## REC Objects To Utility Deregulation Proposal

Texas' electric cooperatives contend that a proposal to dere-
gulate the electric utility industry by 2001 may not be in the best interest of electric cooperativ consumers. The co-ops are concerned that bill are not fully understood and they say that more time is needed to review them, according to Mike Williams, president of Texas
Electric Cooperatives, the statewide Electric Cooperatives, the statewide
association that represents the 75 distribution cooperatives and 11 generation and transmission cooperatives.

"Dramatic changes are being proposed that will impact how the
electric industry in Texas operates electric industry in Texas operates
We believe that this proposal needs more time to be fully understood and to allow for thoughtful examination by legislators and the
public to assure that these suggested changes are indeed in the public interest," said Williams \$1,000 Cargill Awarded

## TDH Issues Alert On Contact Lenses

The Texas Department of and abrasions of the cornea
Health (TDH) has cautioned can result from lenses that do people not to buy contact not fit properly and from
lenses from vendors who do not require a prescription. investigation of vendors selling tinted, soft contact
lenses at flea markets in the lenses at flea markets in the
Dallas-Fort Worth area and
in Amarill in Amarillo.
Investigators say the
vendors did not require a vendors did not require a
prescription, used unsanitary
handling handling and storage
practices and offered little or practices and offered little or
no instruction po instruction about the
preper use and cleaning of
the lenses. Though the vendors were selling primarily non-powered,
tinted lenses for cosmetic rather than corrective purposes, state and federal
laws require a written aws require a written
prescription from a licensed
practitioner before contact practitioner before contact
lenses of any kind can be sold to consumers.
Health officials say a
prescription is needed for prescription is needed for
proper size and curvature of proper size and curvature of
the contact lenses and
indicates that the lenses are appropriate for the wearer
In Texas, ophthalmolin Texas, ophthalmol-
ogists and optometrists can
prescribe and dispense contact prescribe and dispense contant
lense. Opticians can dispense them to consumers who have
legitimate prescriptions. legitimate prescriptions.
Tom Brinck, chief of Tom Brinck, chief of
TDH's medical devices
branch, said the same contact branch, said the same contast
lenses were being tried on by many customers at the flea
markets despite TDH's markets despite TDH's
obvious concern about disease obvious concern about disease
transmission. He said permanent eye
damage can occur from infections caused by these
unsafe handling practices and by improper care and
cleaning of the lenses. Cuts

teen-agers, Brinck said.
