## Mustangs Top Owls, 14-8

The Bovina Mustangs improved their season record to 2-1 with a 14-8 win over the Hale Center Owls in the team's home opener last Friday.

The Mustangs turned the tables on the favored class AA Owls with a good, solid performance.

"I felt both teams played a good, hard game. I was proud of the effort by our kids," said Bovina Coach Bill Talley.

The game went right down to the wire. Hale Center took to the air, and was trying long passes on their last possession.

But Noah Villa intercepted a pass as time was winding down, to give the ball to the Mustangs and allow them to run out the clock.

After a scoreless first quarter, Bovina took the lead on a 70-yard sustained drive. Bud Venable had the biggest gainer of the drive, a 35-yard run. Fullback Todd Ware got the touchdown for Bovina on a six-yard run. Venable's kick gave Bovina a 7-0 lead.

Later in the second quarter, Bovina recovered a fumble at the 41-yard line, and proceeded to drive for their second TD. Quarterback Scott Scaff tossed to Gabriel Mancini, with just three seconds left in the half.

Venable's kick sent the Mustangs to the intermission with a 14-0 lead.

The third quarter was not Bovina's best period of the ball game. The Mustangs turned the ball over on fumbles three times. Twice, the Bovina defense held, but the third time the visitors were able to capitalize with a touchdown.

The Owls made a two-point conversion, which meant that a seven-point score could have given them the lead.

Also during the period, Venable had a nice 55-yard run called back due to a penalty.

In the fourth quarter, Bovina drove to the Hale Center 20, where the drive stalled after the team got a delay of game penalty.

The game was a close one statistically. Bovina had 182 yards,

to 191 for Hale Center. The Owls led in first downs, 12-11.

"I felt our defensive line and linebackers played exceptionally well. We allowed quite a bit of yardage in the first half, but we made adjustments at halftime and shut down their running game completely in the second half," Coach Talley said.

Talley said he also thought Bovina's defensive secondary had improved, coming up with two interceptions. In addition to Noah's theft, Denver Riddle had an INT in the third quarter to stop a Hale Center threat.

Venable was the leading rusher for the Mustangs with 94 yards on 13 carries; Ware added 68 on 23 tries.

Talley said he felt like his program had come a long way, when you consider the fact that in his first year as head coach of the Mustangs, Hale Center scored 59 points against his team in a one-sided win.

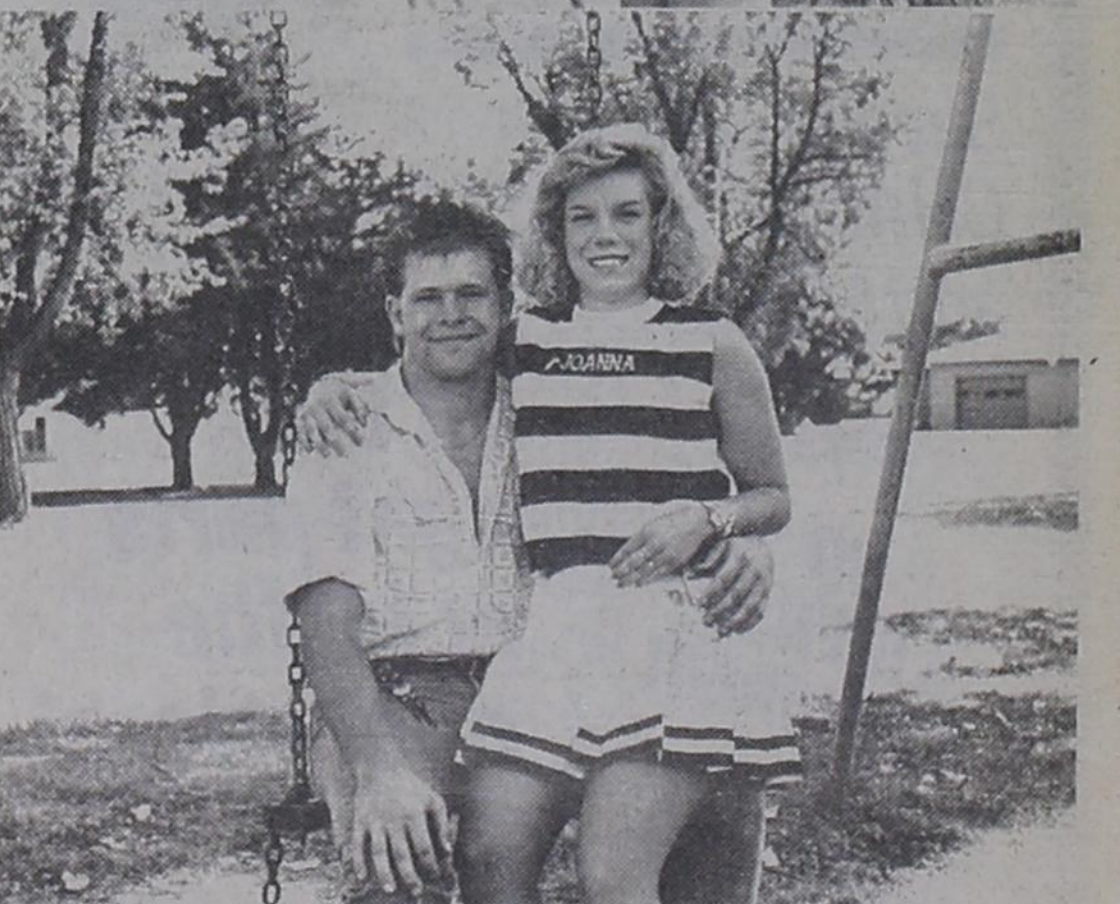
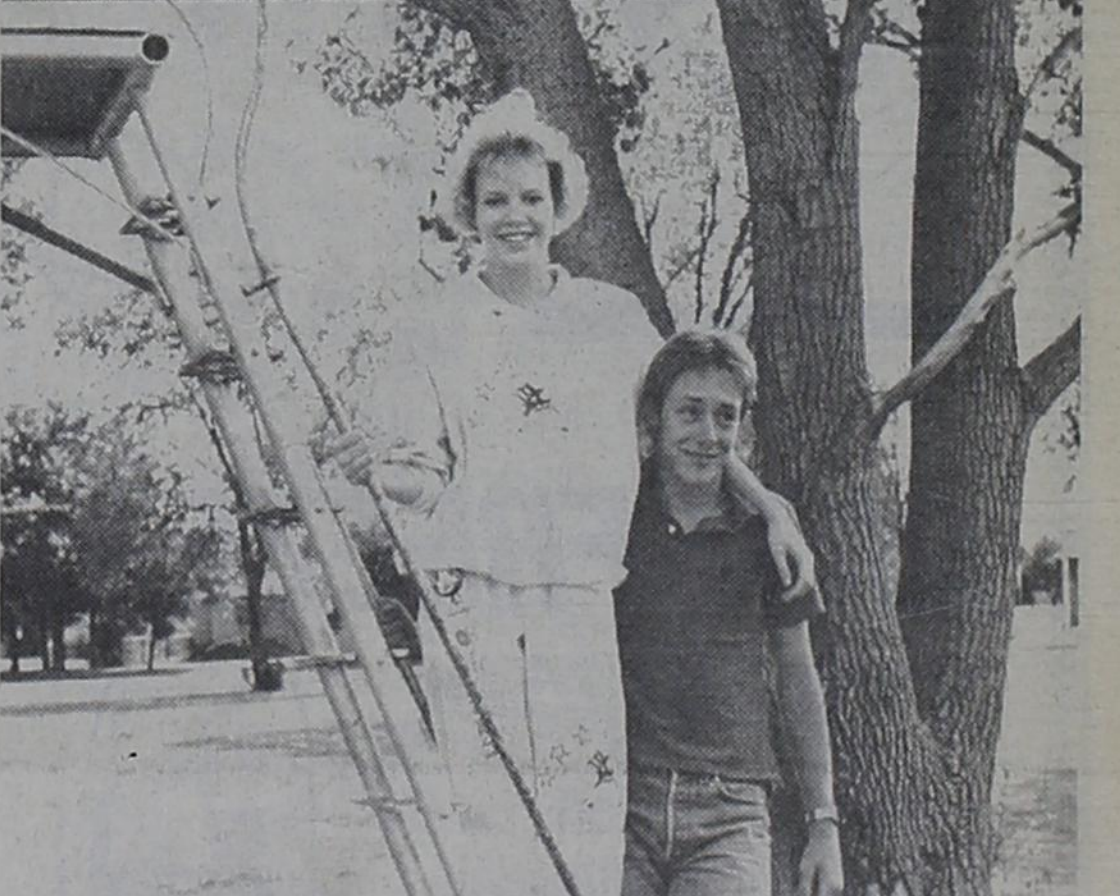
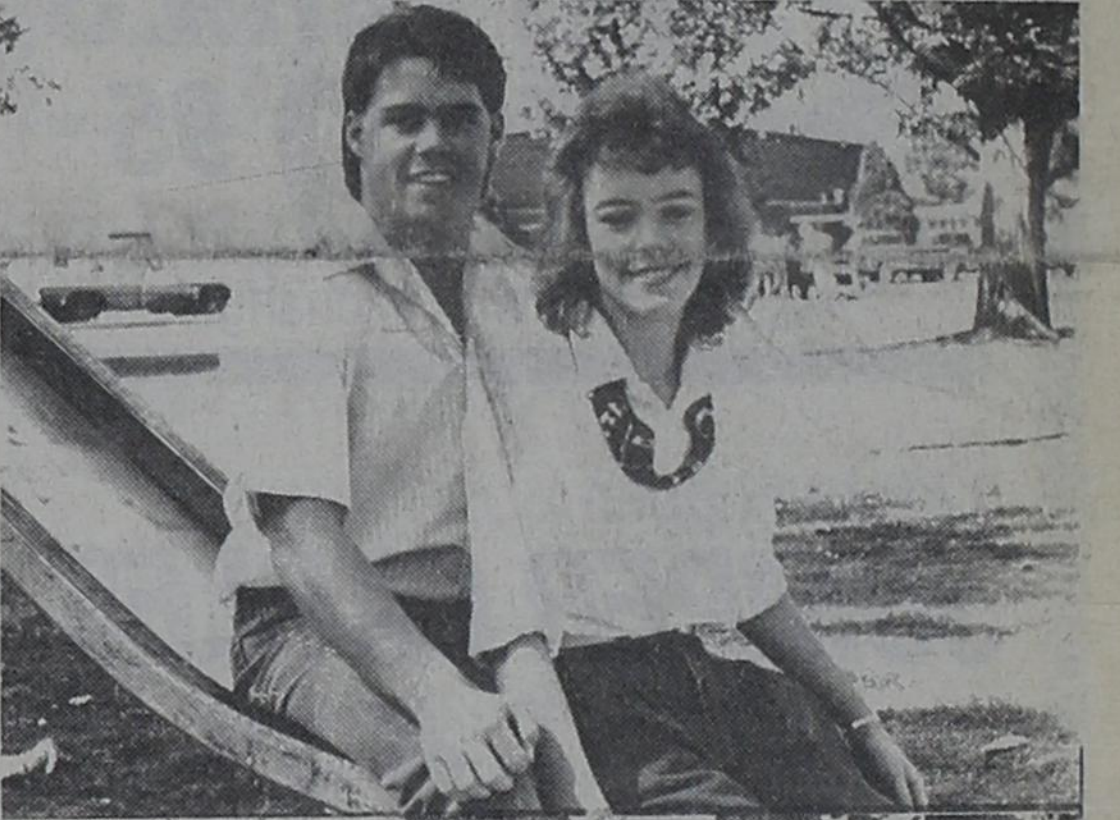
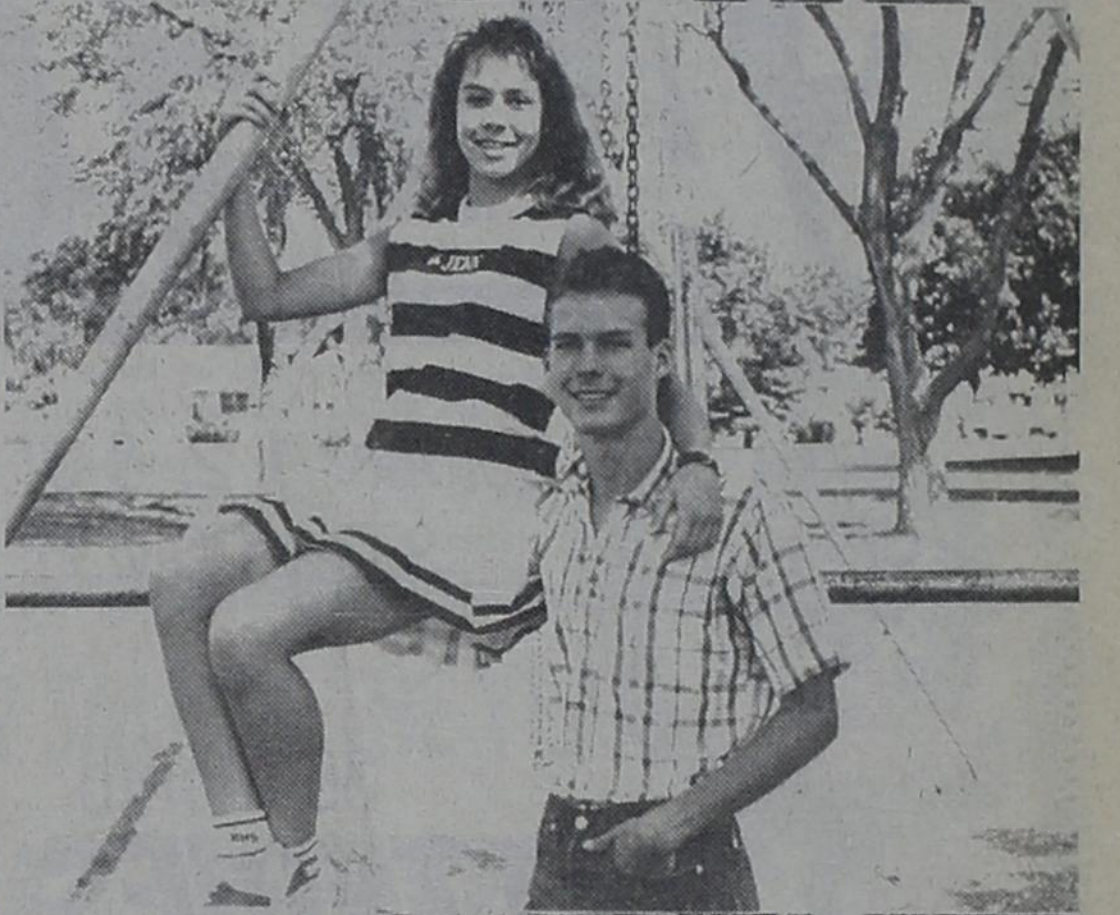
All of the contestants received misses on the Tennessee-Auburn game and Ohio State-L.S.U., both of which ended in ties.
