## WORK STARTED ON HEDLEY ELEVATOR

Men, teams and scrapers were on the job bright and early Monday morning making ready for the construction of the elevator of the Perrine-Fields Grain & Elevator Co., near the cotton yard, announcement of which was made in this paper a couple of weeks ago.

Speaking of this new enterprise and the men behind it, The Clarendon News says:

The elevator is to be 15,000 bushel capacity, or fifteen cars, and will be cribbed and covered with corrugated iron, thus making a structure of the very best type for the business. Fairbanks Morse engines, automatic scales, a grain cleaner, and an automatic dump in the wagon driveway will be the up to date equipment. At an early date, warehouses near the elevator are to be built as a storage for the headed grain. The driveway will be on concrete flooring down the center under the building. Thus there will be no exposure to the grain, thereby insuring it against loss in weight and grade.

Capt Nat S. Perrine and Capt. Robert S. Fields, the partners in the firm, have recently returned from Army service in France. Capt. Perrine formerly lived at Hedley and left here two years ago as a lieutenant with the company that was recruited here. Capt. Fields formerly lived at Tulsa, later moving to Kingsville where he farmed five years before going into the service. They were discharged July 8th, and came to prosperous Donley to enter business. In their new business we wish them the success that is due them, and believe that theirs it will be.

**SOME OBLIGATIONS PECULIAR TO CHRISTIAN PARENTS**

It goes without argument that parenthood imposes obligations not shared by others, and the Holy Scriptures place special obligations on Christian parents. Here as elsewhere Christianity lifts people out of the common walks and duties of men, converts them into servants of others, and sends them forth on a mission of amelioration and redemption. The religion of Christ has accomplished mighty little for those persons who "follow the multitude to do evil," live lives of selfishness and ease, and put forth no efforts to make the world better. The professions of all such are but "a sounding brass, or a clanging cymbal" in the ears of those with whom they have to do. Certainly such is terribly true of all those Christian parents who fail to provide for the highest welfare of their own children; for Inspiration emphatically says that "If any provide not for his own, and specially his own house, he has denied the faith, and is worse than an infidel." ITimothy 5:8. "IS WORSE THAN AN INFIDEL!" Mark the expression, and ponder well its meaning, for the God of all the earth said it!

In these strong and meaningful words are imposed upon Christian parents obligations which invite the curse of God unless they are faithfully and consistently performed. And these duties and obligations include much more than providing food and raiment for the physical needs. The most blatant infidel readily recognizes such needs, and willingly supplies them. Even the wild beasts seeks to protect their young, and to supply their natural necessities. Certainly parents who have received divine cleansing, and who have been called with a holy calling, are expected to do much more for their own offspring. The scripture quoted above certainly teaches as much, and human reason approves it well. All parents are obligated by every human consideration to so train their children, and so protect them against the many evils which destroy, as to enable them to grow into happy, useful men and women. But for Christian parents to fail in these and other important matters is to transgress against both God and their own children! These "other important matters" may be summed up in the words of him who said: "Train up a child in the way he should go, and even when he is old he will not depart from it." Proverbs 22:6 Or according to him who exhorted the fathers to provoke not their children; but to nurture them in the chastening and admonition of the Lord. See Ephesians 6:4. The one includes the other, but it also imposes other obligations—that of training for efficient service in this life.

And this raises the questions of education, of industry, and of frugality. No plea is made here for denominational schools, although they are better in many respects. But our public schools should be made as good as others, for they deal with the child during its most plastic state, and any hurt received here will prove lasting. Happily we have come to the place where no little caution is exercised in selecting the men and women (mostly women) who are to have charge of our girls and boys during life's formative period. It is deliberately written down here that a giddy headed, pleasure-seeking, self loving person has no more business teaching our children than a dancing master has in the pulpits of our churches. But that education which deals with the intellect only fails to measure up

to the constantly increasing demands, and so will it continue to fail. Habits of industry and frugality must be formed, and the earlier such habits are acquired the stronger and more fruitful will they prove. As a general proposition, those boys who were given employment and who practiced economy, have become useful, progressive citizens in the several walks of life, and so will it always be. There is no more pathetic spectacle than that young man or that young woman who grew up without employment or the necessity to economize, but who now finds that he or she must labor for a livelihood. Having received no training during childhood, they are without knowledge and skill as men and women, and are compelled to travel the gait of the plodder. Nor may we expect them to become citizens of much worth, for discouragements many will overtake them, and they will become hewers of wood and drawers of water of others.

Never before was it more important that these facts should be earnestly heeded, for on every hand, and from afar, come the cry and wail of distress. The "high cost of living," or more correctly speaking, "the cost of high living," is gradually enslaving the people, and more and more undermining the very foundations of our government and destroying a l that is pure and good in our social life. Millions of people are literally working and striving for that which is not bread, and spending their money with a lavish hand for that which satisfieth not. A halt must be called, and that immediately, and in the righteous way, else ruin and wreckage will supplant our

splendid civilization. Nor do we have to go far to find the one remedy, for, according to statistics, and notwithstanding our late world war, the population of the world is increasing four times as rapidly as food commodities are being produced.

Then there is the social life which should receive thoughtful attention, for society is laden with germs of many and diverse sorts. Whether an amusement is right or wrong matters but little, but whether it will prove helpful or injurious to the future of the child is of inestimable value. Women are not naturally better than are our men, but the conduct of our girls is safeguarded while our sons are permitted to spend their MANY leisure moments in all kinds of frivolity, and to go, we know not where; and thus it comes to pass that our girls and women are more easily reached with the gospel of Christian service.

And this suggests another and a more binding obligation under which Christian parents live—that of giving proper attention to the spiritual needs of their children. Just here is our greatest failure, and also our most disastrous one! How tragical that we fail most where our service is of greatest worth, and yet such is most always the case. Then, too, our most serious failure is chargeable against our men—the very ones whom God has made the heads of the family, and the leaders in every necessary undertaking. Many a Christian mother has labored on heroically from year to year, and that against many and mighty difficulties, only to witness her sons, one after another, drift away in to the bad, and finally go down

into that which is worse than ruin, all because the husband and father failed when duties called or when grave responsibilities made demands. Reference is made to our boys because our girls follow the advice and heed the example of the mothers more readily than do our sons. The boy worships the heroic, and will unconsciously follow the men instead of listening to the mother. Our boys will continue in the Sunday School, and give themselves to the Savior of men when our fathers willingly recognize their religious duties and measure up to their highest obligations as Christian men and servants of the most high God. But to fail here, is to deny to our own children the faith which we profess, and nothing but the most dire consequences may be expected to follow.

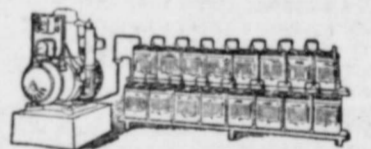
