## School Speed Zones

 Discussed By CityThe Bovina City Council met in
special session last Wednesday morning. Those present were Mayor
Tom Bonds; Councilmen Rouel Tom Bonds; Councilmen Rouel
Barron, Bedford Caldwell and Dick
Clayton, along with City Manager Clayton, along with City Manager
Clayton Williamson. In routine fashion, it was voted to
pay the bills, on a motion by Barron, seconded by Clayton.
The Council then passed a
resolution asking the Texas Deresolution asking the Texas De-
partment of Highways and Transportation to remove highway
bunkers on U.S. 60 and FM 2088. The bunkers on U.S. 60 and FM 2088. The
motion was made by Clayton and motion was made by

rally rally and report at Friona Monday
night. Approximately 250 farmers were on hand at the Community Center to hear reports from those who hav
participated in the organization' Washington Rally.
"I think we convinced the folks in Washington that we're not just a
bunch of hicks from the sticks, with a wheat straw in our mouths," sald Edwin Lide, who was among those trip. It was the general opinion that the
thinking around Washington has thinking around Wasying ha
changed considerably since the farmers began their lobbying effort. It was also pointed out that there
have been a lot more farmers have been a lot more farmers
attending the rally than ha generally been reported in news-
papers and on television and that papers and on television, and that
the Washington news media the Washington news media gav
the movement more coverage than it received nationally.
"We still have a fight on our
hands, and have some tough nuts to hands, and have some tough nuts to crack, but Ielieve we can do the job
if we stay with it," Lide told the
group of group of farmers Monday. "We've got to win this fight,
because, if we don't, the America because, if we don' I, the America
farmer is doomed. If we don't make farmer is doomed. fee we don't make pay our taxes, and keep our schools
