Landowners Urged to Install **Chemigation Safety Valves**

To protect the ground water resources of the Texas High Plains from chemical contamination, the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 is inspecting chemigation systems to make sure check valves are installed.

Chemigation is a technique that allows agricultural producers to apply chemicals or fertilizers directly to the soil or plant surface through an irrigation system. However, there is risk of accidental back flow of these materials into a ground source if the system does not have a working chemigation check valve and back flow check valve in place.

In-line, automatic quick-closing chemigation valves are nandated by state law and are strongly encouraged by the Water District. "Required equipment shall be installed on all systems whenever a pump is installed or repaired or at the time of a themical injection," according to Texas Water Well Drillers and Water Well Pump installer's rules.

"If during daily work activities, a Water District field technician inds a chemigation system operating without a check valve, we vill send the land owner a reminder that state law requires these safety devices," said Arnold Husky, water use division director for the High Plains Water District.

By state law, these check valves must contain an automatic, quick-closing, tight sealing mechanism designed to close when water stops flowing in the output direction. This presents flow back into the well and potentially contaminating ground water. In ddition, check valves must be installed between the pump discharge and the point of chemical injection.

Chemigation and back flow check valves are available through 56 and Friona Cub Scout Pack ny irrigation dealer. 



Various other mixed media art pieces and photographs were on display but were not judged or voted.

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
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

The Sensational and The Ordinary in Religion

By REV. ALVIN PETTY

Religion has both the sensational and the ordinary in its makeup. The sensational, however, is very minor in wholesome religion and the ordinary is very major. Spiritual maturity and joy consists of seeking and learning to do the ordinary excellently well. Anytime a group or an individual majors on the sensational, mark it down, that their expression of religion is emotionally imma-Maturity, spiritual strength, is finding great sensation in the midst of doing the ordinary well. To paraphrase a statement of Abraham Lincoln's, "God must prefer the ordinary, for he sure made more of it."

Almost all religions traditions contain revelations, visions, prophecies, ecstasies, experiences of being caught into heaven as the apostle Paul was (2 Corinthians 12). These are valid and have their place if they lead toward the further transformation of our lives towards positive good. But if there is no personal transformation to the good these sensational experiences are void of any real worth.

Stephen Mitchell in The Gospel According to Jesus, points out that any good spiritual teacher such as the apostle Paul will discourage us from taking visions and other sensational religious experiences too seriously. That is, we are prone to center upon the "residue of fascination" left by mystical experiences. We are to learn from the sensational religious experiences that do come, that which transforms our lives and helps us to focus on doing well the practicality of real life here and now. We are to let the sensational experiences "come and go like any other experiences."

In 2 Corinthians 12 the apostle Paul refers to his vision experiences of being caught up into heaven for the only time in all his writing. And he speaks of it here only to catch the attention of an emotionally immature congregation, which worships sensational experiences, and Paul wants to grow them beyond that. Paul even states deprecatingly in 2 Corinthians 12:6b that he "refrains from speaking about his vision experience so no one would think more of him than was warranted by what he did or said." He wanted the Corinthians to focus on the simple gospel of accepted by grace through faith and transform their ordinary lives accordingly. A sensational experience can be very helpful but as Mitchell said, "if focused on too seriously, too much, then like medicines it can have strong and harmful side effects."

Again Mitchell teaches that the purpose of any sensational religious experience is to help us make "the ordinary become the greatest miracle of all." An eighth century oriental, Layman Pang, summed up this issue very well:

My daily affairs are quite ordinary;

I don't hold on to anything,

don't reject anything; nowhere an obstacle or



Friona lost one of its best longtime boosters last week with the death of Ralph Shirley.

When I first arrived in Friona, I heard Ralph being called "Gassy." It wasn't anything derogatory, it was just the fact that he was manager of Friona's Pioneer Gas Co. office. I learned that a group of businessmen in town enjoyed

giving their friends nicknames according to their business. There was Kenneth Williams who owned the Tasty Cream Drive-In. He was known as "Tasty." D.G. McClellan, local service manager for the GTE office, was called "Phoney."

I guess I'm jealous, since they didn't call me "Newsy." But again, they could've used "Nosey," so I guess that's okay. In the early 1960s, area farmers organized a group to fight a rate increase in natural gas, used to power their irrigation well motors. At a meeting at Hub, a farmer got up and said "I know we need to keep the prices as low as possible, but I

don't want to hurt Ralph Shirley--he is such a nice guy." Ralph came to Friona in 1951, and immediately became active in community activities, such as the Fire Department,

where he served as Chief for over 30 years. His Fire Chief job didn't stop with Friona. He taught at the Texas A&M Fire School for 31 years, and eventually took other local firemen to work at the school. The firemen and wives also were regular members of the Panhandle Fire

Marshalls & Firemen's Assn., which met at Amarillo. A veteran of World War II, Ralph was active in the American Legion and VFW Post, as well as the Chamber of Commerce, Boy Scouts, Lions Club--you name it, Ralph was

ready to assist. During his term as president of the Chamber of Commerce, Ralph instigated the awards to a pair of high school students each year, along with the regular Chamber awards.

He didn't ask for a lot of publicity. In fact, if Ralph ever called with a request, I tried my darndest to do something but I'm in total harmony with about it, because he wouldn't have asked if it wasn't needed.

Thanks for coming our way, Ralph. We join your family, your community, your church, etc., in mourning your loss. There was just one Gassy Shirley!

10-50 at the Hub Intersection

Hub intersection Tuesday.

Pretty much the same group of people as last time: EMS responders from Bovina and Friona; volunteer firemen from Bovina and Friona; the County Sheriff and deputies; a half dozen DPS Troopers; workers from the electric companies; residents, various onlookers, the simply curious. And me.

The occasion was not a festive one. But then it never is when we all gather at the Hub intersection. The dispatcher call went out as a "major 10-50 at the Hub intersection." A 10-50 in police parlance is a motor vehicle accident.

When a call goes out about "10-50" at the Hub intersection, you can be confident that it is major. The Hub intersection is not designed for minor accidents.

intersection Highways 214 and 86 has become legend in Parmer County. Highway 214 runs north-south. Traffic on 214 has the right-of-way, given by a blinking yellow light. The eastis supposed to stop.

North-south 214 traffic doesn't even have to slow down. Most oldtimers that live around here do slow down though. One man at the accident site said he slows to at least 20mph when he approaches the intersection.

Over the years at least 16 people have died at the Hub intersection, mostly because someone ran a red light. a limb and suggest that the Numerous other near-fatal accidents have happened.

We gathered again at the Minor accidents seldom happen at the Hub intersection.

> Yet no one seems to know what to do to make the intersection safer. This latest accident killed two people instantly, trapped a truck driver in his overturned truck, snapped a major electricity pole, and brought the Lifestar helicopter.

A lot of people at the scene Tuesday were shaking their heads and asking "what can be done about this damn intersection." Of course in an ideal world if everyone obeyed traffic signals there would be far fewer wrecks. That is not the case at the Hub intersection.

Almost everyone in Parmer County passes through the Hub intersection at some time or other. During football season, countless football fans and school buses travel south through the intersection.

Friends and relatives that come from the south to visit here, pass through Muleshoe and the Hub intersection. With the welcome addition of dairies to the county, dairy related west route, Highway 86, has a traffic, including many milk blinking red signal, and traffic trucks, pass along the intersected highways.

The last accident at the Hub intersection involved a loaded hay truck and an empty milk truck that ran the flashing red signal. The hay truck ended up in the yard of a residence with its hay on fire. Two truckers injured. Two trucks totaled. Same first responders, same intersection.

I'm going to venture out on intersection be a four-way stop intersection with the blinking red signal stopping traffic in all four directions.

somebody say "aw crap, we don't need to do that.")

When that idea was suggested (not by me) at the accident site Tuesday, a law enforcement person said that "people still wouldn't stop." If we buy that theory then why not just get rid of all annoying signal lights in the county and let people drive however they

A four way stop light would at least minimize a lot of stupidity. In Tuesday's case, the truck driver (who had the right of way) would have had to stop which means he would else is inconvenient? Hitting somebody broadside and killing them, then being trapped in your truck cab for an hour and grabbing a helicopter ride to Amarillo when all you wanted to do was deliver some food to the Hub Cafe. That's really inconvenient.

Or having your hay truck split in half and burn up when it is hit by an empty milk truck that jackknifes and totals? That's damn inconvenient if you ask me, especially if you take care of the wife and kids by hauling hay for a living.

How about attending the funeral of a friend or loved one that was killed at the Hub intersection because it was inconvenient to stop for a flashing red light on a flat, straight highway where you can see for miles?

Tommie Weemes at Deaf Smith Electric Coop thinks it is kind of inconvenient to keep replacing poles at the Hub intersection and reconnecting

lines that are knocked down. In this Tuesday accident, three (I think I just heard substations were knocked out and power was disrupted to about 2,500 electric meters on the DSEC system.

> Jon Hendrickson and a crew from Xcel Energy found their pole splintered into pieces with lines draped across both the car and truck. Electricity in Friona, eight miles away, was off for a while. That's inconvenient.

> I'm sure TxDot has some elaborate formula they use to determine whether intersection like Hub qualifies for a four-way signal. There has to be a certain number of meaningful fatal statistics before they do anything.

> There have to be some studies done. Maybe stretching those rubber hose traffic have avoided T-boning the Taurus and killing two people.

> Another law person said that making the intersection a four-way stop would be real inconvenient for traffic. I suppose it would.


I'll be trying to find somebody at TxDot to talk to during the next few weeks about the Hub intersection. Somebody needs to do something.

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

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

TIPS ON EYEGLASS CARE

Wash lenses twice a day in warm water or with special lens cleaner. Dry them with a soft cotton towel or special eyeglass cleaning cloth. Never use paper or silicone products to wipe glasses since they will scratch the lenses. Do not clean glasses when they are dry. Instead, wash or blow off dust



Keep glasses in a protective case when not wearing them. Always rest them with the lenses facing up. Put on or take off your glasses with both hands, grabbing the temples midway on each side and sliding them backwards over your ears. This will keep their shape.

Avoid spraying aerosol hairsprays and perfumes near your lenses. These products may contain acetones and other chemicals that can cause lens coating to

If you keep sunglasses in the car, store them out of the direct heat. Your frames will need adjusting over time. Have an eye-care professional make the corrections to ensure proper fit and comfort.

A reminder that the current seat belt law is being enforced statewide and is expensive if a traffic citation is issued. As of this writing, the fine for not wearing a seat belt is \$132.00. That is quite a large piece of change that you could put to better use than in the coffers of the State of Texas or the City of Friona. So please do us a favor and wear your seat belt.

There is also the safety factor, in that seat belts save lives, it's as simple as that. In my 30 years of law enforcement I have not checked one wreck where a seat belt caused an injury, but I have checked wrecks where the victim did not use a seat belt and that

was the basis for serious injury or death. Another violation that is dangerous and expensive, if issued a

citation, is exhibition of acceleration. That will cost you \$124.00. I would like to ask you to be extra careful when passing a police car that has a vehicle stopped on the side of the roadway. Slow down and move over to the center of the roadway as much as possible. The officer has enough to watch out for without having to

worry about you as you attempt to pass. I have been looking over the applications for patrolman and there are some good experienced officers wanting to go to work for the City of Friona. Our current shortage of officers is starting to

look like it might be solved in the next two or three weeks. I think I need to explain the 'billy club' school I was talking about at the newspaper office. I told Ron that officers have to be certified with each piece of equipment they have access to. Thirty years ago an officer had to qualify with his weapon and that was

about it as far as training went. Today, the officer is much better trained and educated.


The correct name for the school I mentioned is 'baton training' and in this training session an officer is taught how to control a violent person with the baton without causing severe injury or

Pepper spray is another tool that enables an officer to restrain a violent suspect without causing severe injury, and an officer has to be certified in the use of pepper spray before he can carry it on

An office has to be certified in radar operation before he can operate the radar set in his unit.

The number of schools and re-certifications an officer has to go through every year is extensive and time consuming, not to mention the cost to the agency he works for. Our officers at the Friona Police Department are currently up to date with their training and are fully qualified to use each piece of equipment they are issued.







Hail Damage Total Still Unclear; **Harvest Aid Guidelines Available from TCE**

LUBBOCK September 19, 2003 By Shawn Wade A week after one of the worst late-season storms in recent memory has done little to pinpoint just how much cotton was lost to a pair of hard charging hail storms that sliced through the area early last week.

The damage, concentrated in Dawson, Terry, Lynn, Hockley and Yoakum counties, has reportedly affected upwards of 150,000 acres. Acres so severely damaged that they will not be harvested is estimated at less than 100,000 acres.

Affected producers are now in the uncomfortable position of having to assess the amount of damage incurred and deciding what course of action they should take next.

To help producers through this process the Texas Cooperative Extension service has available a publication titled "Assessing Hail-Damaged Fields" that provides information on how to determine the potential of the remaining crop. It also discusses harvest aid options are available to open remaining bolls and salvage the most production from damaged fields.

In order to help producers make 2003 harvest aid treatment decisions, TCE Cotton Specialist Dr. Randy Boman has also updated the "2003 High Plains and Northern Rolling Plains Harvest

This publication, along with the other TCE publications cited, is available at local Texas Cooperative Extension office locations or from the Texas A&M Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Lubbock. You can also find the 2003 Harvest Aid Guide and Harvest Aid Price table in .pdf format on the Lubbock Extension Center's website (http://lubbock.tamu.edu/). The publication "Assessing Hail-Damaged Cotton" is available on the PCG website (www.plainscotton.org) along with a study evaluating the effectiveness of harvest aids applied to hailed-on cotton.

TCE also has prepared a chart containing the average retail price for most of the harvest aid products available to producers. The prices shown are averages and are not reflective of any single retail location. Producers need to be aware that prices will vary from location to location.

Disaster Rules Involving Deceased **Producers and Estates Getting Clarified**

By Shawn Wade LUBBOCK, September 19, 2003 Over the past few months one of the most vexing problems being encountered by individuals inquiring about participation in the 2001-2002 Disaster Assistance Program has been how to apply for eligible losses on a farm when the producer who farmed the land is deceased.

Program rules state that DAP applications must be signed by the eligible producer, someone authorized to sign for the eligible producer, or, in the case of a deceased producer, the individual who has authority to enter into a contract for the deceased

producer. In the case of a deceased producer, figuring out who has authority to sign the application has created a great deal of consternation for both producers and county Farm Service Agency

personnel. Unfortunately, determining if an estate has been closed and if authority remains vested in an individual is often a little harder to

determine. Proof of authority is often an easy thing to provide through copies of court orders, letters from the Secretary of State, or documentation authorizing the individual as the Executor of the

If none of the above types of documentation are available, other documents may be approved by FSA on a case-by-case basis. This case-by-case approval mechanism will include requests to accept applications from, and issue payments to, heirs of the deceased.

Once approved, payments will be issued either to the eligible individual, or the deceased producer's estate as applicable. If payment has been approved for a deceased producer's heirs, then payment will be made in the name(s) of the heirs based on the details of the determination by FSA.

TDA Amends Stalk Penalty

The Texas Department of Agriculture today amended the Cotton Stalk Destruction Program's penalty system to further TDA's mission to control cotton pests and eradicate the boll weevil in Texas.

The biggest change is that the new penalty formula used to calculate fines does not take field wetness into account. This is because current herbicides, including some new materials, make cotton-killing aerial applications possible even if fields are wet. In the past, the farmers with wet fields were given extra time to destroy

In 2002, the cotton stalk destruction regulations for Cotton Pest Management zones 1-8 were modified to require simply that farmers maintain their fields in non-hostable instead condition, of specifically requiring the shredding and plowing of stalks. Non-hostable means that no live fruiting structures (buds, flowers, squares or bolls) can be present. In the absence of such structures, a cotton plant cannot serve as a host for boll weevils. As a result of this 2002 regulatory change, alternative means of stalk destruction, such as herbicides, have become widely adopted.

Another change simplifies the penalty calculations. The new formula uses a \$250 base penalty, plus a 50 cents per acre penalty for each day of noncompliance. The new system benefits cotton growers by shortening the period that boll weevils have host material available to feed upon in the fields. This helps reduce the size of weevil populations present at the beginning of the next planting season. The changes come as a result

of suggestions made by the Cotton Producer Advisory Committees made up of Texas growers from across the state. Deadlines for cotton stalk destruction are mandated by regulations adopted under the Cotton Pest Control Law to help control boll weevils and pink bollworms. After the deadline, cotton stalks in Cotton Pest Management Zones 1-8 must not be allowed to develop squares, blooms or bolls and must remain without fruiting structures until planting nest

Cotton futures on the New York Cotton Exchange rose to new 33month highs Wednesday. The highs were short-lived, however, as cotton futures declined the following day in consolidation. Although technical factors permeated the market this week, concerns surrounding potential damage to the U.S. cotton crop by Hurricane Isabel were evident.

Cotton analysts were apprehensive that Isabel would move through the key cotton producing state of Georgia and then northward into the Carolinas. Instead, only North Carolina and Virginia were affected.

Talk among traders is the damage to North Carolina's cotton crop has not been too severe in the aftermath of Hurricane Isabel. In fact, Isabel was downgraded to a tropical storm Thursday night. North Carolina's production for the 2003-04 season was projected at 1.0 million bales. It still is too early to report a complete assessment of the damage to the crop, but one trader estimated losses at 25,000 to 50,000 bales of cotton due to the storm and more cotton will have suffered wind damage.

Meanwhile, USDA's crop progress report continued to highlight a U.S. crop that still lags behind the norm. As of Sept. 14, 45 percent of the bolls on the U.S. cotton crop were open compared with 35 percent last week, 61 percent in 2002 and the five-year average of 64 percent. The condition of the U.S. crop showed 19 percent in poor to very poor condition compared with 18 percent, while 53 percent of the crop remained in good to excellent condition.

In other news, USDA's weekly sales and export report was delayed as the agency remained closed in the aftermath of Hurricane Isabel. The report is scheduled for release on Sept. 22. Traders expect the report to show weak sales, but they said they will be more interested in future reports to see how sales have fared in the wake of cotton prices hitting 33-month highs. The high prices, traders said, likely will hinder foreign cotton demand. Sales estimates for the week ended Sept. 11 ranged from 30,000 to 50,000 bales while shipments were pegged at 90,000 to 120,000 bales.

China remains key to the bullish outlook in cotton prices due to its reduced production and expected import increases. Internal cotton prices in China have been rising to record levels, and this has been offering support to futures prices. A news service reported this week that China's low tariff quota for cotton imports in 2004 has been lifted to 4.0 million bales from 3.8 million bales this year, according to the State Development and Reform Commission (SDRC). The commission said the government would ask local cotton importers to seek overseas cotton at preferential prices to meet the textile industry's demand, as China's cotton supply will not be ample.

On the spot cotton scene, online sales by Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas producers in the five trading days ended Sept. 18 totaled 4,123 bales compared to 84,421 bales the previous week. Prices received by producers selling their cotton online ranged from 46.03 to 54.81 cents per pound versus the previous week's 47.41 to 53.61 cents per pound range.

USDA Grants **Funds For**

Director, USDA Rural Development today announced that Panhandle Community Services was awarded a \$157,920 grant through the Rural Housing Service Housing Preservation Grant (HPG) program.

"USDA Rural Development is very pleased to be able to provide housing rehabilitation funding for rural Texans," said Daniel. "It is our goal to ensure rural residents are afforded an opportunity to live in decent housing that meets basic health and safety standards and provides the benefits of energy efficient features."

USDA funds will be used to assist 35 families with essential home repairs in 26 Panhandle counties. The estimated population of these counties is 360,000, with 9% being very

Bryan Daniel, Texas State low income. Each county will receive assistance based on the total population, percentage of low income and amount of funds available and areas of greatest need. The funds will be used to conserve energy and improve accessibility for the handicapped.

The purpose of the HPG program is to promote sustainable economic development in rural communities by making grants to sponsoring organizations for the repair or rehabilitation of low and very low-income housing. Grants are competitive and are made available in areas where there is a concentration of need.

Failed WTO Negotiations Did Not Fail Texas Farmers

Congressman Randy Neugebauer is pleased that U.S. trade negotiators, "didn't give away the farm" at last week's World Trade Organization trade negotiations.

Neugebauer recently returned from a four-day trip to the WTO ministerial meeting in Cancun as part of the House Agriculture Committee delegation. The U.S. negotiating team included the Secretary of Agriculture, Ann Veneman and the U.S. Trade Representative, Robert Zoellick.

Neugebauer went to the WTO negotiations to promote and defend the concerns of West Texas farmers who are increasingly victimized by unfair trading practices in other countries; he was encouraged that U.S. negotiators held their ground. Neugebauer called his experience eye opening.

"The world is really starting to understand the importance of U.S. Agriculture, U.S. Cotton, and U.S. Textiles. Fair trade is more important than free trade. The U.S. is not prepared to give away the farm when it comes to trade negotiations," Neugebauer said. "Our West Texas farmers must be protected and that's one of the issues we discussed in Cancun. While free trade has economic benefits, fair trade is more critical to expanding export markets for American farm products, and that's the message I delivered to our negotiating team."

The meetings came to an abrupt conclusion Sunday when four African countries submitted a proposal that would eliminate the U.S. cotton program. Neugebauer said Zoellick tried to persuade those country's representatives to broaden their proposal, but the talks fell apart at that point.

Neugebauer said that while agriculture was not the cause for the failure of negotiations, it was important to note that the U.S. came to Mexico with the willingness to ambitiously move forward on the three pillars of agriculture trade - domestic subsidies, export subsidies, and market access.

"Agriculture had a strong voice at the trading table and that is the most important thing. The skill of the negotiating team ensured that these meetings would in no way result in a bad deal for U.S. agriculture and our farmers," Neugebauer said.

Neugebauer also discussed with Agriculture Committee Chairman Bob Goodlatte the possibility of hearings to assess the WTO negotiations after Cancun. One possible hearing will focus on types of subsidies and trade barriers that developing countries maintain in their own markets.

Neugebauer sits on the Agriculture Committee's Subcommittees on General Farm Commodities and Risk Management, Specialty Crops, and Foreign Agriculture Programs, and Livestock and Horticulture.
