Shall Hedley Have an Assembly Hall for Winter As Well As Summer?

Most people, by nature, are social beings and that social tendency is the fabric upon which our civilization has been developed, by people mingling andgiving other people the benefit of their ideas and in return they receiving information that was valuable to them.

The Greeks developed their civilization by being naturally progressive and able to acquire the best from the neighboring nations. Then the knowledge of the few became the possession of all her people, because they were one of the most social of all the ancient peoples. The schools were their first interest, but they came together in great athletic meets, one of which was the Olympian Games which has been revived in recent years by modern nations. These games have the honor of being the incentive of the Greek's greatest sculptur ing and the mother of that local patriotism which gave to us Democracy. They used every possible means to continually bring the people together, and at those gatherings all people were encouraged to take part. Oratorical contests were encouraged to the extent that every man was his own lawyer and the people was the jury. Because of such a life their love for home was in tense, and it was this love that enabled them to withstand the attacks of nations apparently stronger than they. The history of our own country's development is the history of our own

The social gathering may not e altogether productive of good t depends largely upon the purpose of the assembly. The gatherings should not always be of the same nature; if they are the people will become one sided. The purposes should be divided into political, religious, educational and entertainment. The first two are fairly well taken care of. The political campaigns, assisted by the press, will not allow people to become stale on the issues of the day. The churches are usually found on the job, and at work.

The school is doing its best, in an educational way, for the young, but a man's education should not cease when he leaves school, so his education should be broadened by lectures along the lines of public interest. It is true that people often become so engrossed in their own business that they forget public affairs, but that is exactly the trouble with many of our German communities: their own private interest is all they see, and you make an enemy of them when you try to convince them that they should have an interest be yond their own fence. 

COST OF VARIOUS HIGHWAYS

Macadam Road Is Most Expensive, But When Built Is Satisfactory and Permanent,

Dirt roads are ordinarily surfaced with sand, mixed with clay or with gravel, or brick, or crushed stone, concrete or other like material. The gravel road will cost from \$1,500 to \$3,500 a mile-the difference in cost depending upon the accessibility of gravel. The macadamized road costs from \$2, 000 to \$10,000 per mile. It is the most expensive, but when well built is both satisfactory and permanent.



IN JAIL 14 MONTHS, INNOCENT

Italian, Cowfused in Trial, Was Convicted of Perjury-Pardon Recommended.

New York .- Gov. Smith has grapted a commutation of sentence to Frank Rossamongo, a Sing Sing prisoner who figured in a famous case. Prosecuting authorities in the Bronx who convicted Rossamongo recommended that he be pardoned, after newly discovered evidence cleared

him of wrongdoing. Rossamongo has been imprisoned fourteen months. Nathan Lubin, "King of Pickpockets," was tried in the Bronx, charged with robbing Rossamongo. On the stand Rossamongo made contradictory statements. Lubin was given ten to twenty years. Rossamongo was tried and convicted of perjury in June, 1918. He always stoutly maintained he was in-

He got his story to the attention of the governor. District Attorney Francis Martin ordered an investigation. It developed that while Rossamongo on the witness stand seemed to have veered around from prosecuting Lubin to defending him, he was in reality only confused,

VIRTUE IS REWARDED HERE

Nine Dollar Errand Boy Returns \$575, 000 Lost Bonds-Receives \$15 as a Reward.

New York .- That he found \$575,000 in Liberty bonds and received a reward of \$15 for turning them into their owners was the story told by Isadore Geller, a sixteen-year-old errand boy who is employed at \$9 a week by Unz & Co., of 26 Broadway. He lives at 420 Junius street, Brooklyn.

Geller said that he found a package in front of the subtreasury building that proved to contain more than half a million dollars in bonds. He took it to the offices of Salomon Brus. & Hutzler, brokers of 27 Pine street, whose name was on the wrapper. Members of that firm de lined to dis-

cuss the story.

This can be done by local programs, high class Lyceums and Chautauquas.

The trouble with our place is, we have no place to meet only for R. H. BEVILLE religious services. Many activities that we have in our community are not suited for the churches. We build churches and schools but we neglect the other lines. Even the school cannot be brought together as a whole, and so long as it cannot be it is handicapped for the lack of continuity of spirit and purpose. For example, the other day at a teachers' meeting the question was asked: "What are you preparing in the way of public holiday programs?" and the answer came in chorus, "We have no place to give them." And so of ten we are embarassed by the questions: "Where is your as sembly hall?" "How eften do you have chapel?" and our answer is compelled to be, "We do not have an assembly hall; we do not have chapel; no place to meet even for a general announcement." Even the rural school is better equipped that way. The house is at least large enough to convene the school in a body and have some surplus room for visitors. Does the lack of a place for a general assembly for the school and the public, do you think, mean any. thing to your welfare and the welfare of your children? Does it mean that we are promoting the best interest of our commu nity by smothering the possibil ity of these gatherings? If we are right, then hundreds of thou sands of our leading educators are wrong. Candidly I believe it is thoughtless neglect, coupled with lack of co operation in attempting to get together on some plan. I have heard so many of the people express themselves as desiring a place for public meet-

ings and public entertainment. It has been suggested, since we have the frame and the roof of the old tabernacle, that it should be floored, ceiled and lighted for a place to meet in

winter as well as in summer. If we should do this, the basis for a model community would be laid. We would then have s school auditorium, a place for school programs or any other clean, wholesome community activities. If you are interested. let me repeat from last week's paper: Talk this to your neighbor, not once but many times, until he, with your assistance, will interest someone else to the point of DOING something instead of TALKING ABOUT what is needed. I think we agree that the need exists, but are you will ing to assist in remedying this crying need? If you are, TALK it, BOOST it, and BOOST THE OTHER FELLOW to help you boost Hedley.

Write for Samples and Agent's Inventor Lifts Terrors of the Fog From Harbors WASHINGTON .- Ocean fog has been tamed by the navy, so that it will no

longer be necessary for battleships and liners to lie outside harbors waiting a chance to creep in when the weather lightens. In a contract signed with Earl C. Hanson, a young inventor of Los Angeles, the navy department took the first step to make practical a new device to control vessels in a fog

> outside harbors. Tests will be made at once at the naval base at New London and later in Ambrose channel in New York harbor. By the use of the invention in connection with the radio compass, which the navy has now perfected, delay in ocean travel due to weather is

to be eliminated. The radio compass brings all shipping "in sight of land" and the new device, like a friendly hand, reaches out and takes the biggest of ships through the most tortuous channels safely and quickly to its pier.

The new device is a simple one. A cable is laid in the center of the ship channel. Through it is sent an electric current of low frequency, which through the listening devices on board ship gives off a sound of certain pitch that cannot be mistaken for any other sound.

The ship hugs the cable from harbor line to the dock. On the bridge and in the captain's cabin listening devices like telephone receivers are placed and attached by wires to the hull of the ship. The ship follows the course of

Boys' Working Reserve Proves a Great Success

F EW things that came out of the war have been of greater significance than the benefits derived from the United States Boys' Working reserve, though we are still too close to the movement to appreciate its results. Back in the

early summer of 1917 President Wilson wrote: "I call upon the ablebodied boys of the land to turn in hordes to the farms and make certain that no pains and no labor are lacking in this great nation.'

The result was that "our second line of defense," as Mr. Hoover first called it, the Boys' Working reserve, was formed. There was a spontaneous response in every state, many schools and other organizations under-

of boys who went out to help the farmers with their work. In 1918 this army of boys from sixteen to twenty-one years old was more than 250,000 in the United States. Of these 250,000 no less than 21,000 were from the high schools of Illinois.


So a glance at the Illinois report will give an idea of the results in the whole The Illinois boys produced crops worth \$23,000,000 and earned for them-

selves \$1,200,000. Less than 1 per cent of the boys have proved unworthy of the opportunity given them. About the same proportion of farmers proved unworthy of having a good boy sent them. The boys made the farmers open their eyes, and in a few weeks the

Women as Special Agents Under Food Control Act

OFFICIAL consideration is to be given the appointment of women as special agents for the department of justice in the enforcement of the food control act. It has been said informally that a recommendation will be

made to name women among the agents necessary to enforcement of this new legislation. This recommendation will be placed before Frank Burke, chief of the bureau of investigations of the department of justice.

The department of justice has employed women agents previously. A number of them did spy work in this country during the war. They were stationed in many of the larger cities of the country-New York, Boston, Chicago, Baltimore and others.

"I think women would be most valuable as agents in the enforcement of this profiteer act, not only for clothing overcharges, but for food as well," said one of the officials of the department of justice. "Women have been the purchasers of these commodities for years and they ought to make good detectives of profiteers."

Housewives who have long cherished the desire to get legal action against the retailer who has taken too much for little Johnny's shoes or the family beefsteak may yet have the gratification of pouring their woes into the ear of a feminine department of justice agent.

It will be interesting to watch the effect on clothing and food prices should women agents be named.

As the food administration acts during the war educated the women of the country, this new bill may give them additional insight into the matter of buying and selling in quantities

A year later a French army advanced to Louvain to repel a Dutch invasion. It was said that some of the French corps in that advance crossed the field and took offense, not at the mound or the lion, but at the shape of its tail, which, erect in the air, seemed to express defiance! The story went on to say that in their wrath they broke off the tail, and that the complaisant Belgians supplied the lion with a new one, no longer erect. but made gracefully dependent.

I went to considerable pains in 1901 to show that this legend could have no real basis, because the contemporary drawings in the Brussels Museum of Prints showed the lion being hoisted into its position with the tail in precisely the same form as it wears today.
