
"In The Agricultural Center Of Parmer County"

WE HAVE IN recent years been beseiged by news releases telling about some honor or other that residents of our town have won.

Some of these honors are (with apologies to those who have "won" them) a come-on for people to sell books or plaques.

Our friend Sue Cannon at Olton had the following column in her paper this past week, and it explains how the "come-on" works:

"Dear Nominee,.... "Dear Biographee,.....

"A 'personal' letter from.... "Your name has been put forward to the Hon. General Editor for biographical inclusion in the 1975-76 Edition of this world famed International Biography Diction-

"You have been nominated to appear in the 1975 Edition of 'Outstanding Americans In The South,' which is a compilation of biographical information on Outstanding Citizens in the South."

"Letters, with phrases such as those above, designed to make you feel like you have really received some kind of an outstanding honor, receiving recognition world wide or nationally or in the south, are simply gimmicks to get the "biographee" to buy one of these volumes! I say it's "legalized robbery"!

"A number of years ago I received one of these letters and actually was stupid enough to believe that I had been NOMINATED for that honor. So I proceeded to fill in all the information (they don't know a thing about you except your name and address). They take the information you send them and put it in about a two inch space inside a book printed in the smallest type possible, with as many abbreviations as there could possibly be and still be sensible reading.

"But the big play (for them) "You may reserve your copy of this publication and save money at the same time. Only \$45 for the two volume set or if you wish to purchase the volume that your biography actually appears, it is only \$32.50."

"The other company sends an order form that states if you order NOW, prior to publication, you may purchase a \$47 book for ony \$37.50.

"Two more letters have arrived in my mail since the first one came and got results for the company, meaning I BIT ... and bought the book! But NO MORE! NO WAY!

"Now, there has to be enough room in those volumes for at least 10,000 names (give or take a few) and biographies the way they are printed in such a condensed form. So even if only about half the nominees, buy the books, look at the money this company is making....off of "vanity," "pride," "ego" or whatever you might want to call it.

"It seems to me that something should be done to warn people (who are as gullible as I was) who purchased the book that it's not what "it's cracked up to be."

"Last year at Hart High School, nearly every senior received a letter from this same office stating that they had been chosen for "Who's Who Among American Teenagers." Two DROP OUTS receive the letter! Now....how legitimate can that be?

"Granted, there are some deserving people who should be recognized someway, but this is somebody's way of getting rich off of making people think they have received a great honor. And who, receiving such an honor, wouldn't like to purchase the book just to see what has been said? These companies are betting on that!!!!

"And I say again it is simply legalized robbery!!"

The Bovina Filly track squad entered its first meet of the season Saturday at Littlefield and came home with the second place trophy from the Littlefield Relays, racking up 68 points in doing so.

Olton tracksters took first place with 175 points, followed by Bovina, Friona with 66, the host team with 63 and one-half, Farwell with 57, Springlake-Earth with 55, Muleshoe with 37, Morton with six and one-half and Plains with no points.

In picking up the second place trophy, the Fillies picked up two firsts, two seconds, one third, two fourths, two fifths and one sixth

Pat Shepherd picked up two blue ribbons with a first place in the shot with a toss of 33'8", two feet better than second place, and a first in the discus with a throw of 86'6", over nine feet better than the second place finish.



CCC To Lower Interest Rates

6 Candidates File

For School Board

The Commodity Credit Corporation has announced that Price Support Commodity Loans disbursed on or after April 1, shall bear interest at the rate of 6.125 percent per annum from the date of disbursement to the date of any subsequent change in the interest rate. This reduction applies to cotton, feed grains, wheat, storage facility, and dryer loans, according to Prentice Mills, executive director

of the Parmer County ASCS. The interest rate on outstanding loans bearing an adjustment interest rate will be at the rate of

9.375 per annum thru March 31 and at the rate of 6.125 percent per annum from April 1 to the date of any subsequent change in the interest rate.

This lowering of interest rates will be of real benefit to farmers having a commodity under loan at this time as well as those who may tender a commodity for loan at a later date. The final date for placing 1974 crop cotton under loan is May 31, 1975. These cotton loans mature 10 months from the month of disbursement, said Mills.

Board members can afford to be, we suppose. They have demonstrated repeatedly in recent years that they have the power to enforce their personal prejudices on the young people in their school system....even to the point of depriving those who will not

conform to the barber-college philosophy of Canadian High School of their right to continuing their public school education.

They have the power, and will undoubtedly continue to exercise it until their abuses of it eventually force the federal Courts to step in to uphold the personal freedom of individuals.

But we remain convinced that they have the right to exercise that power in support of what some board members themselves have now admitted publicly is "a personal thing" at the expense of the rights

This never has been a matter for levity among the parents involved, faced with the unhappy alternatives of yielding parental control over their own children, and more seriously, of losing the respect of their children in order to yield to what they believe are unjust and unnecessary restrictions....or, opposing them, of taking their children out of school at a time when it may be most crucial for them to remain.

It is an unfair choice, and certainly an un-funny one and the members of the school board who can so lightly dismiss the educational future of the young people under their jurisdiction are exhibiting their own insensitivity in a most objectionable way.







Fillies earning honorable mention were Cathy Trimble, a 'junior forward, and Tammy Christian, a sophomore guard.



In addition to Jones of Bovina and Jones of Farwell, Richardson, Miller, Finch and Cleavinger were






Changes Announced By MH/MR Outreach Office




