AUTOMOBILE STYLE SHOW IN CLARENDON JULY 4th

The Informer has received the following communication from Secretary Keen of the Clarendon Chamber of Commerce:

The Clarendon Chamber of Commerce and Directors of the Clarendon Fair Association had a joint meeting last Friday in regard to the Fair for 1920. It has been the custom of Donley county for the past several years to hold one or more Fairs each year.

On the Fourth of July the Automobile Dealers, Chamber of Commerce and City of Clarendon will stage an Automobile Style Show in Clarendon at which it is expected to have representatives of all the popular makes of cars, tractors, trucks and other motor transportation units. These, in addition to a regular display of their machines will give a series of programmed demonstrations of the workings of their different motors and be offered entrance into a series of contests designed to bring out the strong points of motor construction and operation,—such as 50 yard race in high, starting from standstill; races of ten yards in reverse; novel and fancy driving for the ladies; boys under ten years of age, etc.

The dealers are enthusiastic over the Show, and a large string of cars are expected to take part in the grand parade that precedes the day's program.

TIME TO PREPARE FOR INTERSCHOLASTIC MEET

Many of the schools may have been discouraged because of the "Flu," and consequently have done nothing to speak of in preparation for the Interscholastic Track Meet to be held in the early part of April.

But that same Flu will have served to give all the schools an even start in training for the various events. Many of the smaller schools think they can not contest against the larger ones. In all the Athletic events it is the individual that does the winning; it is the boy's own two feet that take him down the cinder path or in a long jump, and it does not matter how many, or how few, there are in his school, the boy in the contest must rely on his own ability.

Teachers and parents should impress it upon the pupils that they have time to prepare and have as good a chance to win as anyone at the coming Meet. Sometime teachers say their pupils will not take interest in the contest. In reply to that, those who have been in the Interscholastic League emphatically deny it. We all know that to get children to play all you have to do is give them a chance.

Hence, we hope every school will have some entries. Donley County took eighth place among the progressive counties of the State last fall at the Dallas Fair. Shall we as teachers permit our County to lose a part of the honor won, or improve that record? A country is rated by its school system. Let us take first place among the counties of the Panhandle in the District Meet at Canyon. To be ready for that, we must have a good county contest, and it is NOW time to get down to hard preparation.

MEANT TO SERVE AS BEACON NUT-BEARING NATIVE TREES

Statue of Liberty at New York Is Not Fulfilling Original Purpose of Designer.

The statue of Liberty, in New York harbor, is electrically illuminated—that is, so flooded with light as to be rendered brightly visible at night.

Originally, however, the idea was to make it serve as a beacon, and for this purpose the "flame" of the lady's torch was cut at the sides, the openings fitted with glass, and nine duplex arc lamps placed inside.

Thus was obtained a light which, upheld at a height of 305 feet above the water, was visible 24 miles out at sea, or ten miles beyond the anchorage of the outside lightship. Its maintenance was assigned to the government lighthouse board.

But the lighthouse board declared that it had little or no usefulness as an aid to navigation, its value being purely sentimental, and in 1902 the light was extinguished, the business of illuminating the statue being handed over to the war department.

Home Town Helps

FOR CENTRAL HEATING PLANT

Canadian Newspaper Warmly Advocates Such a Scheme, on Economic and Other Grounds.

The town of Renfrew has carried a by-law to spend \$25,000 on a central heating plant for the business section. It is erecting a new fire hall and takes advantage of the opportunity. Owen Sound is said to have a similar scheme under consideration. This is an avenue of small-town development that will be much more extensively traveled in the future, remarks the Toronto (Can.) Mail and Empire. Ontario towns are usually compact, the streets used for business intersect each other, and with the advent of modern heating systems in the stores and factories, the economic possibilities of a central heating plant are exceptionally good. Many cities and towns in the United States have adopted the system, and results have been very satisfactory. Instead of two dozen furnaces, two dozen firemen, one big plant handled by about three men, does the whole business. Modern insulating methods prevent loss of steam and heat underground and the service is usually better than any home system. The obtaining of coal is such a problem nowadays for the ordinary merchant and factory operator that the putting of responsibility on a city plant would be a great relief. The ultimate saving, once the heating equipment is installed, ought to be thousands of dollars a year. In many of the small Ontario towns stores are still heated by stoves, or hot-air furnaces, using anthracite coal. The statistics of the relative cost of steam heat cannot be made up without consideration of local conditions, because pipe-laying, radiator installation and plant costs vary with the size of the project, and the location of the premises to be heated. But the innovation is one that should commend itself to the notice of all town councils.

WRONG KIND OF ADVERTISING

Signboard Display May Catch the Eye for a Moment, but It Does Not Make Friends.

An important function of advertising is in creating good will. The permanent, lasting value of an advertising campaign is in the good will it creates. Signboards can do little toward creating good will and may stir up a lot of ill will.

There are certain classes of advertising that must be handled in a dignified manner, otherwise the advertising may do more harm than good.

If the information received is correct, various garden clubs have already protested against the use of signboards by florists, which shows "the way the wind blows" regarding public sentiment.

It has been proposed that motorists organize to rid our highways of the grotesque obstructive signs. Each member is to agree not to purchase any goods advertised on signboards. That will be an effective way to clear up the situation.

This gives the florists good advice and gets their slogan before our readers, both of which it is hoped will be profitable.—New York Times.

Trees on Roadside.

Believing that the problem of roadside planting should not be entirely set aside during the movement for a greater mileage of improved highways, active steps are now being taken by the New York state motor federation and the state college of forestry at Syracuse for the development of a planting scheme for the section of the highway running from Syracuse to Utica, a distance of about sixty miles.

It has been demonstrated by those in charge of the work that aside from the purely ornamental value of trees along the highway, many practical benefits would result from their proper use. It is not generally realized that trees, by means of their shade during hot summer months, prolong the life of the roadway for many years, and road experts in general are heartily in favor of this means of road protection.

Have an Eye to the Future.

It is common in a good many cities to find a street originally laid out to come to an abrupt end for a block, after which the street is continued. No doubt the founders never dreamed that more and wider streets would be necessary, and thought that in laying them out they were anticipating all possible road expansion for hundreds of years to come. Where such streets, by continuing them through the block, would create an outlet for additional traffic, thereby eliminating congestion and confusion, the property owners, as well as city and government officials, should take additional steps to rectify it.

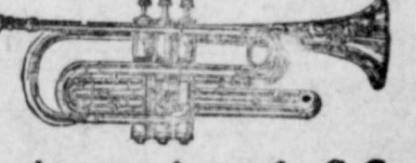

WASHINGTON CITY SIDELIGHTS



Hawaii Territory Is Desirous to Enter the Union

WASHINGTON.—Hawaii territory wants to be a state. A concurrent resolution adopted by the Hawaiian legislature sets forth this desire. The territory also wants various legislation at the hands of congress.



A Hawaiian commission will present to congress a series of concurrent resolutions adopted by the Hawaiian legislature setting forth the desires of the territory.

Gov. Charles J. McCarthy heads the commission, which includes Attorney General Harry Irwin, Senator Robert W. Shingle, Senator John H. Wise, secretary of the commission; Representative William T. Rawlins and Representative Henry J. Lyman.

The members of the commission, it is announced, will initiate no discussion of the Japanese question.

Authority to incur public debt in an amount of 3 per cent in excess of the amount fixed by present laws, 7 per cent, is to be sought from congress. The present debt is \$10,884,000. The additional money is said to be seriously needed for road building and schools.

Another proposal is that the governor, land commissioner and land board be given the right to pass upon qualifications of applicants for homesteads, to assure that "the remaining small body of agricultural land should be settled by a class of farmers who will remain the active owners thereof, and interested and actively concerned in its development."

Other concurrent resolutions to be put before congress ask: A law requiring residence of not less than one year in Hawaii for eligibility to appointment to federal office in the territory.

Extension to Hawaii of the farm loan act and the reclamation act of June 17, 1902.

Appropriation of \$1,000,000 for roads, pipe lines and water works in homestead tracts.

Permission for Hawaii to retain 50 per cent of all customs and internal revenues collected in the territory.

Long-time leases on arid lands upon which water may be brought.

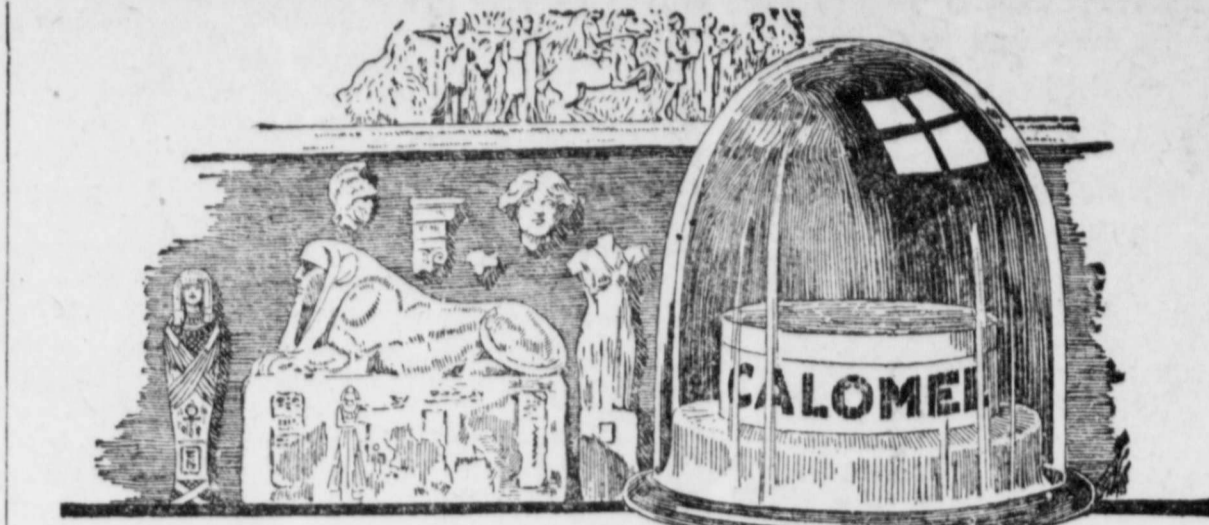
Mexico Has Been a Nuisance Since Jackson's Time

MEXICO has been a nuisance for a long time, it appears. Senator King of Utah read into the Congressional Record the other day extracts from two annual messages by President Andrew Jackson and a special message. The latter, under date of February 6, 1837, is in part:

"The length of time since some of the injuries have been committed, the repeated and unavailing applications for redress, the wanton character of some of the outrages upon the property and persons of our citizens, upon the officers and flag of the United States, independent of recent insults to this government and people by the late extraordinary Mexican minister, would justify in the eyes of all nations immediate war.

"We should act with both wisdom and moderation by giving to Mexico one more opportunity to atone for the past before we take redress into our own hands. To avoid all misconception on the part of Mexico, as well as to protect our own national character from reproach, this opportunity should be given with the avowed design and full preparation to take immediate satisfaction if it should not be obtained on a repetition of the demand for it.

"To this end I recommend that an act be passed authorizing reprisals and the use of the naval force of the United States by the executive against Mexico to enforce them, in the event of a refusal by the Mexican government to come to an amicable adjustment of the matters in controversy between us upon another demand thereof, made from on board one of our vessels of war on the coast of Mexico."

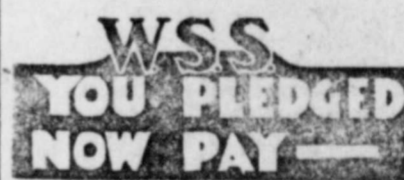

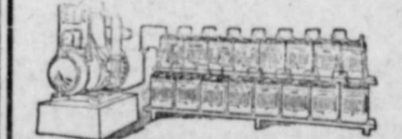

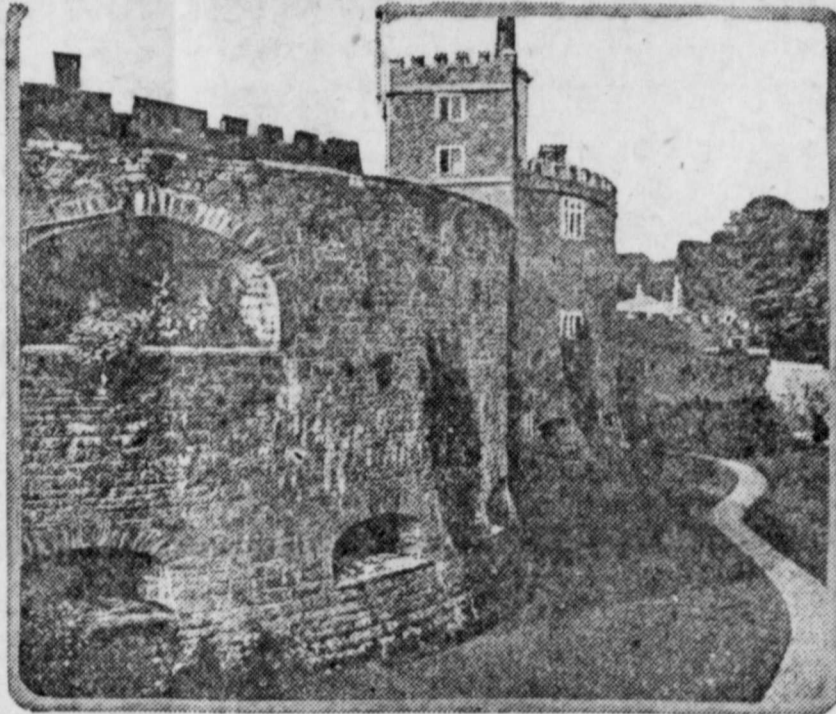

AMONG the numerous historical structures which the British cherish because in them, they feel, is visibly incorporated the prestige of England, not the least picturesque and interesting is Walmer castle, on the coast of Kent, the official home of the lord warden of the Cinque ports.

The lord wardenship is an older and more picturesque monument than Walmer castle. The office of lord warden is far more ancient than his dwelling. About that office are gathered the earliest activities out of which the British navy grew, writes Martin Conway in Country Life. The present functions of the lord warden may not be of any executive value as contributing to national defense, but, as long as there is a lord warden living at Walmer, the small beginnings of the navy in a remote past remain visibly memorialized. Such a memorial is more efficient than any pile of stone that the ingenuity of man could raise. Nothing more vividly brings the past into the present or enforces on living men the amount of their indebtedness to those from whom they descend than a living ceremonial recurrently performed in accordance with an ancient and unbroken tradition.

No one knows when the lord wardenship was founded or by what earliest stages it came into being. Necessity enforced the defense of the southeastern coast of England, and to that end the small maritime forces of the little ports along it had to be coordinated. The original five ports were Hastings, Romney, Hythe, Dover and Sandwich; to these others were added, as well as inland localities which had to contribute financial aid. Ultimately the jurisdiction extended round the coast from Seaford in Sussex to near Margate in Kent.

Importance of the Cinque Ports.
Throughout the Middle Ages down to the time of Henry VII the Cinque ports thus enlarged and organized had to furnish the crown with nearly all the ships and men needed for naval purposes. The oldest existing charter dates from Edward I, but it refers to older documents as far back as the time of Edward the Confessor. Duties and corresponding privileges went on accumulating. Such an organization could not exist without a head, but his office was of correspondingly gradual growth. At one time it was an office of great power and importance. It was generally coupled with the governorship of Dover castle. The lord warden was admiral of the ports. He had his court of chancery at Dover. He still retains the duty of appointing the judge of the admiralty court of the Cinque ports as well as the justices of the peace in the same areas; but his most important functions have become decorative, monumental and picturesque, not, however, as aforesaid, unimportant.

The maritime activity which led to the discovery of America and the beginnings of a world commerce necessarily made a great change in British naval affairs. Local levies of ships and sailors were bound to be replaced sooner or later by something in the nature of a national navy. The change is already apparent in the days of Henry VIII, and from that time the importance of the Cinque ports as the nation's naval base declined and with it the power of the lord warden. It is noteworthy that the erection of Walmer castle dates from this period. It was built in the reign of Henry VIII along with other castles round the coast, such as the neighboring Deal and Sandown and the remote Lindisfarne on Holy Island in Northumberland. Previously the coast had been protected by a succession of earthworks, the Great and Little Bulwarks, for instance, within the parish of Walmer. They had embrasures for guns, and were connected by communication trenches.

Built by Henry VIII.
The Kentish castles built by Henry VIII were completed about 1540 and under the control of the lord warden.
