To Meet Midsummer Needs



AMONG all the charming frocks that have been made to meet the needs of midsummer, it would be hard to find one more excellent in every particular than the novel dress shown here. It begins by fulfilling its mission—which is to look beautifully cool. It is a handsome affair, simply made, but embodying the last word in smart styles; it is an original design and it contrives to be informal enough to prove very useful. One can hardly imagine an occasion where this frock would seem out of place. It will lend itself to all sorts of summer backgrounds.

French blue and white pongee, with embroidery in white, blue and black, has been handled with consummate skill in this masterpiece. White predominates in the skirt, which takes advantage of the vogue for accordion plaiting and is made with four panels of blue set in it. The texture of pongee silk, like that of georgette, gives

the best effects in accordion plaiting; the lines are less hard and rigid than in plain materials.

The skirt is perfectly straight, with three-inch hem at the bottom and a narrow belt.

Blue pongee is used for the blouse and it is cut with short kimono sleeves and arranged to allow for a little drapery about the waist. At each side a row of five silk-covered buttons is set. A little fold of pongee finishes the neck and sleeves and the bottom of the blouse. Above this an effective pattern is embroidered with some blue and a little black introduced in a design of solid figures in white.

Carlsbad Now Karlovy Vary

WHEN EUROPE'S best advertised health resort awoke one morning to find its postoffice changed from Carlsbad, Austria, to Karlovy Vary, Czechoslovakia, the mental shock to the German inhabitants must have been somewhat like the occasional explosions of its hidden wells, from which its famous mineral waters come, says a bulletin of the National Geographic society.

Though it is located in Bohemia, the Englishman had introduced afternoon tea, and the American had made tennis popular, but the 17,000 permanent residents, who remained in Carlsbad after the annual influx of some 70,000 visitors, were essentially German, and Karlovy Vary remains so, according to the press reports.

Hence it is easy to understand how this island of Germans, under Czech rule, approached a political booby trap. Dispatches told of open display of Emperor Franz Joseph's portrait, and of the refusal of the native sons, who live by means of the saline waters and salt derivatives, to call Carlsbad by any other name.

Discovered by Charles IV. Tradition had it, and the inhabitants preferred to believe, that Emperor Charles IV. discovered the healing power of the waters that gush through the vents of the mammoth lid that nature clapped down over a seething cauldron far beneath the surface.

Atop this vast subterranean lake of molten mineral and hissing steam a river, the Tepef, flows lazily down a narrow valley whose slopes are softened by beautiful trees and traversed by winding trails and paths. Among these, some physicians intimate, the health hunters gained the rosy cheeks and buoyant spirits for which the springs receive overmuch credit.

It is just before the Tepef enters the Eger that the underground streams pierce the crust at numerous points, and furnish the waters used for bathing and drinking by those who could afford to go there; and either bottled or boiled down by the millions of gallons, for its salt and soda content, and shipped to all quarters of the globe.

During the season at pre-war Carlsbad the guest at any of the numerous hotels would be awakened at 6 o'clock, or even earlier, and would arise to join the procession toward the springs. At a popular one, such as the Sprudel, from which flow 440 gallons of water a minute, at a temperature of 163 degrees, Fahr., he might have to wait 15 or 20 minutes until a white-capped maid served him. For his protection, large glass covers were erected over many of the springs, and from an airplane Carlsbad might resemble a field of conservatories.

But to linger too long among the springs of Carlsbad is to miss its history. Here there is a grim sort of symbolism. For it was here, just 100 years ago last August, that Metternich plotted to clamp down the lid upon free speech, free press, and untrammeled teaching in the German states.

Origin of the "Carlsbad Decrees." There were signs that liberal agitation among Germans was reaching the boiling point. Autocracy was threatened. Prince Metternich of Austria arranged to have sympathetic representation from Austria, Prussia, and seven other states of the German confederation at Carlsbad, and then called them together in a hurry, under pretext of need for summary action.

Out of the conference came the famous "Carlsbad Decrees," and there can be little doubt but that the tinder for the world explosion in 1914 was lit at Carlsbad. There was formulated the policy, later carried to a relentless conclusion by the German empire, of press censorship, of state regulation of teaching in universities and all other schools, and a commission was created to inquire into utterances which every German state was bound to maintain.

Eighteen years before Metternich's method of political repression was new as he

while the rest of this Metternichian policy of repression is modified by the modern idea of providing safety valves, through which rise the springs.

Capitalizing the mineral waters was the principal industry, but not the only one, of Carlsbad. In the vicinity were porcelain works, and the shopper of the days when the wealth and fashion of three continents gathered there might purchase Bohemian glass and beautiful trinkets of many kinds, representing the Czech handicraft.

MOURN OVER LOST CHANCES

Few Who Do Not Claim to Have Had Great Opportunities, and Lost Them.

In an article in People's Magazine Hugh S. Fullerton tells of millions of dollars' worth of ideas running to waste.

"I'd rather have the idea I failed to follow up than the ones I made my money out of."

That was said to me by a man who ranks among the wealthiest in the country and who is credited, among his associates, with almost supernatural wisdom in evolving ideas and seeing their possibilities.

"Every man had one or more big chances to get to the top," he continued. "If you don't believe that, just get into any crowd of men, tell some yarn of an opportunity that you had, and overlooked, and then listen to them. Chances are every one of them will have a better story of lost opportunity than you told, and nine out of ten of them will tell a wonderful story of how some other man 'stole' their great ideas and got rich or famous from them. Examine into these stories and you will find, in the majority of cases, that the man who claims to have originated the idea did not do it at all, that he did not see the possibilities of it, or that, even if he did, he was not smart enough or lacked the initiative to follow it up."

There are more chances for men to get rich now than there ever were before in the history of the world, and more big chances being overlooked. Whether it is because men lack faith in themselves or because they prefer a humming bird in the hand to an eagle in the air, I don't know. They seem to think a man must be a super-genius or a great inventor.

I reminded him that he had a reputation as an originator, as an inventor and genius, in addition to being a successful organizer.

"Bunk," he asserted. "I do not claim to have originated anything. My success has been due to seeing the possibilities of an idea and working out the details so as to apply the idea to practical business. Probably a thousand men thought of the same things I did before I was born, and did not develop them. Some of my most successful ideas probably were talked over and dreamed over by hundreds who failed to work them out practically."

KEEPS FLY PAPER IN PLACE

Device That Will Be Appreciated by Anyone Who Has Sat on the Abomination.

A New Jersey man has invented a device to keep fly-paper in one position and from being blown by the wind on to father's favorite chair or mother's most treasured lace curtains. It consists of a frame having grooves at each end to permit the insertion of the sheet of fly-paper. A narrow strip of wood is forced down into the groove over the paper to hold it taut. At the lower end of the frame three grooves are located for taking care of any variations in the lengths of the fly-paper.

When the fly-paper is in its frame, it may be placed up in any convenient place, and will be so conspicuous as to be readily seen before being sat upon. In addition to being useful as a holder for fly-paper, the device can be used as an embroidery-frame or as a stretcher for cloth or paper.—Popular Science Monthly.





Woman Seeks Sunken Riches

Salvages Cargoes From Vessels That Have Gone Down in Great Lakes.

DIVER GAVE HER THE IDEA

Mrs. Margaret Campbell Goodman Has Recovered Fortunes From Wrecks on Floors of Inland Seas.

Cleveland.—Mrs. Margaret Campbell Goodman, the only woman salvager in the world, has regained a fortune which went down with the steamer Pewabic, in Lake Huron, 55 years ago. Succeeding where many men had failed, Mrs. Goodman has broadened her scope of work until she now has contracts to raise sunken fortunes in almost every sea.

Mrs. Goodman spent her early life in Mount Pleasant, Mich., and after her school days she went to Toledo, O., her present home. There she became interested in diving suits, after witnessing an exhibition of deep-sea diving in which the diver went down 361 feet, remaining under water for 45 minutes.

Treasure on Sea Bottom.

This feat of deep-sea diving convinced her that securing the floor of the sea for sunken treasures would be a profitable business. Remembering the loss of the Pewabic, Mrs. Goodman, after much discouragement, formed a stock company. She went to Alpena, Mich., and found Capt. John Persons, who had stood with his father, keeper of the lighthouse in Thunder Bay, and watched the ship founder.

Later, Mrs. Goodman located George P. McKay, the captain of the Pewabic. Captain McKay was living in Cleve-

land and showed Mrs. Goodman the manifest of the lost vessel. It showed that the Pewabic carried in her hold tons of copper, worth \$200,000 or more, and several hundred tons of pig iron. In the ship's express box was \$50,000 of "shin plasters."

The work of searching for the Pewabic was begun in 1916. In the first season's work, the divers took out 100 tons of copper and 100 tons of pig iron. Many interesting relics were discovered which, when possible, were forwarded to the relatives of the sailors who had lost their lives a half century ago. When the treasure chest of the ship was brought to the surface, the "shin plasters" were found to be water-soaked and valueless.

Considerable work was done in 1917, until the needs of the government, at war with the central powers, called a halt to all salvaging operations.

Deserter Lives Long in Cave

Ohio Youth Fears Firing Squad Because of Visit to Family.

GIVES UP AFTER TWO YEARS

Hides in Hills, Feeds on Herbs and Wild Berries and Such Scanty Food as His Wife Got to Him.

Chillicothe, O.—Stories of how a neighbor deserter from the Union army during the Civil war had been brought to bay in a nearby village by a United States marshal and shot, brought visions of a similar fate to Carl Amerline and impelled him to hide in the hills almost two years rather than face a firing squad at Camp Sherman.

Amerline, drafted into the army, left a wife and two-year-old babe at home. In the quiet, picturesque hills. He could neither read nor write and the largest village visited in his 24 years had numbered less than a thousand inhabitants. The bustling thousands at the camp, military restraint and customs weighed heavily on him and an impelling desire to see his wife and baby led him to quit camp to see them without obtaining permission.

Fears Firing Squad. At home, his father, a tottering veteran of the Civil war, told him he was a deserter. Visions of the firing squad flashed through his mind. Kissing his

wife and baby good-bye he took to the rugged hills.

There Amerline found a cave in which he slept most of the time, venturing forth only at night and at times during the day when there was little chance of being seen. His only fare was such scanty food as his wife could get to him, herbs and wild berries gathered from the woods and fields, and such wild game as he could catch.

2,000 POLES WEEKLY TO U. S.

Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid Society Opens Branch Office in Warsaw.

Warsaw, Poland.—Arrangements have been completed for the transportation of 2,000 persons weekly from Poland to the United States by the Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid Society of America, which recently opened offices in Warsaw. The Polish authorities estimate that 250,000 persons already have applied for passports, about 95 per cent of these being women and children, dependents of persons now in America.






