ORDINANCE NO. FOURTEEN

An Ordinance Prohibiting Ball Playing on Streets and Alleys. Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Hedley,

Texas: It shall be unlawful for any

person or persons to engage in playing ball, or pitching and catching ball, on Main and Rail. road streets and adjoining streets and alleys within the corporate limits of the town of Hedley, Texas.


