Outside the small gate, in the Moslem quarter, are shops for the sale of glass beads and bracelets, kept by men of Hebron, and soon you come into the street of shoemakers. The trade was established here in old days when the abattoir was in the Mauristan, among the ruins of the ancient hospital of the Knights of St. John. The Mauristan was given by Sultan Abdul Aziz as a present to Frederick William, crown prince of Prussia, when he visited Jerusalem in 1869. The German Church of the Redeemer (Erloser kirche) was built here after the war of 1870. The slaughter house had previously been removed to waste land just inside the walls up by the Zion gate. The hides of beasts were thrown upon the road, and people walked on them till they were tanned enough for shoemaking. European boots and shoes were then unknown to the majority. The Moslem and Christian men wore soft red shoes of sheepskin; the women yellow slippers of the same. The mission schools and convents had cobblers of their own, who had been taught the ways of Europe in such mat-

Round the corner to the left, below the Abyssinian convent, were the sweets shops. Great was our delight when at the New Year every boy in the school received a cake enriched with clarified butter and sweetened with honey and sugar. But Halaweh. sweetstuff made of sesame meal and ney, was our perennial joy.

Butchers, Spicers and Dyers. All along behind the Mauristan run three streets parallel to one another, appropriated by the butchers, the spicers and the dyers, respectively. In the butchers' street, the dealers, all Moslems, sold nothing but mutton and goat's flesh. As the streets are arched over, semidarkness reigned, and often we have tumbled over fat and lazy dogs which were attached to almost every meat shop. These dogs not only kept good watch at night, but also kept the greasy street in a tolerable condition by licking up the blood and eating bones. Wheat and barrey, and overcoming kidney, liver and bladlentils and dhurra, or maize, are here poured on big heaps and sold to the public. The official appointed to measure out the grain in the Tabbeh (about eight rotls) or Sa' (half a Tabbeh) is quite a serious and important personage. Filling his measure, he will begin by announcing Allahu Ahad (God is One), and continues saying this till the first tabbeh is in the sack. "Two," "three," he says at every measure, till he comes to seven, when he says sameha (pardon), instead of saba (seven). The number seven, being that of the princes of the Jann (genis), must not be named while handling grain for fear the Jann should carry off the blessing. Tamanieh (eight), ya Rabb, el Amaneh (Lord, give me honesty).

The crowd is exasperating at times, though comical incidents occur occasionally. As I slowly pushed my way forward one day, stopping to avoid huge sacks, a European snob, anxious to escape being crushed, stood in a corner, wearing a new straw hat. Hats are, as a rule, disliked by orientals. The European, in derision, is often called abu 'l-baranit (father of hats). A durneytah (hat) attracts unpleant notice in a crowd. A camel, waiting to pass, looked round casually, put out his huge lips, seized the strange straw busket, and in one bite ate half the hat, to the distress of Mr. Snob and the delight of the by-standers.

The north and northeast portion as far as the Temple Area was most exclusively Moslem. Like the butchers and the spicers, the gold and silversmiths, the blacksmiths and the coppersmiths and other workers had their separate streets, the last named near the dyers; but many began to feel the influence of a new period and left their old quarters, bidding farewell to the ancient oriental tradition.





DON'T FEED ROUGHAGE ALONE

Leguminous Hays, Such as Alfalfa, Clover, Soy Bean or Cowpea Hay Are Favored.


(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

The best kind of dry roughage to be fed to the dairy cow, in connection with corn sitage or roots, are leguminous hays, such as alfalfa, red, crimson, or alsike clover and soy bean or cowpea hay. While corn silage is an excellent feed, it is not a balanced one, as it does not contain sufficient protein and nineral matter to meet fully the requirements of the cow. The leguminous hays, in addition to being very palatable, have a tendency to correct this deficiency. They are also one of the best and cheapest sources of protein. One or more of these hays can be grown on any farm, and in addition to their value for feeding purposes, they improve the soil in which they are grown. Hay from Canada field peas, sown with oats to prevent the the fingers. Truly! No humbug! peas from lodging, also makes an ex-

cellent roughage. Corn stover, coarse hay, etc., also find a good market through the dairy corn, or corn between the toes, and cow. This class of roughage is low in protein, however, and when it is used the grain must be richer in pro-

No positive rule can be laid down as to the quantity of dry roughage that should be fed, but about 6 to 12 pounds a day for each cow, in addition to silage, will be found to be satisfactory in most cases. When the dry roughage is of poor quality, such as coarse, weedy hay or a poor grade of cornsialks, a large portion can often be given to advantage, allowing the cow to pick out the best and using the rejected part for bedding. With this quantity of dry roughage the cow will take, according to her size, from 25 to 50 pounds of silage. This may be considered as a guide for feeding to apply when the roughage is grown on the chased, it is often more economical to

timit the quantity of roughage fed_and increase the grain ration. While a cow's stomach is large and her whole digestive system is especially designed to utilize coarse feeds. there is a limit to the bulk that she can take. This limit is below the quantity of roughage that it would require to

furnish the nutrients she must have for maximum production; that is, a rat'on may contain the proper proportions of protein and carbohydrates and still be so bulky that she cannot handle it. She therefore should have some grain even though the roughage in itself is a balanced ration.

FIRST-GRADE MILK

The five essentials for produc-tion of first-grade milk are: (1) Healthy cows and men, (2) clean cows and men. (3) clean cans and paths, (4) covered milking pails, (5) cooling milk to 55 degrees Fahrenheit or below within an hour after production and holding it as low as possible until delivered.

LACK OF ICE AT CREAMERIES

One Concern Turned Back to Farmers \$2,700 Worth of Food Products-Many Other Losses.

One large creamery, which buys about 350,000 gallons of sweet milk and cream per year, returned to farmers last year nearly \$2,700 worth of these food products on account of lack of proper care which caused souring,

churning and off flavors. The records of another plant show that nearly 50,000 gallons of sour milk were received in one year.

Insufficient cooling caused most of these losses, which are duplicated many times all over the country during the heated season.

TREATING COWS FOR GARGET

Afflicted Animals Should Be Milked Regularly-Hands of Milker Should Be Washed.

Cows that are subject to garget should be milked regularly and clean, In some cases it may be advisable to milk oftener than twice a day. The hands of the milker should be washed after milking a cow that is affected with garget before milking another cow, to prevent carrying the germs, The practice of milking out an affected cow on the ground is a bad one for the germs are spread in this way

GOOD BUILDINGS FOR SHEEP

Should Be Dry, Well Drained, Ventilated and Furnish Ample Space Yor the Flock.

(Prepared by the United States Depart-ment of Agriculture.)
The site for permanent buildings for sheep should first of all be dry and well drained. Ample yard space that is dry and sheltered should be available adjacent to the main barn or shed. A southern slope with sundy soll is especially satisfactory for this purpose.

On most farms it will be advantageous to have the buildings and yards easily reached from the regular pastures or from fields used to grow forage crops for summer pasture. As the flock requires attention many times daily during part of the year, convenience of location in relation to the farm dwelling and to other buildings will effect an economy of time in the

performance of routine labor. Since sheep do not require quarters that are especially warm, a single wall will ordinarily insure sufficient warmth. If lambs are dropped in very cold weather, a temporary covering over the lambing panels will provide warmth, or a small space can be par-

titioned off in which to keep a few ewes until their lambs become strong. Shade and protection from heat are peculiarly necessary for sheep. Shade cannot always be furnished in pastures, and buildings that are well located and constructed so as to render them cool in summer will often provide greater comfort to the sheep during hot days than would be possible

for them out of doors. Dryness and freedom from draft are ost important. Sheep cannot possibly thrive in quarters that are damp or dark. In fact, the flock should be shut in only during storms. Abundance of light in all parts of the building and at all times is necessary not only for the health of the sheep, but for convenience of the shepherd in caring for them. One square foot of window for each 20 square feet of floor space is necessary. Windows should be placed at a height to insure a good distribution of light, and particularly direct sunlight for the lambing pens during the period the ewes are lamb-

Close confinement in poorly ventilated pens is very injurious to breed-

ing ewes. While they should seldom be shut indoors, a part of the flock will usually lie inside at night. At lambing and during storms doors should be closed. For such times it is necessary to provide means of securing fresh air without creating drafts. In a very large building with numerous doors and windows it is often advisable to build one or two partitions from floor to ceiling to prevent drafts. Fresh air can be admitted through muslinscreened windows opened on the side opposite to that from which the wind blowing without causing drafts if all other sides of the building are

tightly closed. Level and well-drained clay-surfaced floors are satisfactory and economical. Sheep pack the surface very firmly, and if there is proper drainage the only objection to this floor is that it does not exclude rats. Concrete floors for alleys and feed rooms are necessary, but will seldom be

The main features to be provided in the floor plan are minimum of waste space, convenience and ease in feeding and in cleaning the pens, and elimination of the need of moving or dis-turbing the sheep. Pen partitions should be movable. By using feed racks to make divisions in the pen space the size of the pens can be varied as needed, and in special cases the racks can be removed to permit the use of the space for other stock.

LIVE STOCK GAINING FAVOR

Farmer Who Does Not Raise Animals to Supplement Crops Loses Soil Fertility.

More and more is the tendency toward livestock raising to supplement crop growing in general farming. The farmer who raises crops, such as corn, cotton, sorghum, hay, etc., without animals and sells these products must sell the fertility constituents at wholesale and buy meat, milk, butter, flour, meal, etc., at retail, paying the high cost of hauling both ways and dealers' profits. Animal raising saves fertility and the high cost of hauling. It is worth while.





POINTS ON HOUSING POULTRY IN WINTER

Aim to Prevent Drafts Which May Cause Colds in Flock.

Cloth Used for Curtains in Front Should Be Thin Enough to Permit a Slow Circulation of Air-Hens Can Stand Cold.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) The back and sides of the poultry house should be absolutely tight in order to prevent drafts which may

cause colds in the flock. The front of the house should be so high that the windows or openings will allow the sun to shine well back into the interior during the winter. Burlap, unbleached muslin, or light-weight duck cloth may be used for curtains in the front. This cloth should be thin enough to allow a slow circulation of air without a draft. This is impossible if too heavy a grade of duck cloth is used or if the cloth is oiled or

If the curtain is not attended to, however, curtain-front houses may be less satisfactory than the open-front

type even in northern latitudes. A large amount of glass in the front of the house makes it warm during the day but cold at night, as glass radiates heat very rapidly. Some glass, however, is helpful in providing light when the curtains are closed. Some ventilation should be given in a poultry house even on the coldest night. It is usually best secured by leaving a small window open or having muslin curtains in the front of the house. If the house is shut up tightly without any muslin curtains in the front, there is a tendency for moisture to collect in the house and condense on the rafters and other woodwork on frosty mornings. It is not necessary to close the muslin curtains in the front of the house except in very cold or stormy

The old-time, so-called "dyedin-the-wool" fancier was interested primarily in producing birds of high exhibition quality and too frequently had no concern in their ability back of them. This fact has led the breeders of standard-bred poultry to see that if they are to take advantage of all possible profitable outlets for their stock they must pay more attention to productiveness. There is a happy medium between the high-quality show-ring type and the productive eggyielding type. Breeders of exhibition birds, as well as poultry raisers in the business for eggs and meat, should strive for this utility show-ring type.
