Cow Bought at Low Price Not Always Best Investment-Best to Keep Track of Feed and Milk.

Is the cheaper-priced dairy cow necessarily the better investment? The question is well answered in the following instance: A man wishing a cow for dairy purposes called upon a dairyman who kept milk records as well as cost accounts. The buyer confined his attention to two cows. One of these would cost him \$75, the other \$175. The former was in good condition, but the dairy characteristics were not as fully developed as they might have been; the latter was the direct opposite. The records of the two cows were shown the buyer, but he was not as much interested in records as he should have been. He did not consider it worth while to sit down and figure out which would be the better investment.

Butter sold for 35 cents per pound Butter sold for as cents per points the year around. The \$75 cow had a record of 226 pounds of buiter. 226 pounds at 35c-\$79.10. Cost of feed-\$72. \$79.10-\$72.00-\$7.10 profit per year. The \$175 cow had a record of 415 rounds. pounds. 415 pounds at 25c-\$145.25. Cost of feed-\$84.00. \$145.25-\$84.00-\$61.25 profit per

From these figures we see that it would take the \$75 cow about ten years to pay for herself in butter; if she was a middle-aged cow she would never do it. On the other hand, the \$175 cow would have paid for herself in butter in less than three years.

The buyer bought the \$75 cow. Would he have done this if he had appreciated the value of records, and figured out the value of each cow?

TREATING ULCERS OF CORNEA

Touch All Parts of Sore With Stick of Nitrate of Silver-Bathe With Solution of Salt Water.

Ulcers of the cornea in calves may be caused by several things, such as bruises, abscesses, or beards from foxtail; or it may be the result of a severe attack of pink eye. You can tell ulcers of the cornea from pink eye by means of the discharge. Instead of pus, you will find an acid, watery fluid. If it should be ulcer of the cornea, or ulcers formed by very violent cases of the pink eye, the treatment is about the same. Take a stick of nitrate of silver, sharpen as you would a pencil, get an attendant to hold the head of the calf, keeping the eyelids back, and touch all parts of the alcer lightly with the stick of silver nitrate. Wait a few minutes and bathe eyes with a solution of salt water.





USEFUL IN CARRYING SILAGE

Contrivance Adapted to Average-Sized and Small Feeding Yards-Arrangement Saves Labor.

The Nebraska experiment station in its Bulletin No. 145 describes in detail the silage carrier shown here. It is adapted to average-sized and small





feeding yards and is a highly useful and labor-saving arrangement. The boom or arm to which the carrier is attached must be strongly attached and guyed. The feeding racks are arranged in a semicircle that brings them just under the tip of the arm.

If the stock is inclined to split further after the wedge has been removed, it should be tightly wound with several wrappings of a stout, rather coarse material before wax is applied.

Thin calico or cheap muslin saturated in melted wax, drained and allowed to cool, makes material which answers both as a wax and as a binding substance. The cloth should be torn into strips of convenient width before being immersed in the liquid. When it is thoroughly saturated, it should be taken from the solution and the excess of hot wax removed.

Another method of grafting is known in the nursery as whip grafting. This operation is usually performed in the latter part of the dormant season at some point on the trunk which may be immediately below the surface or several inches unshould be very nearly the same size and preferably not more than threefourths of an inch in diameter. With the knife held so as to make an upward stroke, cut the stock entirely across at a long angle. About one third of the distance from the upper end of the cut, make an incision parallel with the grain. Cut the scion at as nearly the same angle as possible and make a similar incision in the cut surface. Push the cut surfaces together in such a way that the tongue of the scion made by the incision will be crowded into the groove made by two parts together with raffia or other material and pack firmly with earth. months just as the buds begin to swell In this process the use of wax is not necessary. In some respects budded trees are preferable to grafted ones and it is probable that more pecan trees have been propagated by annular budding in some form than by all other methods combined. This process is performed during the summer at the time when the bark slips or peels the most readily. Annular budding con-sists in transferring a ring of bark cut from a bud stick of the desired variety to which a bud is attached to the trunk or branch of another tree to take the place of a similar ring of bark previously removed. Specially designed tools are used for the purpose of cutting the rings. After the two rings have been exchanged the stock should be wrapped at once with wax cloth, care being taken not to cover the bu'.



pr very early in the growing period. Scions for grafting of all kinds should be selected from the growth of the previous season. They should be cut while dormant and either stratified in moist sand or held in cold storage until the grafting season. A sharp, fine-tooth saw, a sharp grafting knife, a specially devised grafting tool, a short-handled wooden mallet, a quan-tity of raffia and grafting wax or grafting cloth, and a number of scions constitute the necessary equipment for cloft grafting.

The trunk or limb of the tree to be grafted (known as the stock) should be cut squarely across with the saw The knife edge of the grafting tool should then be placed across the stock and the back of the tool tapped with the mallet until it has split or cut the stock to a depth of two to four inches. The tool is then removed and the two parts of the stock pried apart with the wedge at the extreme end of the grafting tool. With the annular method it is necessary to have stock and scion of approximately the same size. If the bud stick is slightly larger than the stock, a portion of the bark to which the bud is attached may be cut away so that the two ends of the ring just meet around the stock. If the bud stick is smaller than the stock, a strip of bark on the latter may be left in position to complete the ring. In actual prac tice this is very frequently done and is known as patch budding.

The propagation of pecans is of particular importance because it is essen tial to success that the right varieties be grown in the best localities. A list of these variaties and the localities to which they are best suited is con-tained in the bulletin already mentioned

SIMPLE WAYS TO SEAL SILO

In a good silo the contents are pro tected from the air on all sides except the top. The air always spoils some of the silage on the top unless feeding is begun as soon as the silo is filled.


