TT'S BEGINNING to look like 1978 will be quite a political year in the local precinct, which will elect a new county commissioner for the first time in more than a quarter of a century.

As of press time this week, we were aware of five candidates for the commissioner's job, and rumors were flying as to more names which might be thrown into the race.

Deadline for announcing, in order to be included on the primary ballots, is Monday, February 6.

We think it's a healthy sign that so many are taking an interest in the commissioner's seat. This is an important job, and of vital interest to the precinct. And it behooves the voters to choose the best man for the job.

Perhaps there will be yet others who will make a run for the position. The "more the merrier" definitely applies when you're choosing a new county commissioner.

It's a tribute to the precinct that a number of residents are interested in the job. It's preferable to the alternative, which would be that no one wanted to run.

Looney Is Employed With City


Bovina has a new deputy city marshal.

R.D. Looney, a Bovina native, started his duties early in January, acting in the capacity of deputy marshal and animal control officer, under a government grant program.

Graduating from Roswell, N.M., high school in 1970, Looney attended Texas Tech for a short time and, in 1971, entered the Air Force for a four-year hitch. He returned to Tech for two more years, majoring in music (voice), and then went to work for Sherley Grain, here, in the fall of last year.

Under the program, Looney will attend Law Enforcement Certification School at Amarillo College for six weeks, starting in March. The classes will be held five days a week and the deputy will work in Bovina on weekends.

Looney is a member of the First Baptist Church of Bovina and the local Jaycees.

School Speed Zones Discussed By City

The Bovina City Council met in special session last Wednesday morning. Those present were Mayor Tom Bonds; Councilmen Rouel Barron, Bedford Caldwell and Dick Clayton, along with City Manager Clayton Williamson.

In routine fashion, it was voted to pay the bills, on a motion by Barron, seconded by Clayton.

The Council then passed a resolution asking the Texas Department of Highways and Transportation to remove highway bunkers on U.S. 60 and FM 2088. The motion was made by Clayton and seconded by Caldwell

seconded by Caldwell.

It seems there have been complaints of confusion in the matter of speed zones near school zones on Highway 86 and also on Third Street.

The city manager, on a request by Councilman Clayton, agreed to investigate the problem and attempt to ease or eliminate the confusion in the posted school zones.

The Council also discussed ways and means of financing the new fire truck and voted on preliminary measures to achieve that goal.

Following discussion of legal representation for the city, the Council chose the law firm of Aldridge, Harding and Aycock to conduct Bovina's legal affairs.

Charles Aycock will be the official city attorney.

Accident Here Injures Driver

An automobile accident Friday afternoon at 3:55 sent a Bovina resident to the hospital for treatment.

According to City Marshal Jerry Atchley, a 1975 Chevrolet, driven by Randell Craig James of 403 Fourth Street, was traveling northwest on Third in the inside lane. A 1978 Plymouth, driven by Isaac W. Quickel, of 508 Avenue E was parked on Third, in front of the First State

Quickel left his parked position to make a left turn onto Avenue A. Traveling in a northeasterly direction, Quickel's right front fender struck the right front fender of the James vehicle.

James' mother, Anna Lee Englant, 403 Fourth Street, was thrown into the dash and her head struck the windshield. Mrs. Englant was transported to Parmer County Community Hospital by her husband, Floyd, where she was treated and released.

No estimate of damage to the vehicles was given.

Trimble, a farmer and breeder of


thoroughbred horses, has been a Bovina resident for 31 years. "I feel like I am qualified for the

Dixon also is former chairman of the Parmer County Republican party. He is a graduate of Texas A&M University (1958) with a degree in agriculture. He is a captain in the U.S. Air Force and is a member of the American Hiking Society.

In making his announcement, Dixon said "So that the people will have an opportunity to vote in a

Farmers Report On Trip

Farmers from the Bovina area attended, and participated in, an American Agriculture Movement rally and report at Friona Monday night.

Approximately 250 farmers were on hand at the Community Center to hear reports from those who have participated in the organization's Washington Rally.

"I think we convinced the folks in Washington that we're not just a bunch of hicks from the sticks, with a wheat straw in our mouths," said Edwin Lide, who was among those reporting on his impressions of the trip.

It was the general opinion that the thinking around Washington has changed considerably since the farmers began their lobbying effort.

It was also pointed out that there have been a lot more farmers attending the rally than has generally been reported in newspapers and on television, and that the Washington news media gave the movement more coverage than it received nationally.

"We still have a fight on our

"We still have a fight on our hands, and have some tough nuts to crack, but I believe we can do the job if we stay with it," Lide told the group of farmers Monday.

"We've got to win this fight, because, if we don't, the American farmer is doomed. If we don't make a profit, we can't feed our families, pay our taxes, and keep our schools and communities going," Lide concluded.

It was reported at the meeting that Bovina, Friona and Parmer County has been well represented in Washington since the beginning of the rally. Over 70 residents of the county have made the trip during the first two weeks, and more were to leave this week.

In addition, it was pointed out that

farmers will be needed to testify during the House Agriculture Committee hearing February 15-16. The possibility of cutting back

planted acreage for 1978 50 per cent of normal was also discussed.

This is to be a "last ditch" plan, in the event that American Agriculture

Movement leaders see that congress, or the Secretary of Agriculture is not going to act on the farmers' demands for 100 per cent parity.

Farmers are also being urged to

purchase grain on the futures market, and it is felt that the cutback in acreage, plus buying of futures, is a virtual cinch to drive up prices.

The farmers in South Texas will be watched to see how they comply with the acreage cutback, if this is pushed.

"I feel that if we push the 50 per cent cutback, social pressure in a community will see to it that everyone goes along," said one of the spokesmen at Monday's meeting.

Among the residents of the Bovina area who were planning to follow up the first two weeks of the Washington Rally by making the trip to the nation's capital were Harry J. Charles, Durward Bell, Vernon Willard and Gaylon Rhodes.

Grain Dust Blast Injures Local Man

An explosion occurred at the Parmer County Cattle Co. last Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock, leaving one man with serious burns. The company is located on U.S. Highway 60, west of Bovina.

According to Andy Garza, local fire marshal, the blast occurred in the basement of the feed plant where a maintenance crew was using a cutting torch. Apparently, the torch touched off an accumulation of grain dust.

"Fortunately," Garza said, "the force of the blast went upward rather than concentrating around the men."

Carl Wilson of Parmer County received first and second degree burns to his hands and face. He was rushed to the Parmer County Community Hospital by Friona
