Early Voting Is Underway

Early voting for the City and School Board Elections will begin on Monday, April 17 and end on May 2.

Early voting for the school board election will be at Ridgelea Elementary School, 1000 Highway 86 each weekday between the hours

of 8 a.m. and 4 p.m.

Early voting for the city election will be conducted each weekday at Bovina City Hall, 205 North Street.

Six candidates are currently running for three slots in the May 6 Bovina School Board election. The four candidates listed on the ballot are incumbents Mike Beauchamp and Dennis Willard, and candidates Bob Owen and Velma Grisham, while Josie Alonzo and Justin Brozek have filed as write-in

Four people will run for the three alderman positions in the Bovina City Election, Garry Beauchamp, Galen Hromas, Rick Anderson, and Earl Quintana. Holdover members of the council are Joe Alvera and Kenneth Waters.

Voters in the school board race will be using the cumulative voting system (however, no cumulative voting will be used in the city's election).

Under the cumulative voting system, each eligible voter will be allowed a number of votes equal to the number of trustee positions to be filled. In years when three trustees are to be elected, each eligible voter will be allowed three votes. In years when two trustees are to be elected, each eligible voter will be allowed two votes.

Each eligible voter will be allowed to cast his or her votes in any manner, according to the voter's preference. The voter may cast each of his or her votes for separate candidates, cast all of his or her votes for one candidate, or apportion his or her votes in any other manner among the candidates, as long as the number of votes cast does not exceed the number of votes

In the event of a tie vote between candidates for the last trustee position to be filled, the winning candidate shall be determined by casting lots in accordance with §2.002 of the Texas Education Code.







Bull Town Bulletins By Bill Ellis

THE TRAGEDY this week, the bombing of the Federal Building in Oklahoma City, has been almost unbelievable to those of us who are life-long residents of this area.

We have a number of relatives in Oklahoma, and spent much of our growing-up years spending "vacations" by visiting various of our kith and kin in the Sooner State. Since we more or less grew up with many of these folks, the bombing in Oklahoma City was just as unbelievable to us as if it had happened in Amarillo or Lubbock.

These things just don't happen in our part of the country. That's the type of things we're used to seeing on the 6 o'clock news-happening in New York or Los

Angeles. Ye Editor called our first cousin, Leta Ray Tate, who lives in the Oklahoma City suburb of Jones, Oklahoma, to find out if we might have had relatives hurt or killed in the explosion.

Luckily we didn't, but Leta said that she and her husband Joe have made periodic visits to that Federal Building, and to the HUD office in particular. They have gotten into the rental business in a serious way, and have bought several houses from HUD, remodeled them, and then rented them out.

"We've gone to the HUD office to check on the list of homes available, pick up bid forms, leave bids, or check on bid results. We were well familiar with that particular office, which was located on the eighth floor," Leta told me Thursday night.

In fact, they were well-acquainted with one of the lady employees at the HUD office, and this lady's desk was situated where some heavy damage occurred.

But by the hand of fate, the lady had gone Wednesday morning to begin a computer class, in the southwest part of the building. This was a section of the building that wasn't as badly hurt, and the friend felt as though she might owe her life to the fact that she had gone to the class that particular day.

HUD had offices on both the seventh and eighth floor of the Oklahoma City building. The friend had gone to an office on the ninth floor when the explosion happened.

A number of other federal offices are located in the building, including Social Security, the Army and Navy recruiting offices, the ATF headquarters, Social

******** Security and Secret Service.

Leta told us that they regularly went by the Social Security office on their way to visit the HUD office, and "it was always full of people." If you've ever had business at the Social Security office, you know exactly what she was talking about.

Our relatives said that the HUD office itself had a total of 129 employees. After I called them Wednesday night, Leta called her friend from HUD, who told her that 30 of her co-workers are among those on the "unaccounted for" list, and presumed dead.

In fact, Leta's contact had heard that various offices had "entire sections" of employees who were on the "unaccounted for" list.

They expect the fatality list to top the 100 mark, maybe even hit as many as 150.

These relatives live 12 or 15 miles from downtown Oklahoma City, and Joe said he immediately felt the jolt from the explosion. "I thought perhaps there had been a plane crash, perhaps at Tinker Air Force Base.

My cousin Leta said she was at the beauty shop, and her attendant was just leaning her back for a rinse when they heard a strange noise. "Who is moving furniture?" her beauty operator asked.

That is the question that the FBI, along with numerous other law agencies were asking as we wrote this piece Thursday night. Here's hoping that by the time the ink is dry on this bit that the authorities have someone in custody. Then, you people in Oklahoma show the nation how a "trial of the century" really ought to be handled!


