WE HAVE IN recent years been besieged by news releases telling about some honor or other that residents of our town have won.

Some of these honors are (with apologies to those who have "won" them) a come-on for people to sell books or plaques.

Our friend Sue Cannon at Olton had the following column in her paper this past week, and it explains how the "come-on" works:

"Dear Nominee,.....
"Dear Biographee,.....
"A 'personal' letter from....
"Your name has been put forward to the Hon. General Editor for biographical inclusion in the 1975-76 Edition of this world famed International Biography Dictionary...."

"You have been nominated to appear in the 1975 Edition of 'Outstanding Americans In The South,' which is a compilation of biographical information on Outstanding Citizens in the South."

"Letters, with phrases such as those above, designed to make you feel like you have really received some kind of an outstanding honor, receiving recognition world wide or nationally or in the south, are simply gimmicks to get the 'biographee' to buy one of these volumes! I say it's 'legalized robbery!'"

"A number of years ago I received one of these letters and actually was stupid enough to believe that I had been NOMINATED for that honor. So I proceeded to fill in all the information (they don't know a thing about you except your name and address). They take the information you send them and put it in about a two inch space inside a book printed in the smallest type possible, with as many abbreviations as there could possibly be and still be sensible reading.

"But the big play (for them)....
"You may reserve your copy of this publication and save money at the same time. Only \$45 for the two volume set or if you wish to purchase the volume that your biography actually appears, it is only \$32.50."
"The other company sends an order form that states if you order NOW, prior to publication, you may purchase a \$47 book for only \$37.50."

"Two more letters have arrived in my mail since the first one came and got results for the company, meaning I BIT...and bought the book! But NO MORE! NO WAY!"

"Now, there has to be enough room in those volumes for at least 10,000 names (give or take a few) and biographies the way they are printed in such a condensed form. So even if only about half the nominees, buy the books, look at the money this company is making....off of 'vanity,' 'pride,' 'ego' or whatever you might want to call it.
"It seems to me that something should be done to warn people (who are as gullible as I was) who purchased the book that it's not what 'it's cracked up to be."
"Last year at Hart High School, nearly every senior received a letter from this same office stating that they had been chosen for 'Who's Who Among American Teenagers.' Two DROP OUTS receive the letter! Now....how legitimate can that be?"

"Granted, there are some deserving people who should be recognized somehow, but this is somebody's way of getting rich off of making people think they have received a great honor. And who, receiving such an honor, wouldn't like to purchase the book just to see what has been said? These companies are betting on that!!!!
"And I say again it is simply legalized robbery!!!"

CCC To Lower Interest Rates

The Commodity Credit Corporation has announced that Price Support Commodity Loans disbursed on or after April 1, shall bear interest at the rate of 6.125 percent per annum from the date of disbursement to the date of any subsequent change in the interest rate. This reduction applies to cotton, feed grains, wheat, storage facility, and dryer loans, according to Prentice Mills, executive director of the Parmer County ASCS.

The interest rate on outstanding loans bearing an adjustment interest rate will be at the rate of

9.375 per annum thru March 31 and at the rate of 6.125 percent per annum from April 1 to the date of any subsequent change in the interest rate.

This lowering of interest rates will be of real benefit to farmers having a commodity under loan at this time as well as those who may tender a commodity for loan at a later date. The final date for placing 1974 crop cotton under loan is May 31, 1975. These cotton loans mature 10 months from the month of disbursement, said Mills.

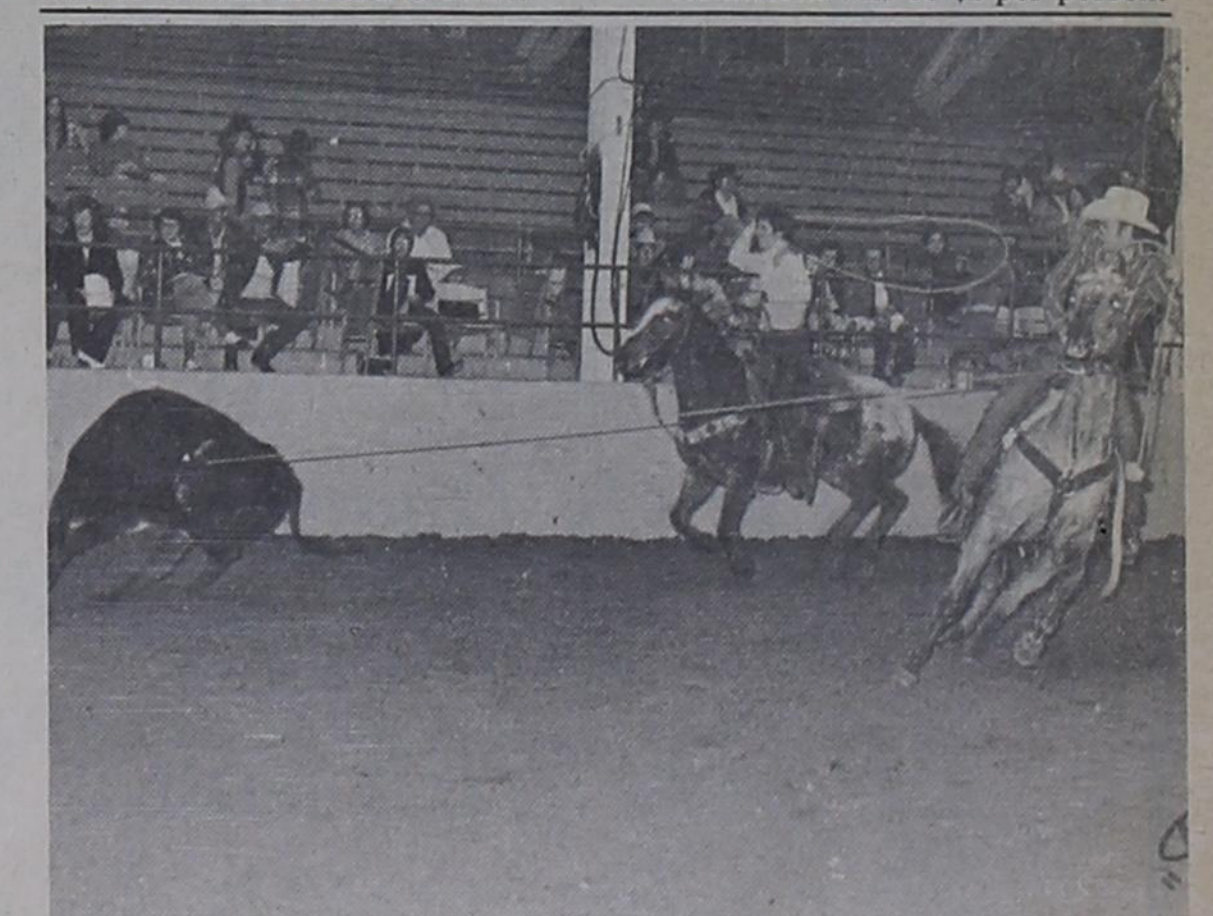

L.M. BOYD in the LUBBOCK AVALANCHE-JOURNAL: You know those gasoline rationing coupons printed up last year during the gas shortage just in case? They can't be used, ever. Turns out they're the same size as a \$1 bill, bear a picture of George Washington, and fit all the standard bill-changing machines. That nifty bit of nonsense cost \$12.5 million.

BILL SOUTHARD in the CLOVIS NEWS-JOURNAL: A brief item in the Feb. 28 issue of the National Review sounds like a sick joke. But, sadly, it's no joke. It says: "After finding a woman guilty of welfare fraud, Judge Arthur Sherman of Cambridge, Mass., ordered her to repay \$1,511.64 to the welfare department. At \$15 a month. Then he ordered the welfare department to increase her payments so that she could pay off the debt."

BEN EZELL in the CANADIAN RECORD: Members of the Canadian School Board obviously think it is a big joke when students who try to assert their individualism, and parents who support them, attempt to challenge the board's hair-styling rules. Board members are all smiles and full of good humor at hearings such as the one last week, and are even condescending to the parents who appear in support of their errant youth.

Board members can afford to be, we suppose. They have demonstrated repeatedly in recent years that they have the power to enforce their personal prejudices on the young people in their school system...even to the point of depriving those who will not

conform to the barber-college philosophy of Canadian High School of their right to continuing their public school education.

They have the power, and will undoubtedly continue to exercise it until their abuses of it eventually force the federal Courts to step in to uphold the personal freedom of individuals.

But we remain convinced that they have the right to exercise that power in support of what some board members themselves have now admitted publicly is "a personal thing" at the expense of the rights and privileges of others.

When students can be arbitrarily deprived of the privilege of continuing their education by the personal prejudices of a public school administration regarding such a purely personal matter as hair style, then it is no laughing matter.

This never has been a matter for levity among the parents involved, faced with the unhappy alternatives of yielding parental control over their own children, and more seriously, of losing the respect of their children in order to yield to what they believe are unjust and unnecessary restrictions...or, opposing them, of taking their children out of school at a time when it may be most crucial for them to remain.

It is an unfair choice, and certainly an un-funny one...and the members of the school board who can so lightly dismiss the educational future of the young people under their jurisdiction are exhibiting their own insensitivity in a most objectionable way.

Fillies earning honorable mention were Cathy Trimble, a junior forward, and Tammy Christian, a sophomore guard.

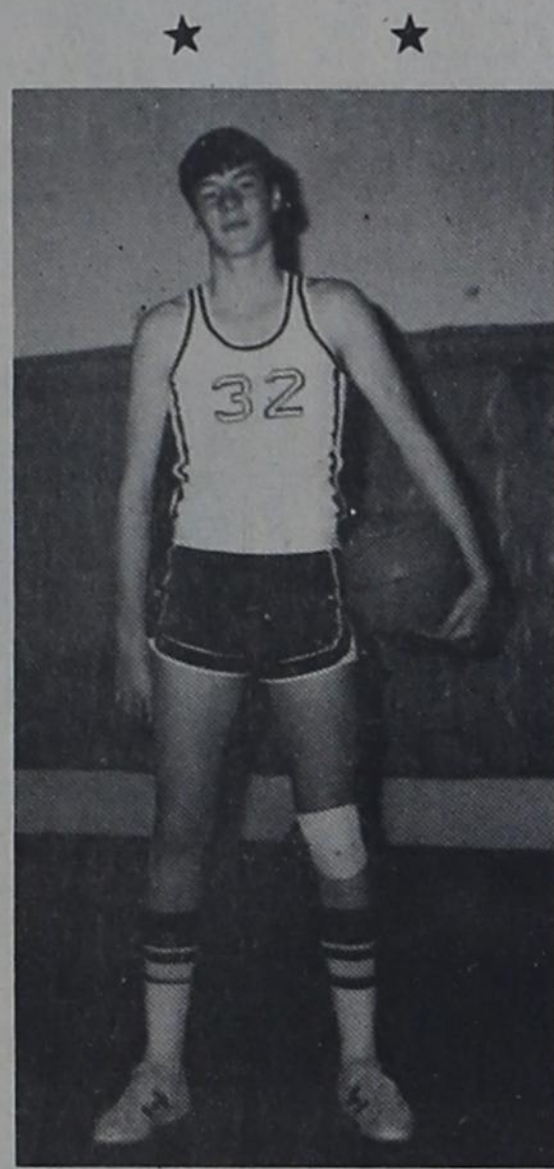

In addition to Jones of Bovina and Jones of Farwell, Richardson, Miller, Finch and Cleavinger were

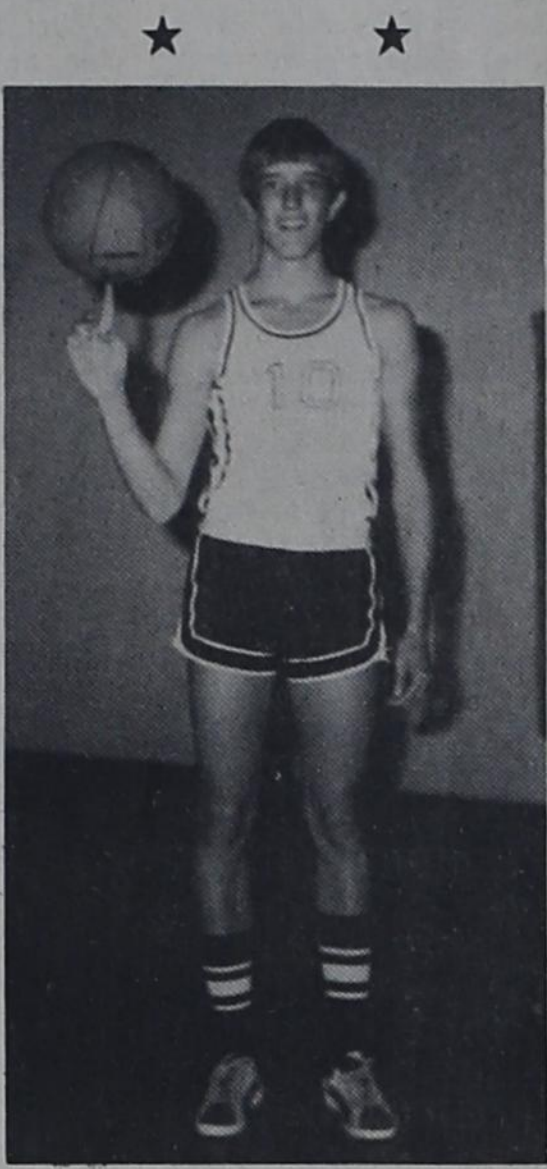

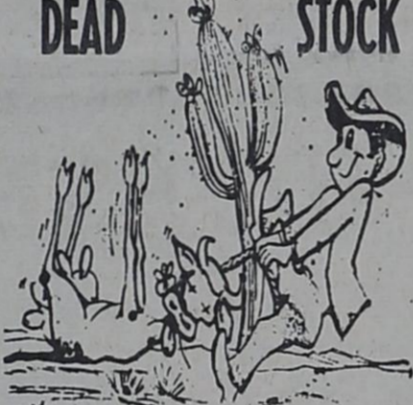

Irrigation Meet Set In Hereford

Irrigation field tests, underground water supplies and energy for irrigation are among the topics on tap for a High Plains Irrigation Conference in Hereford on March 14.

According to irrigation specialist Leon New of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and County Extension Agent Justin McBride, the one-day meeting will give producers and others a chance to get a reading on the 1975 irrigation picture.

Kicking off at 9:30 a.m., the one-day conference includes a catered lunch and will end about 3:30 p.m.

Paul Fischbach, professor of agricultural engineering at the University of Nebraska, will discuss limited water application with center pivot sprinklers and automated gated pipe irrigation systems.

He'll be followed by Leon New of Lubbock, who will report on the results of grower irrigation field tests in the Panhandle area.

Nolan Clark, USDA-ARS agricultural engineer from Bushland, will provide an update on irrigation research. And Duncan Ellison, executive director, Water Incorporated, Lubbock, will wrap up the morning session, with a talk on the status of water importation.

Noon lunch hour speaker will be A.L. Black, a Friona grower and member of the Texas Water Development Board of Directors. Black's topic is, "Action for the Future."

Leading off the afternoon session on the subject of underground water will be Wayne Wyatt of the Texas Water Development Board in Austin.

A panel discussion on

energy for irrigation will be moderated by James Hull, manager of the Deaf Smith County Electric Cooperative.

Final presentation of the day will be by Wayne Keese, Extension irrigation specialist from College Station, talking on the influence of pumping equipment on irrigation costs.

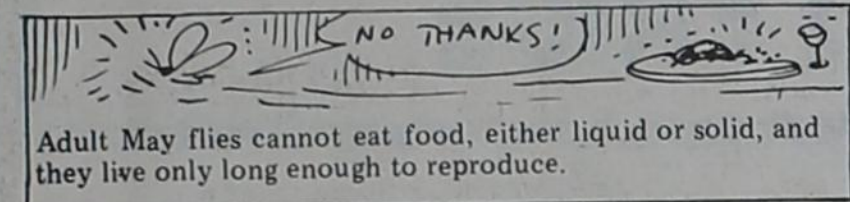

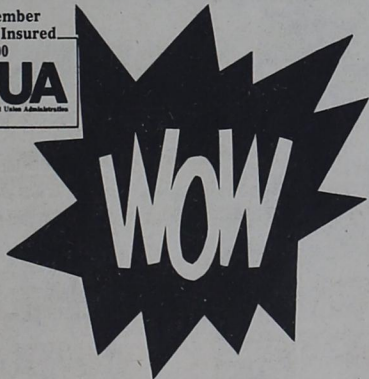

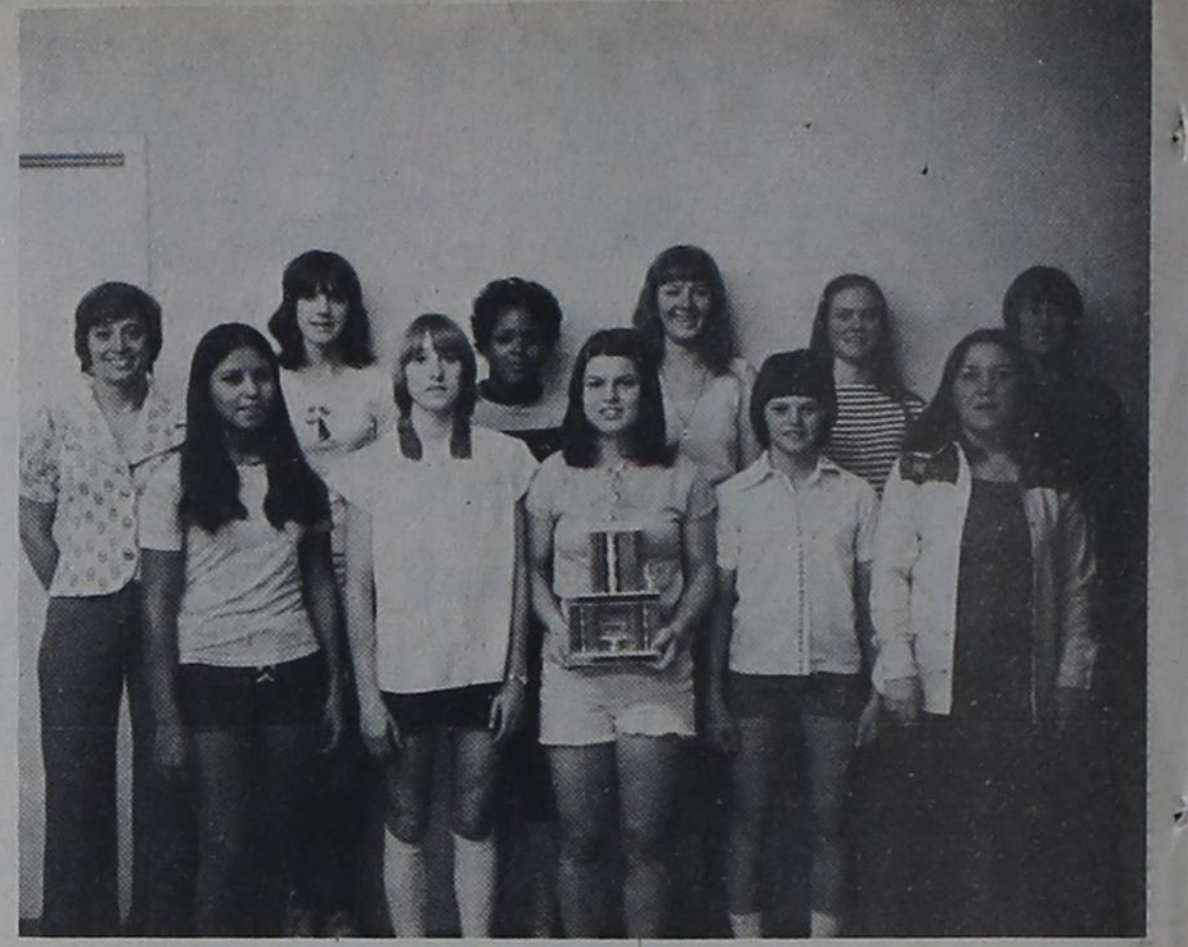
